4 Ways to Cook EGGS

SCRAMBLED EGGS AND TOMATO TOAST—Melt two tablespoonsful butter, add two tablespoonsful flour and stir until well blended; then pour on gradually, while stirring constantly, one and one-half cups stewed and strained tomatoes, to which has been added one-fourth teaspoon soda. Put in double boiler and add one-half cup rich milk. Dip slices of toasted bread in sauce, and when soft remove to serving dish. Four remaining sauce over all. Scramble eggs in a little butter and serve on the toast.

EGG VERMICELLI—Three hard-boiled eggs, one and one-half cupsful of macaroni, two and one-half tablespoonsful of flour, two and one-half tablespoonsful butter, four or six slices of toast, half teaspoon salt and teaspoon of pepper. Make a white sauce by melting butter, add flour, milk and pepper. Chop the whites of the eggs, add to the sauce and pour over the toast. Rub the yolks of the eggs through a sieve and sprinkle over the top.

STUFFED EGGS IN TOMATO SAUCE—Cut six hard-boiled eggs in half, crosswise, and remove the yolks. Mash the yolks fine, adding one teaspoonful of butter, half a cup of bread crumbs slightly moistened with milk (three tablespoonfuls), one teaspoonful of finely minced parsley or scented onion, one half teaspoonful of salt, one half teaspoonful of pepper. Fill the halves finely with this mixture, press two together and serve in hot tomato sauce. Garnish with parsley.

EGGS AND TOMATOES—Take cold mashed potatoes, add a little milk, to make them soft and creamy. Mash the yolks fine, adding one teaspoonful of butter, half a cup of bread crumbs slightly moistened with milk (three tablespoonfuls), one teaspoonful of finely minced parsley or scented onion, one half teaspoonful of salt, one half teaspoonful of pepper. Fill the halves finely with this mixture, press two together and serve in hot tomato sauce. Garnish with parsley.

ENGINES ON FISHING BOATS.

Used on Few of the Larger Vessels, But on All the Smaller Ones.
Out of the fifty large fishing smacks hailing from this port, schooners of from 40 to 120 gross tons, only three have auxiliary engines. On the other hand, of the sixty or more of smaller craft, sloops and schooners of from two or three up to twenty or thirty tons, belonging here and in neighboring New York and New Jersey waters and coming to the Fulton wholesale fish market, almost every one now has a kicker installed.

The big boats with the three exceptions noted still rely solely on sail power, though they may take a tow from Fulton Market slip to the Battery when they go to sea and a tow from the Battery up when they come in. The smaller boats, almost without exception equipped with gasoline engines, may make entire trips without hoisting a sail. If the wind is light or the tide against them they don't wait, they just start their engine and mosey right along. Of course their trips are shorter.

It is more of a job to put an engine into a big vessel than into a small one. Most of the larger vessels now in commission were built before gasoline engines had come into their present wide use. A hundred ton schooner would take an engine of 100 or 120 horse-power, which would take up some room, and for one reason and another not many of the larger boats have thus far been provided with power. But it is the general opinion around Fulton Market that big new schooners which may be brought into the future will be equipped with auxiliary engines.

A few of the big boats now carry a power dory or a boat a little bigger than a dory, like a seine boat, equipped with a gasoline engine. This power dory is carried on the schooner's deck for use as a handy boat on occasion. They may be used for towing boats loaded with seines or they may use it for the picking up and quicker rigging in of men out fishing in dories to tow them in. On at least one occasion a power dory has been used to tow the schooner itself.

YEARLY MILKING RECORDS.
According to report No. 4, of the record of performance for pure bred dairy cattle, just issued by the live stock branch of the federal department of agriculture, nearly 500 cows in Canadian herds have won, on performance of milk production and regular breeding, certificates of record of performance. This has been accomplished within the six years that the tests have been in progress.

# MONTENEGRO TAKES TURK FORT AND GUNS

## Opening Battle of War Goes Against Porte-- Both Sides Lose Heavily.

## Austrian Emperor Hopes for Peace--Bulgaria Appeals to Britain.

New York, Oct. 14.—Montenegrins have captured Detitch Mountain. The Turkish commander and officers, with many soldiers, have surrendered.

For thirty hours the battle between the Montenegrin forces, under direct command of King Nicholas, and Turkish troops strongly entrenched in the hills, has been in progress. The fight began at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning against the Turkish position on Mount Planinitza. Within a few hours the Turks evacuated that district. Strongly fortified positions were occupied by the Turks, however, on Detitch Mountain, which commands the road to Scutari, and reinforcements were brought up, which resulted in a general engagement, which extended along the line for several miles.

King Nicholas remained at his headquarters at Podgoritz while Crown Prince Danilo directed operations at the front. The Montenegrins resumed the bombardment of Detitch at dawn and a heavy canonading was kept up until 11 o'clock in the morning, when the Turkish batteries on the mountain were silenced.

In the meantime a great battle was proceeding near the Turkish town of Tuzeri, about 15 miles to the south of Podgoritz. At 4 o'clock in the afternoon the Turkish commander on Detitch, with his officers and a majority of his troops, surrendered. The Montenegrins captured four guns.

The Turks offered a most stubborn resistance, but the Montenegrins succeeded in rushing the position after prolonged fighting.

