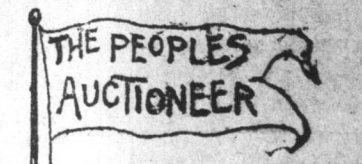

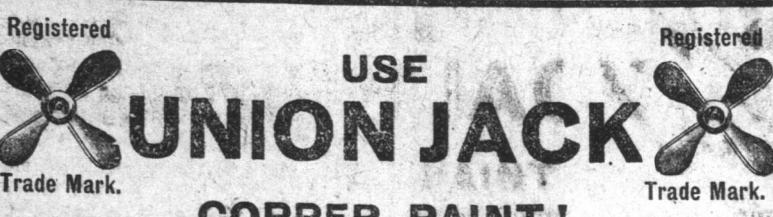

### SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by  
Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, in a maud-centre, in the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance from the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.  
Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.  
Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.

## Household Notes.

A good remedy for cold in the chest is vasoline and turpentine well rubbed into the chest and between the shoulders in the back.

To prevent potatoes from becoming discolored when boiled peel them and let them lie in cold water at least an hour before boiling.

When cutting cookies have a dish of flour at hand into which the cutter may be frequently dipped; then the dough will not stick.

If one has the opportunity to get red cedar chips do not fail to obtain a supply. They are excellent for keeping moths from clothing.

Sometimes dishes become badly stained from tea; a vigorous rubbing with salt will probably remove every vestige of discoloration.

If a garment is faded, and one wishes to bleach it white boil it in water to which a goodly amount of cream of tartar is added.

Before putting skates away for the summer soak them in sour milk whey. Then give them a coat of kerosene and wrap them in tissue paper.

Try stuffing squabs with very tender celery cut fine and seasoned highly with pepper, salt and butter. The stuffing will be found delicious.

By sprinkling a goodly amount of salt over a carpet five or ten minutes before sweeping there will be little dust raised when the sweeping is done.

When boiling cabbage cut the cabbage into quarters.

bage in quarters and slip each quarter into a separate cheesecloth bag. Then, when it is cooked it comes out intact.

To mend an umbrella take a small piece of black sticking plaster and soak it in water until quite soft. Place this carefully under the hole inside and let dry.

If there are stains from machine oil on a white garment, rub on the spots well with a cloth wet in ammonia before washing with soap, and they will disappear.

Few people seem to know, when preparing dried peaches, the skins can be easily peeled off if the peaches are allowed to stand in cold water for several hours.

If a loaf of bread has become stale hold it under the water for one second; then place in a brisk oven for a quarter of an hour. It will taste like new bread.

An excellent way of keeping a black leather hand-bag or travelling bag in condition is to rub it well occasionally with milk. Wipe with a chamois until perfectly dry.

To dry parsley, wash the parsley and shake it well. Then set in a warm oven, and when it becomes crisp let it cool. Put into tins or bottles and exclude the air from it.

If there is danger of color running in a garment, soak it well in solution of turpentine and water for 12 hours, half a pint of turpentine being used to three gallons of water.

When you are ironing any dark material do not put a linen cloth underneath, as the lint will come off on the stuff, and you will have great difficulty in brushing it off again.

## Olympic's New Dock.

Completing the Largest Vessel in the World.

The White Star Liner Olympic, the largest vessel in the world, now approaching completion at Messrs. Harland and Wolff's shipyard at Belfast, will be dry-docked to-day in the new basin constructed at a cost of about £350,000 by the Belfast Harbour Commissioners and rushed forward at express speed in order to be ready to receive the leviathan.

The liner as she lies at her place at Messrs. Harland and Wolff's yard has during the last few weeks made giant strides towards completion. To the casual observer she seems practically ready for sea. Her funnels are in place, her boats aboard, and she has from the water line up received her final coat of paint, but there is a scene of great activity inside the hull. Over a thousand hands are still at work completing her fittings and furnishing.

The new dock in which the Olympic will be installed to-day is a remarkable achievement. It has been some seven years under construction and is the largest of its kind in the world. It has a total available length of 886 feet 6 inches (the Olympic is 840 feet long). The width of the dock at floor level is 100 feet clear and at the coping 128 feet. The entrance has a width of 96 feet. The depth from floor to high-water level is 37 feet 6 inches and to the copings 43 feet 6 inches.—Daily Mail, April 1.

**IS MUCH IMPROVED.**—The young man Ring who was one of the crew of the S. S. Newfoundland taken to Hospital Hill of smallpox, and who it is thought was very ill and in danger from the disease, is greatly improved and there is now hope for his speedy recovery.

