The similarity of asking for money and asking for the use of time and talents which are worth money to their possessors, is something of which many people do not seem to be cognizant.

Mrs. L. is the fortunate possessor of a very sweet and well trained voice. Before her marriage she was trained in the use of this talent rather than in the household arts. Consequently she is glad that, although she is not a very economical household manager, she is able to help out her husband's rather slender income by singing. Although she is extremely busy in her home she finds time to hold a church position and has also put her name in an agency which occasionally brings her chances to sing at some entertainments. For this work she gets five to ten dollars a night.

Now Mrs. L.'s friends, who know that the family finances are none too flourishing, would never think of asking her to give five or ten dollars to some pet project, and yet they are perpetually asking her to sing for them, gratis, on this or that occasion. And what else does that mean than asking her to give five or ten dollars worth of time and talent?

Why is it, I wonder, that artistic talents, that is, the ability to sing, or play some instrument, or read well, or entertain in any other way, are thus regarded by people's friends as public property? We would never think of asking the clever dressmaker to give several dollars worth of time toward making a gown to be sold at

the Fair for the benefit of the Some-thing of Something. And yet Mrs. L. sang twice at that fair, and two other artists are dependent for their bread and butter on her talents, were held up by friends to give their services.

"But you say, 'Just think what a very few minutes it takes Mrs. L. and those others to sing or play. That isn't asking too much, is it?'" Ah, my friend, you forget something. Mrs. L. and the other artists did not give merely the ten or fifteen minutes of time and the modicum of effort which were represented by the actual performance. They gave also the hours of preparation required by even the most skillful performers to prepare an entertainment, and furthermore, they were giving a due share and proportion of the lifetime investment of effort and time and money which they had put into cultivating talents.

To be sure, there are some artists who like nothing better than the opportunity to appear in public, who ask no other remuneration than a goodly meed of flattery and the joy of being the "cynosure of neighboring eyes." I don't doubt that there are even some who would be glad to pay for this pleasure if that were allowable.

But that is another story. Mrs. L. does not belong to this class. Many of the artists who are continually hounded by thoughtless friends do not belong to it.

So be a little less glib in your assurances to the committee that you are sure you can get Mr. A. to read, or Mrs. B. to sing, or Miss C. to play the violin, at the entertainment. Perhaps you can hold them up at the pistol point of your impertinence. But do you want to do it?

Household Notes.

Put a little ammonia in the warm water used to wash paint. Dish towels should be washed and scalded every day and dried in the sun to keep them sweet.

If butter becomes a little strong, it should be worked over and slightly salted. This will restore the sweetness.

A delicious simple salad can be made of sweet peppers, shredded together with sliced tomatoes and served with French dressing.

To clear a room of mosquitoes, put half a teaspoonful of oil of lavender in a cup of boiling water. No mosquito can endure it.

If you wish to preserve the delicate green of fresh peas or beans, put a tiny pinch of soda into the water in which they are boiled.

### The Governor Goes to Halifax.

Yesterday the Evening Chronicle announced that the Governor and the Prime Minister had been invited by the Government of Nova Scotia to attend the dedication at Halifax of the National Memorial Tower by the Governor General, H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught.

The Government press announced that His Excellency has accepted the invitation and will proceed to Halifax by H. M. S. Sirius, but that the Prime Minister has not accepted the invitation and will not attend that function. In view of the object of the Memorial Tower, it is a matter of satisfaction if only for the sake of his education on responsible Government that His Excellency has seen fit to accept the invitation. On the other hand, it is a matter of some regret, for the same reason, that the Prime Minister has declined it.

The object of the Memorial is to commemorate the granting of responsible Government to Nova Scotia, and other Colonies, and should serve to emphasize the main principles of responsible government on the minds of those who attend. It may be objected that Sir Edward Morris has been actively connected with responsible government for more than a quarter of a century, that there is little for him to learn about it, and that the trip would be a picnic and only serve to accentuate the nickname of the party in charge of the Government.