Several furious assaults by the Montenegrins were repulsed by the Turks before they were finally overcome. Both sides suffered heavy loss in killed and wounded. The fighting lasted over 14 hours.

The road to the Turkish town of Tuzeri, from the north, is now open to the advance of the Montenegrin army.

### CAPTURED BLOCKHOUSES.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 14.—A despatch from Podetchin, Montenegro, says that the Montenegrin southern army, under the command of General Martinovitch, has crossed the River Boyana and captured several Turkish blockhouses at Harakoch, near the Turkish town of Scutari.

### HOPES FOR PEACE.

Vienna, Austria, Oct. 14.—Emperor Francis Joseph, in a conversation with a prominent personage at the palace yesterday said: "I hope that peace may still be preserved."

### A ROYAL WAR NURSE.

Athens, Greece, Oct. 14.—Princess Alice, the wife of Prince Andrew, of Greece, has decided to leave at once for the frontier with a number of nurses.

## IMPORTS FROM U. S. RUBBER OUTRAGES

### Canadian Receipts Averaging \$1,000,000 Per Day.

Washington, Oct. 14.—Exports from the United States to Canada are now averaging \$1,000,000 a day. Three years ago they averaged a half a million dollars a day, and a dozen years ago they averaged a quarter of a million dollars a day. The August statement of exports, just completed by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, shows that the value of merchandise exported to Canada from the United States during the 244 days from Jan. 1 to Aug. 31, 1912, is practically \$244,000, or, to be more exact, \$243,721,771.

In the corresponding eight months of 1909 the value of merchandise exported to Canada was \$120,428,582, or an average of a half million dollars a day, the total value of exports to Canada having thus doubled in the three years in question. In the corresponding period of 1900 the value of our exports to that country was \$67,500,000, or an average of a little more than a quarter of a million dollars a day.

This large growth in the exports to Canada in recent years—an increase of practically 100 per cent. in three years—occurs chiefly in bituminous coal, automobiles and other carriages, manufactures of iron and steel, lumber, corn and unmanufactured cotton.

### HOODLUMS MOB HOME RULERS.

Idmerick, Oct. 14.—While the people were leaving an anti-Home Rule meeting here to-night they were attacked by a mob of hoodlums. An automobile was smashed, and many others were stoned. The people in the cars were compelled to take refuge in the postoffice, where a number of windows were broken. The police repeatedly charged the mob, and used their clubs freely.

### MUTINY ON GERMAN SHIP.

Berlin, Oct. 14.—Three officers and eighteen men of the crew of the German steamship Lotta Menzell mutinied at Horta, in the Azores, and attempted to kill the captain to-day. The vessel was bound from Norfolk, Va., to Copenhagen.

The mutiny was suppressed by the intervention of the German cruiser Hertha, and the mutineers were arrested.

All the indications here point to war. A Cabinet meeting lasting several hours was held this morning under the Presidency of the King.

### SERBIAN PRINCE GOES TO FRONT.

Belgrade, Serbia, Oct. 14.—Prince Alexander and a section of the general staff left here last night for the frontier. The royal train is in readiness at the station for King Peter.

### TURKEY'S PREPARATIONS.

Constantinople, Oct. 14.—(Wireless from a steamer in the Dardanelles to Kustendje, Roumania)—No fewer than 140,000 Turkish troops from Asia Minor will, it is estimated, concentrate within a week in European Turkey. This will bring the effective force of the Turkish army up to 400,000 men.

Turkish officials say the day of trial has shown that all the money and the effort devoted to the reorganization of the army have not been wasted.

All the army depots are full of the stores and the army equipment is complete and of good quality.

The Bulgarians, or men of the second reserve, now being brought from Asia Minor, are determined ones, and the Bulgarians, whose persistent nagging and intrigues in Macedonia have, the Turks say, caused them to be constantly called from their homes, are to receive a sound lesson. It is to be war to the knife, the men say. They have decided to take no prisoners, and to give no quarter.

The Albanians in the north are expected by the Turkish authorities to keep the hands of the Montenegrins full.

Concessions have been demanded to the effect that they will fight for the Turks.

The reliability of the Christians serving in the ranks of the Turkish army is one of the great problems of the moment for the Ottoman commanders. The Armenians are expected to behave loyally, but it is only to show ignorance of human nature to expect Greeks to fight against Greeks or Bulgarians against Bulgarians, and there are many of those nationalities in Turkey.

### MAKES APPEAL TO ENGLAND.

London, Oct. 14.—The Daily News gives exceptional prominence to an appeal by M. Gueschoff, the Bulgarian Premier, for English help. A despatch from its Sofia correspondent quotes the Prime Minister as saying:

"The impending war is the appalling ransom we are going to pay for the freedom of our Christian brethren, a freedom of which they were robbed by the crime committed by the congress of Berlin. We appeal to England for aid. We beseech her not to forget her great responsibility for the iniquitous work performed by that congress. We implore her not to commit again the error of thinking that Turkey will be able to work out alone the lasting pacification of the Balkan peninsula. Let her assist once and for all upon the only satisfactory solution of the Balkan question, the disappearance of direct Turkish rule in southeastern Europe."

### LABOR CONDITIONS IN PERU NOT MUCH BETTER.

Washington, Oct. 14.—The atrocious labor conditions in the Putumayo rubber district of Peru are but little changed, according to the report of United States Consul and Special Investigator Stuart Fuller, who called to the State Department to-day his arrival at Iquitos, Peru, after a two months' trip into the heart of the rubber district.

