Yesterday the Evening Chronicle announced that the Governor and the Prime Minister had been invited by the Government of Nova Scotia to attend the dedication at Halifax of the National Memorial Tower by the Governor General, H. R. H. the Duke of

that His Excellency has accepted the itation and will proceed to Halifax by H. M. S. Sirius, but that the Prime Minister has not accepted the invitation and will not attend that function

In view of the object of the Memorial Tower, it is a matter of satisfaction if only for the sake of his education on responsible Government that His Excellency has seen fit to accept the invitation. On the other hand, it is a matter of some regret, for the same reason, that the Prime Minister has

The object of the Memorial is to commemorate the granting of responsible Government to Nova Scotia, and other Colonies, and should serve to emphasize the main principles of responsible government on the minds of

those who attend. It may be objected that Sir Edward Morris has been actively connected with responsible government for more than a quarter of a century, that there is little for him to learn about it, and that the trip would be a picnic and only serve to accentuate the nickname of the party in charge of the

But, after all, these objections are trifles light as air, in view of the pos- entrusted again with an office similar sibilities of the function. The name, to the one he now holds, he may know

brings out so well the characterisof the Government party, that to his education on responsible Gov ernment, the part he played with the Governor on the Morison Memorials shows it sadly defective and in need of much re-furbishing.

As to the benefits, His Excellency may derive from the trip, these ar surely obvious, and need little in the way of elaboration to bring them out. In the first place, His Excellency has not had the advantage of such acquaintanceship with responsible Government as Sir Edward Morris. His experience has been mainly in the Crown Colonies, and we believe this Governorship is the first appointment Had it been otherwise, we cannot be lieve he would have blundered so egregiously in stubbornly insisting on referring the Memorials to a Sccretary of State. He would not have derogated the dignity of his office by attempting to thrust on the Secretary of the Colonies what was constitutionally a matter for the responsible government of which he was the representative of the Crown. He would not have brought about the rebuff given him by the Secretary of State Nor would he have grossly outraged public sentiment by the deplorable decision he gave. He would not have lent such a credulous car to the plea of Mr. Morison, and made such staggering mistakes as he did. It is, therefore, a matter of satisfaction that His Excellency has decided to go to the Halifax function, not that he can show himself as a model Governor of a Colony with a responsible Government. Far otherwise. He has betrayed weakness and little capacity for that office. But he may learn something at Halifax, so that if he is
