A New Point of View

By RUTH CAMERON.



A great deal of this talk about the tremendous debt children owe their fathers and mothers is nonsense. The children do not ask to be born; the father brings them into the world of their own accord, and in doing so they take upon themselves the duty of caring for the children until they are able to take care for themselves.

"More family happiness is wrecked by the selfishness of older people who try to impose their narrow and old-fashioned ways upon the younger generation, and to interfere in the lives of married sons and daughters, than in any other way."

"All the return a father or mother ought to ask from grown up sons and daughters is love and appreciation, and of course, when that is necessary, financial assistance. They have no right to ask that the children shall live with them to keep them from being lonely, or shall alter the course of their lives for their convenience."

The above opinions were expressed to me by a woman the other day. No, she is not a young wife made resentful by interference from the older generation.

Quite the contrary. For she, herself, belongs to the older generation in years, although emphatically not in thought. She has brought up six children: one is just married; another is about to marry and a third is likely to marry soon.

If her words had been inspired by the hot resentment of youth or by personal inconvenience, they would weigh much; but they are her honest and cold-blooded opinion of the faults of the class to which she belongs. And because of that, I think they are a point of view well worth considering, although I must admit I combated them warmly when I heard them.

Personally, I don't believe—as I have said elsewhere in this column—that a girl needs to cease being a daughter when she becomes a wife, or that a man needs to forget he is a son the moment he becomes a husband.

Nor do I think that the young people who trample indifferently upon the happiness of the old folks in their mad race for happiness for themselves, will find that happiness very satisfying when they clutch it.

But on the other hand, the older folks certainly ought not to forget that the young people have their own lives to mould, and they ought to give them every chance to do this in their own way. If the older folks were unhampered in their youth, they ought to want to give their children as good a chance; and if the older folks, themselves, suffered from excursions and interferences in their young married lives, they ought to have learned from their own suffering a sympathy that would make them determine not to inflict such suffering on their beloved children.

We talk a great deal about the selfishness in the young. Let us not forget that selfishness in old people is even more ugly.

Restored to Parents

Gypsies' Captive Home After Seventeen Years—The Boy, Who Was Stolen from Lachine When a Little Lad, Owes His Return to the Fact That An Old Woman Kept a Page With the Name of His Home Written On It.

The mystery has been cleared up. The boy Patrick, many times lost, strayed and stolen, who kept Lachine and the Valley of Silence at Akka ago, for many weeks, has found his parents. He is said to be living happily with them at Potsdam, New York, from which place he was originally stolen from gypsies.

Some gypsies travelled through the Montreal district a couple of months ago, and about a month or six weeks ago a young named Patrick, ragged and uneducated, turned up, hungry and useless, for he apparently had been taught no trade of any kind, in the vicinity of Lachine.

Here he was taken in charge by Chief of Police Robert, to whom he told how he had escaped from a band of gypsies and had stolen a ride on a St. Lawrence River freight boat, which had turned him off at the Lachine wharf.

Chief Robert did not know what to do with him, as he did not seem to be able to read or write and absolutely had no idea of whom his people were, having been with the gypsies for seventeen years. Therefore the chief sent him to Oka, the Trappist Monastery, and the monks gladly welcomed him, gave him some light work, and named him Antoine Oyer, as he came to them when their honored Abbott Dom Antoine Oyer died.

His story at the time was published in the daily press with a picture of him, and this attracted the attention of his people, who wrote to the chief. The chief told them that the best thing that they could do was to come here.

She had a great affection for him in her own peculiar way, which might have been returned if she had not drunk, smoked a pipe, chewed tobacco and beaten him when he cried for his home and mother in Potsdam.

That real mother, by the way, kept waiting for him to return year after year, and when her husband saw her for prospects ahead somewhere else, she insisted on remaining where they were, as the only place where Frederick if he was alive, and her mother instinct told her he was, would be able to find them.