Mr. Fuller is sending a detailed report of his investigation by mail to the State Department, and consequently made but a brief report by cable to-day. He intimated plainly that little real progress has been made by Peru in establishing and enforcing permanent measures of reform.

It has repeatedly been stated in Peruian quarters that the Government of Peru had effectively put an end to the atrocities committed against Indian laborers in the rubber districts by the agents of the company exploiting the resources of that region.

### EXTEND CONNAUGHT'S TERM.

London, Oct. 14.—"It is almost certain that the Duke of Connaught's term in Canada will extend another year," says Truth, which is generally reliable in such matters. "It is very desirable that he should be at the head of the Canadian Government when the Prince of Wales and Prince Albert visit Canada in 1914."

"The Duchess and Princess Patricia are coming in April for a few weeks' visit to England, and will visit the Crown Prince and Princess of Sweden at Stockholm. Probably the latter will visit Canada next autumn."

### I. M. U. ELECT OFFICERS.

Milwaukee, Oct. 14.—Jos E. Valentine, San Francisco, was today re-elected president of the International Moulders' Union of North America. Other officers are: Vice-Presidents, Michael J. Keogh, Green Island, N. Y., John R. O'Leary, Worcester, Mass., Lawrence O'Rourke, Detroit; Secretary, Victor Klobner, St. Louis; Assistant Secretary, Wm. Slimer-ton, Toronto, Ont.; Financier, R. H. McCaff, Cincinnati; editor of the official magazine, John P. Frey, Worcester, Mass.

Rochester, N. Y., will be the next meeting place.

## WAS IT A MURDER?

### Went for \$18,000 Legacy and is Found Dead.

Montreal despatch: Word has been received in the city from Quebec that Louis Nolin, 48 years of age, whose home was at 1,028 St. Dominique street, Montreal, had been found dead with both legs severed from his body.

It has been learned that Nolin left here a week ago for Levis to settle up the estate of his mother, who died recently, and from which it was said he was to receive \$18,000. When leaving for Quebec he informed his wife and family that he would not be away more than two or three days. Nothing more was heard of him by his family until word reached them that his dead and mutilated body had been found on the railway tracks outside the C. P. R. station in Quebec.

It was not stated if any money had been found on the body, and it was not known up to last night by his relatives here if Nolin had received any of the money from the estate that he went to settle up. A son of the deceased left for Quebec last night to investigate the circumstances of his death and to bring the body back to Montreal.

## A COSTLY EPIDEMIC

### Many Suing Ottawa Over Typhoid Outbreak.

Ottawa, Oct. 14.—Ottawa's second great typhoid epidemic, which so far this year has aggregated 1,200 cases and 72 deaths, promises to prove about as good a harvest for the lawyers as it has been for the doctors.

The city solicitor has given an opinion to the city council that the city is on the ground of negligence in protecting the purity of the water supply, liable for damages to the typhoid sufferers.

Based on the standard figures published in economic losses by disease, the total collectable damages for loss from deaths, from wage loss, doctors' bills, etc., aggregate about \$1,700,000.

Several of the sufferers have already instituted action for recovery of damages against the city, one widow claiming \$15,000.

Now comes another almost humorous sequel to the sad story of Ottawa's waterworks mismanagement. Bills are beginning to come into the city for money spent by taxpayers for fuel for boiling the water in order to make it innocuous.

## GUELPH THE HUB

### Of Proposed New Radial Railway System.

Guelph despatch: A statement was made to-day that American promoters were contemplating the building of an electric railway between Guelph, Plainville Lake, Hooper, and Preston, thus connecting this city with the southern part of Western Ontario by railroads, with the possibility of further extension as far north as Arthur. Certain conditions were attached, however, and the whole matter was summed up in the following sentence by the agent to be on the inside:

"If the City of Guelph will hand over its franchise for an electric railway between this city and Plainville Lake and Hooper, and is willing to make a deal for the use of the tracks of the radial as far as St. George's Square, I can secure the capital to build the road within 30 days' time."

## TRACED McMANIGAL

### Hotel Clerks Identify Dynamite Outrage Suspect.

Indianapolis, Oct. 14.—For the first time since he confessed to dynamiting, Ortie McManigal, before a jury in the "dynamiting conspiracy" trial to-day, was identified by hotel clerks as having visited various cities at times when explosions occurred.

H. E. Pearce, of Kansas City, Mo., in the pages of a hotel register, traced "J. W. McGraw" as having registered at a Kansas City hotel August 20, 1910, three days before McManigal blew up a portion of a \$1,500,000 bridge across the Missouri River, which he says, was arranged for by W. Bert Brown, of Kansas City, and James B. McNamara.

"Do you see McGraw in the court room?" asked James W. Noel, special assistant district attorney.

"That's the man," said Pearce, pointing straight to McManigal.

R. J. Quigley, of Duluth, Minn., identified McManigal as a visitor at a Duluth hotel in July, 1910, shortly before an explosion at Superior, Wis. F. W. Gates said McManigal was the "Judge Bree" who frequently registered at a hotel at Rochester, Pa., near which later were discovered quantities of nitro-glycerine hidden in a shed.

