FIRST SESSION, SEVENTH PARLIAMENT, 1891.

Wednesday, 29th April, 1891.

At the First Session of the Seventh Parliament of the Dominion of *Canada*, begun and holden in the City of *Ottawa*, on the Twenty-ninth day of April, in the Fifty-fourth year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lady *Victoria*, of the United Kingdom of *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, Queen, Defender of the Faith, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

On which day, being the first day of the meeting of this Parliament for the Despatch of Business, pursuant to a Proclamation (hereunto annexed) John George Bourinot, Esquire, Clerk of the House of Commons, Donald William Macdonell, Henry Hartney and François Fortunat Rouleau, Esquires, Commissioners appointed by Dedimus Potestatem for administering the Oath to the Members of the House of Commons, all attending according to their duty, Samuel E. St. O. Chapleau, Esquire, Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, delivered to the said John George Bourinot, a Roll containing a List of the names of such Members as had been returned to serve in this Parliament (a copy of which List is hereunto annexed), the said Commissioners did administer the Oath to the Members who appeared, which being done, and the Members having subscribed the Roll containing the Oath, they repaired to their seats in the House.

A Message was brought by *Réné E. Kimber*, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod :---

GENTLEMEN :---

The Honourable Sir William Johnstone Ritchie, Deputy Governor, desires the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Senate Chamber.

Accordingly the House went up to the Senate Chamber; where being,

The Honourable the Speaker of the Senate said :---

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate, and

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The Honourable Sir William Johnstone Ritchie, Deputy Governor, does not see fit to declare the causes of summoning the present Parliament of Canada until a Speaker of the House of Commons shall have been chosen according to Law; but To-morrow, at the hour of Three o'clock in the afternoon, His Excellency the Governor General will declare the causes of his calling this Parliament.

And the Members having returned;

The Right Honourable Sir John A. Macdonald, addressing himself to the Clerk of the House (who standing up, pointed to him and then sat down) proposed to the House for their Speaker, Peter White, Esquire, Member, representing the Electoral District of the North Riding of the County of Renfrew, and moved, "That Peter White, Esquire, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker," in which Motion he was seconded by the Honourable Sir Hector L. Langevin.

And the Question being called for, "That *Peter White*, Esquire, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker," it was accordingly put by the Clerk, and

Resolved, nemine contradicente, That Peter White, Esquire, do take the Chair of this House as Speaker.

And the Clerk having declared Mr. White duly elected, he was taken out of his place by the said Sir John A. Macdonald and Sir Hector L. Langevin, and conducted to the Chair; where standing on the upper step, he returned his humble acknowledgments to the House for the great honour they had been pleased to confer upon him by unanimously choosing him to be their Speaker.

And thereupon he sat down in the Chair, and the Mace (which before lay under the Table) was laid upon the Table.

Then Sir John A. Macdonald moved, seconded by Sir Hector L. Langevin, That this House do now adjourn until To-morrow at Three o'clock P.M. And the House accordingly adjourned.

Thursday, 30th April, 1891.

The House having met; and Mr. Speaker elect having taken the Chair;

PRAYERS.

A Message was brought by *Réné E. Kimber*, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod:-

MR. SPEAKER,

His Excellency the Governor General desires the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the Senate Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker elect, with the House, went up to the Senate Chamber; And there Mr. Speaker spoke to the following effect, viz.:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :---

The House of Commons have elected meas their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me, and not to the Commons, whose servant I am, and who through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and Country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of speech in their Debates, access to Your Excellency's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Excellency the most favourable consideration.

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the Senate said :---

MR. SPEAKER,

I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor General to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the House of Commons to Her Majesty's person and Government, and not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you, that the Commons shall have ready access to His Excellency upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

And the House having returned :---

Mr. Speaker reported that the House had been in the Senate Chamber, and that he had informed His Excellency that the choice of Speaker had fallen upon him; and also in the name of this House and on its behalf, he had laid claim to all their rights and privileges, that they may enjoy freedom of speech in their Debates, and have access to His Excellency's person, as occasion shall require, and that all their proceedings may receive from His Excellency the most favourable construction; to which His Excellency was pleased to say that he readily and willingly granted and allowed the Commons their constitutional privileges, as well as ready access to His Excellency on all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as their words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favourable construction.

Mr. Speaker informed the House, That he had received a Certificate bearing date, the eighth day of November, 1890, of the Honourable Mr. Justice Armour, one of the Judges selected for the trial of Election Petitions, pursuant to "The Dominion Controverted Election Act, 1874," relating to the Election Petition,

Ordered, That Sir John A. Macdonald have leave to bring in a Bill respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, That when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which he read to the House. as followeth :---

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate :

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I am glad to welcome you to the duties of the first Session of a new Parliament, which I hope will be memorable for wise deliberations, and for measures adapted to the progress and development of the Dominion.

The season in which you are assembled has opened auspiciously for the industries of our people. Let us hope that their labours may be crowned with fruitful returns from land and sea, and that the great resources of *Canada* may continue to reward the toil and enterprise of its inhabitants.

My advisers, availing themselves of opportunities which were presented in the closing months of last year, caused the Administration of the United States to be reminded of the willingness of the Government of Canada to join in making efforts for the extension and development of the trade between the Republic and the Dominion, as well as for the friendly adjustment of those matters of an international character which remain unsettled. I am pleased to say that these representations have resulted in an assurance that, in October next, the Government of the United States will be prepared to enter on a Conference to consider the best means of arriving at a practical solution of these important questions. The papers relating to this subject will be laid before you.

Under these circumstances, and in the hope that the proposed Conference may result in arrangements beneficial to both countries, you will be called upon to consider the expediency of extending, for the present season, the principal provisions of the protocol annexed to the Washington Treaty, 1888, known as the Modus Vivendi.

A disposition having been manifested in the United Kingdom to impose on seagoing ships engaged in the cattle trade increased safeguards for life and greater restrictions against improper treatment, careful enquiry has been made as to the incidents of that trade in so far as this country is concerned. The evidence elicited on this enquiry will be laid before you. While I am glad to learn that our shipping is free from reproach in that regard, your attention will be invited to a measure which will remove all reasonable apprehensions of abuses arising in the future in connection with so important a branch of our commerce.

The early coming into force of the Imperial Statute relating to the Vice-Admiralty Courts of the Empire has made it necessary to revise the laws in force in *Canada* respecting our courts of maritime jurisdiction, and a measure will therefore be laid before you designed to reorganize those tribunals.

A Code of Criminal Law has been prepared in order that this branch of our jurisprudence may be simplified and improved, to which your best attention is invited.

Measures relating to the Foreshores of the Dominion and to the obstruction of its navigable waters, will be submitted to you, and you will also be asked to consider amendments to the Acts relating to the *North-West Territories*, to the Exchequer Court Act, and to the Acts relating to Trade Marks.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons :

The accounts for the past year will be submitted to you. The Revenue, after providing for the services to which yo: appropriated it, has left a surplus for the works which you designed to be carried on by Capital expenditure.

The Estimates for the coming year will be laid before you at an early date.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons :

I pray that in the consideration of these matters, and in the performance of all the labours which will devolve on you, your deliberations may be Divinely aided, and that your wisdom and patriotism may enlarge the prosperity of the Dominion, and promote in every way the well-being of its people.

to His Excellency the Governor General to thank His Excellency for his gracious Speech at the opening of the present Session of the Parliament of *Canada*.

And the Question being put on the Resolution : It was resolved in the Affirmative. Resolved, That the said Resolution be referred to a Select Committee composed of Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Hector L. Langevin and Messieurs Foster, Hazen and Corbould, to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Governor General to both Houses of Parliament, in conformity to the said Resolution.

Sir John A. Macdonald reported from the Select Committee appointed to draw up an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, That they had drawn up an Address accordingly, and the same was read as followeth :--

To HIS EXCELLENCY the Right Honourable Sir Frederick Arthur Stanley, Baron Stanley of Preston, in the County of Lancaster, in the Peerage of Great Britain; Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor General of Canada and Vice-Admiral of the same.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :---

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of *Canada* in Parliament assembled, humbly thank Your Excellency for your gracious Speech at the opening of the Session, welcoming us to the duties of the first Session of a new Parliament, which we hope with Your Excellency will be memorable for wise deliberations and for measures adapted to the progress and development of *Canada*.

We receive with much pleasure Your Excellency's intimation that the season in which we are assembled has opened auspiciously for the industries of our people, and we unite with Your Excellency in the hope that our labours may be crowned with fruitful returns from land and sea, and that the great resources of *Canada* may continue to reward the toil and enterprise of its inhabitants.

We are pleased to be informed that Your Excellency's advisers, availing themselves of opportunities which were presented in the closing months of last year, caused the Administration of the United States to be reminded of the willingness of the Government of Canada to join in making efforts for the extension and development of the trade between the Republic and the Dominion, as well as for the friendly adjustment of those matters of an international character which remain unsettled. We learn with great satisfaction that these representations have resulted in an assurance that, in October next, the Government of the United States will be prepared to enter on a Conference to consider the best means of arriving at a practical solution of these important questions. And we assure Your Excellency that any papers on this subject laid before us will receive our careful consideration.

Under these circumstances, and in the hope that the proposed Conference may result in arrangements beneficial to both countries, we will willingly consider the expediency of extending, for the present season, the principal provisions of the protocol annexed to the *Washington* Treaty, 1888, known as the "*Modus Vivendi*."

We are pleased to learn that a disposition having been manifested in the United Kingdom to impose on sea-going ships engaged in the cattle trade increased safeguards for life and greater restrictions against improper treatment, a careful enquiry has been made as to the incidents of that trade in so far as this country is concerned, and that the evidence elicited on this enquiry will be laid before us; and while we rejoice with Your Excellency that our shipping is free from reproach in that regard, we will give our earnest attention to any measure which will remove-all reasonable apprehensions of abuses arising in the future in connection with so important a branch of our commerce.

Your Excellency having been pleased to inform us that the early coming into force of the Imperial Statute relating to the Vice-Admiralty Courts of the Empire 54 Victoria.

has made it necessary to revise the laws in force in Canada respecting our courts of maritime jurisdiction, we will carefully consider any measure laid before us designed to reorganize those tribunals.

We will give our best attention to the Code of the Criminal Law which Your Excellency is pleased to inform us has been prepared in order that that branch of our jurisprudence may be simplified and improved.

Your Excellency may rest assured that all measures submitted to us, especially Bills relating to the Foreshores of the Dominion and to the obstruction of its navigable waters, and for the purpose of amending the Acts relating to the North-West Territories, the Exchequer Court Act, and the Acts relating to Trade Marks, will receive our earnest attention.

Our thanks are due to Your Excellency for informing us that the accounts for the past year will be submitted to us, and that the Revenue, after providing for the services to which it was appropriated, has left a surplus for the works which were designed to be carried on by Capital expenditure, and we will respectfully consider the Estimates for the coming year.

With Your Excellency we pray that in the consideration of these matters, and in the performance of all the labours which will devolve upon us our deliberations may be Divinely aided, and that we may be vouchsafed such wisdom and patriotism as will increase the prosperity of Canada and promote in every way the well-being of its people.

The said Address being read a second time was agreed to.

3rd. Also, copies of the Reports of the Commanding Officer, confidential or otherwise, as to the necessity there was for the Military occupation at Wellington, and for the continuance there until they were recalled.

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return of all papers, correspondence and other documents relating to the dredging on the Bar of the Kaministiquia River, Thunder Bay, since July, 1890, including the advertisement, tenders received and contract for such dredging; also, Engineer's Report to the Department. showing what progress has been made in the work up to the 1st of December last; also, statement showing the amounts paid on account of such work, to whom paid, dates and amounts of such payments.

Mr. Tarte moved, seconded by Mr. Guay, and the Question being proposed, That Israël Tarte, Esquire, the Member representing the Electoral District of Montmorency in this House, having declared from his seat in the House that he is credibly informed, and that he believes, that he is able to establish by satisfactory evidence that:—

In 1882 the sum of \$375,000 having been voted by the Parliament of *Canada* to carry out the works of the Harbour of *Quebec*, the *Quebec* Harbour Commissioners called for tenders for dredging in connecton with the said works.

That Messrs. Larkin, Connolly & Co. tendered and were awarded the contract for the said dredging.

That in order to secure the influence of the Hon. Thomas McGreevy, then and now a Member of the Parliament of Canada, and a Member of the Quebec Harbour Commission by appointment of the Government of Canada, the firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co, with the knowledge of the said Thomas McGreevy, took as a partner Robert H. McGreevy, his brother, giving him an interest of 30 per cent. in the firm.

That the said *Thomas McGreevy* consented to his brother becoming a member of the firm, and stated that he had first consulted the Honourable Minister of Public Works, Sir *Hector L. Langevin*, and secured his consent.

That the said contract, signed on the 25th of September, 1882, stipulated that the works thereunder were to be finished by the 1st of November, 1884, but that the said *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. continued to perform the work of dredging under the scale of prices therein mentioned up to the close of the season of 1886.

That in order to help Larkin, Connolly & Co. to secure the said dredging contract, the said Hon. Thomas McGreevy agreed to give and did give, in an undue manner, his help as Harbour Commissioner to Larkin, Connolly & Co.

That the said contract was approved and ratified by an Order in Council based on a report of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works.

That up to the year 1883 aforesaid Messrs. Kinipple and Morris, of London, England, had acted as Engineers to the Quebec Harbour Commission, and that their resident Engineer for the carrying out of the works was Mr. Woodford Pilkington.

That in concert with Larkin, Connolly & Co. the said Thomas McGreevy undertook to secure the removal of Messrs. Kinipple, Morris and Pilkington from their positions, and that they were in fact so removed in 1883, and replaced by Mr. Henry F. Perley and Mr. John Edward Boyd, with the consent of the Honourable Minister of Public Works.

That in the same year, 1883, tenders were called for a cross-wall and lock in connection with the harbour works at *Quebec* in accordance with plans and specifications prepared in the Department of Public Works under the direction of *Henry* F. Perley, Esquire.

That several tenders were made, and amongst others who tendered were Messrs. Larkin, Connolly & Co.

That before tendering, and in order to secure the influence of the Hon. Thomas McGreevy, then and now a Member of the Parliament of Canada and a Member of the Quebec Harbour Board by appointment of the Government, Larkin, Connolly & Co. took into partnership with themselves Robert H. McGreevy, a brother of the said Hon. Thomas McGreevy, giving him a 30 per cent. interest in the firm, and this with the knowledge and consent of the said Hon. Thomas McGreevy.

That among the parties tendering were a contractor named George Beaucage, and one John Gallagher.

That it was on the suggestion of the said Hon. Thomas McGreevy that Beaucage consented to make a tender.

That with the knowledge of the said *Thomas McGreevy*, the three tenders of *Larkin, Connolly* & Co, of *Beaucage*, and of *Gallagher*, were prepared by the members of the firm of *Larkin, Connolly* & Co., *Beaucage* being throughout deceived by the said Hon. *Thomas McGreevy* as to his position in the matter, as he alleges in an action recently entered by him against the said *Thomas McGreevy* in relation to the said contract in the Superior Court of *Montreal*.

That the said tenders were transmitted to the Department of Public Works of Canada for examination and extension.

That while all the tenders were being examined and the quantities applied in the Department of Public Works of Canada, the said Hon. Thomas McGreevy, then and now a Member of the Parliament of Canada, and a Member of the Quebec Harbour Commission by appointment of the Government, promised to obtain and did obtain from the Department of Public Works of Canada, and from officials of that Department, in relation to the said tenders, to figures in connection therewith, and to the amounts thereof, information which he offered to communicate before the result was officially known, and which he did communicate to the firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co., and to certain members of the said firm individually.

That to the knowledge of the said Thomas McGreevy, the tenders of Messrs. Gallagher and Beaucage were lower than those of Larkin, Connolly & Co., but that in consideration of the promise of the sum of \$25,000 to be to him paid, he, the said Thomas McGreevy, agreed to secure the acceptance of the tenders of Larkin, Connolly & Co., and that he suggested to that firm and to certain members thereof individually, to make arrangements in connection with the said Gallagher and Beaucage and to so manipulate matters as to render the tenders of those two parties higher than those of the said firm, or at all events to secure the contract for Larkin, Connolly & Co., and that said arrangements and manipulations were carried out as suggested by him.

That in consequence of the said arrangement and manipulations wherein the said *Thomas McGreevy* directly participated, the contract for the cross-wall and lock in connection with the *Quebec* Harbour Works was awarded to *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co., cn a Report to Council made by the Honourable Minister of Public Works, under date 26th May, 1883.

That a few days thereafter the sum of \$25,000 was, in fulfilment of the corrupt arrangement above stated, paid to the said *Thomas McGreevy* in promissory notes signed by the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co., which said notes were duly paid.

signed by the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co., which said notes were duly paid. That about the same date, namely, the 4th June, 1883, a sum of \$1,000 was paid by the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co., towards "the *Langevin* Testimonial Fund"—a fund destined to be given to Sir *Hector Langevin*.

That in the course of the carrying out of the works, the said *Thomas McGreevy* caused changes contrary to the public interest to be made in the conditions of the said contract.

That in 1884, *Thomas McGreevy*, then and now a Member of the Parliament of *Canada*, and a Member of the *Quebec* Harbour Commission by appointment of the Government, agreed with the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co., and certain members thereof individually, to secure for them a contract for the completion of the Graving

Dock of Lévis, one of the conditions of the agreement being that he, Thomas McGreevy should receive any excess over the sum of \$50,000 in the contract price.

That to the detriment of the public interest, a contract was signed in or about the month of June, 1884, for the performance of the said works, and that subsequently the said *Thomas McGreevy* received the price stipulated in the corrupt arrangement above mentioned, namely, \$22,000.

That in 1883 and 1884, tenders were asked for by the Government of Canada for the completion of the Graving Dock of Esquimalt, B.C.

That the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. were among those who tendered, and that the contract was awarded to them in pursuance of a Report to Council, dated 24th October, 1884, and signed by the Honourable Minister of Public Works.

That before tendering, the said *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. had with *Thomas McGreevy*, then and now a Member of 'the Parliament of *Canada*, communications and interviews wherein they secured his services to assist them in dealing with the Department of Public Works, in order to secure the said contract.

