Windsor, May 26.—Protesting against the new taxation scheme as proposed in the recent budget, the Border Cities Retail Merchants' Association executive, in special session here, sent telegrams to Ottawa. Many amendments to the act are suggested, the most important being that the tax be collected only on the excess selling price, i. e., the amount over and above the amount excess selling price, i. e., the amount over and above the amount exempted. Former Ambassador to Washington Relates Dealings With U. S. Representative.

Berlin, May 26.—Letters from Count von Bernstorff and other German diplomatic officials have just been made public here in connection with the investigation of President Wilson's peace proposals during the war by a parliamentary committee. They contain much ancient history regarding various diplomatic moves, but here and there give an interesting sidelight on the events of the war from the diplomatic standpoint.

Increased fares may be effective before the end of the month. Preparation of a new street railway agreement will be commenced today, it is expected. As soon as this is accepted by the street railway company higher fares and higher wages will result.

It is not expected that there will be a hitch at this point, however, as in the discussion of the matter in the council it was generally intimated that the company and the city is signed or should accept.

The king and his wife are living at the same hotel here, and yesterday went to Versailles, where they lunched together and visited the gardens.







Present sugar prices in Canada are pased on advantageous purchase by refiners when raw sugar was less than half the price as at present. SAYS UNITED STATES MAY BE DEPENDENT ON OVERSEAS FOOD

Hoover Fears Decrease in Agricultural Production.

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Decrease in agricultural production may result in the United States becoming dependent on overseas food supplies. Herbert Hoover today declared in a letter to Representative Riddick, Republican, Montana, setting forth the former food administrator's views as "to practical measures to insure returns to the farmer for his labor and investment." Asserting that present high prices of commodities sooner or later will decrease. Mr. Hoover said: "This deflation must not begin on the farmer." Shortage in production outside the United States, wild extravagance and misuse of extended credits, speculation and profiteering and non-essential production were contributing factors in WASHINGTON, May 25 .- Decrease and profiteering and non-essential production were contributing factors in the present inflated prices, he wrote. When the collapse occurred, he preficted, intermediate dealers would be able to pass the greatest portion to the back of the farmer, no matter how carefully handled, he added.

The Revere Sugar Refinery and Henry E. Worcester, its vice-president, were charged with exacting excessive prices and withholding sugar from the market, and the American Sugar Refining Company and W. K. Green, its general manager, were charged with selling sugar at excessive prices. The complaints asserted that the companies had made millions of dollars by hoarding and regulating the price.
