



At the present day the only thing in this country that can be compared with the struggle is the sheep feuds of the Northwest, in which shots have been taken at shephords at sight and the sheep driven over cliffs

In these battles up in the Canadian wilds guns were freely used. When it so happened that the compatants got clore enough together, knives were brought into play. Fists were seldom used-this would have been too mild.

Stirred to commercial competition, the Hudson Bay Company for a time paid the highest prices to the Indians, thus securing the pick of their furs; but the Frenchmen, so it is recorded, got around this by introducing firewater. 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
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