That he agreed to help them, and that he did in fact help them in divers ways, and, amongst others, by obtaining from the Department of Public Works information, figures and calculations, which he communicated to them.

That to the knowledge and with the consent of the said *Thomas McGreevy*, and for the purpose of securing for themselves his influence, *Larkin, Connolly & Co.* took into partnership with themselves, his brother, *Robert H. McGreery*, giving him a 20 per cent. interest in their firm.

That during the execution of the said contract, the said *Thomas McGreevy* was the agent or one of the agents in the pay of *Larkin, Connolly* & Co. in dealing with the Department of Public Works; that he endeavoured to obtain, and did obtain for them, at their request, important alterations in the works and more favourable conditions.

That the said more favourable conditions and the said alterations enabled them to realize, to the detriment of the public interests, very large profits.

That during the execution of the works large sums were paid by Larkin, Connolly & Co. to Thomas McGreevy for his services in dealing with the Minister of Public Works, with the officers of the Department, and generally for his influence as a Member of the Parliament of Canada.

That in consideration of the sums of money so received by him and of the promises to him made, the said *Thomas McGreevy* furnished to *Larkin, Connolly* & Co. a great deal of information; strove to procure and did procure to be made by the Department and the Honourable Minister of Public Works, in the plans of the Graving Dock and in the execution of the works, alterations which have cost large sums of money to the public treasury.

That he himself took steps to induce certain Members of the Parliament of Canada to assist him, the said Thomas McGreevy, in his efforts, in concert with Larkin, Connolly & Co., to obtain alterations and additional works, for which large sums of money were offered to him by the members of the firm.

That on his suggestion Members of the Parliament of Canada were approached by members of the firm of Larkin, Connolly & Co.

That certain members of the said firm have declared that the said Members of the Canadian Parliament on being so approached had asked for a certain sum of money for exerting their influence in favour of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. with the Minister of Public Works, and that *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. had agreed to give them money for that purpose.

That Thomas McGreevy, acting in concert with Larkin, Connolly & Co., did at their request corruptly endeavour to procure the dismissal from office, of certain public officers employed in connection with the works of the Graving Dock at Esquimalt in order to have them replaced by others who would suit Larkin, Connolly & Co., the former having for a time incurred the ill-will of Larkin, Connolly That during the winter of 1886-87 the said *Thomas McGreevy* proposed to and made with the firm of *Larkin, Connolly* & Co., through certain members of the said firm, an arrangement whereby the said firm undertook to pay to him the sum of \$25,000 on condition that he would obtain for the firm the sum of 35 cents per cubic yard for the dredging of 800,000 cubic yards in area of the Wet Basin in the Harbour of *Quebec*.

That dredging of the same kind, and even more difficult, had previously and up to that time, and to the knowledge of the said *Thomas McGreevy*, been executed for the sum of 27 cents per cubic yard, and even less, in the same works.

That the said *Thomas McGreevy* used his influence as a Member of this House with the Department of Public Works, and in particular with *Henry F. Perley*, Esquire, to induce him to report to the *Quebec* Harbour Commission in favour of the payment of the said sum of 35 cents per cubic yard.

That the correspondence on this subject between Henry F. Perley and Larkin, Connolly & Co., before the Quebec Harbour Commissioners were consulted, took place at the suggestion of the said Thomas McGreevy, and was conducted with his knowledge and participation in such a manner as to conceal from the eyes of Parliament and of the public the corrupt character of the contract, in connection with which he had received \$27,000.

That Larkin, Connolly & Co. paid in money to the said Thomas McGreevy the sum of \$20,000 in fulfilment of the arrangement above mentioned, and that at his own request a sum of \$5,000 was left to secure the election of the said Thomas McGreevy to the House of Commons at the general election of 1887, in the hands of one of the members of the firm, who, finding that sum insufficient, had to add thereto the sum of \$2,000.

That on the 23rd May, 1887, in fulfilment of the arrangement above mentioned, and through the effort, the influence and the intervention of the said *Thomas Mc-Greevy*, and without any public tender having been called for, a contract was made between the *Quebec* Harbour Commissioners and *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. for all the necessary dredging and removal of material in the Wet basin of the Quebec harbour works.

That in the execution of the works of this contract extensive frauds were perpetrated, to the detriment of the public treasury, and sums of money were paid corruptly to officials under the control and direction of *Henry F. Perley* and appointed by the *Quebec* Harbour Commission.

That by an Order in Council, dated 10th May, 1888, the Government of *Canada* decided to pay a sum of \$12,500 yearly, during five years, to Mr. Julien Chabot on the condition of his causing the steamer "Admiral" to ply between *Dalhousie* and *Gaspé*, forming a connection with the Intercolonial Railway.

That the said sum of Twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) has since been paid in the manner prescribed in the Order in Council and the contract made thereunder.

The said Julien Chabot was merely a screen for the benefit of the said $Thoma^s$ McGreevy, who then was, and continued to be for a long time thereafter the proprietor of the "Admiral" in whole or at least in great part.

That previous to the 10th May, 1888, to wit, since 1883 or 1884, the same subsidy of \$12,500 was paid for the said steamer "Admiral," then also owned by men representing the said *Thomas McGreevy*.

That the said *Thomas McGreevy* received in that connection a sum of about \$120,000, while being a Member of the Parliament of *Canada*.

That in 1886, tenders were asked for by the *Quebec* Harbour Commissioners for the construction of a work called the "South Wall" or "Retaining Wall."

That Mr. Thomas McGreevy procured from public officials the tenders received, and showed them to Messrs. O. E. Murphy, Connolly and R. H. McGreevy, for whom he was acting, in order to give them an undue advantage over their competitors.

That they had the said tenders in their possession during several hours, after which they were returned to *Henry F. Perley*, then in *Quebec*, by the said *Thomas McGreevy*.

That the contract was awarded to one John Gallagher, a mere figurehead for the said Murphy, Connolly and R. H. McGreevy, who did the work for their own profit and advantage.

That changes detrimental to the public interest but of a nature to secure great profits to the contractors were made in the plans and the carrying out of the works and in the conditions and securities set out in the contract, through the influence and intervention of the said *Thomas McGreevy*.

That from the year 1883 to 1890, both inclusive, the said *Thomas McGreevy*, received from *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. and from his brother, *R. H. McGreevy*, for the considerations above indicated, a sum of about \$200,000.

That during the period aforesaid he was the agent and paid representative of *Larkin, Connolly* & Co. on the *Quebec* Harbour Board of Commissioners, in Parliament, and in connection with the Department of Public Works.

That the said *Thomas McGreevy* exacted and received out of the subsidies voted by Parliament for the construction of the *Baie des Chaleurs* Railway, a sum of over \$40,000.

That the moneys expended in connection with the works mentioned in the present motion are moneys voted by the Parliament of *Canada*, and amount to about \$5,000,000.

That the said *Thomas McGreevy* on several occasions demanded in the name of the Honourable Minister of Public Works and received from *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co., sums of money.

That from 1882 to the present Session the said *Thomas McGreevy* has always lived in *Ottawa* in the same house as the Honourable Minister of Public Works, and that he seems to have done so in order to put in the mind of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. the impression that he had over said Honourable Minister an absolute control and that he was acting as his representative in his corrupt transactions with them.

That in fact on many occasions he used the name of the Honourable Minister of Public Works in his dealings with them, undertaking to obtain his co-operation or declaring that he had secured it.

That before the Board of Quebec Harbour Commissioners he often also used the name of the said Minister.

That certain members of the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. paid and caused to be paid large sums of money to the Honourable Minister of Public Works out of the proceeds of the said contracts, and that entries of the said sums were made in the books of that firm.

A Select Committee be appointed to enquire fully into the said allegations, and specially, but without limiting the scope of such enquiry, to investigate all circumstances connected with the several tenders, contracts and changes therein, and the payments and other matters mentioned in the statements hereinbefore made, with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses upon oath or affirmation, and that the Committee do report in full the evidence taken before them, and all their proceedings on the reference, and the result of their enquiries, and that Rule 78 of this House as to the selection of Committees be suspended, and that said Committee be composed of Messieurs Davies, Edgar, Kirkpatrick, Mills, (Bothwell), Ouimet, Prior, Tarte, Weldon and Wood (Brockville);

Mr. Edgar moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. Lister,

That all the words in the last Paragraph to the end of the Question, be left out, and the words: "That the above statements be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections to enquire fully into the said allegations, and specially, but without limiting the scope of such enquiry, to investigate all circumstances connected with the several tenders, contracts and changes therein, and the payments and other matters mentioned in the statements hereinbefore made, with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses upon oath or affirmation, and that the Committee do report in full the evidence taken before them, and all their proceedings on the reference and the result of their enquiries, inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the Amendment:—It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Then the main Question, so amended, being put:-It was resolved in the Affirmative.

And Then the House adjourned till To-morrow.

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, praying His Excellency to cause to be laid before this House, a Return of all petitions addressed to the Government, praying for the analysis of intoxicating liquor manufactured or offered for sale, by wholesale or retail, in the Dominion of Canada.

Ordered, That the said Address be presented to His Excellency by such Members of this House as are of the Queen's Privy Council.

And then The House adjourned till To-morrow.

The Order of the Day being read, for resuming the Debate on the Question, which was yesterday proposed,—That in the opinion of this House, the time has arrived when it is expedient to prohibit the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes;"

And the Question being again proposed :- The House resumed the said Debate.

Mr. *Mackintosh* moved in amendment to the Question, seconded by Mr. Roome, That all the words after "That" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words:

"The numerous Petitions presented to this and preceding Parliaments, praying "for the enactment of a Prohibitory Liquor Law, indicate the desire upon the part of "a large section of the population that the question should receive serious considera-"tion from the people's representatives.

"This House is of opinion that, as such Petitions as well as reports made by "various Committees of Parliament, allege that the social, moral and civil standing of "the subject is imperilled by the existence of such trade in intoxicating liquors, im-"mediate steps should be taken to obtain fall and reliable information upon all prac-"tical and financial details connected with the question.

"That this House is fully cognizant of the immense loss of revenue which "would, for the time being, follow the enactment of Prohibitory measures, not alone "to the Dominion Exchequer, but to the various Provinces of the Union, and the "possibility of complications between the Provincial and Federal authorities conse-"quent upon such reduction of financial resources.

"That this House, whilst desirous of moving in the direction of the ameliora-"tion of evils complained of, is of opinion that any legislation should be so safe-"guarded as not to too suddenly disturb the revenue of the country or the vested "interests claiming compensation.

"In view of these considerations, the House is of opinion that a Select Com-"mittee should be appointed to report upon all the details involved in the subject, "more particularly:—

"1. The annual loss to the Federal Exchequer;

- "2. The amount invested in the manufacture of intoxicating liquors;
- "3. The amount necessary to compensate those now embarked in the manufac-"ture and sale of liquors, should such a policy be deemed expedient;
- "4. The amount of annual loss to each Provincial Exchequer;
- "5. The amount of annual loss to each municipality throughout the Dominion;
- "6. An estimate of the probable amount requisite by taxation in lieu of license "fees in each Province and Federal Excise and Customs duties;
- "Together with all information obtainable touching the present cost of main-"taining the various institutions for the suppression and punishment of
 - " crime throughout the Dominion.

"Said Committee to be composed of Messieurs. DRAFT REPORT SUBMITTED BY THE SUB-COMMITTEE.

The Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, have the honour to Report that in pursuance of the reference made to the Committee by the House on the Eleventh day of May last, several witnesses have been in part examined, and a large number of documents has been produced.

One of the witnesses so examined in part was Michael Connolly, a member of the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Company, mentioned in the reference. The said Michael Connolly's summons required him to produce a number of documents and books of account.

The witness having attended with documents and books of account containing entries relating to the matters under enquiry, and being under examination, was required to produce the books and place them under the control of the Committee.

This demand he distinctly refused to comply with. He was likewise required to hand certain of these books to a Member of the Committee who expressed a desire to look at them in order to put questions to the witness relating to certain matters of account which were supposed to be entered therein. This was also refused by the witness.

The proceedings of the Committee, and the testimony of the witness will appear more in detail by the Exhibits hereto annexed, marked "A" and "B," being the minutes of the proceedings of the Committee, and the shorthand writer's notes of the evidence.

Alexander Ferguson, Esquire, Q.C., referred to in the Exhibits, was Counsel for the witness and for another member of the firm of Larkin, Connolly & Company.

Your Committee, being of the opinion that the discharge of the duties of the Committee, imposed on them by the House, requires that the books should be placed under the control and in the possession of your Committee, and that the books be placed in the hands of Members of your Committee for the purpose of interrogating the witnesses, report the refusal of Michael Connolly to obey the orders of your Committee in these particulars, and request the action of the House thereon. (Appendix No. 1.)

(i) The names of the Advocates who were employed by the Government to conduct the said suits and proceedings.

(j) The amounts which the Government paid to each of the said Advocates in connection with the said suits.

(k) The suits of a similar nature, now pending in the courts. (l) The amount of the account filed by each of the said Advocates for his services in connection with such suits and proceedings.

Your Committee have had under consideration the following Bills and have agreed to report the same with Amendments, viz.:-

Bill to amend the Act incorporating the Canadian Power Company.

Bill to amend the Act to incorporate the Medicine Hat Railway and Coal Company.

Bill to incorporate the Whirpool Bridge Company.

Bill to incorporate the Peterborough, Sudbury and Sault Ste. Maric Railway Company.

Bill respecting the South Ontario Pacific Railway Company.

Bill further to amend "The Canadian Pacific Railway Act, 1889;"-and

Bill respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

Mr. Denison, from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented to the House the First Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have examined the Bill to incorporate the *Pembroke* Lumber Company, and beg to report the same with an Amendment. Also, Bill to amend the Act to incorporate the "*Empire*" Printing and Publishing Company (Limited), which they report without amendment.

Mr. Desjardins (Hochelaga), from the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House during the present Session, presented to the House the Second Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee in accordance with the recommendation contained in their First Report, which was concurred in by the House on the 2nd instant, have had under consideration the appointment of an Assistant Revisor in connection with the French Translation of the Debates, and recommend that Mr. J. C. Dansereau be appointed in that capacity at a salary of \$1,000 per Session, and that the appointment and remuneration of the said Assistant Revisor date from the 3rd June, instant.

Mr. Tupper, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of this House, dated 3rd June, 1891, for a Return showing the names of all persons in the County of *Queen's*, Nova Scotia, to whom Fishing Bounties have been paid during the last five years, with the amount paid each, and the dates of payment; the amount still unpaid, with the names of the persons to whom such bounties are still due. (Sessional Papers, No. 54a.)

Also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 18th May, 1891, for a Return of the names of all persons in the County of *Guysborough* to whom Fishing Bounties have been paid during the last three years, with the amount paid each; the amount still unpaid, with the names of the persons to whom such bounties are still due. (Sessional Papers, No. 54b.)

On motion of Mr. Tupper, seconded by Mr. Costigan,

Resolved, That this House will, To-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting the shipping of Live Stock.

Mr. Dewdney moved, seconded by Mr. Haggart, That this House will, To-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee to consider a certain proposed Resolution, respecting the granting of subsidies in land to certain Railway Companies in the North-West Territories.

Mr. *Dewdney*, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, then acquainted the House, That His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject matter of this Motion, recommends it to the consideration of the House.

Resolved, That this House will, To-morrow, resolve itself into the said Committee.

The Order of the Day being read, for the House in the Committee of Ways and Means;

Mr. Foster moved, seconded by Mr. Bowell, and the Question being proposed, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair; Sir Richard J. And a Debate arising thereupon;-The said Motion, in amendment, was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

Then the main Question being put;-It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Ordered, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair.

6. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that the foregoing Resolutions and the alterations thereby made in the Duties of Customs and Excise on the articles therein mentioned, shall take effect on and after the twenty-fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one.

Provided, however, that nothing herein shall be construed as exempting any sugars now held to be in bond for refining purposes, in any bonded premises connected with, or occupied in whole or in part, by any sugar refinery, which may be found on examination of the stock in such premises to have been removed therefrom, from payment of the duty properly payable thereon, under item number 419, in Schedule "A" to the Act, Chapter 33, Revised Statutes, which shall continue in force as regards such sugars, until proper entry thereof and payment of duty thereon, has been made.

Your Committee have had under consideration the following Bills, and have agreed to report the same with Amendments, viz.:--

Bill to confirm a lease made between the *Guelph* Junction Railway Company and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and for other purposes.

Bill respecting the Ontario and Rainy River Railway Company; - and

Bill to confirm an agreement between the *Shuswap* and *Okanagon* Railway Company and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and to grant further powers to the *Shuswap* and *Okanagon* Railway Company.

And also, the following Bills without amendment ;---

Bill respecting the South-Western Railway Company; and

Mr. Mills (Annapolis), from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented to the House the Ninth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Your Committee have examined the Petition of *Robert D. Wilmot* and others, for leave to present a Petition for an Act of Incorporation under the name of The *Inverness* Railway Company, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for receiving Petitions for Private Bills, and the reasons assigned for the delay justify your Committee in recommending that the necessary leave be granted.

Mr. Tupper, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented,-Return to an Order of this House, dated 27th May, 1891, for a Return showing the amount paid for the supplies required by the crews of the several Government vessels engaged in the Fishery Protection Service, in the Province of Ontario, for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1890; together with the names of parties from whom purchases were made, and the prices paid. (Sessional Papers, No. 54c.)

On motion of Sir Hector L. Langevin, seconded by Mr. Foster,

And proposed amendment thereto, That all the words after "That" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "the numerous petitions presented to this "and preceding Parliaments, praying for the enactment of a Prohibitory Liquor "Law, indicate the desire upon the part of a large section of the population that "the question should receive serious consideration from the people's representatives.

"This House is of opinion that, as such Petitions as well as reports made by "various Committees of Parliament, allege that the social, moral and civil standing "of the subject is imperilled by the existence of such trade in intoxicating liquors, "immediate steps should be taken to obtain full and reliable information upon all "practical and financial details connected with the question.

"That this House is fully cognizant of the immense loss of revenue which would, "for the time being, follow the enactment of Prohibitory measures, not alone to the "Dominion Exchequer, but to the various Provinces of the Union, and the possibility "of complications between the Provincial and Federal authorities consequent upon "such reduction of financial resources.