But, after all, these objections are trifles light as air, in view of the possibilities of the function. The name,



LONDON, To-Day.

While it is practically certain the Prime Minister will not visit Canada Churchill according to the Telegraph is considering the invitation and will likely go to Canada in the Autumn. No formal invitation not yet been issued but it is said if the Canadian Premier is assured the proposal would be viewed favourably an official invitation will be extended to the British Ministers willing to go to Canada. The telegraph repeats report that Bryce, British ambassador to the states will not return. The Telegraph says a question to Bryce's retention of his post will be asked in Parliament.

**RAINY RIVER, Ont., To-day.**—Durnan Champion professional oarsman of America, defeated Hackett of Minnesota by seven lengths in a three miles course with time 20 minutes 49 seconds.

**TOKIO, To-day.**—The business of the capital and generally throughout country which came to a standstill with the death on Tuesday of the Emperor has been resumed. Emperor Yoshihito having expressed the desire that there should be no further cessation, owing to losses entailed by it on poor people and its interference with international exchanges. Emperor Yoshihito has issued an edict proclaiming his accession to the throne.

WASHINGTON, To-Day.

Unless Congress takes action to provide for the operation of the Panama Canal at the present session, Taft and Secretary of War Stimson believe it will be practically impossible for the army engineers to keep their promise to open the big ditch to ships of the world next year. According to information brought to the White House yesterday, the prospect of action by Congress on canal legislation this session is growing dimmer. Stimson was understood to believe there is little contention over proposed administration and operation of the canal, but the question of tolls and of railroad owned steamships have stirred up controversy in both Houses, and to-day neither the President nor the Secretary of War are hopeful of settling it.

### Murder as a Fine Art,

OR HOW THEY "CROAKED" ROSENTHAL.

(The New York American.)

I. Rosenthal, gambler and criminal, "squealed." He told how Police Lieut. Becker, in charge of a police squad, became his partner, how he had shared his profits, how they finally quarrelled. Rosenthal next made trouble for Becker among other gamblers. Becker then tried to drive him out of New York. Lieutenant Becker kept a policeman within the doors of Rosenthal's dwelling, 24 hours a day, in night-hour watches, for 90 consecutive days and nights. This was not execution of the law. It was lawless police oppression. Rosenthal was not ever under indictment.

II. On the 90th day of this oppression the worm, Rosenthal, turned. He talked to the newspapers. His charges were corroborated in part by public records. He said Lieutenant Becker loaned him \$1,500 and had taken 30 per cent. of the gambling profits. Becker had assigned Jack Rose, he said, to deal in Rosenthal's house and to collect for Lieutenant Becker.

III. A chattel mortgage securing this \$1,500, loaned to Rosenthal, was drawn by Lawyer Robert H. Hibbard, of 22 Broadway. The money was taken to the lawyer's office by Rose, Becker's man. Lawyer Hibbard tells the grand jury he heard that Becker, and not Rose, furnished the money, but he did not know. Hibbard, the lawyer, had acted for Lieutenant Becker's wife and for Becker's brothers in other transactions.

IV. Rosenthal's charges led Commissioner Waldo to telegraph to District Attorney Whitman at Newport, asking him to investigate them. Mr. Whitman returns by the next train to New York and hears Rosenthal's story. Rosenthal promises to produce the next day six or seven other gamblers to corroborate his charges. Even while Whitman is listening to Rosenthal's story the police are busy collecting evidence to drive Rosenthal out of town. The chief police agent in getting this evidence is Lieutenant Becker's friend, Jack Rose.

Rose goes to Rosenthal's first wife, Dora Gilbert, now living an exemplary life at 151 East 27th street. She is forced to tell a long, revolting, hideous story and swear to it—1,500 words—for use as a weapon against Rosenthal. Rose does this. News of this affidavit is sent to Rosenthal.

V. But Rosenthal, though a gambler and a criminal, seems not to have been a coward. He announced that he would tell District Attorney Whitman all he knew about the police the next morning and would produce six witnesses to corroborate him.