It measures 600 feet by 150 feet, and eighty men are required to handle this ten ton of material. Costumes From 5s. to £120. All the dresses, armor, and so on, to be used in the Pageant of London have been made by hundreds of hands employed by the Festival of Empire, and this means that the work is not only all that it should be, but performers gain their costumes at cost price. The costumes range in price from 5s. to £120, the latter being the values of the armor and decorations to be worn by Lord Howard de Walden as the Black Prince. Some of the ladies, whilst appearing as grand dames of the past, will use real jewellery of great value. It should be noted that while the 15,000 Pageant performers are giving their services in this splendid "living history book," work is found for many who need it. Some hundreds of ex-soldiers have been engaged to form marching armies of various periods, and the staff of grooms, dressers, property men, wardrobe attendants, electricians and scene shifters numbers quite 500. The Pageant is the cause of money going to far off parts of the Kingdom. For 500 horses and 500 cattle are being acquired for use upon this great grass stage in the Crystal Palace grounds. The Council of the Festival have decided to use both electricity and high pressure gas in order to turn the Palace into a fairyland of light. In the terraces and principal avenues there will be 400 high pressure lamps mounted upon lofty standards, each gas mantle being of 1,500 candle power. Hundreds of thousands of smaller lamps will be used to outline the various Government buildings, and the other 300 structures dotted about the noble Park. Mr. Albion T. Snell, M. Inst. C.E., M.L.E.E., the eminent Consulting Engineer, says that the illumination of the grounds as viewed from the upper terrace will be magnificent, and in many respects unrivalled. The interior of the Palace will be brilliantly lighted in the south transept and adjacent courts by large arc lamps, and in the north positions there will be placed Messrs. Oliver's newest pattern Oriolite electric arc lamps, and the latest type of Messrs. Keith Blackman's high pressure gas lamps. Engineers and others interested in public lighting will thus be able to compare the relative effects of these illuminants, and it is believed that the tests between electricity and gas will be of great value to Municipal Corporations and other authorities. A power station erected in the grounds and containing machinery aggregating 3,000 horse power, will form a very interesting exhibit. A Pleasing Event. The members of the T. A. & B. **Is It to Be Permanent?**

We are aware that both of the Government organs have referred to the smallpox observation hospital as a temporary structure, and we do not doubt that the statement was made by them in good faith; but there is a strong and persistent belief abroad, how it has originated we do not know, that the erection is to be a permanent structure. We mention this rumor in order to give the Government an opportunity to contradict the statement if it is not true. We take this course because the public interest demands that the public shall know the full intent of the Government, candidly and without equivocation. We also draw the attention of the City Council to the matter, in order that the Municipal authorities may deal with the matter, for we presume that the authorization of the Deputy Mayor, for whatever it may be worth, will come up for ratification or rejection, and when the vote is taken Councilors will have in mind whether they purpose to ratify an erection of a temporary nature or of a permanent character. If the Government is in a position to state definitely that the building will be destroyed in a few weeks, this will do much to allay the anxiety of the neighbourhood. In any case, it will be for the City Council to insist on its removal within a short time.

When the enterprise was entered upon, it was currently understood that the building would be destroyed by fire. The risk of such a proceeding from the vicinity of the new building to the oil stores is in itself enough to scout the probability of such a course, and gives colour to the rumor that the erection is to remain permanently. This view is corroborated by the lavish expenditure of money on the building and the equipment, said to be in the vicinity of \$10,000.

We need hardly point out that if this view is correct it aggravates the outrage and will intensify the resentment of the neighbourhood against locating a Smallpox Observation Hospital near dwelling houses and a public highway.

New Job Created for Eli Whiteway.  
Mr. Gleeson Dismissed for Sake of "Economy."

A few days ago, we learn that John Gleeson was dismissed from his position in the office of Agriculture & Mines on the score of "Economy," though money has been spent like water on party favourites such as Seymour, Deveraux and Downey, though the Premier himself did not balk at taking \$9,000 for his trip over at the Hague. Yesterday the Government gave another exhibition of the Tory brand of Economy when they appointed Eli Whiteway, brother of Mr. Jesse Whiteway, to an office especially created for him and which entails very "arduous" work. Mr. Whiteway is to receive \$600 per year for the duty of seeing patients who come in trains or other conveyances to hospital and escorting others from hospital to trains and steamers. Now we cannot but designate the creation of this office for this man as nothing short of an outrage. Under former Governments, and as a matter of fact for a while at least under the present Government, the members of the various districts have given their services in this respect, cheerfully in the interests of their constituents and free of charge. We believe also that Mr. Jas. Murphy has done some of this work. Will Mr. Whiteway be Mr. James Murphy's assistant? The allocation for this job is utterly unaccounted for and is another instance of the Picnic Party's squandering of the public monies to give sops to party hangers and supporters.