## N. Y. ELEVATED COLLISION.

New York, Oct. 14.—Twenty-two passengers were injured early to-day, when two elevated trains came together in a rear-end collision at the 104th street station of the Sixth Avenue Railroad. The failure of the brakes of the second train is said to have caused the accident. The forward car of this train and the last car of the train in front were telescoped. Two of the injured will probably die.

One of the less seriously injured is a policeman, who was standing in the street below the station when the accident occurred. He was killed by wreckage which dropped to the street following the crash.

## NEW WITNESS

### IN BECKER CASE

### Chauffeur Eyewitness, In Terror, Denies Story.

## LEWIS POINTED OUT

### By Another Witness as One of Gunmen.

Oct. 14.—Mrs. Luban, the "mysterious" witness found by District Attorney Whitman in jail at New York, were at the Criminal Courts building to-day waiting to be called to the stand at the trial of Police Lieut. Becker. They were held in Newark on charges of forgery, but on their statement that their arrest was a "frame-up," and that one of them was an eye-witness to the murder, they were paroled and brought to New York.

Giovanni Stanich, another eye-witness to the tragedy, and Mrs. Lillian Rosenthal, widow of the murdered gambler, were other witnesses whom it was expected, the State would call early.

The informers, Rose, Vallon, Webber and Scheppe, were held in readiness as usual, and it was thought possible that enough progress might be made to reach Rose's testimony.

Thomas Ryan, a chauffeur, and an eye-witness of the murder, was the first witness called. His appearance was a surprise to the defence, for his name had never previously figured in the case. According to Ryan's story, only one man fired the shot that killed Rosenthal.

"Did you not say yesterday in the presence of Officer Fife, when the four men charged with the murder were brought to the bar, that the man called 'Whitey' Lewis fired the shot?" asked Assistant District Attorney Moss.

"I object to what he said yesterday," interposed John F. McIntyre, counsel for the defence.

"Sustained," ruled Justice Goff.

"Do you think you could remember him if you saw him again?"

"I don't believe I could," mumbled the witness.

Judge Goff took a hand in the question and put the witness through a severe examination. The chauffeur appeared reluctant to testify, and his answers were almost inaudible.

"Did you not say yesterday, you had seen this man in court?" resumed Mr. Moss.

"This time Justice Goff allowed the question.

"I said I thought I knew the man, but did not know his name," conceded the witness.

The four gunmen were then brought into court, and the witness was asked to pick out the man who fired the shot.

"Who did you refer to of these four men?" asked Moss.

Ryan appeared frightened. "I didn't refer to anybody," he declared, shifting his eyes quickly over the four men.

"Didn't you tell the Assistant District Attorney in the prison yesterday, when you were asked to identify the man on him?" pursued Mr. Moss.

"I was afraid because I might put my hand on the wrong man," answered Ryan, in a weak voice.

"Can you swear," interrupted Justice Goff, "that any one of these four men fired the shot?"

Ryan gave a feeble look at the four. Every one of the gun men was eyeing him.

"I cannot," he replied, in a trembling voice. Ryan was then allowed to go. He was followed on the stand by Giovanni Stanich, also an eye-witness. Stanich is a native of Italy, and his testimony through an interpreter. The witness saw three men with revolvers about, but was not sure whether there was more than one fired at Rosenthal.

Stanich left the witness stand and without hesitation picked out "Whitey" Lewis as one of the three he had seen. He was unable to identify the others, but swore that "Whitey" fired one of the shots.

## INCENDIARIES AT TECUMSEH.

Windsor despatch: Residents of the village of Tecumseh on the Grand Trunk, eight miles east of Windsor, are much wrought up over a series of mysterious fires of supposedly incendiary origin which have occurred there within the past ten days. Last Tuesday night three separate blazes were discovered among the barns owned by farmers residing on the outside of the village, but the flames were extinguished by bucket brigades before any serious damage was done.

Several outbuildings owned by Alex. Jacques have been burned this summer without the detection of the miscreants. The total value of property destroyed in the village within the past six months is estimated at about \$5,000.

## GOT FIVE-YEAR SENTENCE.

Whitby despatch: Norman York, a young man, was to-day by Mr. Justice Latchford committed to Kingston Penitentiary for ten years for a grave offence. In passing sentence his Lordship said that the crime committed by York was almost as serious as murder, and therefore he was not inclined to show leniency. A fifteen-year-old stepdaughter was the complainant.

## WINDSOR MASONIC TEMPLE.

Windsor despatch: Subject to approval of the shareholders, the directors of the Windsor Masonic Temple Association have accepted the bid of the Canadian Frost-Winchester Co., Limited, for the construction of a Masonic Temple at London street and Ouellette avenue.

The plans finally approved are for a reinforced concrete structure which will cost about \$100,000.

## A FATAL DUCK HUNT

### Westerner Lost on Lake, Dies of Exhaustion.

Moosejaw, Sask., Oct. 14.—Douglas Hood was found dead on the shore of Lake Johnson yesterday, and his companion, Fred Williams, of Expanse, is in a critical condition, and his death is feared. Hood is the son of James Hood, of Winnipeg. He and several companions left here on Monday for Williams' ranch for several days' duck shooting. They were on the lake when nightfall came up, and in the darkness lost their way. Hood complained of the cold, and Williams gave him his coat and took charge of the canoe, but when he managed to reach shore he found Hood dead. Suffering from exhaustion, he tried to reach the little shack in which the party had camped, and was found unconscious in the morning.

