



"If there is a municipal voter who says he does not know what is being done in connection with municipal works, it is because he does not want to know," said City Clerk Baker Thursday, as he completed the compilation of his annual statement of city activities for the year, a copy of which will be mailed to every voter. These will go out immediately after the municipal nominations, and will include the names of those whom the voter is entitled to cast a ballot for, and where to go to vote. All polling booths will, as usual, be located in schools.

Ex-penditures for 1921 are estimated at \$2,433,766,19 for the year, as compared with \$2,063,594.51 for last year, and \$1,-697,636.03 for 1919. The largest increase was in uncontrollable expenditure.