**Bellaventure Arrives**

HAS 22,000 OLD AND YOUNG SEALS

The s.s. Bellaventure, Capt. Job Kneeb, arrived here at 9.50 this morning from the icefields, hauling for between 22,000 and 23,000 old and young seals. The ship in company with the Beothic was the first in the fleet, and striking the N.E. corner of the northern patch on the 15th March about 70 miles to the N.E. of the Groins Islands. The men killed and banded 8,000 on the 16th, and followed up that work until the patch was cleaned up, when she steamed north in search of the old seals. Since then she has been following the old fat and went down about 70 miles north of Belle Isle, and was off the Seal Islands on Labrador. She bore up from there and left the ice at the Funks at 2.30 p.m. yesterday. The captain reports old seals so plentiful that all the ships of the fleet could load with them but that the ice was loose and not many could be killed. When the ship arrived she was visited by Drs. She killed 450 that day and will have a fair trip. The Aurora hauls for 22,000. The Ranger was seen Monday afternoon with 13,000 seals and should arrive here to-night. The Diana was seen recently and looks very deep. The Neptune is reported with about 8,000. Both this ship and the Ranger has a dead man on board. The belief is that the ships now out will get fair trips of old seals.

## Heart's Content Extension vs. Bay de Verde Branch

Editor Evening Telegram:

Dear Sir,—We have just read a letter from Mr. W. A. Munn in reference to the extension of the Railway into Bay de Verde District. If he had simply advocated the Railway to be brought to the thrifty and hard-working people of that District we would not have taken any exception to his remarks, but his endeavour to disparage the extension along the rough shore of Trinity Bay South has stirred the indignation of everyone. From his first paragraph he appears to know more of the Government's plans than the proposed route than some members of the Executive, i.e. if they can be credited with telling the truth; but then we remember Mr. Wille was abroad a while ago, perhaps he was reading law and knows how to interpret the contract, for he says the wording of it can be easily construed to mean its extension to Old Perlican in one direction and Heart's Content in another direction. We have often heard it said that some lawyers can make white black, and black white, and that they will do and say anything to suit their own.

**Selfish Purposes.**

He tries to emphasize what he writes by referring to what he calls the incontrovertible arguments of Rev. Mr. Lench, presumably thinking that his name (Mr. L's) will cast some halo about his letter. There were many things in his letter which could be gainsaid, particularly when he speaks of the population, pointing out that there are five times more people living on the North Shore than on the corresponding shore of Trinity Bay. If these gentlemen had taken a little trouble and looked up the Census Returns for 1901 they would have found the population of that District 9,827 and the population of the District through which the proposed line would be built in this District, or from Head Cove to Broad Cove, was 6,959, a difference of 2,868. According to the contract the Government was to build the Heart's Content Branch from Broad Cove to Grates' Cove, so by its intentions that route would take in a population of 8,370. Mark the difference, gentle reader, five times greater, and yet these writers will tell you in one letter Bay de Verde has a population of 12,000, and in another, 15,000—what mammoth exaggerations. If they try to prove their contentions by births during the ten years they will likely find that the propagation of the race in this District has kept pace at the same ratio, and I question if our emigration has been half as great as theirs. The newly appointed Magistrate has decried of that District retaining its population, and can count many vacant homes. I think the Rev. Mr. Lench should have made himself better acquainted with the route of the Ethie before saying she makes regular calls to places she never enters. Heart's Content, Scilly Cove and Hart's Harbor are her only scheduled ports of call, on this shore and apart from Old Perlican does not Bay de Verde, Northern Bay and Western Bay receive similar visits and like benefits of her services. so large that you should do newspaper, bill board, street car or window advertising, you will find that heat, clean looking printed matter is the best investment. Remember that your competitor can buy the same space in the same newspaper that you can. Whether your advertisement will be more attractive and bring you more business than his, depends entirely on what you say in the space you buy and how you say it.

IMPORTANT.

