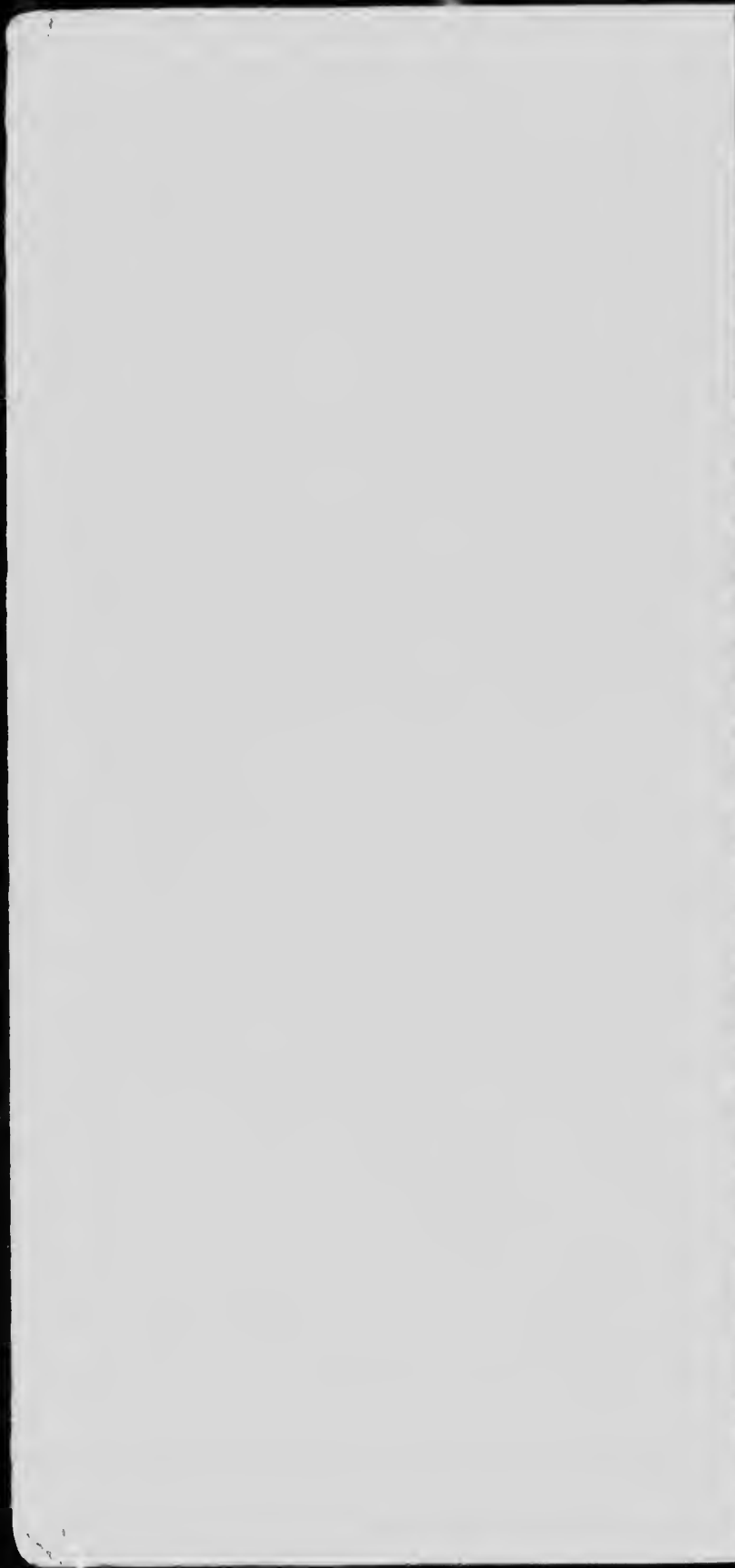
MICROCOPY RESOLUTION TEST CHART

THE CANADIAN CLUB of Toronto was founded in
November, 1897.

CONSTITUTION.

1. The Club shall be called the Canadian Club of Toronto.

2. It is the purpose of the Club to foster patriotism by encouraging the study of the institutions, history, arts, literature and resources of Canada, and by endeavoring to unite Canadians in such work for the welfare and progress of the Dominion as may be desirable and expedient.

