

The forenoons were devoted to lectures and such practical work as could be done in-doors. The afternoons were spent principally in visiting points of interest to the geologist, mineralogist, botanist or entomologist, and collecting such specimens as could be carried The dissection of lobsters, oys away. ters and clams, experiments in physics and chemistry, the analysis of plants and the testing of minerals by b'owpipe were some of the practical in-door exercises. Some excellent apparatus, of a very cheap kind, was constructed and teachers learned the important lesson that experiments, imparting very valuable information, may be perform ed at a trifling expense. The lectures were so interspersed with experiments as to make them intensely interesting.

An excursion to Trenton, ten miles from Pictou, afforded an opportunity to visit the Steel, and Glass Works. tages from the smelting of scrap iron till it was formed into bars of steele or axles for rail-cars. The Glass Works were not in operation ; but the buildings, machinery, dies, &c., were in. spected. From these, some idea of the kind, and magnitude of the work was obtained.