Simplicity is the most important thing to emphasize in giving instruction to a printer or newspaper as to how your advertisement should appear. Don't allow several different kinds of type, rules around your advertisement, or decorations of any kind, unless they have something to do with what you are talking about. Don't think that because you are paying for space you have to fill it all up. What you want is to get your advertisement read—often times the more white space and the more simplicity, the quicker people will notice and read it.

STICK TO YOUR SUBJECT.

If you are advertising bargains, price is the thing to emphasize. If you are advertising regular goods at regular prices, the thing to talk is quality.

Always emphasize service, mentioning careful attention customers get from your employees, prompt delivery of goods purchased, freedom from mistakes, etc.

Be specific. Tell your your goods are good goods. Don't make claims that are not true.

Straightforwardness and simplicity will attract people quicker than so-called originality. Some advertisements are failures because they are too original.

Don't talk or advertise over people's heads.

Cheer—Confidence—Success. Failure is more often due to lack of ideas than lack of capital.

One idea breeds another. Your employees can help you. Holding trade depends upon your method of doing business.

Use big ideas and small words. City customers walk blocks and country customers drive miles to attend a goodspecial sale.

Everything you say or do advertises you favourably or unfavourably. Good goods attract attention. Good service holds trade.

Respect yourself and others will respect you. Remember that people get impressions from little things.

The interest other people take in your business depends upon the interest you and your employees take in theirs.

See that no mistakes occur in customers' accounts. Politeness, fairness and accuracy attract and hold trade.

Eliminate all unnecessary things that occupy your time and attention. Teach your clerks.

Seven-Deck Liner.

Mr. Alfred A. Booth, at the annual meeting of the Cunard Steamship Company at Liverpool recently, referred to the contract for the new steamer Aquitania, and said they had arrived at the conclusion that she must have seven living decks, against six in the Lusitania and Mauretania. The difficulty of finding dock accommodation for these large vessels had been overcome through the construction of the new Gladstone Dock, which would be completed shortly before the Aquitania was ready for sea, and would be used both as a wet dock and dry dock.

The delay in embarking the mails at Queenstown on the westward voyage had been reduced by nearly two hours.

A lasting and satisfactory settlement of the claims of competing lines, Mr. Booth said, could perhaps only be arrived at after another war rate.

A dividend of 5 per cent. was declared.

PERSONAL NOTES.

Const. P. O'Neill who has been doing special duty at St. Bride's since September, returned here by Monday night's train, and will resume duty in the city.

Const. E. Lawlor who did duty as Health Inspector while Inspector O'Brien was ill, and did good work has resumed duty in the police force.

Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, April 18. Assurances by the Mexican Government that it will adopt a definite restriction policy along the border, and news that the rebel forces had evacuated Agua Prieta, have done much to relieve the tension under which President Taft and the members of his administration have laboured during the last few days. These assurances followed demands by the State Department that fighting, which endangered American lives in the border towns, must be stopped. That the situation is not now regarded as acute is evidenced by the fact that leaders in the Senate and House of Representatives, with whom the President conferred prior to the assembling of the Cabinet, declared that no action would be taken by Congress. To callers, President Taft said there was no intention to intervene in Mexico. The two big developments of that morning had strengthened him in that position. An attack on Ciudad Juarez, in Mexico, is momentarily expected, according to despatches from the United States Consul there. The Consul reports that he has asked Colonel Sharpe to keep Americans from crossing the Rio Grande during the progress of the battle.

LONDON, April 18. The Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, Home Secretary, introduced into the Commons to-day an Aliens Bill, which, if enacted, will markedly change the attitude of the Government towards those who have sought the British shores as political or criminal refugees. The Home Secretary disclaimed any desire to interfere with the right of asylum for persecuted ones, but under the proposed law, aliens hereafter arriving in Britain will be required to furnish securities for good behaviour for five years. If that time can establish that they have been law-abiding during the probationary period, they will be exempt from further bonds. The carrying of pistols, un-authorized by permission of the police authorities, is prohibited.

AGUA PRIETA, April 18. The rebel army, after eighteen hours' fighting in defence of this town, evacuated it during the night. The national troops entered at dawn. It is believed that the rebels had exhausted their ammunition.

CORK, Ireland, April 18. The fifth cigar supply coming through the States from Porto Rico has been cut off owing to the continued strike of the cigar makers.

Vision of Crime.

Sentence on "Second Sight" Evidence.

