### HENRY M. STANLEY HAS PASSED AWAY

Famous African Traveler Vic-

BEGAN LIFE IN A POORHOUSE

WORK in 1884, having established trading stations along the Congo River from its mouth to Stanley Pool, 1,400 miles by river. A description of his labors in this field was published by him in 1885 under the title, "Congo and the Founding of Its Free State."

Found Livingstone and Located the Sources of the Nile and Congo Rivers.

London, May 10 .- Sir Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer, passed away peacefully shortly after 6 o'clock. He was quite conscious to the last and able to recognize his wife. Before he died Sir Henry expressed a wish to be buried at his country seat, Furze Hill, Pirbright, Surrey. The question, however, is being discussed of burying him beside Livingstone, in Westmin-

Sir Henry Morton Stanley, famous for his explorations in Central Africa and his rescue of Livingstone and Emin Pasha, was born in 1841. He was the first to open up the Lake Victoria Nyanza district of Central Africa to the world. He also located the sources of the Congo and the Nile. For a time he was Governor of the Congo and from 1895 to 1900 represented Lambeth North in the British House of Commons as a Unionist Liberal. In 1890 he married Dorothy Tennant, a famous English beauty and artist. Stanley had published the following books: "Congo and Its Free State," "Coomassie and Magdala," How I Found Liv-Darkest Africa,

"Through South Africa." greatest achivement was the finding of the missionary explorer, David Livingstone. The search was carried on under the auspices of the New York Herald. He also represented that paper as war correspondent during Napier's celebrated march to Magdala. Henry Morton Stanley, the African explorer was born near Denbigh Wales, Jan. 28, 1841. When 3 years of age he was placed in the poorhouse of St. Asach, where he re mained ten years and received ar education which enabled him to teach in a school. At the age of 15 he sailed as cabin boy in a vessel bound for New Orleans. Here he was adopted by a merchant named Stanley, whose name he took, in place of hi original one, which was John Rowlands. His patron died without leav ing a will and young Stanley to his own resource

He enlisted in the Confederate army, was made prisoner an subsequently joined the Federal navy, serving as act ing ensign on the Ticonderoga. After the close of the war he went to Turkey as a newspaper correspondent, and in 1867 was sent by the New York Herald as its correspondent in Abyssinia subsequently traveled in Spain and elsewhere for the same paper. He was finally sent by the Herald to fin Dr. Livingstone, of whom nothing had been heard for more than two years. ber, 1870, and reached Zanzibar, on the east coast of Africa, early in January 1871, and on Nov. 10, found Livingston at Ujiji, on Lake Tanganyika, where had just arrived from the southwest. Stanley furnished him with supplies, explored the northern part o lake Tanganyika with him, and re mained until February, 1872, when Liv ingstone started on the journey fron which he never returned, and Stanley made his return back to Europe, reach

ing England, in July, 1872. Second Expedition. The eclat of his first expedition in duced the New York Herald and the London Daily Telegraph to send him at their own expense on another African expedition. He reached Zanzibar in the autumn of 1874 and, learning that Livingstone was dead, resolved to go northwestward and explore the region of Lake Victoria

Nyanza. This, after many encounters with the natives and the loss by death or desertion of 104 out of 300, he reached in February, 1875, and found it to be the largest body of fresh water or the globe, having an area of 40,000 square miles. He then pushed westward toward Lake Victoria Nyanza and was able to satisfy himself that it was not, as had been generally supposed, connected with Lake Tan-

Navigating the Congo.

Forced by the hostility of the na tives to return to Ujiji he determined to descend the great river discovered by Livingstone, and believed by him Nile, but which others thought to be the Congo (and Stanley, by his journey, ascertained it had been named by Livingstone the Lulaaba, but by Stanley was named the Livingstone. May 6. — On the night of the full moon in each month there are special services in all the Buddhist temples in Ceylon, and on the full moon of June and July - those special anniversaries of the chief events in the life of the Buddha, the great renunciation, the great enlightenment, and the entry into Nirvana - the ceremonies are protracted and elaborate.

Dig a border thee feet wide, running along the fence and enrich, with good soil, to the depth of 18 inches. Where space is limited no trees or shrubs should be planted on the lawn. All planting should be done in border. Next to the fence have grape vines, Virginia creeper and honeysuckle; also rambler roses. which are permanent and improve each year. The first season plant annua! vines with them, such as morning glory, wild cucumber, scarlet beans, Madeira vines, nasturtium, which grow quickly and soon cover a fence. Next to vines plant tall flowers-hollyhocks sunflowers, native asters, phlox, gold The last named is a grand plant to hide a fence, and multiplie rapidly and is also very hardy. In front of this plant iris, asters, marigold, snapdragon, zinnia, and a host o as most people have their favorite flowers. Plant the edge next to grass with low growing flowers, lik sweet alyssum, white candytuft and annual phlox. 



Frank Waters, a well-known man about the city, was struck today while driving a victoria carriage across the C. P. R. tracks, at Maitland street, by the express from the east, due here at 11:30 o'clock, and was badiy injured. Rev. Father Staniey, who is attached to St. Peter's Catheoral here, was in the victoria, but with great presence of mind jumped and saved himself a few yards from the track.