## BATEMAN TO HANG

### Aged Cedardale Man Convicted of Wife Murder.

### Defence Attempt to Prove Insanity Failed.

Whitby despatch: Proved guilty of murder and sentenced to hang, John Bateman lies to-night in the county jail here, whence he will walk to the scaffold to die on December 19 next, unless crown clemency be exercised on his behalf. The jury which heard the story of the killing of the aged wife by the more aged husband was only thirty minutes deciding upon its verdict of guilty, with a recommendation to mercy.

"I was never intended to kill that woman," was the answer Bateman made to the judge's enquiry if he had anything to say before sentence was passed upon him. Bateman's voice trembled, but when the announcement of death in two months fell upon his ears he showed no emotion and walked out of the court room to the jail with the sprightliness which has characterized him during the two days' trial. His face was impassive.

The defence this morning occupied an hour and a quarter. Mr. Conant put in only medical testimony to support the case. He endeavored to show that Bateman was senile, erratic, violent in temper, and at such moments irresponsible. Drs. McKay and Kalar, of Ontario; John Moore, of Brooklyn, and Bruce Smith, of Toronto, did not, however, give testimony corroborative of the claim that the prisoner was of unsound mind.

Counsel for defence handled his case so well that he won the encomium from his Lordship that he had done and said all that any man could have done and said for the prisoner. He appealed to the jury to make the verdict one of manslaughter, that the aged prisoner might live out his allotted years.

The crown counsel urged the inexorable law of duty, and said that the court room was no place for hearts and for emotions. The crime, he said, was a sordid and deliberate murder.

His Lordship's charge was brief, and when the jury returned their verdict he remarked that no other conclusion was possible.

## FATAL OIL SHIP FIRE.

New York, Oct. 14.—Five men are known to be dead and sixteen men were missing late to-night after a fire at the Standard Oil wharves at the Hook, on the south end of Bayonne, which consumed the Danabome, an oil steamer, which was loaded with case goods, and the Colona, a sailing vessel. The Narragansett, the largest oil tank steamer in the world, was singed by the fire, but was towed to safety out into New York harbor.

## FOSSILS 25,000,000 YEARS OLD.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 14.—Perfectly formed fossils of the trilobite species, the largest animals of the Cambrian formation, declared by paleontologists to be more than 25,000,000 years old, have been unearthed.

Dr. C. D. Walcott, secretary of the Smithsonian Institute, Washington, found them at the base of Mount Robson, in the heart of the Rockies, while on a scientific expedition occupying two months. He was accompanied by H. H. Hayden.

## WELLAND POOL-ROOM FIGHT.

Welland despatch: Between eleven and twelve o'clock to-day ten negroes and two whites were engaged in a fight at Perry's, started a rough house in Beatty's pool room here. Beatty received a wound in the head from a pool ball.

Beatty and his son succeeded in driving the men from the room after being badly cut by flying billiard balls and cues. Two negroes and a white man were arrested on the spot. One of them was badly wounded, and was given medical attention. Five others were gathered in later, but three broke jail and escaped, only to be captured at the M. C. R. station.

## MEXICAN REBELS WIN.

Laredo, Tex., Oct. 14.—A rebel force numbering 1,800, under the leadership of Cheche Campo, practically annihilated a force of 150 Federals, near Herrihan, between Liminez and Torreon, late yesterday, according to advices received here to-day. Of the Federal force only 17 are said to have escaped. Among the dead are four officers, including Col. Tello, in command of the Federals.

## RABIES CASE AT PARIS.

Paris, Oct. 14.—E. B. Karn leaves to-morrow morning to take the Pasteur treatment in Toronto. He was bitten by a dog a few days ago, and word was received this morning from Ottawa that the animal was badly infected with rabies.

## NEWS OF THE DAY IN BRIEF

### Canadian Methodists Will Found University.

### GETS NOBEL PRIZE

### Big Price for Montreal Real Estate.

Toronto schools were found to be seriously overcrowded.

Midland citizens endorsed the project of the Canada Central Railway from Midland to Montreal.

James Doyle died at Belleville, and Thomas Harding, held for assault, may face a more serious charge.

The western freight rate inquiry before the Board of Railway Commissioners adjourned to November 4.

A sensation has been caused in London over charges made by City Engineer Geo. Wright, who has resigned.

One hundred Toronto citizens decided to hold a mass meeting as the result of the prosecution of Rev. R. B. St. Clair.

The Methodists of Canada will found a university in West China to be modelled upon the University of Toronto.

Friends of Mayor Geary, of Toronto, look for his appointment as corporation counsel at Monday night's council meeting.

The Nobel prize for medical research was awarded to a Frenchman, Dr. Alexis Carrel, of the Rockefeller Institute, New York.

Sir George Murray has already begun his investigation of the civil service under authority of the order-in-council passed a few days ago.

Another international loan, this time not to China, but to Turkey, is in process of negotiation. The amount of the loan is between \$40,000,000 and \$50,000,000.

William R. Goddard, aged 55, living at 54 Caroline avenue, Toronto, was instantly killed by a live wire near the corner of Dundas street and Sorauren avenue.

Montreal milk men have advised their customers of an increase in the price of bottled milk to 10 cents per quart, while cream is up 10 cents a quart to 60 cents.