Probably for the first time in history a man has been convicted of murder on the strength of a vision. The evidence heard in the trial at New Jersey of William Strong, a farmer, who was accused of murdering his wife, suggested an episode as bizarre and terrible as the famous dream scene in "The Belles" so magnificently played by the late Sir Henry Irving.

Mme. Pauline Girard, a clairvoyant, was the chief witness for the prosecution. On her evidence, despite the protest of counsel for the accused, Strong was convicted recently.

Mme. Girard calls herself a "psychometrist." Her method is to hold in her hand a trinket belonging to the person concerned, on which, she declares, a vision of his past arises before her. Strong was persuaded to visit her, and while she invoked a vision, two detectives hidden behind a screen in her parlour watched the effect on the accused.

In her evidence the clairvoyant described the murderer of her client's wife as wearing glasses and having fair hair. "He sat on the corpse for a long while," she went on dreamily.

Vaccination for Plague

The fact that a number of English, French, and German doctors, who left Paris last week for Harbin, in Manchuria, in order to fight the plague now raging there, were vaccinated against that dread complaint before setting out, serves as a reminder of how widespread is now the custom of combating disease by this means.

We have not yet, it is true, got so far as to vaccinate people against household's knees or ingrowing toenails. But vaccination against typhoid fever, carbuncles, influenza, hydrophobia, and a whole host of other more or less serious ailments, is now an accomplished fact. Even cancer has been so combated, and successfully.

The principle, of course, is in every case the same. A person is purposefully infected with a disease in a mild form, in order that when he catches it in the ordinary way, if ever he does, its severity may be modified. It is, in short, a case of fighting plague with plague, small-pox with small-pox, and so on.

The germ of the disease is cultivated artificially through successive microscopic generations, becoming less and less deadly with each remove from the parent stock, until eventually it can be introduced into the human system without causing anything worse than a slight temporary indisposition.

A typical case of this is afforded by the small-pox germ in ordinary vaccination, whose original power for evil has been so weakened as to interfere scarcely at all with the patient's general health, while conferring almost complete immunity against small-pox, at all events for a considerable time.—P. W.

The King and the Peers

The King's consent to the introduction of Lord Lansdowne's Bill for the reform of the House of Lords was announced in that House yesterday, April 18th, in the following message from His Majesty:—"I have received your Address, and, relying upon the wisdom of my Parliament, I desire that my prerogatives and powers in so far as they relate to the creation of peerages and the is-

struction of their capital buildings. The cost of the Coronation to the State, according to a "white paper" just issued, is estimated at \$25,000, which is just \$30,115 more than the cost of King Edward's Coronation, nine years ago.

Prices for seats along the Coronation Route are now announced, and range from one to five guineas.

The Isle of Man (G. B.) has had in force for 200 years a law fixing 6 per cent, as the highest rate of interest that can be charged on a loan. In the Isle of Man every woman has a parliamentary franchise. The Manx were many years ahead of the English in prohibiting the sale of cigarettes and liquor to children. Every widow has the income of half the personal estate of her husband and a life interest in his real estate.

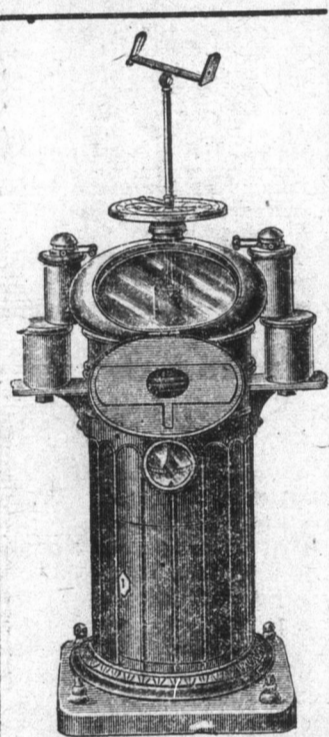

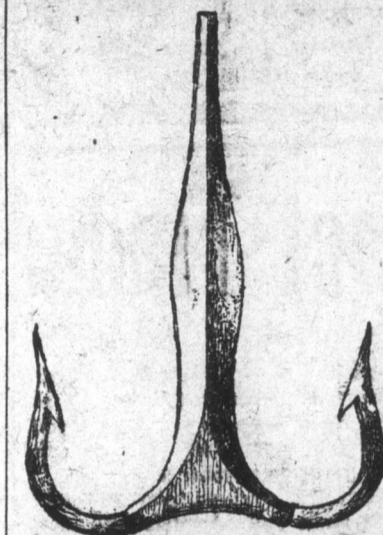