VII. What does Lieut. Becker's friend Rose next do? He acts promptly. He engages automobile No. 41,313, owned by Libby & Shapiro, two confidants of gamblers. It goes first to Pugilist Starkey's saloon, on East 14th street, near Third avenue, where it picks up two men with Rose. Thence it goes up town to "Bridgy" Webber's gambling house, northwest corner of Sixth avenue and 42nd street, where Rose leaves the automobile and enters Webber's alone at midnight. Auto 41,313 then goes up town to Rose's brother's house, in West 145th street, where it picks up two more men, names unknown. The auto then speeds down Broadway to Longacre square, turns east into 43rd street and stops a few doors east of Broadway, near the Metropole.

VIII. Rosenthal has been called to the Metropole. He sits in the cafe at 12:30 a.m.—waiting. He smokes, but does not drink. He sits—waiting. Finally some one who knows him well enters and says: "Hello, Herman."

some one at the door wants to speak to you." As he crosses the threshold in the glowing white light of Broadway—the street that knows no night—four men surrounded him and he is shot dead. Automobile 41,313, with both side doors left open by the assistants, waits half a block away. The assistants return to it and speed away. Not even the number of the car is taken by policemen, five of whom were there within fifteen seconds. District Attorney Whitman says after investigation: "Not even a serious effort to pursue the murderers was made."

IX. But Bridgy Webber, whose house, three blocks away, Rose had entered barely an hour before, is near the Metropole, and is one of the first to "hear" of the assassination, and he slips around the corner—possibly back to his own house—to report to Rose what the assassins did and how they did it.

X. Two innocent bystanders had, however, caught the number of the assassins' auto. One of them went to the 47th street station, reported the number and was locked up for his trouble, and the number was put down erroneously on the police blotter by the officer in charge. The other witness, Cope, gave the number of the auto to the reporters, and so it got out! The arrest of the chauffeur and owner of the car then speedily followed.

XI. It transpired 24 hours later that Lieut. Becker's friend Rose had hired the car. Was Rose then hunted by the police like a dangerous wild animal? Was a general alarm sent out for his arrest? No. It was not necessary. The police knew exactly where he was. Lieut. Becker slipped to Far Rockaway. Rose was there. Or in seclusion. Commissioner Dougherty's official statement put it: "We sent word to Rose to come to Police Headquarters." Rose marched up to police headquarters yesterday, alone and unframed.

He is now at the Tombs.

The gambler, Rosenthal is dead—and buried—where he can tell no more tales.

HALIFAX, July 31. The Duke and Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia landed in Pictou to-day, and were welcomed by thousands. They were received by the Mayor and presented with addresses. The Duke unveiled two tablets, one to the memory of Sir William Dawson, geologist, once Supt. of Education in Nova Scotia and principal of McGill University, the other to the Duchess and Princess took an auto drive, incognito, through the country with McDonald, M. P. Thursday the Royal party will go to New Glasgow and Truro, returning to Pictou the same evening, and proceeding by steamer on Friday morning to Sydney arriving there the same evening. A cable from Newfoundland announces that the Governor of the Colony is coming to Halifax to meet the Royal party there.

SHANGHAI, July 31. It is reported that Dr. Sun Yat Sen and Gen. Huang Shing who was Minister of War in the Provisional cabinet have concluded negotiations for the establishment in Shanghai of a foreign and Chinese Bank with a capital of ten million dollars, their object being to checkmate the proposed foreign loan.

LONDON, July 31. The House of Commons has passed the second reading of the seal-fishing bill giving effect to the convention between Great Britain, the United States, Russia and Japan to prevent the extermination of seals in the North Pacific.

WASHINGTON, July 31.  
By a vote of 127 to 107 the House of Representatives refused to agree to the Senate's amendment to the Excise Tax Bill providing for a repeal of the Canadian Reciprocity.

WASHINGTON, July 31.  
A new revolution has broken out in Nicaragua. The captain of the United States gunboat at San Juan del Sur, has advised the navy department that Managua, the Nicaragua capital, was attacked on July 29th, and is now cut off from communication.