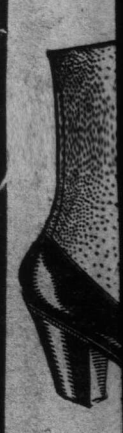

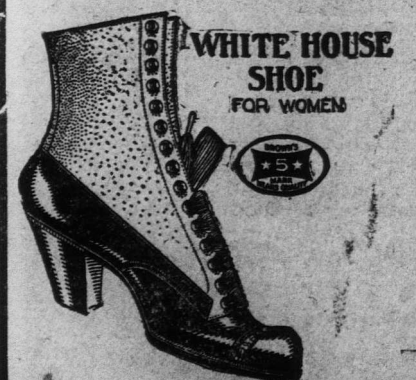

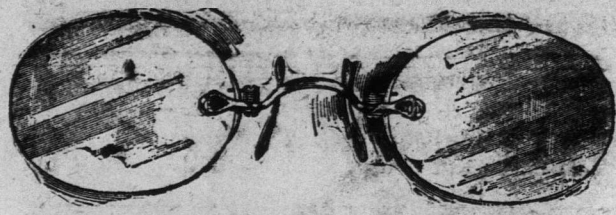

Newfoundland May Take Part

In Extension Movement of School for the Blind.

It has been proposed by the Directors of the Halifax, N.S. School for the Blind, to enlarge its scope of usefulness by extending its benefits to those who by reason of their mature years are unable to attend the institution.

This is known as the Extension Movement of the Halifax School for the Blind, and in connection with this movement, Mr. John Weir, the Travelling Secretary of the institution is now visiting the Colony. His object is to make known the aims and objects of this Extension Movement and to arrange that this Colony may avail of its benefits.

Mr. Weir is a native of Newfoundland and was a student of Bishop Field College. He was subsequently engaged in teaching at Fogo and Port-de-Grave. While at Port-de-Grave his sight failed him completely. Medical aid could do nothing for him. He was then induced to avail himself of the advantages offered by the Halifax School for the Blind, and under the instruction of the world-famed Dr. Fraser, he was enabled within a very short time, to take the position of assistant at the Anglican Church, Dartmouth, N.S., where he remained until appointed Travelling Secretary of the School for the Blind.

Mr. Weir has found, on enquiry, there are 287 blind persons in this Colony, and it is his intention during his limited stay, to visit as many of these as he can in their homes.

We append below a description of the aims and objects of the Extension Movement from the pen of Mr. Weir and bespeak for it a careful perusal. The extension movement in connection with the Halifax School for the Blind, is for the purpose of helping those—the adult blind, by sending to them Home Teachers, through which agency they may arise from their position of inactivity to that of helpfulness, not only to themselves but also to those who may be dependent upon them. The Home Teacher will not only instruct blind persons in their homes, but will also instruct the parents of young blind children, in order to give them practical ideas with regard to the bringing up of their little ones.

The work of alleviating the condition of those to whose lot blindness has fallen in adult life is broad and humanitarian in its scope and must appeal to the sympathy and judgment of all. The loss of sight to one who has arrived at mature years, is indeed a dread calamity, and there is little cause to wonder at the evident despondency of many who are thus afflicted. Their friends witness their suffering without being able to offer either comfort or encouragement. Fathers, with wives and children depending upon them for support, and mothers, with infants and growing families requiring their care, naturally regard the loss of sight as the greatest calamity that could have befallen them, and yet with intelligent

direction, most of these men and women will willingly take up the burden of life anew, and many of them will succeed in discharging their daily duties to the satisfaction of those dependent upon them and to their own great comfort.

The work of Home Teaching has for the past 20 years been quietly carried on as far as the limited income would allow. Many middle-aged and elderly blind people have been taught to read by the sense of touch and have been supplied with books from the Circulating Library of the School. Many of those who have thus been taught by our Home Teachers have been encouraged to resume the active duties of life and have succeeded far beyond their own expectations. One of the first persons who was taught to read was Mr. Andrew Breed, of St. Andrew's, N. B. Mr. Breed was 56 years of age at the time he lost his sight. When our Home Teacher first visited him he was much depressed and took a hopeless view of life. After learning to read and write in the Braille point system, his spirits revived and he determined to do what he could to improve the condition of the blind in his native country. His work in the Soldiers' Homes of the United States, in which there were many blind inmates, and his efforts on behalf of the adult blind of Massachusetts have won for him a continental reputation.

Many letters of appreciation of the Home Teaching work have been received from sightless men and women in all parts of the Maritime Provinces expressing heartfelt gratitude for the privilege of reading for themselves life many religious, biographical, historical and miscellaneous books contained in the circulating library of the school.

What this movement means to Newfoundland will best be appreciated when we state that there are no less than 287 blind persons to be found around its shores.

The Government of this country makes annual provision for the training of 20 of the youthful blind of the Colony at the Central School in Hal-

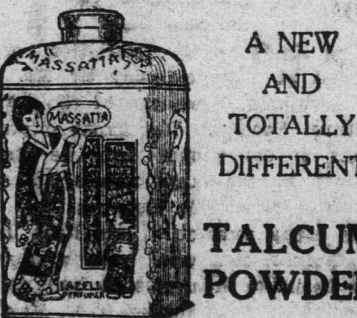

fax, N.S., where exceptional educational advantages are given them.