"That this House, whilst desirous of moving in the direction of the ameliora-"tion of evils complained of, is of opinion that any legislation should be so safe-guarded "as not to too suddenly disturb the revenue of the country or the vested interests "claiming compensation.

"In view of these considerations, the House is of opinion that a Select Committee "should be appointed to report upon all the details involved in the subject, more "particularly:

"1. The annual loss to the Federal Exchequer;

"2. The amount invested in the manufacture of intoxicating liquors;

"3. The amount necessary to compensate those now embarked in the manufac-"ture and sale of liquors, should such a policy be deemed expedient;

"4. The amount of annual loss to each Provincial Exchequer;

"5. The amount of annual loss to each municipality throughout the Dominion;

"6. An estimate of the probable amount requisite by taxation in lieu of license "fees in each Province and Federal Excise and Customs duties;

"Together with all information obtainable touching the present cost of main-"taining the various institutions for the suppression and punishment of

"crime throughout the Dominion;

"Said Committee to be composed of Messieurs Coatsworth, Curran, Davies, Ferguson "(Leeds and Grenville), Girouard, Gordon, Hazen, Jamieson, Mills (Annapolis), Mills,

"(Bothwell), Préfontaine, Ross (Lisgar), Scriver, Taylor, Wallace and Wood (West-"moreland), to report at the earliest possible period," inserted instead thereof;

And proposed amendment to the said amendment thereto, That all the words after "That" in the main Motion, and all the words of the proposed amendment be left out, and the words "this House renews the expression of opinion, made in pre-"ceding Parliaments, as to the expediency of prohibiting the manufacture, importa-"tiod and sale of alcoholic liquors for beverage purposes, but declares that, in a "question of such far-reaching importance, affecting long-established social and trade "interests, involving the loss of many millions of necessary revenue and the conse-"quent imposition of new and heavy taxation, it is essential to the effectual working "and permanent maintenance of such an enactment that the electorate of Canada "should first pronounce a definite opinion upon the subject at the polls," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being again proposed ;—The House resumed the said adjourned Debate.

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return of all correspondence, telegrams, letters, reports, estimates and other documents relating to the surveys for, and construction and cost of, a sub-marine tunnel between Prince Edward Island and the mainland.

And then The House, having continued to sit till twenty-five minutes after Twelve of the Clock on Thursday morning, adjourned till this day.

Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, of the 5th May last, for copies of the Order in Council of date the 10th May, 1888, granting a subsidy of \$12,500 per annum to Mr. Julien Chabot, for the use of the steamboat "Admiral," between Dalhousie and Gaspé, in connection with the Intercolonial Railway; and also, of all other Orders in Council which may have been passed afterwards in respect to the same steamboat.

53. 54a. Return to an Order of the House of the 3rd June last, for a Return of papers, correspondence, reports and other documents in the possession of the Government, relating to the subject of the herring fisheries of the Bay of *Fundy* and its adjacent waters, during the past year, including the report of the conference of Fishery officers held at Ottawa on the subject.

Mr. Wood (Westmoreland), from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented to the House the Third Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

Bill to incorporate the Steam-Boiler and Plate Glass Insurance Company of Canada.

The promoters of Bill respecting the Septennial Benevolent Society, having signified their intention of not proceeding any further with the measure, your Committee recommend that the Bill be withdrawn.

Your Committee also recommend that the fees and charges paid on the two lastmentioned Bills be refunded, less the cost of printing, and translation. On motion of Mr. Wood (Westmoreland), seconded by Mr. Ives,

Ordered, That the Bill respecting the Septennial Benevolent Society; and the Bill respecting the Order of Canadian Home Circles, be severally withdrawn, and that the fees and charges paid thereon be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Third Report of the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

Mr. Dewdney, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented,-Return to an Order of this House, dated 5th May, 1891, for a Return showing the quantities and kinds of timber and sawlogs cut annually in the lately Disputed Territory, in the Province of Ontario, under the authority of timber licenses issued by the Government of Canada; the names of such licensees; and showing also, how the dues were imposed, and the amount per thousand feet, board measure, realized by the Government of Canada from each person or firm so licensed in each year from 1875 to 1887, inclusive; or what royalty or other revenue was received by the Government from licensees aforesaid on such quantities cut or sold. (Sessional Papers, No. 57.)

3. Resolved, That any such person may, in lieu of such land, take scrip, as provided by the said amended Act, but that any person choosing to take scrip must notify the Minister of the Interior of his choice within six months from the issue of the warrant in his favour.

(c) Walter William Phelan, of Regina, a scout actively engaged during the outbreak, whose services have been certified to by competent authority;

(d) The following members of the troop of scouts known as the Steele Scouts, that is to say: -James Rolland, Frederick Rolland, William Rolland, John Whiteford, R. E. Steele, G. M. Steele, W. Chamberlayne, Peter Nelson, George Beatty and John Calder;

(e) Such other persons as hereafter establish to the satisfaction of the Minister of Militia and Defence that they were, respectively, within the meaning of the said

amended Act, members of the enrolled Militia force, actively engaged in bearing arms in the Indian and Half-breed outbreak, and that they have not received the land or scrip by the said amended Act authorized to be granted.

Mr. Bowell, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented Return to an Order of this House, dated 13th May, 1891, for copies of all correspondence since 1st July, A.D. 1890, from the New Glasgow Board of Trade and other Boards or persons, respecting the through train from Sydney, C.B., to Oxford, County of Cumberland, via the Short Line Railway. Also, copies of all correspondence during said time from any person or persons, asking for better Railway accommodation between Pictou and New Glasgow, to and from Halifax. (Sessional Papers, No. 70.)

Ordered, That Mr. Foster have leave to bring in a Bill, intituled : "An Act further "to amend 'The Customs Act."

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time To-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Allan, seconded by Mr. Innes,

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, copies of all petitions, correspondence, reports of surveys and any other documents relating to the construction of a dry dock at the Town of Amherstburg.

1. The amount of money spent by the Government up to the 30th June, 1891, on the Tay Canal;

And a Debate arising thereupon:-The said Motion was, with leave of the House, withdrawn.

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, copies of correspondence and all documents whatever to induce the Government of Newfoundland to suspend the operations of the Newfoundland Bart Act against our Canadian Fishermen during the present fishing season, pending the answer of the Colonial Office through the delegation now in London; and also, the correspondence and all other documents whatever respecting the measures taken by the Government of Canada towards exacting from the Government of Newfoundland the fulfilment of the assurances to the Imperial and Canadian Governments that if the Act known as "The Newfoundland Act," passed in 1887, received the Royal Assent, its provisions would not be enforced against British or Canadian Fishermen.

On motion of Mr. Lépine, seconded by Mr. Carignan,

4th. The names of the extra labourers for whose services there was paid in 1889-90 the sum of \$12,176.25, as recorded in the Auditor General's Report, for the year 1889-90 at page C-254;

5th. To whom was paid the sum of \$5,930.29 for cartage at the Custom House at Montreal, as recorded in the said Report of the Auditor General, at page C-254.

On motion of Mr. Fauvel, seconded by Mr. Brown (Chateauguay),

Ordered, That there be laid before this House, a Return of the names of proprietors to whom licenses have been granted for salmon net fishing on the Restigouche River, in the County of Bonaventure, for 1890 and 1891.

Mr. Chapleau, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented,-Return to an Address to His Excellency, dated 27th July, 1891, for copy of all correspondence between John A. Macdonald, M.P. (Victoria, N.S.) or any other parties in the County of Victoria, N.S., and the Government, or any Department or official of the Government, previous to the late General Elections, in reference to the appointment of a Returning Officer at said elections for said County. (Sessional Papers, No. 60a).

And it being Six o'Clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at half-past Seven o'Clock; P.M.

Half-past Seven o'Clock P.M.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill, and made Amendments thereunto.

Ordered, That the Bill, as amended in the Committee, be taken into consideration To-morrow.

The Order of the Day being read for resuming the adjourned Debate which was, on Monday, 1st June last, proposed, "That, whereas in 1883 an Act was "passed granting second Homesteads to those settlers who had completed the "conditions of the first Homestead entry; and whereas in 1886 an Act was passed "abolishing the policy of second Homesteads; and whereas in 1887 an Act was "passed which acknowledged the principle and right of those second Homesteads, "it should now be enacted that all those settlers who came in between 1st June, "1883, and 2nd June, 1886, should, on completing their improvements, be granted "a second Homestead,"

Ordered, That the said Order be discharged. Ordered, That the Motion be withdrawn.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill further to amend the Electoral Franchise Act,

Ordered, That the said Order be discharged. Ordered, That the Bill be withdrawn.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill further to amend the Railway Act;

Mr. Barron moved, seconded by Mr. Flint, and the Question being proposed, That the Bill be now read a second time;

And a Debate arising thereupon;

On motion of Mr. Roome, seconded by Mr. Montague,

Ordered, That the Debate be adjourned.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill to amend the Railway Act;

The Bill was accordingly read, a second time; and referred to the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines.

And then The House adjourned till To-morrow.

Mr. Desjardins (L'Islet) moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Wallace, That all the words after "That" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words, "it be Resolved, That this House desires to express its approval (1) of the fiscal "policy of the Liberal-Conservative Government, which, by permitting the free "importation of raw materials, and by a judicious protection of our natural "and mannfactured products, has resulted in the marked development of Canadian "industries; (2) of the liberal aid which has been granted to important and neces-"sary public works, notably railways, canals and steamship lines, which have "proved such important factors in developing our resources and facilitating our "commerce; (3) of the wise and prudent management of the finances, which, while "adequately providing for the public service, has maintained and advanced the "credit of the country, and, while producing substantial surpluses for capital expen-"diture, has made no appreciable addition to the public debt during the last two "years; (4) of the policy of relieving from duty articles of universal use, such as "tea, coffee and sugar (in respect of the latter the consumer being freed from taxa-"tion to the extent of Three and one-half millions during the present Session), and

" of the mode of meeting the larger part of the loss of revenue thereby caused by " the exercise of economy in expenditure.

1. Resolved, That whereas the persons hereinafter mentioned and described, being "members of the enrolled Militia force actively engaged and bearing arms in "the suppression of the Indian and Half-breed outbreak," within the meaning of the Act passed in the Session held in the 48th and 49th years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 73, as amended by the Act passed in the Session held in the 49th year of Her Majesty's reign, chapter 29, have not as yet received the land or scrip by the said amended Act authorized to be granted, and the time within which, under the provisions of the said amended Act, they might have received the same has elapsed; and there may be other persons in the like case; it is desirable that authority should be given for the granting to such persons, notwithstanding anything in the said amended Act contained, of the bounties thereby contemplated.

2. Resolved. That, notwithstanding any limits of time in the said amended Act prescribed, the Minister of the Interior be authorized to grant free homesteads or scrip to the persons hereinafter mentioned or described, upon warrants, in favour of such persons, respectively, issued by the Minister of Militia and Defence, as provided in the said amended Act: Provided that any person in whose favour such warrant is issued, or his duly constituted substitute, shall, within six months after the date of the issue of such warrant, select and make entry for the two quarter sections to which he is entitled thereunder, and shall thereafter perfect such entry and reside upon and cultivate the lands so entered for, in accordance with the terms and conditions prescribed by the Homestead provisions of "The Dominion Lands Act."

3. *Resolved*. That any such person may, in lieu of such land, take scrip, as provided by the said amended Act, but, that any person choosing to take scrip must notify the Minister of the Interior of his choice within six months from the issue of the warrant in his favour.

4. Resolved, That all the provisions of the said amended Act shall, so far as the same are applicable, extend and apply to grants of land and scrip issued under the foregoing provisions.

(e) Such other persons as hereafter establish to the satisfaction of the Minister of Militia and Defence that they were, respectively, within the meaning of the said amended Act, members of the enrolled Militia Force actively engaged in bearing arms in the Indian and Half-breed outbreak, and that they have not received the land or scrip by the said amended Act authorized to be granted.

Mr. Girouard, from the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, to whom were referred certain Statements made in connection with the tenders and contracts respecting the Quebec Harbour Works, &c., with instructions to enquire fully into the said allegations, and especially, but without limiting the scope of such enquiry, to investigate all circumstances connected therewith, and the payments and other matters mentioned in the said Statements, beg leave to present the following as their Fourth Report :--

That in the course of the enquiry now pending before your Committee, the Honourable *Thomas McGreevy*, Member for the Electoral District of *Quebec* West, named in the Order of Reference to your Committee, offered to be examined and was in fact examined under oath.

During his examination the witness was repeatedly asked to whom he paid a sum of 20,000, being a portion of a larger sum he had received from *Robert McGreevy*, out of the moneys paid by the firm of *Larkin, Connolly* & Co., for political purposes, which questions the witness declined to answer, and to give the names of the persons to whom the money was paid, alleging as his reason that the said money was given to him in confidence. Being also required to state whether any portion of that money was paid to any person in the interest of Sir *Hector L. Langevin*, this was also refused by the witness.

The testimony of the witness will appear more in detail by the Exhibits hereto annexed, "A" and "B," being the minutes of the proceedings of your Committee and the short-hand writer's notes of the evidence.

Your Committee being of opinion that the questions should be answered, report the refusal of said Honourable *Thomas McGreevy* to comply with the Order of your Committee in these particulars, and request the action of the House thereon. (Appendix No. 1.)

Mr. Mara, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented to the House the Fourteenth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

"1. That, in the Session of 1883, Parliament was induced to continue the con-"struction of the *Tay* Canal, extending from the *Rideau* Canal to the Basin in the "Town of *Perth*, on the assurance of the Government that the cost would be "\$240,000."

"2. That, in the Session of 1887, Sir *Charles Tupper*, then Minister of Railways "and Canals, declared that, up to that time, \$256,360 had been expended on said "canal, and that \$55,000 would complete the work, including the new basin at *Perth*. "Parliament then voted said sum."

"3. That, in the Session of 1888, Sir *Charles Tupper*, then Minister of Finance, "stated that the whole cost of the canal would be \$358,364. He then asked for and "obtained an additional sum of \$78,000, and stated that 'this amount is required to "settle matters connected with the canal. The work has been done.'"

"4. That, in the Session of 1889, the Finance Minister asked for and obtained an "additional sum of \$25,000, and then stated that '\$25,000 is required to complete "the basin and carry out other works,' and that the cost up to that time was "\$363,951."

"5. That, in the Session of 1890, the late First Minister asked for and obtained "two additional sums of \$11,000 and \$20,000, the latter a revote, respectively, and "on that occasion declared 'that this amount is to settle with the contractors and "finish the work,' and then also stated that this work 'drained the public treasury "pretty well."'

"6. That, according to the statement of the Acting Minister of Railways and "Canals, the amount expended on the *Tay* Canal, up to 3rd of August, 1891, was "\$440,613.21,"

"7. That, in the Estimates for the years 1891-2 an additional sum is asked for "of \$30,000, or in all \$230,613.21, more than Parliament was assured by the Gov-"ernment the works would cost."

"8. That, without the assent of Parliament, the Government has contracted for "an extension of said canal from the said basin—the former terminus thereof—to "*Haggart's* Mill, at a cost of \$18,486."

"9. That the vessels using said canal so far, consist of two tugs of 117 and 144 "tons, respectively, one pleasure boat of 15 tons, two small boats of 8 tons each, one "scow of 30 tons and one skiff of 1 ton."

"10. That the gross receipts from said canal—from the 1st October, 1890, to "the 30th June, 1891—amount to \$58.81."

"11. That this House is of opinion that the said expenditures on the said canal "are in violation of the pledges and assurances of the Government to Parliament, "and this House is further of opinion that the said extension of the said canal to "Haggart's Mill is not a work that ought to have been undertaken at the public "expense, and is unwarranted by any public necessity," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment; the House divided : and the names being called for, they were taken down, as follow :---

Mr. Bowell, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented :--Return to an Order of this House, dated 17th June, 1891, for copies of all correspondence between the Minister of Customs and the Collector of Customs at Kootenay Lake, and between the Minister of Customs and any other person, relating to the admission of mining machinery into the Kootenay Lake District free of duty.

Also, a copy of instructions from the Minister of Customs to the Collector of Customs on *Kootenay* River, referring to the free admission of mining machinery. (Sessional Papers, No. 76.)

Also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 1st July, 1891, for copies of all correspondence, reports, paper writings and documents respecting the seizure and sale of the schooner "Marie Eliza," in 1887, by the Collector of Customs at Rimouski. (Sessional Papers, No. 77.)

Mr. Cameron (Huron) moved, seconded by Mr. Casey, That Malcolm Colin Cameron, the Member representing the Electoral District of the West Riding of the County of Huron in this House, having stated from his place in this House, that he is credibly informed and believes that it can be established, by satisfactory evidence.

1. That in the year A.D. 1888 there was a vacancy in the position of Government Light House Keeper in the Government Light House on *Presqu'Isle* Point, County of Northumberland.

2. That one Hedley H. Simpson was an applicant for said office.

3. That *Edward Cochrane* then was, and now is, the Member for the House of Commons for the Electoral District of the East Riding of the said County of *North-umberland*, and a supporter of the Government.

4. That in the year 1888 it was corruptly agreed to by and between the said *Edward Cochrane* and the said *Hedley H. Simpson*, that if the said *Hedley H. Simpson* would make and deliver to one *James Stanley* two promissory notes for \$100 each, endorsed by some responsible person, he the said *Edward Cochrane* would procure the appointment of the said *Hedley H. Simpson* to the said office of Light House Keeper for the Government Light House on *Presqu'Isle* Point.

5. That the said *Hedley H. Simpson*, in pursuance of said corrupt bargain, did make the said two promissory notes for \$100 each—procured their endorsement by a responsible party—handed them to the said *James Stanley*, who received the same and placed them in a Bank for the use of the said *Edward Cochrane* personally or for political purposes.

6. That the said Hedley H. Simpson subsequently paid the said notes.

7. That the said *Hedley H. Simpson*, in pursuance of said corrupt bargain, received the said appointment.

1. That in the summer of 1889, *Obadiah Simpson* was promised by the said *Edward Cochrane* the Government office of keeper or attendant of one of the swing bridges over the *Murray* Canal.