NEW YORK, July 31.  
The New York Yacht Club has received word that King George has presented a cup to the club to take the place of the cup presented by the late King Edward, the cup to be raced for each year at the finish of the club's cruise off Newport.

LONDON, July 31.  
The House of Commons passed a resolution of sympathy on the death of the Emperor of Japan. Premier Asquith described the reign of the late Emperor as "one of the most memorable in modern history. There was no other ruler," he declared, "within whose reign such vast progress had been made."

**Special to Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, July 31.  
Harold Spender, writing editorially in the "Daily News-Leader" on the subject of Cabinet control of foreign affairs in connection with the overseas dominion, points out how peace or war was practically in the hands of the cabinet, although it is even possible that war might be declared by the Prime Minister alone.

"Therefore," argues Spender, "if the dominions were given statutory voice they would actually possess more powers than the House of Commons."  
The article proceeds to speak of the remarkable change in the attitude of the British Government and then says: "If Canada is to have a voice it is certain that other dominions must also have a similar concession and a council will have to be formed on all important questions of foreign policy, and if there is any reality in the plan of the British Cabinet, it will be impaired to that extent that a blow will be struck at the British Parliament from which the Cabinet is drawn. Would this fundamental change in the Government make for Peace or War? Restraints on war arise chiefly from a fear of the consequences of war, but the dominions are so far removed from the probable centre of any European war that they would be far less liable to the restraint."  
"It is perfect natural," continued Spender, "that Britain should rejoice at the willingness of the Dominions to help her both in defence and offence, but it was a dream of the earlier school that the British Empire should be a league of peace."

**Special to Evening Telegram.**  
WASHINGTON, July 31.  
The Senate Foreign Affairs Committee to-day agreed to recommend the ratification of the treaty signed on July 20 by the United States and Great Britain, promulgating the fishery regulations in Newfoundland waters.  
The treaty carries out, with some modifications, the methods and procedure recommended by the Hague Tribunal on September 7th, 1910. It provides that all future laws or rules for the regulation of the fisheries by Britain, Canada or Newfoundland, such as those which relate to the time and methods of taking fish, shall be promulgated and come into operation within the first fifteen days of November in each year. After a year intervenes, a change in date may be made the subject of negotiation, and if necessary, of submission to a committee.

After the promulgation of new rules, the United States is given forty-five days in which to object, and the objection may be submitted to a permanent mixed fishery committee. This committee is to consist of three members appointed for five years, one of whom shall be an expert from Great Britain, and one from the United States respectively.  
The recommendations of the Hague Tribunal regarding the determination of the limits of bays enumerated in the award, was adopted so far as they related to bays contiguous to the territory of the Dominion of Canada. It was expressly asserted that the two nations understood the award did not cover Hudson Bay; and it was further agreed that the delineations of the bays on the Newfoundland coast, whether mentioned in the recommendations or not, did not require present consideration.

# CABLE NEWS.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
LONDON, July 31.  
Winston Churchill will decide in a day or two regarding his visit to Canada during the parliamentary vacation. In the event of satisfactory arrangements being made, the First Lord would leave during the first week in August.

The Daily Mail states it is understood that Premier Asquith and Churchill will visit Canada after Borden has returned home. In the event that the journey was made in one of British Dreadnoughts, the visit might be made the occasion for an imperial demonstration, declared the Mail, and Quebec, out of compliment to the French Canadians, would be an ideal place for landing. Any reserve that may have been felt by any section of the French Canadians ought to be removed by the speeches which have welcomed Borden and his colleagues in France. France will be the first to encourage them in any decision that will strengthen the naval power of Britain, for upon that power and upon the army of France rest the foundations of an understanding which is the assurance of peace, declares that er.

**Special Evening Telegram.**  
WASHINGTON, July 31.

That the Monroe doctrine forbids the United States to permit any foreign nation to acquire a Naval base at Magdalena Bay or at other similarly situated points on the American continent is understood to be the substance of a report to be made by Senator Lodge to the Senate Committee on foreign relations.  
It is understood the report will be a strong reaffirmation of the Monroe doctrine. President Taft, at the time the Magdalena Bay resolution was made public, stated no evidence was to be found that the Japanese Government itself was behind the corporation endeavoring to secure land as a naval base.

