JURY CANNOT SAY

How Fred Carey Came to Drown in the Rondeau.

He Was Apparently Stunned in Some Way—Those With Him Exonerated.

The inquest into the death of Fred Carey was concluded at Blenheim yesterday before Coroner Hanks. The following were examined:—Robert Carey, father of the deceased, James Mace, his half brother; Dr. Langford, who made the post-mortem examination; Hubert Murphy, Geo. Hibbert and James Kerr, who were in the boat at the time of the accident; William J. Taylor and W. R. Fellows, who were mainly instrumental in the finding of the body.

The general tendency of the evidence went to prove that Carey must have been stunned in some way before he struck the water or immediately afterwards. Dr. Langford testified that he might have received such a shock, but from the decomposed state of the body it was impossible to tell whether or not such was the case.

The jury returned the following verdict:—We find that the said Fred Carey was drowned in the Rondeau on Sunday, July 29, but the direct cause leading to his drowning has not been made clear to us. From the evidence adduced we would exonerate all those who went with him in the boat, from any culpability in his death, as every effort appears to have been made by them to reach him and rescue him before he sank.

and high fighting spirits. Peitsang was reached Saturday, and the allies took position for battle during the night. The attack was made Sunday at daylight. The resistance of the Chinese was most stubborn. For seven hours the result of the battle was in doubt. Then the allied troops rushed the Chinese position and the Mongolians were driven from their trenches. The American troops did splendid execution, fighting most gallantly. The losses of the allies were very heavy.

The Japanese artillery did splendid service, in the face of a galling Chinese cross fire, under which they lost heavily. The Chinese were forced to retreat, but saved their guns. Their rear-guard was attacked and practically decimated. The total allied loss was about 400.

CATTLE TRADE DULL.

How Nathaniel Massey Found it in Montreal—What he Says.

Nathaniel Massey has returned from a business trip to the eastern Eye stock market. He reports the cattle trade dull just now and he had some difficulty in unloading the consignment which he took with him. Speaking of his trip he said:

"The cattle trade was very bad last week, in fact the market was the dull-est it has been this season. The chief cause was the high ocean freight rates, spaces selling at about \$17.50 each. Then, too, owing to the South African and Chinese wars, boats are scarce. When the eastern buyers can't get space the market is blocked, and that is just what happened last week. The farmers in this section should understand that under all circumstances it pays to raise a better class of cattle. There are plenty of good beasts in Kent's country, but they are not fat, and so are not fit for shipment to Europe. The Durham or shorthorn breed is the best class that walks as far as the European trade is concerned and the farmer can make no mistake in raising these. They will pay him well."

FOR SEVEN HOURS

The Chinese Stubbornly Resisted at Peitsang.

Battle was in Great Doubt but the Allies Finally Rushed the Enemy's Trenches.

New York, Aug. 8.—A despatch, dated at the camp of the allies, Peitsang, is printed here to-day. Some new facts appear, as follows:—The expedition moved slowly, because it was found that the Chinese had placed many mines and torpedoes on the Po River. The Japanese in the advance soon struck a force of the enemy near Tien Tain, and skirmish followed. The Chinese fought well, and the Japanese suffered a loss of twelve men. The Chinese then retired upon Peitsang. Scouts reported that three large guns and many smaller cannon were in place in the Chinese intrenchments at Peitsang. A spy who had come out in advance of the allies brought in the information that the Chinese forces consisted of fully 40,000 men, well armed and strongly entrenched. The American and British troops marched up the west bank of the river. The Russians and Japanese moved along the east bank. Light draught transport boats with supplies and artillery moved slowly up the river between the columns. The weather was ideal, and the troops were in good condition.

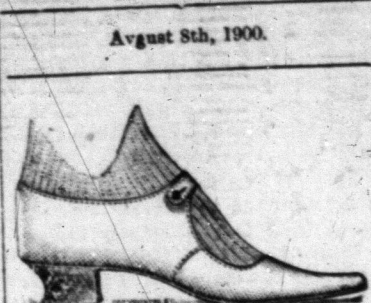

A NEEDED WARNING.

The Brantford Expositor reiterates a warning against the indiscriminate filling up of the Northwest with alien races. It points out that the character of the original settlers determines the character of the population in the districts settled for many years after-

ward. The extent to which the characteristics of the early settlers have been transmitted to those who have followed them is particularly noticeable in many parts of Ontario. Happily for us, the early settlers of this province were of the right kind. How different Ontario would be to-day had it been settled by the same class of people that are now being rushed in from Europe to fill up Western Canada!

There would not be so much cause for apprehension if the immigrants now being brought in were scattered over the Dominion. But, generally speaking, they come in as communities, and are located by themselves. The United States, with its large native population, has succeeded to a wonderful extent in assimilating the mass of emigrants that has reached its shores. Yet, even in the United States, the merging of the various elements has been far from complete. How much less complete will fusion be in the Northwest, where population is sparse, and where, under the system of settlement that is being followed, the new arrivals are isolated from even the two or three hundred thousand Canadians who now reside west of Lake Superior.