2. That in the summer of 1889 the said James Stanley, who is a confidential friend and warm political supporter of the said Edward Cochrane, sent for one Arundel R. Simpson to call and see him. He did, when the said James Stanley proposed to the said Arundel R. Simpson, with the knowledge and consent of the said Edward Cochrane, that if the said Arundel R. Simpson would pay \$150 and give to his father, the said Obadiah Simpson, the life lease of his farm (as compensation for his not being appointed such bridge keeper)—he had been promised and had not received the said office—he the said Arundel R. Simpson would be appointed such bridge keeper.

3. That shortly afterwards the said Arundel R. Simpson had an interview with the said *Edward Cochrane* on the same subject, when the said *Edward Cochrane* said to him that they could not take the \$150 for said office, that *Stanley* should not have made that offer, that other arrangements had been made with one *Wesley Goodrich* who agreed to pay \$200 and give said life lease for said appointment.

4. That the said *Edward Cochrane* then and there corruptly proposed to the said *Arundel R. Simpson*, that if he would pay said *Edward Cochrane* \$200 and give said life lease he would be appointed. This he refused to do.

5. That subsequently it was corruptly agreed to by and between the said Wesley Goodrich and the said Edward Cochrane, that if the said Edward Cochrane would procure the appointment of the said Wesley Goodrich to the said Government office of keeper of the said bridge, he, the said Wesley Goodrich, would pay the sum of \$200, and execute to the said Obadiah Simpson, father of the said Arundel R. Simpson, a life lease on his farm, with a condition in said lease, that if said Wesley Goodrich lost said appointment said lease would be cancelled.

6. That in pursuance of the said corrupt bargain the said Wesley Goodrich paid said money and executed said lease, and caused his wife to execute the same to the said Obadiah Simpson, on part of lot 18, in the 2nd concession of the Township of *Cramahe*, in the said County, for the rent of one peppercorn a year, and on the condition that if the said Goodrich should be released by the Government from attendance on said bridge, said lease would come to an end and be void, but said condition was not to apply in case said Goodrich should be discharged on account of any act of his own.

That the foregoing charges preferred against the Member for the Electoral District of the East Riding of the County of Northumberland, be referred to a Select Committee, to enquire fully into the said allegations, and report thereon; said Committee to be composed of Sir Adolphe P. Caron, Messieurs Cameron (Huron), German, Mulock, Skinner, Tisdale, and Whate (Shelburne).

Mr. Cochrane having made a statement in his place, then withdrew.

And the Question being put on the Motion:-It was resolved in the Affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Cameron (Huron), seconded by Mr. Casey.

Ordered, That the Select Committee appointed to enquire into and report on the charges against *Edward Cochrane*. Esquire, a Member of this House, be authorized to employ a Short-hand writer to take down such evidence as they may deem necessary.

On motion of Mr. Cameron (Huron), seconded by Mr. Casey,

Resolved, That it is desirable that any witness called before the Select Committee appointed to enquire into and report on the charges against Edward Cochrane, Esquire, a Member of this House, be examined under oath or affirmation touching any matters coming before them.

Sir John Thompson, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented,-Return to an Order of this House, dated 3rd August, 1891, for copies of all petitions, correspondence, reports of surveys and any other documents relating to the construc-tion of a dry dock at the Town of Amherstburg. (Scssional Papers, No. 40d.)

Also, Return to an Address, to His Excellency, dated 5th May, 1891, for copy of all petitions presented to His Excellency with reference to the School Acts of Manitoba : and all memorials, reports, Orders in Council and correspondence in connection with the same. (Sessional Papers, No 63a.)

The Order of the Day being read, for the House again in the Committee of Supply;

Mr. Foster moved, seconded by Mr. Bowell, and the Question being proposed. That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair;

Mr. Amyot moved, in amendment, seconded by Mr. Mulock, That all the words after "That" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words, "the documents " and papers submitted to Parliament, in relation to the Kingston Graving Dock, and "the evidence taken before the Public Accounts Committee and reported to this "House in relation to said Dock show that gross fraud and forgery were committed "in connection with the said contract; and that culpable negligence marked the " letting of said contract and the changes made in the terms thereof and the moneys "paid under such changes," inserted instead thereof;

8. Ale, beer and porter, when imported in bottles (six quart or twelve pint bottles to be held to contain one gallon) twenty four cents per gallon.

Resolved, That it is expedient to provide that the Governor in Council may authorize the payment, out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, under such regulations and restrictions as are made by Order in Council, to the producers of any raw beet-root sugar produced in Canada, wholly from beets grown therein, between the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-one, and the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-three, of a bounty of one dollar per one hundred pounds, and in addition thereto, three and one-third cents per one hundred pounds for each degree or fraction of a degree over seventy degrees shown by the polariscopic test.

The said Resolution, being read a second time; and the Question being put, That this House doth agree with the Committee in the said Resolution ; the House divided: and it was resolved in the Affirmative.

Ordered, That Mr. Foster have leave to bring in a Bill to encourage the production of beet-root sugar.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry back the Bill to the Senate, and acquaint their Honours, That this House hath agreed to their Amendments.

Mr. Bergeron reported, from the Committee of the Whole House to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting the granting of subsidies in land to certain Railway Companies in the North-West Territories, a Resolution, which was read, as followeth :--

Range twenty-three, west of the 4th Meridian, a distance of about seventy-five miles.

The said Resolution was amended, by leaving out all the words after "railway," in the fifth line, to the end of the Resolution, and inserting the words, "from the "Town of *Calgary*, in the District of *Alberta*, in the *North-West Territories*, to a "point in or near Township twenty-nine, Range twonty-three, west of the 4th "Meridian, a distance of about fifty-five miles," inserted instead thereof;

And the said Resolution, so amended, was agreed to.

Ordered, That Mr. Dewdney have leave to bring in a Bill further to amend the Act fifty-second Victoria, chapter four, initialed: "An Act to authorize the grant-"ing of subsidies in land to certain railway companies."

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time To-morrow.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee on the Bill respecting the Inspection of Ships, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill, and made Amendments thereunto.

"That pursuant to such call for tenders a large number were received, among "them tenders for services "A" and "B" from Messrs. *Pickford* and *Black*, of *Hali*-"fax, N.S., which were, after modifications, accepted and a contract was on the 23rd "day of April, 1890, entered into between said firm and the Government to perform "said service, as follows:—Service "A" with the steamer "Beta" (677 tons) and "service "B" with the steamer "Alpha" (750 tons), and the said contract, at the "request of the said contractors, was to be deemed to have been in force with regard "to service "A" from the 24th day of December, 1889, and with regard to service "B" from the 15th day of November, in said year, and to remain in force for the "term of five years from said dates.

"That among the tenders for "C" service was one from Joseph Wood of Halifax. "N.S., providing a service from St. John and Halifax to Demerara, calling at inter-"mediate ports, as required by the call for tenders, offering one steamer of 700 or 800"tons register, speed 12 knots, accommodation for 30 1st class passengers and classed "A 1 at *Lloyds*, and to be ready for service by 1st September, 1890, for the sum of \$20,000, payable at the rate of \$2,000 per round trip for ten trips to be made each

"year, and contract to be for five years.

"That the Minister declined to accept such tender on the ground that he did "not consider the same adequate.

"That in addition to the above tender for "C" service a number of others were "received, but, of those conforming to the Government's requirements (viz.:-1,000 "tons and 12 knots speed) the lowest were those of the said *Pickford* and *Black*, "sailing from *Halitax*, \$48,000 a year; and Mr. *Furness* of *England*, sailing from "St. John, \$50,000 per year, and Mr. Van Wart, for himself and associates, sailing "from St. John, \$54,000 per year.

"That the Minister of Finance, on the 18th September, 1889, recommended to "Council the acceptance of the *Furness* tender.

"That although such tender of Mr. Furness urged the necessity of his receiving "the decision of the Government by September 5th, such decision was not com-"municated to him until the 20th of September, when the Finance Minister tele-"graphed his (Mr. Furness') agent offering \$50,000 per year, after the new boats "referred to in Furness's offer were put on, and \$48,000 a year, pro rata, for the sub-"stituted steamers until new ones were put on the route."

"That on the 24th of October, 1889, Mr. Furness informed the Finance Minister "that owing to the Government's delay in communicating with him, the substitute "steamers which were under offer to him, were withdrawn, and that he had been "unsuccessful in securing other suitable boats.

"That on the 8th of November following, the Finance Minister reopened negotia-"tions with Messrs. *Pickford* and *Black*, and, by telegraph, with the said *Van Wart* "for said "C" service, and, on the following day, the said *Van Wart* tendered, offer-"ing steamships of 1,000 tons and 12 knot speed, reducing his price from \$54,000 to "\$49,200, or at the rate of \$4,100 for each round trip, and providing one steamer "making trips every six weeks for first year, and two steamers making monthly trips "in subsequent years.

"That on the 15th of November following, the Minister reported to Council in "favour of accepting Mr. Van Wart's offer, upon the above conditions, which report "was concurred in.

"That the said Van Wart who had tendered for himself and associates, after the "acceptance of his tender, organized a company called the Canadian, West Indian "and South American Steamship Company (Limited), and took out letters patent "therefor under the Companies Act, and, in the name of the said Company, and on "the day of March, A.D., 1890, entered into a contract with the Government to "carry out such tender.

"That Mr. Geo. F. Baird, then a Member of the House of Commons for Queen's "County, N.B., one of the associates of the said Van Wart, in such tender, after "the formation of the said Company, became the manager thereof.

"That the contract so entered into, provided that the said Company should carry "on said service with twosteamers, of not less than 1,000 tons register, and of a speed "not less than 12 knots, and with accommodation for not less than 30 1st class pas-" sengers, with a proviso that the service might be carried on for six months by the " contractors with the SS " Portia.

"That the "Portia" is a steamer of 732 tons only, and of a less speed than that "tendered for, and was put on the route in the month of January, and performed two "round trips in the months of January, February, March and April, payment for "which was not made till after the Company was organized in March.

"That in the month of May, the SS "Loanda" was placed on the route by the "said Company and continued thereon until the contract was abandoned by the "Company in November or December following.

"That the "Loanda" did not comply with the requirements of the contract, "being much below both in tonnage and speed, and being in other respects unsuitable "and unsatisfactory. "That notwithstanding these facts the Minister of Finance agreed with the said "C. W. I. and S. A. S. S. Company in the summer or autumn of 1890, that such "steamer "Loanda" might be continued on the route, during the year 1890, and that "the Government would pay for each round trip made by her the sum of \$6,150, "instead of \$4,100, as provided by the contract, and further, that such increased sub-"sidies should extend to all previous trips made by the "Loanda" under the contract, "and that such agreement was subsequently carried out and the increased subsidies "paid to such Company.

"That after being informed by said Company that they did not intend to carry "out their contract beyond the year 1890, the Minister of Finance, without calling for "new tenders, agreed with the above mentioned *Pickford* and *Black* to give them a "contract for said" C" service for 5 years—sailing from *St. John*, calling at *Halifax*, "for the sum of \$5,000 for each monthly trip, by suitable steamers of the speed and "tonnage called for by the former contract with the Company, in all \$60,000 per year, "and, at or about the same time, agreed to pay and did pay the said *Pickford* and "*Black* the sum of \$15,000 in cash for certain alleged trips to the West Indies of the "Hepta" and "Beta" made by said boats before the tender for their services had "been accepted and before the date from which the said *Pickford* and *Black* at the "time of entering into the said contracts ("A & B"), claimed they were entitled to "be paid.

"That subsequently to such arrangement between the Minister of Finance and "Messrs. *Pickford* and *Black*, the latter, with the consent of the Minister, continued "the SS. "Loanda" on the service till April, 1891, when, owing to the many com-"plaints and the unsatisfactory nature of the service, she was withdrawn and the "SS. "Taymouth Castle" substituted.

"That the said "Taymouth Castle" appears to be simply a cargo-boat, of a "speed of about 9 knots and altogether inferior to the requirements of the contract, "and the said *Pickford* and *Black* have never yet furnished the class of boats "required by the terms of their contract.

"That the conduct of the Minister of Finance in the premises has been detri-"mental to the public interest and merits the censure of this House," inserted instead thereof;"

PRAYERS.

Mr. Wallace, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented to the House the Twentieth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth :-

Your Committee have had under consideration the Accounts, &c., respecting the equipment and plant of the Government Printing Bureau, and, in connection therewith, summoned Mr. André Senécal, Superintendent of Printing, to again appear before them, this 27th day of August, 1891; Mr. Senécal, however, has disobeyed the Order of your Committee, and has failed to appear, as directed, but has forwarded the following letter to their Chairman :---

(Translation.)

"OTTAWA, 24th August, 1891.

"CLARKE WALLACE, Esquire, M. P.,

"Chairman Public Accounts Committee.

"SIR,-I have held myself at the disposal of your Committee for several weeks, " contrary to the formal prescription of my doctor, in order to furnish all desirable "information as to the purchases and as to the expenses of the Government Printing "Office. I should have been able in one sitting to have given that information, and "immediately thereafter to have taken the rest I needed. But, I see that your Com-"mittee are not anxious to secure that information. I can no longer delay comply-"ing with the doctor's orders.

"It would have been easy to convince your Committee that all the contracts "were honestly and scrupulously made and that no commission or advantage for "myself or for others was stipulated for or taken into consideration in any of them. "It would have been easy to prove that (a thing of rare occurrence) the purchases "were made for the Government at lower prices than any private individual could "have made them for himself. But that was not, it seems, what your Committee "wanted.

"According to my understanding of the law, the Civil Service Act, as also "the oath taken by the employees, forbids the receiving from the Government of "any other remuneration than the regular salary, but, it does not forbid, it cannot "forbid, testimonials of esteem and of cordial relations from friend to friend, and, "under these circumstances, the system of low spying and vile, anonymous inform-"ing, now so freely resorted to, is of no utility. But, the contrary opinion seems to " prevail in your Committee and elsewhere, and I have tendered my resignation.

"I have worked often,-very often,-late into the night to make the National "Printing Office what it is, and my work will stand as my answer to the calumnia-" tors and fanatics who have sought my ruin.

Mr. Flint moved, seconded by Mr. German, That Thomas Bernard Flint, the Member representing the Electoral District of Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, in this House, having stated from his place in this House that he is credibly informed and verily believes:

1. That Edward Cochrane was, during the last Parliament, and now is the Member for the Electoral District of the East Riding of the County of Northumberland.

2. That while he was such Member, it was corruptly agreed to by and between the said Edward Cochrane and John D. Clouston, William Johnson, William Brown and Robert May, respectively, that if each of them would pay to him, or to certain other persons for him, or for political purposes, the sum of \$200, he would procure for each of them the position under the Government of Canada, of attendant or keeper of one of the swing bridges over or across the Murray Canal.

3. That in pursuance of such corrupt agreement, the said several sums of money were paid, and the said persons were so appointed to said positions.

4. That while he, the said *Edward Cochrane*, was such Member as aforesaid, it was corruptly agreed by and between the said *Edward Cochrane*, and one *Henry May*, that if the said Henry May would pay the said Edward Cochrane, or to other persons for him, or for political purposes, the sum of \$200, he would procure for the said Henry May, the office or position under the Government, of foreman or overseer of employees under the Government.

5. That in pursuance of the said corrupt agreement, the said sum of \$200 was paid, and the said office or position duly received by the said Henry May.

That the foregoing statement be referred to the Select Committee composed of Sir Adolphe P. Caron, Messieurs Cameron (Huron), German, Mulock, Skinner, Tisdale and White (Shelburne).

And the Question being put on the Motion :- It was resolved in the Affirmative.

"If, when Parliament is not in Session, any accident happens to any public "work or building which requires an immediate outlay for the repair thereof, or "any other occasion arises when any expenditure, not foreseen or provided for by "Parliament, is urgently and immediately required for the public good, then, upon "the report of the Minister of Finance and Receiver General that there is no Par-"liamentary provision, and of the Minister having charge of the service in question, "that the necessity is urgent, the Governor in Council may order a special Warrant to be prepared, to be signed by the Governor General, for the issue of the amount "estimated to be required."

"That on or about the 25th day of June, and 16th day of October, 1890, His "Excellency was advised to issue his warrants for the expenditures of \$281,606 and "\$16,000, for the service of the *Prince Edward* and Intercolonial Railroads, during "the fiscal year, 1890, which terminated on the 30th day of June, 1890."

"That Parliament remained in Session up to the 16th day of May, 1890, being "within six weeks of the close of the said fiscal year."

"That no accident had occurred upon the said Rulroads, nor was there any "reason whatever why said expenditure should not have been foreseen and provided "for by Parliament."

"That, under such circumstances, the issue of a Governor General's warrant for "the said sums was a gross abuse of the power vested in the Governor in Council "under the said Act, and that the conduct of the Government in neglecting to apply "to Parliament in due time for the said sums, indicates great laxity of administra-"tion and deserves the censure of this House," inserted instead thereof;

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Honour the Deputy Governor, as followeth :--

In the name of the Commons, I present to you Honour a Bill, intituled: "An "Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying "certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year, ending the 30th June, "1892, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service," to which I humbly request your Honour's assent.

To this Bill the Royal Assent was signified in the following words :----

"In Her Majesty's name, His Honour, the Deputy of His Excellency the "Governor General thanks Her Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence and "assents to this Bill."

The Committee of the Whole on the Bill further to amend the Act fifty-second Victoria, chapter four, initial:—"An Act to authorize the granting of subsidies "in Land to certain Railway Companies," was then resumed, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had made some progress, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, on Monday next, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

(In the Committee.)

1. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding One hundred and twenty-nine thousand two hundred and ninety dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Dredging, as follow, viz.:-New dredging plant, \$21,000; Dredge vessels-Repairs, \$24,290; Dredging-Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, \$28,000; Quebec and Ontario, \$28,000; Manitoba, \$10,500; British Columbia, \$10,500; General service, \$7,000.

3. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Twenty-six thousand one hundred dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Experimental Farms, buildings, fencing, etc.

4. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Twenty-four thousand seven hundred and tifty dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for the following Miscellancous items, viz. :-Miscellancous works not otherwise provided for, \$6,750; Surveys and inspections, \$14.400; National Art Gallery, \$900; Surveys and plans of Government properties in connection with Public Works, \$2,700.

5. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Four thousand five hundred and fifty dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Collection of Slides and Booms dues.

6. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Eighty thousand eight hundred and fifty dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for repairs and working expenses, Harbours, Docks and Slides.

7. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding One thousand four hundred dollars, be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for telegraph line between *Prince Edward Island* and the mainland.

Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Twenty-one thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Land and Cable Telegraph Lines of the Sea Coasts and Islands of the Lower Rivers and Gulf of St. Lawrence and Maritime Provinces, including cost of working steamer "Newfield," or other vessel when required for cable service.

9. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Seventeen thousand five hundred dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Telegraph Lines, North-West Territories.

10. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Seven thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Telegraph Lines, British Columbia.

11. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Seven thousand dollars, be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Telegraph and Signal Service generally.

12. Resolved. That a sum not exceeding Four thousand five hundred and fifty dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Public Works Agency, British Columbia.

Resolutions to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had come to several Resolutions.

Mr. Girouard, from the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections. which was empowered and directed, by Order of the House of the 19th August, to enquire and report whether the election of the Honourable *Thomas McGreevy* was being lawfully contested at the time he tendered to Mr. Speaker his resignation, and, if such fact is found in the affirmative, whether the Warrant of Mr. Speaker should have issued for the issue of a new Writ, and what practice should be adopted with reference to similar resignations tendered to Mr. Speaker in the future by Members of this House, beg leave to present, as their Sixth Report, the appended report of their Sub-Committee, to which they had unanimously agreed :---

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE.

TUESDAY, 1st September, 1891.

The Sub-Committee of the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, to which were referred the matters contained in the Order of Reference from the House of the 19th August, with instructions to search for precedents, and to report the result of their deliberations, beg leave to report, as follows :—

That the election of the Honourable *Thomas McGreery* was lawfully contested on the 15th day of April last past, and that the said contestation was pending at the time that he tendered his resignation to Mr Speaker.

That under the circumstances, your Sub-Committee recommends that the saidresignation be not acted upon by Mr. Speaker, and that his Warrant for the issue of a new Writ be recalled.

Your Sub-Committee is also of the opinion that, under the present state of the law, the Speaker, when not aware of the contestation of the election of a Member, may properly act upon the resignation of such Member, and issue his Warrant accordingly; and, should Clause 7 of Chapter 13 of the Revised Statutes be continued, they beg to recommend that this want in the Statute be remedied by providing, that, in the future, the Prothonotary or Clerk of the Court where an Election Petition is filed and pending, shall forthwith notify the Speaker of such Election Petition.

Your Sub-Committee finally, without expressing any opinion thereon, recommends the advisability of the House considering whether the said Clause seven (7) of Chapter thirteen (13) of the Revised Statutes of *Canada* should not be repealed.

On motion of Mr. Sproule, seconded by Mr. Taylor.

Ordered, That the Second Report of the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization presented to this House, be referred to the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament.

The Order of the Day being read, for the attendance at the Bar of The House of André Senécal :

And the said André Senécal not having attended at the Bar of The House.

On motion of Mr. Lister, seconded by Mr. Edgar.

Ordered, That André Senécal not having attended this day at the Bar of this House, pursuant to the Order of this House of the 27th day of August last, he be taken into the custody of the Sergeant-at-Arms attending this House, and that Mr. Speaker do issue his Warrant accordingly.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting the release of certain Mortgage bonds of the North Shore Railway Company, held by the Government.

(In the Committee.)

Resolved, That subsidies to the extent of \$1,500,000 were voted by Parliament in the years 1884 and 1885, to be used in such manner that the City of Quebec and other portions of the Province, north of the River St. Lawrence, should be reached and served by the Canadian Pacific Railway, the then existing North Shore Railway to be utilized for that purpose, and that its road-bed and other properties, as well as its equipment; should be improved so as to make that portion equal to the other portions of the Canadian Pacific Railway system; and the Government, in 1885, made an arrangement concerning the acquisition of the North Shore Railway by the Canadian Pacific Railway for the aforesaid purposes, by which it was agreed that in the event of the net receipts arising from the operation of the said Railway,

after paying the operating expenses thereof, proving insufficient to meet the interest on the mortgage bonds of the said North Shore Railway Company, including those held by the Government of *Quebec*, as collateral security for the balance of the price of the said Railway, the Government would apply the interest on the sum of Nine hundred and seventy thousand dollars, at the rate of four per cent. per annum, in whole or in part, as might be required, towards the payment of the deficiency; but, that if, or when after payment of all such deficiencies, the net receipts of the said Railway should be sufficient to pay the interest on the said bonds, the Company would cease to have any further claim or demand upon the Government in respect of the said sum of money, provided, as regards operating expenses, that the cost of no new works or renewals of a more expensive character than existing works were when new, should be accounted as forming part of such operating expenses, unless the previous consent of the Minister of Railways and Canals had been obtained to the construction.

That subsequently, with the consent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, the Government applied the sum of \$970,000, part of the said subsidies, to the purchase of the bonds of the North Shore Railway Company, to the amount of \$1,108,626, said bonds forming part of the issue of about \$5,000,000, secured by mortgage on the North Shore Railway, the balance of the purchase price of that Railway by the North Shore Railway Company amounting to \$3,500,000, being secured by a first charge on the said Railway in favour of the Government of *Quebec*, as vendor's lien (*privilège de bailleur de fonds*) and, therefore, ranking before the charge in respect to the bonds so held by the Government as aforesaid, such purchase being made on the understanding that the interest on the bonds purchased should be applied in whole or in part, if required, in payment of deficiences in the same manner and to the same extent as the interests of the said sum of \$970,000 would have been applied under the said agreement above mentioned.

That since the said arrangement, the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has not become liable under its provisions to pay, and has not paid, interest on any part of the bonds so held by the Government, as aforesaid, the returns of the Company to the Government showing that the net receipts arising from the operation of the Railway, after paying the operating expenses thereof as above mentioned, has proved insufficient to meet the interest on the mortgage bonds of the North Shore Railway Company, as provided for in the said agreement, and that the deficiency was \$534.-368.36 up to the 31st day of December, 1890, of which amount a considerable portion was expended in bridges and permanent improvements of the said Railway, and the effect of the said agreement has been to remove any incentive for the Company to improve the road-bed or other properties included in the lien by which the said bonds are secured, or the equipment and service of the Railway between St. Martin's Junction and Quebec, inasmuch as the expenditure therefor, although in the interest of the public, would not result to the benefit of the Company, and consequently the City of Quebec and other portions of the Province of Quebec have not received the benefit which Parliament intended them to receive from the subsidies so voted.

That it appears, that under the circumstances, it is improbable that the Company will ever become liable to pay interest on the said balance, and that in the meantime the object of the said subsidies will not have been attained, and that it would be in the interest of the country that the said bonds so acquired by the Government, with part of the said subsidy, should be cancelled, as being an obstacle to the improvement of the road and to the carrying out of the true intent and purpose of the said several subsidies.

That the Company has made certain renewals of a more permanent and expensive character than the works which were replaced by such renewals when new, and the Company has proposed that if the said bonds so held by the Government should be cancelled, the Company would execute a deed of agreement in such form as might be determined by the Government, binding itself to complete and provide with all due diligence, the following works and improvements, namely —

Rolling stock, including sleeping cars, day coaches, baggage, mail and express

cars, locomotives and freight cars, of a standard equal to that used on other portions of the Company's railway system, involving an outlay of about \$350,000.

Improvements over the whole line between St. Martin's Junction and the City of Quebec, of such a character as to bring that section up to the highest standard of the other Canadian Pacific sections, including additional accommodation for passengers at nearly every station, and increased space for the handling of freight, the lengthening of platforms and sidings, the furnishing of new sidings for the development of stone, lumber and other traffic, the substitution of iron for woolen bridges on the line of the North Shore Railway, and the construction of the following specific works, that is to say:—

(1.) In the City of Quebec :--

(a) One grain elevator.

(b) One flour shed.

- (c) Such local improvements and facilities as are necessary for the handling of the traffic of that City.
- (2.) In Three Rivers:—
 - (a) One grain elevator.
 - (b) Improvements over the loop line.

(c) Improvements on the Piles Branch.

The said improvements over the whole line involving an outlay of about \$300,000, in addition to the said outlay on rolling stock.

The whole to be completed to the satisfaction of the Minister of Railways.

That under the circumstances, the release of the said obligation and the cancellation of the bonds would not take from the Government an asset of any real value, but would enable the Company to raise the funds necessary to accomplish the said works and improvements, and thus carry out the intention of Parliament in granting the said subsidies.

That it is expedient to provide that on the execution by the Company and the Government of a deed of agreement in such form as shall be determined by the Government, effectively binding the Company to commence forthwith and to complete within such time as shall be prescribed in such deed the execution of the works and improvements, as well as to furnish the rolling stock and equipment hereinbefore detailed, and on the Government being furnished with proof that the sums required to be expended under such deed of agreement, together with the sums already expended by the Company in bridges and other permanent improvements of the said Railway, amount to at least \$970,000, the Government be authorized to cancel and destroy the said bonds so purchased and now held by the Government, as aforesaid, and to discharge the Company from any liability in respect thereof.

Resolution to be reported.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had come to a Resolution.

Ordered, That the Report be received To-morrow.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry back the Bill to the Senate, and acquaint their Honours, That this House hath agreed to their Amendment.

The House, according to Order, proceeded to take into consideration the Amendment made by the Senate to the Bill, intituled: "An Act respecting the Shipping of "Live Stock," and the same was twice read and agreed to.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry back the Bill to the Senate, and acquaint their Honours. That this House hath agreed to their Amendment.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

And the said Petition was read and received; praying to be permitted to lay before the House their petition for the passing of an Act to amend their Act of Incorporation, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

On motion of Sir John Thompson, seconded by Mr. Haggart,

Ordered, That the Bill from the Senate, intituled: "An Act in relation to the "unlawful disinterment of dead bodies," be now read the first time.

The Bill was accordingly read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time To-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Tisdale, seconded by Mr. Cameron (Inverness),

Ordered, That the evidence now being taken by the Select Committee appointed to enquire fully into the charges preferred against the Member for the East Riding of the County of Northumberland, be printed for the use of the Members of the Committee, and that Rule 94 be suspended in relation thereto, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the First Report of the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Girouard, seconded by Mr. Cameron (Inverness),

Resolved, That this House doth concur in the Sixth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections.

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill to amend the Acts respecting the Duties of Customs;

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House for To-morrow.

Mr. Bergeron reported, from the Committee of the Whole House, to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting the release of certain Mortgage Bonds of the North Shore Railway Company held by the Government, a Resolution, which was read, as followeth:—

Resolved, That subsidies to the extent of \$1,500,000 were voted by Parliamentin the years 1884 and 1885, to be used in such manner that the City of Quebec and other portions of the Province north of the River St. Lawrence should be reached and served by the Canadian Pacific Railway, the then existing North Shore Railway to be utilized for that purpose, and that its road-bed and other properties, as well as its equipment, should be improved so as to make that portion equal to the other portions of the Canadian Pacific Railway system; and the Government, in 1885, made an arrangement concerning the acquisition of the North Shore Railway by the Canadian Pacific Railway for the aforesaid purposes, by which it was agreed that in the event of the net receipts arising from the operation of the said Railway, after paying the operating expenses thereof, proving insufficient to meet the interest on the mortgage bonds of the said North Shore Railway Company, including those held by the Government of Quebec as collateral security for the balance of the price of the said Railway, the Government would apply the interest on the sum of Nine hundred and seventy thousand dollars, at the rate of four per cent. per annum, in whole or in part, as might be required, towards the payment of the deficiency; but, that if, or when after payment of all such deficiencies, the net receipts of the said Railway should be sufficient to pay the interest on the said bonds, the Company would cease to have any further claim or demand upon the Government, in respect of the said sum of money, provided, as regards operating expenses, that the cost of no new works or renewals of a more expensive character than existing works were when new, should be accounted as forming part of such operating expenses, unless the previous consent of the Minister of Railways and Canals had been obtained to the construction.

That subsequently, with the consent of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, the Government applied the sum of \$970,000, part of the said subsidies, to the purchase of the bonds of the North Shore Railway Company, to the amount of \$1,108,626, said bonds forming part of the issue of about \$5,000,000, secured by mortgage on the North Shore Railway, the balance of the purchase price of that Railway by the North Shore Railway, the balance of the purchase price of that alway by the North Shore Railway, the balance of the Government of *Quebec* as vendor's lien (*privilège de bailleur de fonds*) and, therefore, ranking before the charge in respect to the bonds so held by the Government as aforesaid, such purchase being made on the understanding that the interest on the bonds purchased should be applied in whole or in part, if required, in payment of deficiencies in the same manner and to the same extent as the interest of the said sum of \$970,000 would have been applied under the said agreement above mentioned.

That since the said arrangement, the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has not become liable under its provisions to pay, and has not paid, interest on any part of the bonds so held by the Government, as aforesaid, the returns of the Company to the Government showing that the net receipts arising from the operation of the Railway, after paying the operating expenses thereof as above mentioned, has proved insufficient to meet the interest on the mortgage bonds of the North Shore Railway Company, as provided for in the said agreement, and that the deficiency was \$334,-368,36 up to the 31st day of December, 1890, of which amount a considerable portion was expended in bridges and permanent improvements of the said Railway, and the effect of the said agreement has been to remove any incentive for the Company to improve the road-bed or other properties included in the lien by which the said bonds are secured, or the equipment and service of the Railway between St. Martin's Junction and Quebec, inasmuch as the expenditure therefor, although in the interest of the public, would not result to the benefit of the Company, and consequently the City of Quebec and other portions of the Province of Quebec have not received the benefit which Parliament intended them to receive from the subsidies so voted.

That it appears, that under the circumstances, it is improbable that the Company will ever become liable to pay interest on the said balance, and that in the meantime the object of the said subsidies will not have been attained, and that it would be in the interest of the country that the said bonds so acquired by the Government, with part of the said subsidy, should be cancelled, as being an obstacle to the improvement of the road and to the carrying out of the true intent and purpose of the said several subsidies.

That the Company has made cortain renewals of a more permanent and expensive character than the works which were replaced by such renewals when new, and the Company has proposed that if the said bonds so held by the Government should be cancelled, the Company would execute a deed of agreement in such form as might be determined by the Government, binding itself to complete and provide with all due diligence, the following works and improvements, namely:--

Rolling stock, including sleeping cars, day coaches, baggage, mail and express cars, locomotives and freight cars, of a standard equal to that used on other portions of the Company's railway system, involving an outlay of about \$350,000.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Davin, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented to the House the Seventh Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth :---

The Committee would recommend that the following documents be printed, viz. :--

On the reference from the House of Commons.

1st. The evidence given before the Select Standing Committee of the House of Commons on Agriculture and Colonization by the several Professors connected with the Dominion Experimental Farms, to the number of Five hundred (500) copies, severally, and that each of such evidence be issued in separate Bulletin form, for circulation by these officers, this issue not to include the evidence of the Director, Professor Saunders, an edition thereof having been already published in Bulletin form.

2nd. An issue of Three thousand (3,000) copies of the evidence of Mr. James Gordon Mowat, before the Committee, on the Climatology of Canada in relation to Agriculture and Horticulture, this latter publication to be distributed, in the usual way, to Members of the Senate and of the House of Commons.

Report and minutes of evidence of the Select Committee of the House of Commons appointed to enquire fully into the charges preferred against the Member for the East Riding of the County of *Northumberland*.

Reports, minutes of proceedings and evidence, &c., of the Committee of the Senate on Railways, Telegraphs and Harbours, to whom was referred the Bill intituled: "An Act respecting the *Baie des Chaleurs* Railway Company."

The several Reports, with the minutes of evidence, of the Select Standing Committees of the House of Commons on "Public Accounts" and on "Privileges and Elections."

Mr. Wallace, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented to the House the Twenty-Sixth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth :---

Your Committee have had under consideration certain items set forth under the heading "Government in *Keewatin*," on page C—236 of the Report of the Auditor General on Appropriation Accounts, for the year ended 30th June, 1889–90; and in connection therewith have examined witnesses under oath, and, for the information of the House, report herewith the evidence given by such witnesses.- (Appendix No. 2.)

Mr. Bowell, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented Return to an Order of this House, dated 3rd August, 1891, for copies of petitions, correspondence, de., relating to reconstruction, by private parties, of the Caledonia dam, across the Grand River. (Sessional Papers, No. 43d.)

Also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 18th June, 1891, for a Return showing :-

1. The names of the several Railways in the Dominion to which Dominion aid has been granted, except the Canadian Pacific main line;

2. The Province within which the said Railway, in whole or in part, is located, and if located in two or more Provinces, the number of miles in each;

3. The County or Counties through which the said lines run in each Province: 4. The amount of money paid to each up to the 1st January, 1891;

5. The Railways built in the Dominion by the Dominion since Confederation, excepting the main line of the Intercolonial and main line of the Canadian Pacific; 6. The Province within which built;

7. The entire cost of each line built or assisted by the Dominion, in each Province, including equipment;

8. The entire sum spent up to 1st January last, on the construction of Dominion roads in each Province, excepting the Intercolonial main line and Canadian Pacific main line. (Sessional Papers, No. 34e.)

And also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 3rd August, 1891, for a Return showing :-

1st. The names of all employees of the Customs at *Montreal*: the date of their appointment; their respective duties; the salary of each; their nationality; their place of birth; and, in case of their not having been born in Canada, for what period they had been in this country at the time of their appointment; and upon whose recommendation they had been appointed;

2nd. Whether they have all passed the Civil Service examination; and the names of those, if any, who have not passed this examination, since the law requiring it has been in force;

3rd. The names of those, if any, who have received salaries or pay in addition to that attached to the offices to which they were appointed; the amounts received by such persons, and for what additional work given :

4th. The names of the extra labourers for whose services there was paid in 1889-90 the sum of \$12,176.25, as recorded in the Auditor General's Report for the year 1889-90, at page C-254.

5th. To whom was paid the sum of \$5,930.29, for cartage at the Custom House at Montreal, as recorded in the said Report of the Auditor General, at page C-254. (Sessional Papers, No. 83.)

The House, according to Order, proceeded to take into consideration the Amendments made by the Senate to the Bill, intitule 1: " An Act respecting the Outario "Express and Transportation Company," and the same were twice read and agreed to.

Ordered, That the Clerk do carry back the Bill to the Senate, and acquaint their Honours, That this House hath agreed to their Amendments.