The Great Northwestern Telegraph Company was recommended for trial by Magistrate Denison at Toronto on a charge of committing a breach of the betting act.

Mr. Foster, of Tilbury, was awarded \$300 damages and Miss Lumley \$75 against David Orr, of Chatham, whose machine collided with Foster's automobile on a country road.

The London Utilities Commission will reduce power rates ten per cent. to all power consumers, except for household lighting, as a result of the Hydro-Electric Commission reduction.

An order-in-council has been passed directing the proclamation of the Quebec harbor commission act passed at the last session of Parliament. The act is to come into effect on October 15.

Premier Polneuve, of France, declined to intervene at the request of the League of the Rights of Man in an attempt to secure improved passport facilities for French Israelites desiring to enter Russia.

Last March Edward Timms, aged 14, son of the Foreman of Streets Thomas Timms, Kingston, was hurt while at play with school companions. He received a blow over his heart, which has now caused his death.

For the property situated at the northwest corner of St. Francis Xavier and Notre Dame street the Montreal Trust Company paid \$164,148.38, or almost \$63 per square foot for the block of 2,000 square feet.

Several of the stolen Bank of Montreal bills taken from the New Westminster branch have been detected at Belleville, but so far it has been impossible to ascertain who brought them into the city.

At the annual meeting of the Methodist board on the superannuation fund held in Toronto, reports showing that the past year had been a most successful one were presented. The statement showed receipts for the year amounting to \$201,535.06, and expenditures of \$168,603.07, leaving a surplus of \$32,931.99.

## RAILWAY CHANGES HANDS.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 14.—After months of negotiation, the Pacific & Great Eastern—the Vancouver to Fort George Railway has purchased the Howe Sound & Northern Railway, including the unsold portion of the township of Newport, at the head of Howe Sound, and a valuable water frontage. In the two there are five hundred and thirty-five acres transferred to the new owners. The Pacific & Great Eastern pays in cash installments within three years one million dollars for the present company's assets, which include, in addition to its lands, ten miles of completed line, its chartered right from Newport to Filbert, one hundred and twenty miles, and additional charter rights to Filbert and North George.

### RIOTERS SENTENCED.

Port Arthur despatch: Justice Middleton this morning sentenced Damiano Duprezo and Nick Duprezo to ten months imprisonment each in Stony Mountain penitentiary, for having assaulted Chief of Police McClellan on July 29, the night of the riots on the coal docks. Rev. Madison Hicks was convicted of having been at the head of an unlawfully assembly on the evening of July 29, at the time when the riots were in progress at the coal docks. Sentence was suspended and Hicks bound over in the sum of \$500 to keep the peace.

### MORLEY AND JOURNALISM.

He Has Criticisms to Make Regarding the Modern Press.

What Lord Morley called "a remarkable gathering" met at the Hotel Cecil recently, when Sir Edward Cook was entertained by his fellow-journalists in commemoration of the honor of knighthood which his Majesty has lately been pleased to confer upon him.

Journalists of all schools of thought gathered under the chairmanship of Lord Morley on whose right hand sat the guest of the evening and on whose left was Viscount Alford.

In the course of his speech proposing the health of Sir Edward Cook, Lord Morley said: "I met Ruskin once, and then my idol was Mill. I need hardly say that I never met Ruskin again. (Laughter.) I have often wondered, when looking at what came later, whether we unitarians were not happier, and whether it was not an advantage to know where we really were."

"In these days," said Lord Morley, "the narrator, as apart from the leader-writer or publicist, has grown into enormous prominence. That is a very delicate subject for me to touch upon—but we are now in the Palace of Truth. (Laughter.)"

"It is a question whether the news editor is or is not making an advance on the writer of leading articles. And I would suggest that what we call the 'un-er-t' of the age—whether some of it does not arise from the flaming and garish colors, from the emphasis, from the melodramatic type of kinds in which our news is displayed."

May it not be that the tremendous mechanical improvements in news production are in themselves responsible for some of this? Some of us, however, in these days of gramophones and megaphones, still reserve our admiration for Beethoven and Mozart.

"Fletcher of Saltoun he" once talked about making the ballads of the people. I am sometimes tempted to say I don't mind who writes the leading articles if you will give me full control of the black type and the big headlines.

We are all living in times of enormous difficulty. I do not care what party you belong to but everybody knows that in every Chancellery of Europe there are misgivings as to the future. One cause of this difficulty—I may say the main cause—arises from the press.

The prime duty of the press all over Europe is to abate, assuage, and minimize and, so far as we can, remove international susceptibilities, instead of warming these hateful things into a hateful life.

The following quaint epitaph is to be found in Newhaven Churchyard: To the Memory of Thomas Tipper who Departed this life May ye 14 1785 Aged 54 years.

Reader with kind regards this grave survey

Nor heedless pass where Tipper's ashes lay

Honest he was ingenious blunt and kind

And dared do what few dare do speak his mind

Philosophy & history well he knew

Was versed in physic & in surgery

The best old stingo he both brewed and sold

Nor did one knavish act to get his gold

He played through life a varied comic part

And knew immortal Hudibras by heart

Reader in real truth such was the man

Be better wiser laugh more if you can.