3. (a) There shall be two classes of members—active and honorary.

(b) Any man at least eighteen years of age, who is a British subject by birth or naturalization, and who is in sympathy with the objects of the Club, shall be eligible for membership.

(c) Honorary membership may be conferred on suitable persons as in the opinion of the Club may be entitled to such distinction.

4. Applications for membership must be made in writing through two members of the Club in good standing, and the names must be announced at two meetings of the Club and voted upon at next executive meeting. Two black balls shall exclude.

5. (a) Honorary members shall be exempt from the payment of fees, but shall neither vote nor hold office.

(b) Active members shall pay in advance an annual fee of Two Dollars.

(c) No one shall be a member in good standing until he shall have paid his annual fee, such fee being due and payable in October of each year.

(d) Only members in good standing shall be eligible for office or have the right to vote at any meeting of the Club.

(e) All members whose fees are two months in arrears shall be so notified by the treasurer, and if the same are not paid within 30 days thereafter, their names shall be struck from the roll.

6. (a) The officers of the Club shall consist of a President, 1st Vice-President, 2nd Vice-President, Secretary, Literary Correspondent, Treasurer, and several others holding no specific office. These officers, together with the last retiring President, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

(b) The officers shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Club, which shall be held on the last Monday in April, and shall hold office until the next annual meeting, or until their successors are elected.

(c) Nominations shall be made by a nominating committee appointed at a special meeting to be held at least one week previous to the annual meeting. Their report shall be received at the annual meeting and either adopted in its entirety or after amendment, on motion and ballot.

(d) In case of demission of office, whether by death, resignation or otherwise, the vacancy thereby caused shall be filled by the Executive Committee. The person so elected shall hold office until the next annual meeting.

7. (a) Subject to special action by the Club, the conduct of its affairs shall be vested in the Executive Committee.

(b) The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the President and five members shall constitute a quorum.

(c) Where the President is unable or refuses to call a meeting, three members of the Executive may do so by giving the others at least 24 hours notice in writing.

8. The duties of the officers shall be as follows :

(a) The President, when present, shall preside at all meetings and shall inform the Club of the proceedings of the Executive Committee since the last report, receive and read motions and cause the sense of the meeting to be taken on them, preserve order and direct the proceedings of the meeting in regular course. There shall be no appeal from the ruling of the Chair unless requested by at least five members and carried by a two-thirds vote.

(b) In the absence of the President, the senior Vice-President present shall preside and perform the duties of the President and have his privileges.

(c) In the absence of the President and Vice-Presidents, a chairman for the meeting shall be chosen by the open vote of those present.

(d) The Literary Correspondent shall have charge of all correspondence of a literary character, and shall edit any literary matter issued by the Club, and in a general way promote and guard the interests of the Club in the daily and periodical press.

(e) The Treasurer shall collect and receive all moneys due the Club, issue receipts therefor, and pay all authorized accounts.

(f) The Secretary shall take minutes at all meetings of the Club as well as those of the Executive Committee. He shall issue notices of meetings and perform those duties usually appertaining to the office.