The Order of the Day being read, for the third reading of the Bill respecting the North Shore section of the Canadian Pacific Railway;

Mr. Boxell moved, seconded by Mr. Foster, and the Question being proposed. That the Bill be now read the third time;

Mr. Laurier moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Davies. That all the words after "now" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words " re committed to "a Committee of the Whole House, for the purpose of amending the same, by adding "after the word 'agreement,' in the second line of the first section, the words " within two months after the prorogation of the present Session,' and by leaving " out, in the fifth line of the said section, the words 'such time as is prescribed in such 32c

"'deed,' and inserting the words 'twelve months after the completion of such "'deed,' instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment; the House divided: and it passed in the Negative.

Then the main Question being put :---It was resolved in the Affirmative.

Ordered, That the Bill be now read the third time.

The Bill was accordingly read the third time.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass. Ordered, That the Clerk do carry the Bill to the Senate, and desire their concurrence.

1. That *Edward Cochrane* was on the 7th day of January, 1888, and now is, a Member of Parliament for the said riding and a supporter of the Government.

2. That in the year 1888 the said Hedley H. Simpson made and delivered to one James Stanley, two promissory notes for \$100 each, one of which was endorsed by his uncle, Darius Simpson (a responsible party), and handed them to the said James Stanley, who loaned the said Hedley H. Simpson \$200 thereon.

3. The said *Hedley H. Simpson* applied the said money towards the payment of a promissory note made by Dr. *Willoughby* and one *Pickworth*, and endorsed first by *William L. Payne*, and secondly by the said *Edward Cochrane*. The said note was discounted at the Standard Bank to raise money to pay a part of a note for \$1,000 held by one *Webb*, which had been given some time previous to pay expenses connected with a protest, arising out of a local election for the *Ontario* Legislature, about the year 1883; the said *Edward Cochrane* not being a party to the original note and in no way responsible for its payment;

note and in no way responsible for its payment; Your Committee find that the said *Hedley H. Simpson* did not in pursuance of any corrupt or other bargain with the said *Edward Cochrane*, make the notes or get the same, or either of them endorsed, or have the same or the proceeds thereof placed in a bank for the use of the said *Edward Cochrane* personally, or for any political purpose.

4. The said *Hedley H. Simpson* subsequently paid the said notes made by him.

5. The said Hedley H. Simpson was appointed as such Lighthouse-keeper.

6. That it was never corruptly nor in any way agreed, by and between the said *Edward Cochrane* and the said *Hedley H. Simpson*, that if the said *Hedley H. Simpson* would make and deliver to one *James Stanley* two promissory notes for \$100 each, endorsed by some responsible person, he the said *Edward Cochrane* would procure the appointment of the said *Hedley H. Simpson* to the said office of Lighthouse-keeper for the Government lighthouse on *Presqu' Isle* Point; and whatever did take place with reference to the said appointment was between the said *Hedley H. Simpson* and the said *James Stanley*.

7. That a Committee in the riding looked after the recommendation of persons to be appointed to the offices referred to in the charges, and such Committee, through the said *James Stanley*, arranged for the recommendation of the said *Simpson*, and the said *Stanley* asked him to contribute towards payment of the said indebtedness of the party in reference to the protest above referred to, and he voluntarily consented to make a contribution for that purpose to the extent aforesaid.

Your Committee find, regarding the charge in reference to the proposed appointment of Arundel R. Simpson to the office of Bridge-keeper on the Murray Canal.—

1. That Obadiah Simpson was not promised in the summer of 1889, or at any other time, by the said *Edward Cochrane*, the Government office of keeper or attendant of one of the Swing Bridges over the *Murray* Canal, and no evidence was given to support this charge.

2. That James Stanley did not propose to the said Arundel R. Simpson, with the knowledge and consent of the said Edward Cochrane or otherwise, that if the said Arundel R. Simpson would pay \$150 and give to his father, the said Obadiah Simpson. a life lease of his farm (as compensation for his not being appointed such Bridge-keeper, which the charge alleges he had been promised and had not received). he, the said Arundel R. Simpson, would be appointed such Bridge-keeper.

3. As to the charge that shortly afterwards the said Arundel R. Simpson had an interview with the said Edward Cochrane on the same subject, when the said Edward Cochrane said to him that they could not take the \$150 for said office, that Stanley should not have made that offer, that other arrangements had been made with one Wesley Goodrich, who agreed to pay \$200 and give said lease for said appointment,—your Committee find the only evidence which goes to substantiate even a portion of such charge was that given by Arundel R. Simpson. That the said Arundel R. Simpson had, in a solemn declaration which he had previously signed, given an entirely different version of certain matters connected with these charges from what he gave before this Committee, and because of his being contradicted by other evidence, and from his demeanour on the stand while giving his testimony, your Committee cannot place any reliance on the testimony he gave in reference to these charges. 4. That the charge that the said *Edward Cochrane* then and there corruptly proposed to the said *Arundel R. Simpson* that, if he would pay the said *Edward Cochrane* \$200 and give said life lease, he would be appointed, and that the said *Arundel R. Simpson* refused to do so, was wholly unsupported by evidence, and no attempt was made to prove the same, and it appears by the evidence that the said *Arundel R. Simpson* was not, nor ever had been, the owner of a farm.

Your Committee find, as to the charge in reference to the appointment of Wesley Goodrich to the office of Bridge-keeper on the Murray Canal :--

1. That it was never corruptly nor in any way agreed to, by and between the said Wesley Goodrich and the said Edward Cochrane, that if the said Edward Coch, rane would procure the appointment of the said Wesley Goodrich to the said office he, the said Wesley Goodrich, would pay the sum of \$200, and execute to the said Obadiah Simpson a life lease of his farm, with a condition in the lease that if said Goodrich lost said appointment, said lease would be cancelled. The said Edward Cochrane had no connection with the making of the agreement and lease between said Goodrich and Obadiah Simpson; they did the business themselves, and your Committee find that no corrupt agreement was made by or between any persons as to such agreement and lease.

2. Your Committee find, that as to the charge concerning the executing the lease by Goodrich and wife to Obadiah Sompson, and the payment by Goodrich of the \$200, that the lease was executed and delivered as aforesaid, but the same was not done, as charged, in pursuance of a corrupt bargain, nor in pursuance of any agree ment made with the said Edward Cochrane. The said Obudiah Simpson was an old man, desirous of being appointed as keeper of a bridge : and the said Goodrich, who owned a small farm, and had previously received a sunstroke, which rendered him, to a considerable extent, incapable of working on his farm, was desirous of getting the same position, in order that he might be able to make a living in such a class of work as he was then able to perform, was willing, if he received the appointment, to make a lease of his farm for the life of the said Obadiah Simpson, and thereby benefit himself and make some provision for the said Obudiah Simpson in his old age (he being nearly 80 years old), and agreed of his own free will to make the life lease to the said Obadiah Simpson, whereby provision would be made for the said Obadiah Simpson, and thereupon, and for the reason last aforesaid expressed, the said lease was executed and delivered to the said Obadiah Simpson. And as to the payment of the said \$200 by the said Goodrich, he (the said Goodrich) had heard that money was being raised to pay off the hereinbefore mentioned indebtedness of the party in the riding, and he voluntarily offered to contribute \$200 for that purpose ; and one John Wade, a member of the said Committee in the said riding, having heard of this, and also, that the said Goodrich had offered to make the said lease, came and asked him if he would make such contribution, and he thereup in said, he would give the sum of \$200 towards 'such purpose, and at the time, he, the said Goodrich, did so, he knew he was to be recommended by the said Committee for appointment as such Bridge-keeper, and that he had not yet been appointed : but he, the said Goodrich, did not say he would give said \$200, nor did he give nor pay the same under any agreement that his recommendation or appointment was dependent upon such promise or payment; but voluntarily offered to give, and voluntarily paid said \$200 in part liquidation of the said indebtedness, by sending the same to the said W. L. Payne on account thereof. That the said Goodrich informed the said Edward Cochrane that he, the said Goodrich, was about giving the lease to said Obadiah Simpson, for the purpose of making such provision for said Obadiah Simpson. That said Edward Cochrane did not, either corruptly or other-wise, receive any money from the said Goodrich. When the said Goodrich was about taking the \$200, which he said he was willing to contribute towards the pay-ment of said indebtedness, to W. L. Payne, he asked the said Edward Cochrane to count the money for him, and he, the said Goodrich. to save time and trouble in travelling, sent the money to W. L. Payne by Wallace Cochrane, a son of the said Edward Cochrane, who was going on other business to Colborne, the place where said Payne lived.

3. That the said Wesley Goodrich was appointed to the office of Bridge-keeper on the Murray Canal.

1. Your Committee find, that the said *Edward Cochrane* was elected a Member of the last Parliament on the 22nd December, 1887, and upon the 7th day of January, 1888, and until after the Session of 1888, was the Member for said riding; that he was subsequently unseated, and was re-elected such Member on the 21st November, 1888, and from thence remained such Member for the balance of said Parliament, and now is the Member for the East Riding of the County of Northumberland.

2. That it was not corruptly or otherwise agreed by and between the said Edward Cochrane and John D. Clouston, William Brown and Robert May, or either or any of them, that if they or any of them would pay to him, or certain other persons for him, or for political purposes, the sum of \$200, or any other sum, he would procure for each, or any of them, the position, under the Government of Canada, of attendant or keeper of one of the Swing Bridges over or across the Murray Canal, and that no money was paid in pursuance of any corrupt agreement.

3. That John D. Clouston, William Johnson, William Brown and Robert May. were appointed Bridge-keepers or attendant of bridges over the Murray Canal, and were recommended for such appointments by the said Committee in the riding, or some of the members thereof; that all of the men were strong supporters of the Conservative party, and knew of the existence of the said indebtedness, in connection with the expenses arising out of the said protest, before and at the time of such recommendation. In response to the expressed desire of the said Committee or some one of them, the said *Clouston* and *Brown* each voluntarily stated that he would pay \$150, and the said Robert May voluntarily stated he would pay \$125 towards payment of such indebtedness, and afterwards the said Clouston paid about \$100, and the said Brown and Robert May each paid \$150 for such purpose. That the offers to make such payments were made to some or one of the members of the said Committee. either at the time of their being notified of such recommendation or shortly after; and that such offers and payments, respectively, were voluntary and unconditional. That the money so paid by *Clouston*, *Brown* and *Robert May* was paid in reduction of notes given for a part of the expenses in connection with the protest arising out of the Ontario local election, hereinbefore mentioned, and the said Edward Cochrane was not a party to such notes or either of them, or in any way liable for their payment or for the payment of any part thereof.

4. That as to the charge that, while he was such Member, it was corruptly agreed by and between the said Edward Cochrane and one Henry May, that if the said Henry May would pay the said Edward Cochrane, or to others for him, or for political purposes, the sum of \$200, he would procure for the said Henry May the office or position under the Government of foreman or overseer of employees under the Government, and that in pursuance of such corrupt agreement the sum of \$200 was paid, and the said office or position duly received by the said Henry May, your Committee find that such charge is wholly unsustained, and not only was there no evidence to warrant such a charge, but the testimony given clearly showed that the office referred to, was not one within the recommendation of the said Edward Cochrane, or within the gift of the Government, but was under the appointment of the Superintendent of the canal, without reference in any way to the Government, and the evidence further disclosed that the said Henry May had not had any communication with the said Edward Cochrane in regard to said position, and that the said Edward Cochrane had not intervened in any way whatever with regard to the appointment of the said Henry May, and that such charge was not only groundless, but that the same had been made without information from the parties who could have shown that no reason existed for making the charge.

1. Your Committee further find that the appointments of the said Hedley H. Simpson as lighthouse-keeper as aforesaid, and of the said Wesley Goderich, John D. Clouston, William Brown and Robert May, as such bridge-keepers on the Murray Canal, were all recommended to said Edward Cochrane by the said Committee, and by the said Edward Cochrane recommended to the Government.

2. That no evidence was given or suggestion made that the said appointments or any of them were improper in consequence of any insufficiency or incompetency in the persons so appointed.

3. That the facts which your Committee have reported with reference to the manner of making recommendations for the appointments by the political Committee in the riding and the soliciting of subscriptions by the Committee from the applicants for the aforesaid purpose, all occurred before the last election of the said *Edward Cochrane* and were well known in the riding before the said last election, and discussed at the nomination on the hustings and at other places during said election contest.

4. Your Committee report that the practice which seems to have been resorted to by the political organization referred to, in order to raise a fund for political purpose, though not connected with Dominion polities, was improper and reprehensible.

Your Committee also report that the charge relating to William Johnson could not be gone into by them, as they were unable to secure the attendance of the said Johnson before them, and, in the event of its appearing by the statements of any two Members of the Committee that Johnson's attendance can be procured at a subsequent date during the session, it is recommended that the Committee ask leave to sit again for the purpose of taking up and investigating the William Johnson charge; and, in the event of the Committee not being able to secure his attendance, or of inability to proceed during the present session, that the Order of Reference shall be deemed amended by the erasure therefrom of the charge relating to William Johnson charge had never been made. (Appendix No. 4.)

Mr. Bergeron, reported from the Committee of Supply, several Resolutions; which were read, as follow:---

1. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding One hundred and thirty-five thousand eight hundred and ten dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Harbours and Rivers as follow:—Ontario— Kingston Harbour, Lake Ontario, \$5,400; Owen Sound, \$14,400; Port Hope—Repairs, \$4,500; River Ottawa—Improvement of steamboat channel through Natrovs at Petawawa, above Pembroke, \$1,350; Bellerille—To complete harbour works, the local authorities protecting the island with crib-work to the amount of \$6,000, \$3,510; Toronto Harbour—Works at eastern and western entrance, the City of Toronto having contributed \$100,000, \$67,500; Little Current, \$9,000; Southampton—To complete, \$1,350; Meaford—Harbour works—the Town having contributed \$2,000, \$900; Georgian Bay—Removal of Robertson Rocks in main passage between (Tapperton and Croker's Island, \$2,250; Beaverton Wharf—The local authorities furnishing \$1,500, \$4,500; Thornbury—Dredging, \$2,700; Parry Sound Narrows, \$5,400; Goderich Harbour, \$900; Rondeau Harbour—Repairs, \$3,150; General repairs and improvements, harbours and rivers, \$9,000.

2. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding One hundred and three thousand five hundred dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for Kingston Graving Dock.

3. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Eighty-two thousand four hundred dollars to be granted to Her Majesty, to complete the sum necessary to defray the charge which will come in course of payment during the year ending on the 30th June, 1892, for three lines of steamers running between the Ports of Halifax and St. John, N.B., or either, and the West Indies and South America.

The said Resolutions, being read a second time, were agreed to.

The House, according to Order, resolved itself into a Committee to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the granting of subsidies in Land to certain Railway Companies in the North-West Territories-the Manitoba South-Western Colonization Railway Company and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had made some progress, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, To-morrow, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee on the Bill further to amend the Act fifty-second Victoria, chapter four, intituled: "An Act to authorize the granting of subsidies in Land to certain Railway Companies." and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Denison reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill and directed him to report the same without any amendment.

Ordered, That the Bill be read the third time To-morrow.

The Order of the Day being read, for the third reading of the Bill further to amend "The Dominion Elections Act;"

Ordered, That the said Order be discharged. Ordered, That the Bill be now re-committed to a Committee of the Whole House for further consideration.

The House accordingly again resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Denison reported. That the Committee had amended the Bill.

Ordered, That the Bill, as amended in the Committee, be now taken into consideration.

The House accordingly proceeded to take the Bill into consideration. Ordered, That the Bill be read the third time To-morrow.

And then The House adjourned till To-morrow.

Mr. Girouard, from the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, to whom were referred certain Statements made in connection with the tenders and contracts respecting the Quebec Harbour Works, the Graving Dock at Esquimalt. etc., with instructions to enquire fully into the said allegations, and especially, but without limiting the scope of such enquiry, to investigate all circumstances connected therewith and the payments and other matters mentioned in the said Statements, beg leave to present, as their Seventh Report, the annexed draft Report prepared by their Sub-Committee, and adopted by your Committee at a meeting held this day. (Appendix No. 1.)

The Order of the Day being read, for the third reading of the Bill further to amend "The Dominion Elections Act";

Sir John Thompson moved, seconded by Mr. Tupper, and the Question being proposed, That the Bill be now read the third time;

Mr. Barron moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Colter, That all the words after "now" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "re-committed to "a Committee of the Whole House, for the purpose of inserting therein as an amend-"ment to Chapter 8, Revised Statutes of Canada, after the word "tine" in the last "line of the 100th section, the following: 'And whensoever it shall be proved before "a court of competent jurisdiction, that the ballot box or its contents has or have "been tampered with, during the time when such ballot box or its contents was or "were in the legal possession of the Returning Officer, Election Clerk or Deputy "Returning Officer, then such Returning Officer, Election Clerk, or Deputy "Returning Officer, shall be liable to the tines or penalties, or both, provided by "law for offences under this section, unless such Returning Officer, Election Clerk "or Deputy Returning Officer, as the case may be, proves to the satisfaction of such "court that the offence with which he is charged was committed without his know-"ledge or consent, assistance or connivance," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment; the House divided: and it passed in the Negative.

And the Question being again proposed, That the Bill be now read the third time;

Mr. Davies moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Mills (Bothwell), That all the words after "be" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "re-"committed to a Committee of the Whole House, for the purpose of amending "Section 64 of the said Aet by adding to sub-section 6 the following: "The judge "'shall also, if necessary or required, review the decision of the returning officer "'in respect to the number of votes given for a candidate at any polling place where "'the ballot box used was not forthcoming when he made his decision, or when the "'proper certificates or papers were not found therein; and, for the purpose of "'arriving at the facts, shall have all the powers of a returning officer in regard to "'the attendance and examination of witnesses," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment:-It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The House accordingly again resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Denison reported, That the Committee had further amended the Bill.

Ordered, That the Bill, as amended in the Committee, be now taken into consideration.

The House accordingly proceeded to take the Bill into consideration.