With regard to literature for the use of these institutions by the Home Teacher—this can be procured free of charge from the Circulating Library of the School. This Library was established in 1881. Beginning in a small way with a very few volumes the Library has been slowly but steadily enlarged. The fund for the establishment and maintenance of this library has been subscribed by public-spirited men and women who have realized with what delight the books have been perused by the graduates of the school and by the adults who have been taught to read in their homes.

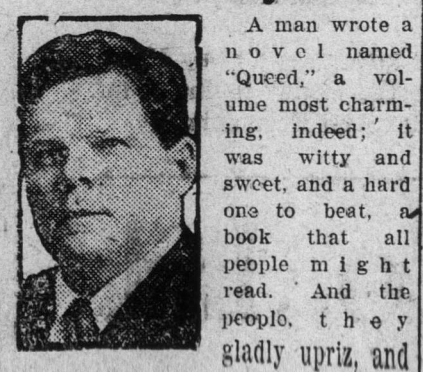
The following is a quotation from the report of the Superintendent of the School in 1882:—
"The inestimable blessing of this library to the blind can only be fully appreciated when we consider the condition of those who lose their sight whilst yet in the prime of life. Suddenly plunged as it were into a new and unknown world in which their whole previous training unites them to dwell, they become, dependent, and sink into a state of the most pitiable and abject helplessness. Fancy, then, what it would be for such persons to have access to a library of religious and instructive books, printed in a system which they might easily learn to read. The very effort of learning to read, and the pleasant occupation thus afforded would tend to draw the mind from the gloomy contemplation of such a deprivation. In more than one instance I have known it to be the means of restoring persons from despondency and stimulating them to such new employment suited to their altered circumstances."

In 1894 the Superintendent writes:—
"Books are like eyes to the blind; they paint in words many grand pictures which stir the imagination and quicken the appreciation of the world without. To learn from these monuments of vanished minds the great truths of nature in a constant joy and delight to one deprived of sight. To be read to aloud by teachers or friends, or to read for themselves from the books in our library, is one of the greatest pleasures that the blind have open to them."

The extension movement of this School must have the hearty endorsement and approval of all public-spirited men and women, and I sincerely ask the kindly help of all in my endeavour to locate and help those afflicted ones of my native home.

Militants Burn Another Station.

London, Nov. 3.—One of the most serious fires which have resulted from the threats of the militant suffragettes to destroy all the railway stations in England occurred at Steatham Hall, a suburb of London, to-day.

Heavy damage was done, and the debris, which fell upon the tracks, held up traffic. Nearby buildings were threatened with destruction. The damage is estimated at \$20,000. Owing to the centennial suffragette outrages, the Duke of Rutland has decided to close Haddon Hall, in Derbyshire, one of the most historic of English mansions.

Maggie Bell Abandoned Crew Safe.

CREW OF FIFTEEN MEN AND TWO WOMEN TAKEN OFF BY AMERICAN VESSEL AT POINT OF STARVING.

Two days and nights with nothing to eat or drink was the harrowing experience of fifteen men and two women who comprised the crew of the schooner Maggie Bell, Parsons, master, which was abandoned at sea yesterday afternoon. The seventeen persons were brought to port this morning by the American vessel W. C. McKay, Capt. Wm. Dean. The W. C. McKay left yesterday morning for Gibraltar with a cargo of fish, ship-maintained by the American vessel. When forty miles to the southeast of Cape Spear the schooner Maggie Bell, flying distress signals, was sighted. The foreign bound vessel, answering the call for help, bore down on the Maggie Bell and learned that she was unable to make port and that the chances of the crew reaching the shore safely without assistance were hopeless. The Maggie Bell belonged to Carbonar and was on her way from the French Shore to the home port with sixty quintals of fish on board. She was caught in the N. E. storm of Sunday last and badly buffeted. Subsequently she met adverse weather and was driven off sea. All her canvas was blown away and the craft was in an awkward plight. She began to labor under bare poles, which was very difficult, but no headway could be made owing to the strong head wind. When hailed by the American vessel the Maggie Bell was drifting about helplessly and practically dismantled. The predicament of the crew was touching in the extreme. These seventeen souls, fifteen men and two women, had nothing to eat or drink for 48 hours previously and very soon after must have perished from starvation, thirst and exposure. They were taken off the vessel and cared for on board the W. C. McKay and were given plenty to eat and drink before being brought to port. The Maggie Bell was abandoned about 40 miles S.E. of this port. The fish cargo was lost as well as a large amount of fishing gear, including three