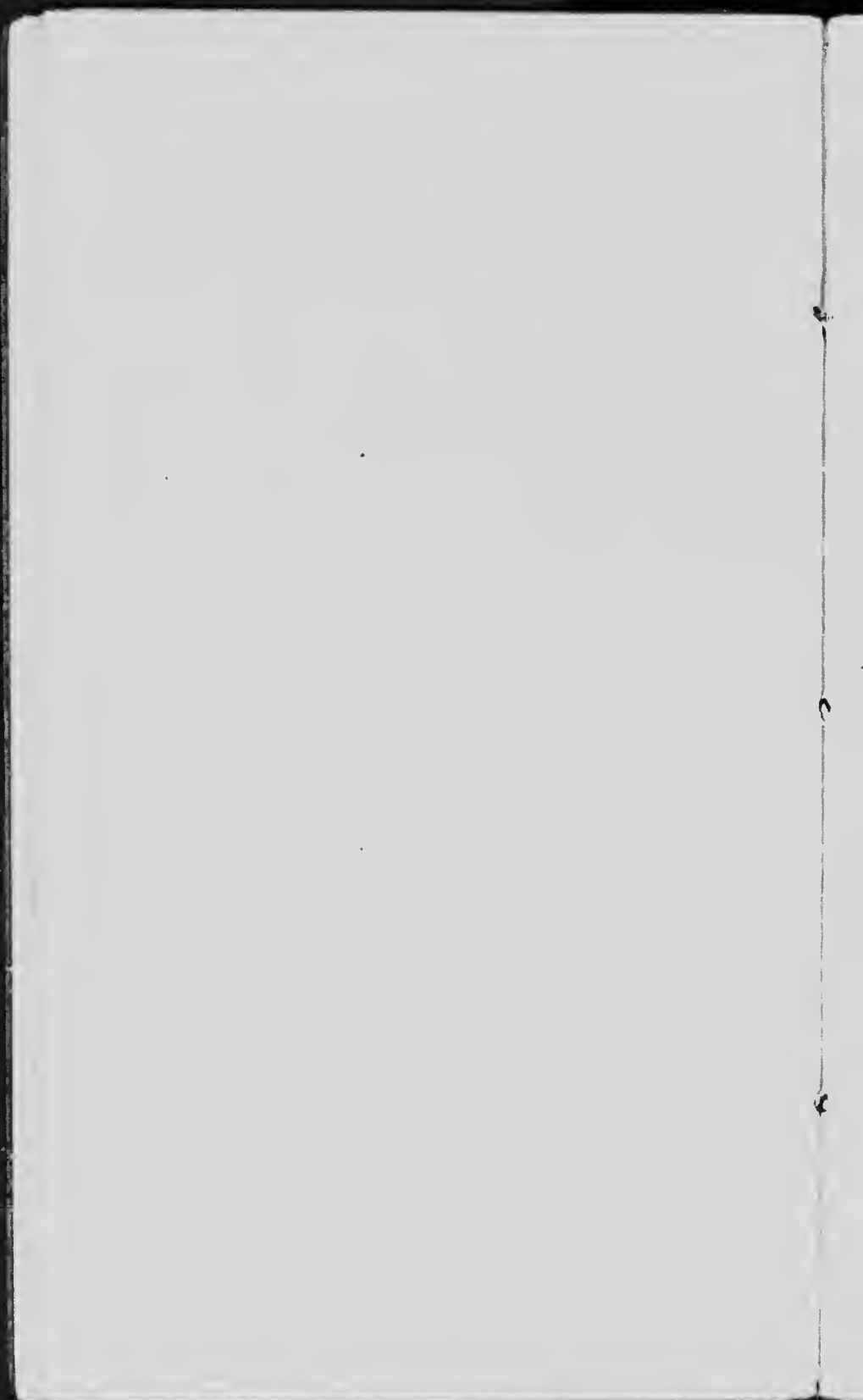
9. (a) The ordinary meetings of the Club shall be held on each Monday from 1 to 2 p.m., except during the months of May, June, July, August and Sept. Special meetings may be held at any time or place on the call of the President or of the Executive Committee.

(b) No notice of ordinary meetings shall be necessary, but notice in writing of all annual and special meetings shall be sent to each member of the Club.

(c) Fifty members in good standing present at any meeting of the Club shall constitute a quorum.

10. Two auditors shall be elected by open vote at the meeting provided for in clause 6 (), and shall embody their report in the Treasurer's annual statement.

11. This Constitution may be amended at the annual meeting, or at a special meeting called for that purpose, by a two-thirds vote of the members present, after one week's notice of such amendment.



THE CANADIAN CLUB.

ITS ORIGIN, ITS AIMS, AND ITS GROWTH.

The Canadian Club, of Toronto, was formed in the fall of 1897, to provide for the young men of the city an opportunity to discuss public questions on a non-partisan basis. It has since developed along broader lines than those laid down by its founders; there are fewer discussions among the members, and more attention is given to providing discussion by experts and publicists.