Sir John Thompson moved, seconded by Mr. Tupper, and the Question being again proposed, That the Bill be now read the third time;

Mr. Landerkin moved in amendment, seconded by Sir Richard J. Cartwright, That all the words after "be" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "re-committed to a Committee of the Whole House, for the purpose of amending sub-"section 2, of Section 6, by leaving out the words 'two weeks' in the last line, and "substituting in lieu thereof the following: 'One week, except in the Electoral Dis-"'tricts of Algoma, Gaspé and Ottawa, when the time may be extended if necessary "to two weeks," inserted instead thereof;

And the Question being put on the amendment; the House divided: and it passed in the Negative.

And the Question being again proposed, That the Bill be now read the third time;

Mr. Mulock moved in amendment, seconded by Mr. Lister, That all the words

"be" to the end of the Question be left out, and the words "re-committed to a Committee of the Whole House, for the purpose of amending Section 3 by leaving out the words "initialed with the initials," and substituting therefor the words "marked with the signatures," and by inserting between the words "do and across" the words; "by writing their signatures";

And the Question being put on the amendment :-- It was resolved in the Affirmative.

The Bill was accordingly read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time To-morrow.

Mr. Foster, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, delivered to Mr. Speaker, a Message from His Excellency the Governor General.

And the said Message was read by Mr. Speaker (all the Members of the House standing and being uncovered), and is as followeth :--

STANLEY OF PRESTON.

On motion of Mr. Laurier, seconded by Mr. Mills (Bothwell), the said Amendment was amended, by leaving out in page 2, line 12, the words, "the next preced-"ing," and inserting the word "this," and leaving out in page 2, line 16, the words, "the said," and inserting "this," and leaving out the words "as amended."

And the said Amendment, so amended, was agreed to.

The Sixth Amendment, being read a second time, was agreed to.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee, to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the granting of subsidies in Land to certain Railway Companies in the North-West Territories—the Manitoba South-Western Colonization Railway Company, and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Ferguson (Leeds and Grenville) reported, That the Committee had made some progress, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee on the Bill further to amend "The Dominion Controverted Elections Act," and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had made some progress, and directed him to move for leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, To-morrow, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into a Committee to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the granting of subsidies in Land to certain Railway Companies in the North-West Territories—the Manitoba South-Western Colonization Railway Company and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

(In the Committee.)

1. Resolved, That it is expedient to authorize the Governor in Council to grant the subsidies of land hereinafter mentioned to the Railway Companies, and towards the construction of the Railways also hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

To the Manitoba South-Western Colonization Railway Company, in addition to the subsidy for One hundred and fifty-miles of railway authorized by the Act passed in the Session held in the forty-eighth and forty-minth years of Her Majesty's reign, chapter sixty, Dominion Lands to the extent of Six thousand four hundred acres per mile for the balance of the Two hundred and twelve miles of railway which have been constructed and are in operation, that is to say, for a distance of Sixty-two

Also, to the *Manitoba* South-Western Colonization Railway Company, Dominion Lands to the extent of Six thousand four hundred acres for each mile of the Company's branch line of railway from *Carman* to *Barnsley*, a distance of about Six and one-quarter miles;

That in the year 1879 Messieurs Alexander Manning, Alexander Shields, John James Macdonald, Alexander McDonell, James Isbester and Peter McLaren entered into a contract with the Government of Canada for the construction of a portion of the Canadian Pacific Railway between Port Arthur and Rat Portage, known as Section B.

The said contract and the works in connection therewith were completed by the said Contractors, to whom they were a source of great profit. During the whole period covered by the said contract, the Honourable John G.

During the whole period covered by the said contract, the Honourable John G. Haggart, now Postmaster General and a Member of Her Majesty's Privy Council for Canada, was a Member of the House of Commons for the South Riding of Lanark, and still is such Member.

That the said Honourable John G. Haggart became and was beneficially interested in the profits of said contract which accrued to the share thereof standing in the name of the said *Peter McLaren*, and has received large sums out of the said profits, and has otherwise derived direct and substantial pecuniary benefits therefrom.

That during the progress of the said works, and while the said the Honourable John G. Haggart was so interested therein, members of the said firm were called upon by Members of the Government of Canada for large contributions for political purposes, and such contributions were paid out of the moneys of the said firm, and with the knowledge and assent of the said Honourable John G. Haggart were charged against the profits of the firm; and while the said contributions were so demanded and paid, the said firm of Contractors were in various ways dependent upon the Government by reason of many matters being unsettled and in dispute in relation to the said contract, which were at the time of such contributions, or subsequently, settled not unfavourably to the said Contractors. That a Select Committee be appointed to enquire fully into the said allegations with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses upon oath or affirmation, and to employ Short-hand writers to take down such evidence as they may deem necessary, and to have the evidence printed from day to day for the use of the Committee, and that the Committee do report in full the evidence taken before them, and all their proceedings on the reference and the result of their enquiries, and that Rule 78 of this House as to the selection of Committees be suspended, and that the said Committee be composed of Messieurs *Mills* (*Bothwell*), *Edgar*, *Barron* and *Lister* (who shall not have the right to vote), *Dickey*, *Wood* (*Brockville*), *Girouard* and *McLeod*;

" CONCLUDING OBSERVATIONS.

"Your Committee have the following general observations to make on the charges generally:----

"Having regard to various features which appear in the contracts which were "the subject of this investigation, we feel bound to report that the members of the "firm of *Larkin, Connolly* & Co. conspired to defraud the Government and the "Harbour Commissioners, and were materially aided in their designs by the inter-"ference of *Thomas McGreevy*, as has been shown in earlier parts of this report. "This conspiracy has been all the more powerful and effective by reason of the con-"fidence which the late Minister of Public Works had in the integrity and efficiency "of his officers and by reason of the confidence which the late Minister entertained "with regard to *Thomas McGreevy*, and has accomplished results which are to be "greatly regretted as regards the administration of the Department, and greatly to "be condemned as regards those who lent themselves knowingly to the purposes of "the conspirators.

"The charges against Sir *Hector Langevin*, as already intimated, having been as "above set forth, your Committee would observe that in course of the investigation "an effort was made to connect him with the wrong-doing of others who have been "reported against as directly connected with fraudulent conduct.

"Your Committee, therefore, report that the evidence does not justify them in "concluding that the Minister knew of the conspiracy before mentioned, or that he "willingly lent himself to its objects.

"Your Committee recommend that, in addition to such action as may seem to be "called for under the findings hereinbefore expressed, such legal proceedings as may "be available be taken against those who are concerned in this conspiracy, and that "for that purpose the books and papers which were before your Committee be "retained (or so many of them as may be necessary) in order that they may be "available for such proceedings," which, in the opinion of this House, should be "struck out for the following reasons :---

"1. That from the facts which were made to appear before the Committee and "reported to the House in support of and in relation to the charges which it was its "duty to investigate, the House is convinced that in many of the dealings of the "firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co., with the Public Works Department and of the "*Quebec* Harbour Commissioners, gross frauds have been perpetrated and the public "have thereby been defrauded out of large sums of money."

"2. That these wrongs were accomplished by means of a conspiracy on the "part of the members of the firm of *Larkin*, *Connolly* & Co. and *Thomas McGreevy*, "a Member of this House, and some one or more of the officers of the Public Works "Department.

"3. That owing to the unfortunate illness of Mr. *Perley*, which rendered it "impossible for the Committee to finish his examination, this House does not feel "that it ought, in the absence of his complete evidence, to pronounce decisively as "to his complicity or otherwise in the conspiracy which the Committee finds to have "existed, or to determine who among the other officials of the Department partici-"pated therein.

"This House for the like reason, and because respecting some of the matters "as to which evidence was given, more especially that relating to the supplemental "contract for the completion of the *Lévis* Graving Dock of 1884, no charge had been "made against the late Minister of Public Works, and the evidence in respect thereof "is incomplete, feel unable to decide whether the conduct of the Minister in approv-"ing and sanctioning the various contracts with *Larkin, Connolly* & Co., the indul-"gences granted to them in the performance thereof, and the over-payment made in "accordance therewith, is to be ascribed to a blind confidence in the integrity and "efficiency of his chief engineer, even in that view scarcely to be distinguished from "weakness almost criminal, or to a guilty connivance in the spoliation of the public "Treasury, which ought to be characterized by very different language.

"4. That as no specific charge of this nature was made against the late Minister, "this House, while compelled to call attention to this view of the matter, does not "think that it is required to reach any more definite conclusion on the subject.

"In addition to the foregoing reasons, the House has no hesitation in recording "its opinion that, judged by the well known constitutional rule which makes the "Minister responsible to Parliament for the administration of the Department over "which he presides, the late Minister of Public Works, irrespective of the considera-"tions dealt with in the last preceding paragraph, cannot be absolved from his "ministerial responsibility, and in that regard merits the censure of this House."

"And the House recommends that in addition to such action as may seem to be "called for under the findings hereinbefore expressed, such legal proceedings as may " be available be taken against those who were concerned in the conspiracy, and, for "that purpose, the books and papers which were before the Committee be retained, "or so many of them as may be necessary for such prosecution. "Finally, the House desires to record its conviction that the enquiry directed

"by the House has been rendered unsatisfactory, incomplete and in some respects "abortive by what the House cannot help characterizing as the wilful perjury of "some of the witnesses examined before it, and the House recommends that Nicholas " K. Connolly and Michael Connolly, and such other witnesses as the law officers may " advise that there is evidence on which indictments for perjury should be preferred, " be prosecuted therefor," inserted instead thereof; And a Debate arising thereupon;

PRAYERS.

Mr. Sproule, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, presented to the House the Third Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

The investigations of your Committee were divided into two parts. The first had reference to the subjects of Agriculture, Horticulture, and, incidentally, to treeplanting in connection with the operations of the Government Experimental Farms. The cognate subject of the Climatology of *Canada* also formed a topic of enquiry. The second part of the investigations of your Committee related to the subjects of Immigration and Colonization.

The information obtained from the several witnesses examined is appended to this Report, as forming a part thereof. It is arranged in the order of subjects for convenience of reference, instead of that of dates.

The witnesses who appeared in the first part of the investigations were officers of the Central Experimental Farm, namely, Messieurs William Saunders (the Director), J. W. Robertson (the Dairy Commissioner and Agriculturist), J. Fletcher (the Entomologist and Botanist), John Craig (the Horticulturist), and F. T. Shutt (the Chemist). Mr. R. Stopes of England, the Chairman of the Committee of Experts who examined the two-rowed barley sent by the Canadian Government to England last year, and Mr. J. Gordon Mowat, Climatologist, were also examined.

The evidence of Mr. Saunders affords valuable and interesting information in relation to the general operations of the Experimental Farms. That of Mr. Robertson contains matter of great importance for farmers in relation to the feeding, fattening and products of animals, and to the most economical uses of the various plants, grasses and grains adapted to those ends. A similar remark may be made of the evidence of Mr. Craig on Horticulture. The evidence of Mr. Fletcher affords valuable and interesting information in relation to depredations by injurious insects, and practical means available by farmers for mitigating their ravages, and also, in relation to fodder plants and grasses. That of Mr. Shutt shows how much economic advantage may be gained by farmers understanding the constituents of the soil in relation to plant life, so as to enable them to apply with intelligence the fertilizers required by the different soils and plants; and also, to utilise to the best advantage such fertilizers as are produced on the farm.

The information furnished by Mr. Stopes is of interest in relation to the growth of two-rowed barley in Canada suitable for the English market. He gave it as his opinion, as an expert, that the Canadian soil and climate are in a high degree adapted to produce two-rowed barley of a grade suitable to the English market, and, at the same time, containing the albuminous and nitrogenous matters which are desired in that grain. This subject is worthy of the attention of farmers, in view of the high prices paid for a grain of such grade in an almost illimitable and easily accessible market.

The evidence of Mr. *Mowat*, on the Climatology of *Canada*, in its relation to Agriculture and Horticulture, possesses many points of interest for agriculturists and horticulturists, and for the public at large. The combination of climatological advantages possessed by the Dominion of *Canada*, and particularly in relation to the industry of fruit-growing for profit, is not by any means so generally apprehended as it might with advantage be.

In the second part of its investigations in relation to Immigration and Colonization, your Committee examined Mr. Lowe, the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, and

Mr. W. A. Webster, a special immigration agent of the Department of Agriculture, engaged in promoting colonization in the North-West.

The Deputy Minister stated that the figures of immigration for the year 1890 had been published in the Report of the Minister of Agriculture, previous to his appearance before your Committee, a fact which made it then unnecessary for him to go into the details of previous years in relation to those figures; but, he stated that the number of settlers in Canada, that is ordinary immigrants reported by the agents of the Department, as having expressed such intention, was 41,549, to which was added the number of 33,518 as registered settlers connected with Customs entries of settlers' effects, it being explained that by far the greater number of these were returned Canadians. The character of the immigration was described as being exceptionally good from the reports of all the agencies, those immigrants who came to seek for work having generally found it. The invitations of the Department to immigrants are confined to the agricultural classes and female domestics-mechanics and artisans being advised to take special information in relation to their several vocations before coming. The class of clerks and others seeking employment in what may be called the sedentary occupations, are dissuaded from coming, except to join friends, or to fill situations previously engaged.

The special vote of \$150,000 infused fresh vigour into the immigration operations of the Department. It was explained to have been applied in affording bonuses to settlers on land in the Provinces of *Manitoba*, *British Columbia* and the *North-West Territories*; also, in affording bonuses to agents in Europe, on proof of settlement on land, in all cases in which the bonus to the settler is payable, but not further. The object of the bonus appears to be to afford a facility for emigrating and settling on land. The test of its being confined to those who take up land in the parts of the Dominion stated very effectually prevents it, in any case, from being used as a premium to foster competition with the labour of the country. It was stated positively that there had been no assisted passages whatever since April, 1888.

A marked feature of the operations for promoting immigration during the year was the inviting of thirteen Tenant Farmers' Delegates from different points in the United Kingdom in order to represent English, Welsh, Scotch and Irish interests. These gentlemen arrived in the latter part of last summer and made a thorough examination of several of the most important parts of the Dominion, and they have each made reports of the investigations, of which 800,000 copies have been published and distributed in the United Kingdom. The reports on the whole give a favourable view of the Dominion as a field for the settlement of agriculturists from the United Kingdom, and they are written in a spirit of fairness and discrimination such as will command confidence.

The amount of bonus paid to immigrant settlers, as authorized by Order in Council, from the vote referred to, is \$10 to the head of a family, and \$5 for each member of a family being a trans-ocean adult—that is, over the age of fourteen years. These amounts are supplemented to immigrants from the United Kingdom, via Canadian maritime ports and the Canadian Pacific Railway, by the amount of \$5 and \$2.50, respectively, contributed by transportation companies, making the amount payable in bonuses to settlers \$15 and \$7.50, respectively. At the date your Committee took evidence on this subject the number of immigrants who had availed themselves of the advantage of the bonus was very limited; but the prospect was that active effect would follow the offer made, especially connected with the agents' bonus at the same time offered.

Another way in which it was sought to stimulate immigration to the North-West was by offering a bonus to the class of "return men," so-called—that is, farmers from different parts of the North-West who had been successful, were allowed free passages by the transportation companies to enable them to see their friends in their old homes, in order to make known the success which they had themselves achieved. The Government, by Order in Council, offered a bonus of \$50 to each of tifty of such "return men" in cases of reasonable success being shown. This is a method of diffusing information which has particular interest as adapted to the European continent, where there is difficulty in circulating immigration publications. The total expenditure of the Department for the calendar year was stated to be \$127,303, the accounts of the Department of Agriculture being kept by the calendar as well as the fiscal year, in order to enable comparisons to be made with the operations of each calendar year. The total number of publications issued was given at 1,543,000.

Mr. W. A. Webster, a special immigration agent, gave a detailed account of his operations in promoting the settlement in the North-West Territories. It appears from the statements furnished to your Committee that during the past year the operations of the Department were particularly active in promoting such settlement, and that very considerable results have been obtained, for details of which reference is made to the evidence.

Your Committee recommends that the House order to be printed, in addition to the usual number of One thousand nine hundred and fifty (1,950), Seven thousand (7,000) copies of this Report with the evidence annexed, in the customary proportions of English and French, for distribution to Members of the Senate and of the House of Commons. (Appendix No. 5.)

Mr. Bowell, a Member of the Queen's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of this House, dated 8th July, 1891, for copies of all paper writings, documents, depositions, etc., respecting or in connection with the enquiry held at St. Flavie, on the line of the Intercolonial Railway, into the conductof Mr. Hormidas Ouillet, Superintendent of the workshops of the said Intercolonial Railway, as well as in relation to any other employees. (Sessional Papers, No. 53c.)

Also, Return to an Order of this House, dated 3rd June, 1891, for a Return of all letters and memorials complaining of the high water in the *Rideau* Canal between *Kingston* and *Jones' Falls*; copies of letters from Colonel By and others, showing the depth of water allowed for vessels navigating the canal; a statement showing the average depth of water in the canal for the first forty years after construction, and for the last ten years; also, for copies of plans and reports of Engineers engaged on the survey of the *Kingston Mills* level, showing the estimate of cost of lowering the water and the quantity of land to be reclaimed if the water is lowered. (Sessional Papers, No. 62i)

The Order of the Day being read, for the second reading of the Bill to authorize the granting of subsidies in aid of the construction of the lines of Railway therein mentioned;

The Bill was accordingly read a second time; and committed to a Committee of the Whole House.

Resolved, That this Honse do immediately resolve itself into the said Committee.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee, and, after some time spent therein, Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had gone through the Bill, and made Amendments thereunto.

Ordered, That the Bill, as amended in the Committee, be now taken into consideration.

The House accordingly proceeded to take the Bill into consideration.

Ordered, That the Bill be read the third time on Monday next.

The House, according to Order, again resolved itself into the Committee of Supply.

Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Forty-three thousand dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to pay the following items in connection with *Rideau* Canal, viz. :---Repairs to dam at *Hogsback*, \$16,000; Bridge at *Merrickville*, \$7,000; Bridge at Oliver's Ferry, \$20,000, for the year ending 30th June, 1892.

16. Resolved. That a sum not exceeding One thousand three hundred dollars be granted to Her Majesty, for fences, ditches, repairs to drains, renewal of bridges and legal expenses—Beauharnois Canal, for the year ending 30th June, 1892.

17. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding Seventy-six dollars be granted to Her Majesty, to pay gratuity to P. Stafford, whose leg was injured permanently while at work in Government yard, Lachine Canal, Montreal, for the year ending 30th June, 1892. Rebuilding wharf, &c., \$300, for the year ending 30th June, 1892.
19. Resolved, That a sum not exceeding One thousand seven hundred and fourteen dollars and ninety-one cents be granted to Her Majesty, for Public Buildings— Prince Edward Island—Summerside Charlottetown and Montague Public Buildings— Balance of commission due Superintending Architects on works carried out, 1885–88, \$1,714.91, for the year ending 30th June, 1892.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair; and Mr. Bergeron reported, That the Committee had come to several Resolutions.

Ordered, That the Report be received at the next sitting of the House.

Mr. Bergeron also acquainted the House that he was directed to move, That the Committee may have leave to sit again.

Resolved, That this House will, at its next sitting, again resolve itself into the said Committee.

And then The House adjourned till Monday next.

Mr. Wallace, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented to the House the Thirty-first Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth :---

Your Committee have had under consideration the item "Napanee Post Office," account of George Newlands, as set forth on pages B-364-5 of the Report of the Auditor General on Appropriation Accounts, for the year ended 30th June, 1890, and, in connection therewith, have examined witnesses under oath, and, for the information of the House, report herewith the evidence given by such witnesses. (Appendix No. 2.)

Mr. Bergin, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented to the House the Eighth Report of the said Committee, which was read, as followeth:—

The Committee carefully examined the following documents and recommend that they be printed, viz.:--

25. Return (in part) under Resolution of the House of Commons, passed on the 20th February, 1882, on all subjects affecting the Canadian Pacific Railway, respecting details as to—

- 1. Selection of the route.
- 2. The progress of the work.
- 3. The selection or reservation of land.

6. The progress thereon.

7. The rates of tolls for passengers and freight.

(2.) The Province within which the said Railway, in whole or in part, is located, and, if located in two or more Provinces, the number of miles in each;

(3.) The County or Counties through which the said lines run in each Province;

Return to an Order of the House of the 27th May last, for copies of all correspondence, memoranda, documents, letters, petitions and all papers whatsoever in relation to the encouragement of the cultivation of the sugar beet, and the protection of the manufacture and refining of beet-root sugar in the Dominion of *Canada*, exchanged between the Government or any of its Members and any person or company.

85. Return to an Order of the House of the 1st July last, for copies of all correspondence, papers and documents relating to the appointment of Customs Officers at *Crystal Beach* and *Point Abino*, in the Township of *Bertie*, and *Carroll's Landing*, in the Township of *Humberstone*, in the County of *Welland*.

The Committee would also recommend that Seventy-five copies of the "General Index to the Journals of the House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada, and of the Sessional Papers of Parliament from 1877 to 1890, inclusive." (fourteen years) as prepared by Wm. C. Bowles, Clerk of Votes and Proceedings, be placed in the Library of Parliament for reference and exchanges.

Mr. Speaker acquainted the House. That a Message had been brought from the Senate by their Clerk, as followeth :---

The Senate have passed the accompanying Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, humbly requesting that Her Majesty may be graciously pleased to take into consideration the position of *Canada*, in respect of certain important matters affecting its trade relations with the Empire and with foreign nations, to which they desire the concurrence of this House.

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty :

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN:

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Senate of *Canada*, in Parliament assembled, humbly request that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased to take into consideration the position of *Canada*, in respect of certain important matters affecting its Trade Relations with the Empire, and with foreign nations.

Your Memorialists desire, in the first place, to draw attention to certain stipulations in the existing Treaties with *Belgium* and with the German Zollverein, ordinarily referred to as the "most favoured nation" clauses, which are extended to other countries whose commercial treaties with *Great Britain* contain a "most favoured nation" clause, and which apply to British Colonies. By Art. XV of the Treaty with *Belgium*, entered into in 1862, *Canada* is compelled to admit all articles, the produce or manufacture of *Belgium*, at the same, or at no higher rate of duty, than is imposed upon similar articles of British origin. And, in the Treaty with the German Zollverein, entered into in 1865, it is stipulated that the produce of those States shall not be subject to any higher or other import duties than the produce of the United Kingdom, or any other country of the like kind; and, that the exports to those States shall not be subject to any higher duties than exports to the United Kingdom.

Your Memorialists consider that these provisions, in treaties with foreign powers, are incompatible with the rights and powers subsequently conferred by the British North America Act upon the Parliament of Canada, for the regulation of the Trade and Commerce of the Dominion; and, that their continuance in force tends to produce complications and embarrassments in such an Empire as that under the rule of Your Majesty, wherein the self-governing Colonies are recognized as possessing the right to define their respective fiscal relations to all foreign nations, to the Mother Country, and to each other.

Your Memorialists further believe, that in view of the foreign fiscal policy of increasingly protective and discriminative duties, it is clearly adverse to the interests of the United Kingdom, and of each and all of its possessions, that the Parliament of the United Kingdom, or of any of Your Majesty's self-governing Colonies, should be thus restricted in the power of adopting such modifications of its Tariff arrangements as may be required for the promotion of its trade, or for its defence against aggressive or injurious measures of foreign policy.

Your Memorialists desire also to point out that the immense resources of the Dominion in its facilities for the growth of food materials, its minerals, its tisheries, and its lumber, require for their profitable development the largest practicable extension of its markets, more especially in countries whose native supply of such productions is limited, while its rapidly developing manufacturing industries demand large and increasing supplies of raw material, to be mainly supplied by countries which are extensive consumers of the productions of *Canada*. Your Memorialists believe that among the countries with which such an interchange of traffic takes place, the British Empire holds the highest rank in amount, and, from its diversity

of climate and productions, affords the widest prospect of rapid, and practically limitless increase, while the trade of the Dominion with the United States is second only to that with the British Empire, and its development and extension are of great importance to us; though, from the similarity of most of the products of the two countries, it is probably not susceptible of so great an expansion as might be effected in the interchange of traffic with the Empire.

Your Memorialists earnestly desire to foster and extend the trade of the Dominion with the Empire, with its great neighbour, the United States, and with other countries throughout the world, wherever opportunity offers; and believe that by mutual concessions, and the adoption of measures for the rearrangement of trade relations between the various portions of the British Empire, and between the Empire and foreign nations, important and lasting beneficial results may be attained, and that to the way of the attainment of these great objects, the continuation of the restrictions imposed upon *Canada* and other portions of the Empire by the so-called favoured nations clause creates an unnecessary and unjustifiable obstruction.

The Senate therefore humbly request Your Majesty to take such steps as may be necessary to denounce and terminate the effect of the provisions referred to, as well in the Treaties with the German Zollverein, and with the Kingdom of Belgium, as with any other nation, in respect of which such provisions are now in force.

On motion of Mr. Foster, seconded by Mr. Bowell,

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE.

The Sub-Committee of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, to whom were referred the Accounts for the Printing Services of Parliament for the past year, for the purpose of audit, beg leave to report :--

That the Annual Statement of the Parliamentary Printing Account for the past fiscal year, from 1st July, 1889, to the 30th June, 1890, was examined, and shows the total cost of the Parliamentary Printing for that year to have been \$71,961.29. This sum includes all expenses of management, salaries, &c., in connection with the Printing of Parliament.

The expenditure was examined and compared item by item with the accounts as submitted, which being receipted, and also accompanied by the cheques by which they were paid, thus forming complete vouchers, have satisfied the Sub-Committee of their correctness, and they have so certified under their signatures.

All which is respectfully submitted.

GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit herewith the annual statement of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Printing Services of Parliament for the fiscal year 1889–90, which shows the cost of those services to have been \$71,961.29.

This is certified to, as being correct, by the signature of the Auditor General.

The printing has been well and satisfactorily performed during the past year. I received the following communication from the Secretary of the Honourable the Treasury Board.

(Copy.)

EXTRACT from the minutes of a meeting of the Honourable the Treasury Board, held at Ottawa, on the fifth day of February, 1891.

PRINTING AND STATIONERY.

The Board had under consideration the question of the payment of the salaries, from the 1st January, 1891, to 30th June, 1891, of Mr. *Boulet*, late assistant distributor of public documents in the Parliamentary Distribution Office, and Mr. J. *Rivet*, one of the messengers, who have been transferred to the Department of Printing and Stationery, and have entered upon their duties in the distribution room of the Stationery Office.

It appears that the above officers have heretofore been paid for their services out of the vote to the Joint Committee on Printing for the current financial year; that no vote was asked for by the Department of Printing and Stationery for these salaries, because some uncertainty existed as to the transfers and the time at which they would be effected; that the usual grant, intended to cover the cost of this service, was made to the Parliamentary Committee; that certain of the work, formerly Parliamentary, has been taken over and is now done in the distribution room of the Stationery Office.

The Board direct that the salaries of Messieurs. *Boulet* and *Rivet* be paid, from 1st January, 1891, to 30th June, 1891, as heretofore, out of the vote to the Joint Committeee on Printing for the current financial year.

In reply to the above I wrote as follows:— (Copy.)

19th February, 1891.

DEAR SIR,—In acknowledging the receipt of the Order of the Honourable the Treasury Board, directing that the salaries of Messieurs. *Boulet* and *Rivet* be paid from the 1st January, 1891, to the 30th June, 1891, as heretofore, out of the vote to the Joint Committee on Printing, for the current financial year, I beg most respectfully to state that I will carry out the instructions of the Honourable the Board. At the same time may I draw attention to the fact that on the recommendation of the Joint Committee on Printing, *Boulet* was transferred to the Bureau of Printing and Stationery; and when the transfer took place in November last, I paid him in full to the 31st December, 1890, and erased his name from our books. As for *Rivet*, he was a sessional messenger employed only during session. At the end of last session, the office of Sessional Messengers was abolished, and a new service inaugurated to take the place thereof, consequently *Rivet* ceased to be a sessional messenger employed by the Committee.

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, in the following words :---

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty:

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,-

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada in Parliament assembled, humbly beg leave to approach Your Majesty for the purpose of representing :--

That by the Statutes of Your Majesty's Parliament (5 and 6 Vic., cap. 45) the privilege of copyright was given to any person who should publish a literary work in the United Kingdom, if he should be a subject of Your Majesty or a resident of any part of Your Majesty's Dominions, and the republication within the Empire and the importation into the Empire of any copyrighted work was prohibited.

The operation of the above mentioned Act was attended with great inconvenience to the people of the North American Colonies, and formed the subject of formal remonstrances from several of their Legislatures.

These remonstrances were replied to by a circular despatch from Earl Grey (then Your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies), directed to all the Governors of the North American Colonies. The circular was in the words following :--

"DOWNING STREET, November, 1846.

"SIR,-Her Majesty's Government having had under their consideration the representations which have been received from the Governors of some of the British North American Provinces, complaining of the effect in those Colonies of the Imperial Copyright Law, have decided on proposing measures to Parliament in the ensuing session, which, if sanctioned by the Legislature will, they hope, tend to remove the dissatisfaction which has been expressed on this subject, and place the literature of this country within the reach of the Colonies on easier terms than it is at present. With this view relying upon the disposition of the Colonies to protect the authors of this country from the fraudulent appropriation of the fruits of labours upon which they are often entirely dependent, Her Majesty's Government propose to leave to the Local Legislatures the duty and responsibility of passing such enactment as they may deem proper for securing both the rights of authors and the interest of the public. Her Majesty's Government will accordingly submit to Parliament a Bill authorizing the Queen in Council to confirm and finally enact any Colonial law or ordinance respecting copyright, notwithstanding any repugnancy of any such law or ordinance to the copyright law of this country; it being provided by the proposed Act of Parliament that no such law or ordinance shall be of any force or effect until so confirmed and finally enacted by the Queen in Council, but that from the confirmation and final enactment thereof, the copyright law of this country shall cease to be of any force or effect within the Colony in which any such Colonial law or ordinance has been made, in so far as it may be repugnant to, or inconsistent with, the operation of any such Colonial law or ordinance.

"I have, &c., (Signed) "GREY."

The intention of Your Majesty's Government, as expressed in this circular, has never been carried into effect. The importation from foreign countries of works copyrighted in the United Kingdom was permitted under certain conditions, but the republication of such works in the Colonies, even under any conditions as regards the holders of copyright, has never been permitted, nor has the right of the Legislatures of the Provinces or of the Dominion of *Canada* to make enactments to regulate the law of copyright been recognized by Your Majesty's Government, unless such enactments could be shown to be consistent with, and subordinate to, the Act of the United Kingdom before mentioned.

Your Majesty's Parliament, in the year 1867, in establishing the Dominion of *Canada*, gave to its Parliament very extensive powers of government, including the right to legislate on this important subject. The Parliament of *Canada* has enacted several statutes regulating the law of copyright for *Canada*. These statutes adopted the provisions which the interests and welfare of the people of this country as connected with this matter seemed to require, and at the same time gave liberal protection to the interests of all such persons as had acquired, or might acquire, copyright in the United Kingdom. These statutes have always been regarded by Your Majesty's Government, however, as requiring sanction by the Parliament of the United Kingdom, and the most recent of them—passed in *Canada* in the year 1889—remains inoperative for want of the assent of Your Majesty's Government to a proclamation which will bring it into force.

The provisions of the Act of 1889, just mentioned, are such as are required in the interests of the people of *Canada*, and its provisions have not been shown to be in any respect unfair as regards any portion of Your Majesty's subjects. The Act was passed unanimously by both Houses of the Parliament of *Canada*, and has been earnestly pressed by the Government of *Canada* upon the favourable consideration of Your Majesty's Government.

While your Memorialists hold the view that such a statute is within the competence of the Parliament of *Canada*, under the British North America Act, they have been informed that doubts upon that subject have been raised, and they humbly submit that such doubts should be removed by statute of Your Majesty's Parliament giving effect to the Canadian Copyright Act of 1889 at once, and confirming the right of the Parliament of *Canada*, according to the promise made by Your Majesty's Government in 1846, to make laws on the subject of copyright as may from time to time be required for the country, notwithstanding that such laws may be inconsistent with the provisions of Imperial statutes passed before the adoption of the British North America Act of 1867.

Your Memorialists beg to call attention to the fact that Your Majesty's Royal Commissioners on Copyright, in the year 1876, recommended that the Colonial Legislatures should be given the right to pass statutes embodying principles precisely the same as those which form the basis of the Canadian Act of 1889, before referred to.

We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to invite such legislation in the Parliament of the United Kingdom as will remove the doubts hereinbefore referred to, and explicitly confer upon the Parliament of *Canada* the power to legislate in the interests of the people of the Dominion on all matters relating to the subject of copyright, without regard to the statutes which may have been in force when the Parliament of *Canada* was established.

We further pray that in order to give full effect to the Act of the Parliament of *Canada* of 1889, aforesaid, notice may be given by Your Majesty's Government of the withdrawal of *Canada* from the *Berne* Copyright Convention.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General as followeth :---

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

"The Commons of Canada have voted certain Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency a Bill, intituled : "'An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defray-" 'ing certain expenses of the Public Service, for the financial year ending the 30th "'June, 1892, and for other purposes relating to the Public Service; "to which I humbly request Your Excellency's assent."

"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her-"Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which His Excellency was pleased to deliver the following Speech to both Houses :---

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I desire to convey to you my high appreciation of the earnestness and assiduity which you have devoted to your Parliamentary duties during this protracted Session.

I have also to express my sympathy in the regret which you and the whole Dominion must feel, and which I sincerely share, for the lamented loss of the late Prime Minister, the Right Honourable Sir John A. Macdonald, who died full of years and honours, in the midst of your deliberations; and, I congratulate you and the country upon the moderation and patriotism which you manifested in that crisis, and which enabled the legislative business of the country to be continued without serious interruption.

An agreement was made in June last, between *Great Britain* and the *United* States of America, for the practical cessation of seal fishing in Behring's Sea during the past season, with a view to the protection of seal life, pending an investigation by experts, in which this country has taken part, into the question of the necessity of measures for preventing its extinction. The report of the experts has not yet been received, and the negotiations for the settlement of the questions which have arisen on the subject are proceeding, but are still incomplete.

I am pleased to observe that, in anticipation of a friendly conference with the Government of the United States, on the subject of the extension and development of our trade with that country, and other important matters, the provisions of the protocol of 1888, known as the Modus vivendi, have been extended.

The measures you have concurred in passing are important and useful. The reorganization of the Legislature of the North-West Territories and the readjustment and increase of its powers, are just tributes to the eminent capacity for self-government which that important and rapidly increasing section of Canada has manifested. The Acts for the improvement of the law respecting Elections will, I hope, be found beneficial, by simplifying procedure and facilitating the repression of corrupt practices. The measures respecting the cattle trade, the loading of ships, the registration of trade marks and the Vice-Admiralty Courts will prove advantageous to trade, commerce and shipping. The enactments respecting the inspection of ships must prove of great value in the protection of the lives of persons employed upon them, while the Act respecting the foreshores of the Dominion and the obstruction of navigable waters will remove a possible source of dissension between this Government and the Provinces.

Notwithstanding that the result of the Census shows a less important increase in population than was expected, it is satisfactory to observe the continuance of the general prosperity of the country. And the bountiful harvest with which Providence has blessed us this year, will give a fresh impetus to the settlement of the North-West, and to the enterprise and industries of the country generally.

It is gratifying to perceive that you have felt justified in reducing the duty upon sugar to the extent of about Three millions of dollars, thus materially lessening the cost of an article of universal consumption, and that you have not judged it necessary to provide for replacing revenue, to the extent of more than half the reduction thus made. It is a further recommendation of this important measure, that while it largely reduces the cost of a necessary article of food, it provides for supplying the consequent loss of revenue by the imposition of duties on luxuries only.

The extensive frauds upon the Government by a group of contractors, and the irregularities of certain persons in the Civil Service, which have been discovered in investigations by your Committees, are much to be regretted. The punishment with which many of them have already been visited, the steps which are to be taken with regard to others, and the operation of the statute you have passed for their repression in future will. I trust, have the effect of preventing their recurrence. And it is the intention of my Ministers to procure the issue of a Commission to investigate the organization of the Civil Service and report as to measures for its improvement.

The question of the restriction or prohibition of the liquor traffic has also been occupying the attention of my Ministers; and a Commission will issue during recess to enquire into, and report upon, this important subject.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons :

I thank you for the liberal provision which you made for the requirements of the Public Service.
