Most of you have, I presume, workad tha a laboratory at some time. It is most delightrul. In fact,
I can think of nothing I'd rather not do than spend an äternoon in a iab. However, for you who have neve had such an experience, let me des-
cribe an atternoon in a laboratory. First you obtain a sheet of paper
on which are printed, in a vague on which are printed, in a vague
way, your instructions. Further way, your instrurtions, furtuer
instructions are given the in-
structor. jut these generaily yamount structor. but these generaily amount
to the date and the name of the exto the date and ene name or we ex-
periment. Then you proceed to
your bench. your bench.
When you get to your benck, you When you get to your bench, you
set up your apparatus. Your appor-
atus consists of test-tubes, baakers, atus consists of test-tubes, beakkers,
crucibles, a long glass rod and a
thermometer fitted togetiner Wheu thermometer fitted icgether whell
you are sure your apparatus will
not fall over, get your tuaterals. Also get a supply of matches-you
will need them.
The materials differ from day to day, but generally ycu will take
some dark powder, a plece of matal,
nix it with an acid, add water and some dark powder, a plece of metal,