The Canadian Club movement dates back to December, 1892, when independent attempts were made to establish national clubs in Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton. The first two organizations were not long lived, although "The Canadian National League," of Montreal, did exercise an influence for a time. The Canadian Club of Hamilton, of which Mr. C. R. McCullough was the leading spirit, was more successful, and was the leading national organization in Ontario for some years. The objects of that Club were "the encouragement of the study of the history, literature, art, music and national resources of Canada, the recognition of native worth

and talent, and the fostering of a patriotic Canadian sentiment." It was intended to be a "debating or mutual improvement society, with social features founded on the basis of unpartisan patriotic public spirit." The Hamilton Club did an excellent work, and its influence flowed far beyond the confines of that city. It still pursues a most useful career.

When Mr. Sanford Evans, one of the founders of the Hamilton Club came to



JOHN A. COOPER.

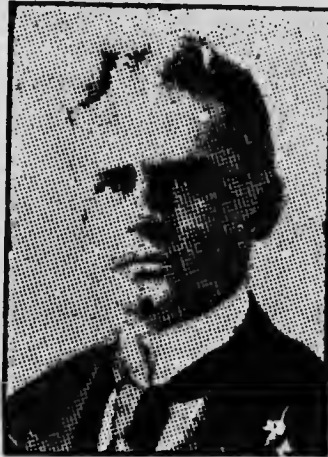
Toronto, he advocated the founding of a similar club here. He called a meeting at the Rossin House, but found opinion divided. National sentiment was not strong. Undaunted, he planned a dinner, at which the whole matter would be discussed. Even there he found croakers. Nevertheless, Mr. Evans

persisted, and a committee drew up a constitution and a list of officers, which were presented at another gathering held in the upper story of Mason-Risch's warerooms, on King Street. That night some twenty-three members signed the roll, and deposited their fee with the treasurer, the first two names being those of John A. Cooper and W. Sanford Evans. The former was selected as President and the latter as First Vice-President.

The work began in earnest. The idea was to have monthly meetings and the weekly luncheon was not thought of. At first the club dragged seriously. To cultivate enthusiasm the president suggested dining together once a week to talk over club matters and get acquainted. This was in February. These luncheons, however, were not constitutional at first and monthly meetings were held. A series of public meetings was also inaugurated. A banquet was also held on January 26th, 1893, with Sir Oliver Mowat, Mr. William Ogilvie (who had just returned from the Yukon with the report of his discoveries), Mr. A. E. Kemp, Mr. J. W. Flavelle, Mr. (now Judge) Neil McCrimmon and Mr. Evans as the chief speakers. On March 3rd, another public meeting was held in St. George's Hall at which four of the members, Mr. Bain, Mr. Colquhoun, Professor Wilmott and others read papers. On March 26th, Mr. Sanford Evans and Professor Shortt addressed another public gather-

ing. On June 1st, Sir Gilbert Parker was banquetted and the first year of the Club closed on November 1st with, according to the treasurer's report, a balance of 87 cents out of a total of \$51 fees received.

In the second year of the Club the membership grew steadily, with Mr. Sanford Evans as President, and Mr. A. E. Huestis as Secretary. It was enthusiasm and earnestness that were

desired, not numbers. The officers decided that the Club should be allowed to grow slowly so that all the members would be thoroughly acquainted with each other. The weekly luncheon grew more and more important, and by January, 1899, it had become the regular meeting day. Thus the present main feature of the Club was a natural growth. At first

there was no particular guest. Conversation was encouraged and occasionally some person made a short speech. Then the members were encouraged to bring any out-of-town guests who might happen to be available. Occasionally a guest was asked to say something. Then the guest was sought because he could say something. Finally it became the custom to have a speaker for each luncheon.

During 1899-1900 Mr. George Wilkie was President, and Mr. George A. Kingston, Secretary. From an average attendance of 25 the number at the weekly luncheons grew to 45, and the membership expanded from 140 to over 190. This was the year of the beginning of the Boer War, and a mass meeting of

citizens was held in Massey Hall, at which Mr. Wilkie presided, and at which Dr. Parkin, the Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick, Mr. Sanford Evans, and Mr. E. B. Osler, M.P., spoke. Later a patriotic concert was held, the proceeds of which went to the National Fund then being raised for the benefit of our soldiers in South Africa. Mr. Kipling cabled a poem to be read at this gathering.