traps and several seines. After the belongings of the crew were taken out of the Maggie Bell she was set fire to by Capt. Parsons and crew of the ill-fated craft desire to express their sincerest thanks and gratitude to Capt. Dean, of this American vessel, and his crew, who are responsible for saving the 17 Carbonar people from meeting watery graves, and for the acts of kindness shown them during their moments of peril. The shipwrecked crew leave for their homes in Carbonar by this evening's train.

MEXICO CITY, To-day.
Unwilling to admit another failure on the part of Washington to bring about the elimination of Pres. Huerta, John Lind, President Wilson's personal representative, never less failed yesterday to manifest his enthusiasm over the prospect of Huerta giving up office. From his manner and conversation indicated it is believed negotiations are nearing the end. There is nothing at the American Embassy to indicate that a more favourable turn of events is expected. There is reason to believe that an ultimatum in its full diplomatic form will soon be handed to Huerta. The time being brief it is expected the new document will be so written as to bring an end to relations between the two countries before November 22nd, the date fixed for the convening of the new Congress unless Huerta sees fit to agree to the terms of the Washington communication.

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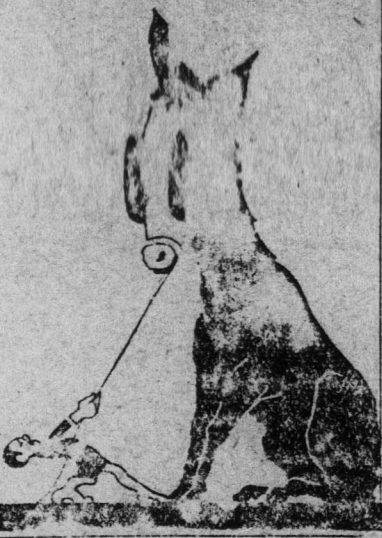

Constantinople.

Constantinople is the capital of the Turkish Empire, and is situated at the extreme eastern end of southern Europe, being quarantined from the rest of the world on three sides by water, and on the fourth by a high brick wall. It contains over 1,000,000 people, and about twice that number of dogs, several of whom are steel and in good health.

Constantinople is a great seaport. It sticks out in the sea of Marmora, and has a harbor six miles long and half a mile wide, like the North River at New York. There is a bridge across the harbour and whenever the nations of Europe have anything else to do they debate over the question of building a draw in this bridge, so as to let the navy of Russia out of the Black sea.

Constantinople has 300 mosques, 1,000 Turkish baths, 10,000 harems and one railroad. The railroad runs up the country to Adrianople, and going down to the 3.45 train is a favor its diversion in Constantinople, just as it is in Padunk. Constantinople also has a street cleaner, but he is very old and feeble, and hasn't worked to years.

When Constantinople became Roman Emperor, he wanted an Eastern capital, and picking out an old used up town named Byzantium he rebuilt it and called it Constantinople. This was about 1,600 years ago. Since then Constantinople has had a varied history, and a great many generals have clumped shot and shell into it at various times. In 1453 the Turks captured it, and stuck a crescent on top of the Church of St. Sophia, which is a lumpy brick and stone structure, about as large as Mount Washington. Ever since then Constantinople has been excessively Turkish. The only plug hat in the town is in the national museum, but the streets assay 1,000 feathers to the block.

Although Constantinople is a strange and foreign city, with uncouth customs and habits which date back a thousand years, life is very safe within its borders. The pedestrian may travel for years without being run down by a street car or automobile, killed by a bolt from a skyscraper, blown up by sewer gas from a manhole or crushed in a subway jam. Once in a while some reckless tourist gets caught in a narrow street and starves before he can be released, but otherwise life is healthy in Constantinople—especially to those who have lost the sense of smell. The city is 1,600 years old, but many of the smells began business before it was built, and are still strong and vigorous.

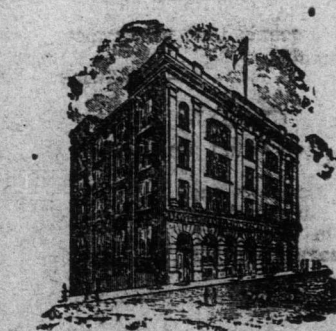