A PECULIAR ARGUMENT AGAINST CREMATION.

The American opponents and advocates of cremation are much interested just now in a statement which has been made by a distinguished chemist, to the effect that if cremation should ever become a universal practice the world's supply of coal would speedily be exhausted. This chemist is Prof. Clemens Winkler, of Saxony, and his statement is the result of long study on this subject. The world's population, he says, consists of about 1,500,000,000 persons, and of these about 21,000,000 die every year. Now, if all these bodies were to be cremated, the amount of coal which would be used for this purpose would, he maintains, be 14,849,000, or, in round numbers, 15,000,000 tons.

Many years, however, he admits, are likely to elapse before the entire world decides to substitute cremation for the prevailing method of burial, and, therefore, instead of laying stress on what is likely to happen in this far distant time, he draws attention to certain statistics which are of more immediate interest. There are, he says, 100 cities in the world each of which has a population exceeding 100,000 and the aggregate population of which is 82,000,000.

The number of deaths in these cities amounts annually to 1,640,000, and if all these bodies were to be cremated the amount of coal required for this purpose each year would be 785,500 tons. That such a large quantity of coal should be consumed in this way seems to him highly undesirable, and he expresses the hope that encouragement will not be given to those who are in favor of using for the annihilation of dead bodies a most valuable material, and one of which the living may soon be in need if much of it is consumed in this way.

Confession of Crime by Hypnotism. Public interest has been aroused recently on this question by the extortion of a confession from a thief by means of hypnotism.

A confession of crime obtained in this way may or may not be a valid one. It is not necessarily infallible, any more than a voluntary confession would be. It would have to be verified by other evidence before it could be seriously considered.

Hypnotism will not make a liar instantly veracious. It is a very common opinion that a hypnotist can completely capture the mind of his patient without his consent, and discover all the secrets of his past life. Hypnotism only gives us a means whereby we can the more readily get at the divine man within. It is not so much a key to the door of a man's mind as a more effective way of rousing the door-bell and entering with the occupant.

Generally speaking, a strong-willed man may still keep his secrets in spite of all influences, hypnotic or otherwise. As a rule criminals are very hard to hypnotize because they set their whole nature against it. The notist, and when a man is under the influence of hypnotism it is impossible to do anything against him.

There is no doubt that hypnotism can and will be used to detect crime. But we are only on the threshold of knowledge in this direction, and no one can set limits to the future of hypnotism in overcoming the obstinacy of the old, ineffectual methods of revealing the moral nature of the offender. By hypnotism we can reach people who are moral imbeciles, and by no other power known to man can you do this.

We can discover the sense of right and wrong where none seemed to exist. We can overcome evil habits and awaken the higher self which never completely dies in any man or woman.

Where every other influence has failed to restore a man to moral sanity, hypnotism has succeeded. So I would say that if it fails to extract a confession from a criminal no other means can be used with success.

There is such a thing as compulsory hypnotism, which can be applied to any person without his consent. It is possible to start a human will as you might break a china vase against a rock. But this is a new and almost undeveloped field, about which little can be said at present.

A MESSAGE FROM PEKIN.
Washington, Aug. 8.—The following cablegram from Minister Conger was received last night by the state department:
Tsi-An Yamen, Aug. 7.
To Secretary of State:
Still besieged. Situation more precarious. Chinese government insisting upon our leaving Pekin, which would be certain death. Rifle firing upon us daily by imperial troops. Have abundant courage, but little ammunition or provisions. Two progressive yamen ministers beheaded. All connected with legation of United States well at the present moment.

The cablegram came in the official cipher of the department, which a recently issued edict permits.

THE QUEEN'S SPEECH.
London, August 8.—The Queen's speech at the proroguing of parliament, after stating that the relations with the powers of Europe and America continue friendly and a reference to the establishment of the Commonwealth of Australia, refers to the war in South Africa, "which has placed in the strongest light the heroism and high military qualities of the troops brought together under my banner from this country, from Canada, Australia and my South African possessions." The speech then says: "Believing the continued independence of the republics to be a constant danger to the peace of South Africa, I authorized the annexation of the Free State as a first step to the union of the races under an institution which may in time be developed so as to secure equal rights and privileges in South Africa." The address also promises full punishment against the Chibans.

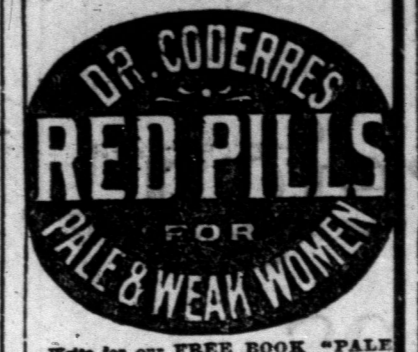