In 1900-1901 Mr. W. E. Rundle presided over the Club, Mr. W. R. P. Parker acting as Secretary. During the regime of Mr. Rundle the membership grew to 270 and the average attendance to 83. Among the prominent men who addressed the Club were Principal Grant, of Queen's University, Sir John G.

Bourinot, Rev. Herbert S. Bigelow, of Cincinnati, Hon. Geo. W. Ross, Mr. Duncan Campbell Scott, Hon. Tom L. Johnson, of Cleveland, Hon. F. E. Alfred Evanturel, Dr. Benjamin Russell, M.P., Hon. Howard G. Crosby, New York City, and Professor Go!dwin Smith. The questions discussed at the luncheons were chiefly those pertaining to

municipal and government ownership and operation of public franchises, Canada's relation to the Empire, The Confederation of Newfoundland, Technical Education, and French Canada.

During 1901-1902 Mr. S. Casey Wood directed the affairs of the Club, Mr. Huestis again being Secretary. In the first two

onths the attendance averaged about 80; but in the last two months of his presidency this had grown to 110. The membership expanded from 270 to 450. The chief events of the year were an "At Home" in the gallery of the Ontario Society of Artists, at which 300 people attended to see and encourage Canadian art, and a banquet to Sir Gilbert

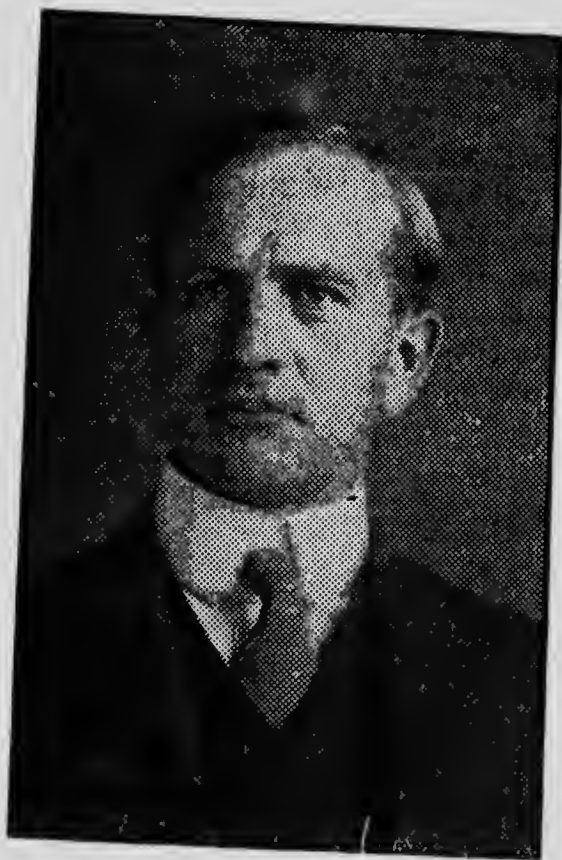

Parker, at which 220 persons were present. Among the speakers of that season were the late Rev. Dr. Robertson, Prof. Goldwin Smith, Dr. Drummond, Hon. R. L. Borden, Prof. Clark, Mr. B. E. Walker, and Auditor-General McDougall.

During 1902-1903 Mr. D. Bruce Macdonald was the President, and Mr. A. E. Huestis

Secretary for the third time. The membership grew from 450 to 800, with a waiting list of 150. Every young man in Toronto wanted to be a member. The average attendance grew from 177 to 188, and the highest recorded number at any one luncheon was 345. Among the speakers in this year were: Prof. J. W. Robertson, Booker T. Washington, Hon. J. W. Longby, Prof. Goldwin Smith, Prof. Charles G. D. Roberts, the Rev. Charles Gordon (Ralph Connor), Ben. Greet, and Judge Hodgins. The banquet to Mr. A. B. Aylesworth, which was attended by 350 persons, was the final success of a successful year.
