



Bulgarian Nation Divided and King Lives in Danger.

Thousands of Bulgarian Soldier. Have Deserted and 'Crossed' the Frontier into Roumania - King Ferdinand is in Fear of Assassina-

London, Oct. 26.-In an article in he Daily Chronicle to-day on "The relations between the Bulgarian people and their King." Percival Gibbon says: "The truth is that the Bulgar is very definitely a Slav, not only in tehnological fact, but likewise by sentiment and deliberate choice. The Czar of Russia is head of his Church. The power of Russia is the background of his political imagination. The people of Russia are his racial

and spiritual affinities. . "Ferdinand's failure to impose his personality and his aspirations upon the Court of Petrograd, and his endeavor to substitute alien Austrian for Russia as Bulgaria's friend and protector, reflects themselves now in thousands of desertions of soldiers across the Roumanian frontier, in anti-German riots at Philippopolis, and in the refusal of troops at Varna to resist a Russian landing. There was also the spectacle of the shipwreck of the Balkan coalition, of Ferdinand over-reaching himself, and losing to Greece and Serbia what had been won from Turkey at the cost of so much Bulgarian blood. The defection of General Radko, Dimitrieff supersession of solid and able men of the type of Gueschoff and Daneff. Now even General Savoff has fallen away rather than make his submission to the German officers, who overran the army.





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