### Nestor of the Commons.

The home rule debates have brought to the front a remarkable personality in Mr. Samuel Young, the member for East Cavan. Not that the Nestor of Parliament needs any introduction to the House of Commons, but he so seldom obtrudes on public notice that it is apt to be eclipsed by more loquacious members.

Mr. Young was born near Belfast in 1822, and he has enjoyed the unusual distinction of having lived through the reigns of five monarchs. He did not embark on a Parliamentary career until he had attained his three-score years and ten, and he was successful at his first election, defeating the Unionist candidate by no less a majority than 3,000.

Though he has attained the ripe old age of ninety, Mr. Young has the buoyancy of youth. He is neither a teetotaler nor a non-smoker, and he laughs at the maxims which are supposed to conduce to old age.

### Pinero's Art.

Sir Arthur Wing Pinero, whose clever comedy "The Mind the Painter" is still drawing large London audiences, is recognized both in this country and on the continent as one of our greatest playwrights. In his early days he was an actor—a fact that explains his wonderful mastery of stage-craft. Sir Arthur Pinero has made a fortune by his pen, and his plays have been produced in all parts of the globe. Such masterpieces as "Sweet Lavender," "The Gay Lord Quex," "The School for Scandal," and "His House in Order," are familiar to millions of playgoers, and as Sir Arthur Pinero is still in the fifties, other masterpieces may be expected from his pen.

Simplified Spelling in Australia. Simplified spelling is progressing in Australia. The education department of Victoria has issued a circular to its teachers embodying a list of words that must be taught in future on "no spelling" principles. The "u" is to be dropped out of all such words as "honour" and "favour." Plough is to become "plow" and centre is to be changed into "center."

### FARM DRAINAGE

The important matter of farm drainage is being given attention by Mr. W. H. Smith, Athens, district representative of the Ontario Agricultural College, and he has arranged for a drainage demonstration to be given on the field of Mr. W. G. Parish, adjoining the station of the B. W. & N. W. Ry at Athens, to take place on the afternoon of Friday, Oct. 18, commencing at 1.30, by Prof. J. R. Spry, B.S.A., drainage expert of the Ontario Agricultural College.

The demonstration will be practical and will include the taking of levels and the planning of a complete system of drains. Explanations will be given of the best manner of laying tile and much valuable information imparted to all interested in farm improvement.

One Who Was There

Gov't Model School

Referring to the inspection of Ren-  
frew Model School made by Inspector  
Tilley, the Journal says,—

Provincial Educational Solons are  
working on a new system of dealing  
with the Model Schools. If the ar-  
rangements contemplated go through,  
the Model schools will in future be  
under the control and jurisdiction of  
the Education Department, and local  
Boards of Education will then be re-  
lieved of much of the engaging of  
teachers and other matters relative  
only to Model Schools.

It will probably be found, when the  
new system comes into effect, that  
the privilege of paying salaries will be  
reserved for the local municipalities.

Under the Stallion Enrollment Act,  
now in force, no person shall stand,  
travel or offer for use any stallion un-  
less and until the name, description  
and pedigree of such stallion has been  
enrolled and a certificate of such en-  
rolment procured. The fee for certificate  
is \$2.00, which is good for only one  
year. If the animal is sold, a transfer  
certificate costing \$1.00 must be ob-  
tained. The penalty for contravention  
of any section of the Act will be not  
less than \$25 nor more than \$100.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

LESSON III.—OCT. 20, 1912.

Mission to the Gentiles.—Mark 7: 24-30; Matt. 8: 5-13.

COMMENTARY.—I. Christ heals a Greek girl (vs. 24-30). 24. thence he arose.—The discourses of our Lord about the bread of life (John 6) and ceremonial defilement (Mark 7: 1-23) had stirred up the Jewish leaders to a high pitch of animosity, and they were already planning his destruction. It did not therefore seem prudent for him to remain longer in Galilee at this time, into the borders.—It is probable that the disciples, either in or near the land of Phoenicia, Tyre and Sidon—Cities of Phoenicia on the shores of the Mediterranean Sea. They were about twenty miles apart, and thirty-five and fifty-five miles, respectively, from the Sea of Galilee. Prospero. In the time of Christ, they have now sunk to miserable villages of a few thousand inhabitants each. Tyre was at one time nineteen miles in circumference and famed for its great wealth and Tyrian purple dye. It has been suggested that the entrance of Jesus into non-Jewish territory in his mission foreshadowed the offer of salvation through the gospel to the Gentile world. could not be hid—Jesus had made his way privately with his disciples, and desired to remain for a time in the presence of the Gentiles. His fame preceded him even into Jewish territory. 25. a certain woman . . . fell at his feet.—She assumed this attitude out of respect for Jesus and also as a suppliant. She had heard of his arrival and of his power, and desired to have that power exercised in behalf of her afflicted daughter. 26. a Greek.—She belonged to the Grecian race, a Syrophenician by nation.—She had her home in Phoenicia, which at this time belonged to the province of Syria. In Matt. 15: 22 she is called "a woman of Canaan." This expression denotes her religious tendency; she was a Gentile, brought him—Her earnestness led her to make a decided effort to secure relief. Matthew records her words, "Have mercy upon me" (15: 22), although it was not she, but her daughter, that was directly afflicted with an unclean spirit, the chief being the devil, or Satan) to be the enemies and tempters of the souls of men. He stood in a totally different position from the abandoned wicked man, who morally is given over to the devil.—Alford.

