Notable Night at Halifax Academy of Music

Boston Opera Stars Captivated Audience in Final Performance

The musical festival provided by the stars of the Boston Opera Company closed last night amid scenes of enthusiasm such as have never been witnessed in Halifax in recent years. It was a notable night. In addition to marking the close of the finest musical programme ever given here, the American premiere of "Andrea Ghenier" an Italian opera of wonderful dramatic and musical effect was held while the concert programme which preceded the performance was, if possible, of a higher standard than on the two previous nights. The Academy and the performance of last night and the manner in which it was received were assurance that capacity houses will rule when these artists return next year.

Never has an opera organization of better stars sung in Halifax, or, for that matter, anywhere in the Provinces. It is a singularly gracious act on the part of the tour management to have arranged presentations in N. Glasgow, Sydney, Truro, Wolfville and Yarmouth. Even the crowded houses here could not have much more than paid the expenses for such an aggregation. But in the short tour half a dozen towns are to be put musically on a par with New York and Boston, and though it be for but one single night, they will have an opera presentation that could not be excelled in any way.

The Art Exhibition At Acadia Ladies Seminary

Wolfville, June 1.—The art exhibition at Acadia seminary was held this year on Tuesday and Wednesday afternoons, May 27 and 28. While the number of pieces exhibited was not as large as on some former years, the pieces shown displayed careful thought and study, with a decided movement toward more advanced subjects. Miss Marion Marr, of Halifax, who completed the course this year, showed taste and skill in her treatment of decorative work, especially in the composition and broad handling of a panel of field lilies done in soft blues and browns. A pair of portieres were also much admired, both for the originality of design and

the beautiful effect produced. Mrs. J. D. Spidell, who completes the course in oils and water colors, excelled in landscape work, choosing familiar scenes and reproducing many phases of nature with true interpretative insight. All of her work showed thoughtful study, careful attention to detail and daintiness in execution.

The china exhibit, while not large, was choice. A tea set in oriental effect, intricate in design (original) and color combination, the work of Miss Nora Lewis, a junior pupil, was much admired. The work exhibited in all departments thus showed a high standard, true artistic appreciation and honest effort.

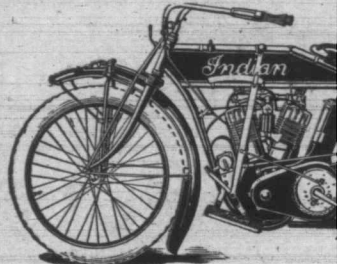

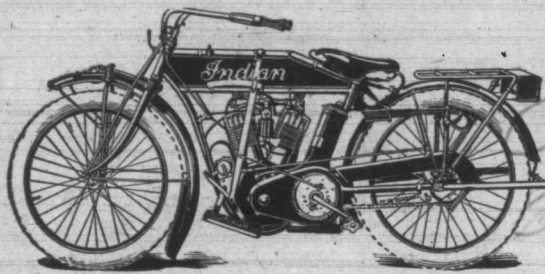

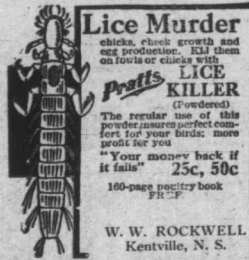

Dry Rot of Potato
A new Disease in Nebraska Worth Knowing About in Canada

The Nebraska Experiment Station has just issued Bulletin 134, on "A Dry Rot of the Irish Potato Tuber." For several years the Department of Agricultural Botany has been engaged in a study of Irish potato diseases in Nebraska. Among these the dry rot of the tuber is one of the most important. Buyers and commission men have reported losses, during storage, of from 20 to 60 per cent due to this dry rot. In fact the most important feature of this dry rot is the fact that it forces the immediate sale of the crop as soon as dug. This tends to demoralize the market and places the grower at the mercy of the buyers, since he is himself afraid to store his crop and wait for better prices.