**TOKIO, July 31.**

The "Era of Traiser"—Great Righteousness—has commenced, the "Era of Meiji—Intelligent Administration"—having closed with the accession of Yoshitito.  
The death of the Emperor, while causing widespread grief, had small effect on the normal condition here. There has been a remarkable absence of demonstrations of any kind, and aside from the closed banks and commercial houses, the crepe bound flags at every entrance and the evident signs of mourning by foreigners and natives alike, the nation is moving along with its accustomed business.  
The Emperor Yoshitito is occupied with business of State and has appointed the chief official of his household. It is understood no special session of parliament will convene.

**LONDON, July 31.**

It is reported in armour plate circles that for some months past the firm of Krupp had been engaged in the manufacture of guns and munitions for a new squad of battleships for Germany. It is understood that during the last three weeks, plates for these ships have been received from England. The importance of this information consist in the fact that in the event of Germany forcing the pace either for herself or the other members of the triple alliance, a fresh battle squadron of nine ships could be ready within a year or at the most in eighteen months. It is understood that the action which has been taken is the reply to Churchill's speeches since his accession to office. If nine new ships were added to the German fleet, the comparison for 1914 would stand as follows: Germany, 38; Britain, minimum, 33, maximum, 41.

**LONDON, July 31.**

Rt. Hon. Sydney Buxton, President of the Board of Trade, announced in the House of Commons to-day that the Board had made new rules governing life-saving precautions on merchant vessels, based on the recommendations of the Committee which had considered the Titanic disaster.


**LONDON, July 31.**

Three were wounded by bullets and many others seriously injured as a result of rioting at the Victoria Docks this morning.  
Two thousand former strikers appeared for work at the docks, and were attacked by a mob of strikers. Bullets, bricks and stones flew in all directions. The police were taken completely by surprise, only a dozen patrolmen being present, and they were powerless to face the huge crowds.  
Riotous outbreaks also occurred at several other docks. Groups of sailors attacked ships on which non-striker men had gone to work, and as a result minor fires were numerous. The police finally quelled the disturbance, and at noon were in control of the situation. One wounded man has since died in hospital, and twenty are seriously injured.

# The Great American Dessert

Pie is a three-cornered slab of robust dessert, and when eaten in large quantities produces a feeling of satisfaction akin to pain.  
This is particularly true of green apple pie, a deadly concoction which leaps upon the small boy with the utmost ferocity and causes him to writ in the despairing accents of the cholera infantum.  
Pie is served in triangular form for the accommodation of people who believe that fingers were made before forks, or who prefer to attack it with a knife.  
Some people have a strong aversion to pie in any form, and can seldom be induced to quench their thirst with it. Others will sit down at the breakfast table and subdue a large cream pie without exhibiting any remorse or other serious consequences whatever.

Since the canned prune has taken the place of the succulent dried apple, the old-fashioned pie which would melt in your mouth if you waited long enough has become simply a heart burning memory. Pies used to be made by mother out of butter crust and real fruit, and were adorned with ornamental fluting and hand-tooled monograms on the upper lid. The modern pie springs from the lard pail and the withered apricot, and is made in various stock patterns, ranging from the imitation quince to the counterfeit huckleberry. The crust of one of these pies can be bent back like the top of a sardine can without affecting its hardy and intrepid nature in the slightest.

The most melancholy figure in the whole realm of culinary art is the dejected mince pie, which is served with great abandon at Christmas time. Three or four of these pies, eaten in wait time, will cause a man to dream of everything except paying his debts.  
Another delcency is the black raspberry pie, which abounds in elusive seeds and clothes the teeth in dark funeral garb.  
All of the most durable pie-eating contests have been made with the use of the cafeteria pie, which is rolled thinner than a lean man in a subway crusher.