27. Jesus said unto her.—He did not repel her, although his disciples "brought her" to "send her away" (Matt. 15: 23). It is not meet—it is not fitting or consistent. The children's bread . . . By the term children he means the Jews, who were not in keeping with his mission to the Gentiles. The blessing designed for the Jews, even though the latter were rejecting him and despising the benefits he was freely offering them. Cast it unto the dogs.—Jesus, in applying the epithet dogs to the Gentiles, was following the mode of expression of the times, for the Jews looked upon all others as dogs. The woman was not to be repulsed even by being classed with dogs. She saw a ray of hope in the words of Jesus, "Let the children first be filled," for there might be something left for the dogs that were accustomed to run about the table. 28. Yes, Lord—I admit all you say. Her strong desire and faith made her not hesitate to put away her request and turned into an argument in her favor. Yet the dogs . . . eat of the children's crumbs.—Here the picture is complete. The household are gathered about the table and the crumbs are eagerly seized by the hungry and ever-watchful dogs. The dog, however, does not deny this privilege, nor should she, the Gentile dog, as she was, be denied the crumb she craved. 29. For this saying.—In what she had said this Gentile woman expressed both desire and faith. Jesus said to her, "O woman, great is thy faith" (Matt. 15: 28). The devil is gone out of thy daughter.—The victory was worth all the effort, humiliation, persistence and faith necessary to its attainment.

II. Christ heals the servant of a Roman officer (vs. 5-13). 5. Capernaum.—A city on the northwest shore of the Sea of Galilee. Centurion.—A Roman military officer, who commanded a century, or company, of from fifty to one hundred soldiers. Palestine was under Roman rule and probably there was a Roman garrison at Capernaum. Beseeching.—Earnestly asking. Luke says the centurion approached Jesus through the elders. The centurion was a Gentile, but had accepted the Jewish faith, and was so much interested in the nation that he had built a synagogue. 6. Sick of the palsy. He was afflicted with some sort of paralysis. Grievously tormented.—In severe pain. Luke says he was "at the point of death" (R. V.). 7. Jesus said. . . I will come.—He recognized the faith of the officer and quickly responded to the call. Heal him.—The severity of the illness caused no hesitation on Jesus' part. 8. The centurion answered.—From Luke's narrative we learn that Jesus started at once with the elders toward the centurion's home, and on the way set servants sent by that officer with the message that follows. I am not worthy.—He felt his unworthiness of the presence of the marvelous Teacher. Speak the word only.—This showed his faith. Under authority, having soldiers under him.—He knew how to obey orders and how to be obeyed. 10. Marvelled.—He wondered at such an expression of faith in one born a Gentile. The term "marvelled" reveals to us the human side of the nature of Jesus. I have found no great faith, no not in Israel.—It was in Israel where one might expect to see faith, if it was to be found anywhere, yet here was the greatest exhibition of faith he had met in his labors as the Messiah, and that in one not a Jew. II. Shall come from the east

and west. This is a promise of the extension of the blessings of the gospel to the Gentiles. With Abraham—Those who accept of Christ through faith shall be counted with the children of Abraham, shall be partakers of everlasting bliss. Kingdom of heaven—Heaven is here indicated. 12. Children of the promise.—The Jews, who were the rightful heirs of the blessings of the gospel. They should have received Christ, but rejected him, thus through their unbelief forfeiting their place in the everlasting kingdom. Cast out into outer darkness—Instead of a place in the palace where they might sit down to the feast with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, they were to be thrust out, banished from the presence of the Lord. Weeping and gnashing of teeth.—This denotes sorrow and rage—conscious suffering. 13. As thou hast believed, so be it done.—His faith had triumphed. Questions.—Where were Tyre and Sidon situated? Who came to Jesus? Why was this woman called a Greek? Why a Syrophenician? What was her request? What reply did Jesus make? What is meant by the children's bread? By casting it unto the dogs? How did she reply to him? What is to be commended in her reply? What was the result of her faith? What is the office of centurion? What request did the centurion make of Jesus? What did Jesus say about his faith?

PRACTICAL SURVEY. Topic—Genuine faith. I. Tested. II. Honored. I. Tested. In this lesson we learn that the most astonishing and acceptable faith may be exercised by the most unlikely persons. On this occasion Jesus had left His own country and people, and sought retirement among the Gentiles. The boundless compassion of the Son of God accounts for the fact that He could not be hidden. The heathen woman is an illustration of the great drawing that exists between the Saviour and the soul that needs and seeks Him. We may safely regard his sole purpose in going to that place was to minister to that sufferer, and to crown her faith and make her an example to those who stood by, as well as to future generations. She had much against her in her circumstances. In the eyes of the Jews she belonged to the most hated of the Gentile races. She received little countenance from Christ's disciples. They desired Him to send her away, but it was not from them that she sought help. Though a heathen in religion and an alien in race she credited what she had heard of Jesus. Her faith overcame natural prejudice in herself and the fear of its influence in others. There are many striking features in the character of this woman, which merit our careful study. Her energy, humility and pleading. She had a deep sorrow, spurring her on to make every exertion. She felt her need and the true character of her affliction. Jesus tried her faith by perfect silence, by seeming indifference and by apparent reproach, but she could not be defeated because she would not doubt.