SYMPTOMS
The dry rot here described is a strict tuber rot affecting mature tubers only. Neither the stems nor the young tubers are ordinarily in the least affected. Natural infection is known to occur solely through wounds produced in the process of digging or subsequent handling. In many cases this rot secured a foothold through wounds produced in scab-producing animals of certain sorts and perhaps even through scab due to fungus parasitism, though the latter method is certainly very rare if we may judge from the laboratory experiments.

The rotting is rather slow, and in general within four or six weeks from one-third to three-fourths of the tuber is destroyed. The epidermis of the rotted portion becomes slightly wrinkled and usually has a characteristic bluish color. On account of the rapid destruction of the underlying tissues the surface over these areas soon becomes distinctly depressed.

CAUSE
Numerous inoculation experiments have shown that this dry rot is caused by a parasitic fungus, not previously described; for which we have proposed the name Fusarium tuberivorum. At the same time it has also been demonstrated that this dry rot fungus does not cause the injury to the leaves and stems often referred to as "blight" or "wilt."

In other words, the present dry rot of the tuber is not connected in any manner with diseased conditions of other parts of the plant.

METHODS OF CONTROL

Extensive experiments have been conducted to learn if any treatment might be applied before the potatoes were stored that would reduce the amount of rotting.

These experiments have clearly demonstrated that dry rot may be held in check through treatment of the tubers before being placed in the storage cellars. For this purpose the best results were secured through the use of either formalin dip, formalin-vapor, or the lime-sulphur wash. Not only did the tubers in these lots show a very small percentage of dry rot, but they were in excellent condition otherwise when removed in April. The storage time, it should be remembered, employed in this experiment is longer than would ordinarily be employed by the average farmer and this gave the treatments a severe test. Under ordinary farm conditions the development of the formalin vapors is not easily secured, and therefore we would particularly recommend the use of the formalin dip as the easiest method to employ and one that should give excellent results in practice.

Household Suggestions

When peeling a pineapple al-
ways leave the top on to hold
on by.
Rub a little lemon juice on tar-
nished faucets to brighten them.
If you wish to store silver so
that it will not tarnish, pack it
in dry flour.
Save the fir needles of the
Christmas tree for sweet smell-
ing pillows.
Lemon and orange rinds may
be dried, grated and bottled to
be ready for use.
Rub the butter paddles in salt
if you have any trouble making
butter balls.
Put cream and bread crumbs
into Hamburg steak and it will
be delightfully juicy.
Windows are most easily wash-
ed with a cloth first and then
rubbed with a chamois.
Heat the knife or dip it into
hot water and dry it before cut-
ting fresh bread or cake.
Pour boiling starch over ink
or iodine spots and they will
come out in two or three hours.
To prevent chapped hands in
cold weather always dry them
very carefully after washing.
Use old catalogues for pads for
the kitchen table or cupboard
or to fry flatirons on.
Scatter grated white pota-
toes over the carpets if you wish
to clean them and freshen their
colors.
Window shades that have be-
come cracked and broken can be
renovated by laying them flat
on the floor and painting them
with oil and paint. Paint one
side, let dry thoroughly, then
paint the other side.
Before using cabbage, caulif-
lower or lettuce, the heads
should be turned down in salted
water, to which a few teaspoon-
fuls of vinegar have been added. If
this is done, any form of animal
life will crawl out.
Before ironing a tablecloth the
edges should be pulled straight
making the corners even. It
should then be ironed with a
heavy iron. Always iron it half
dry on the right side.

A good chiffon blouse if simply
made and separate from the silk
underslip, can be successfully
washed. To wash the blouse
prepare a light lather by adding
a little melted soap to a bowl of
warm water. Gently roll and
press the garment between the
hands. When it is clean, press the
moisture out carefully with the
hands and rinse in clear water.
Stiffen it slightly in gum water
and iron on the wrong side with
a moderately hot iron.
