To Avert American Eagle's Extinction

Unrestricted killing of American eagles in Alaska has stirred up a hornet's nest among naturalists and wild life enthusiasts.
The American Nature Association has taken up the cudgels against the law and, as the first move in a campaign for its repeal and for the protection of the rapidly vanishing American eagle, has issued an appeal to every school teacher in the United States to file a protest on behalf of his class.
The law, it is said, was passed on the ground that eagles live on salmon and thereby damage the industry, one of the most important in Alaska. But the Nature Association points out in reply that a salmon dies after spawning and the eagles eat the fish after they have died and after they have perpetuated their kind.

When Silence Ruins Romance

Dorothy Dix on the Lost Art of Conversation.

The thing that often makes marriage a failure is its dullness. The real beauty of the hearth is that awful silence. It is because husbands and wives have nothing interesting to say to each other that they quarrel.
In any theatre or restaurant you can spot the married couples at a glance. They are the couples who are reading the programme from cover to cover between the acts, or are apparently memorizing the menu while the waiter brings their order. The alert, interesting, smiling people who are chatting together are the unwed, or those who are talking to other people's husbands and wives.
Let even a bore drop into a droopy, dejected family circle that has been yawning itself to death, and everybody brightens up and the stream of conversation, which had apparently dried up at its source, begins to flow again.

Silence That Isn't Golden.
Yet the majority of people marry for companionship. Before marriage they could never get enough of each other's society. How is it, then, that after marriage they get so fed up with each other's company that they all like mutes in the solitude of their homes?

Why is it that, apart from fault-finding and complaints about the servants and the tradesmen and the children, there is so little family conversation; practically none that is interesting and cheerful and inspiring? You would think that a husband and wife who have all interests in common could never talk themselves out. But they do, and they come to the place where they take refuge behind the evening paper to save themselves from the pretence of even having to maintain the appearance of keeping up social intercourse.

Wives lay the blame for this state of affairs on their husbands. They say that they would be glad enough to talk, but that you can't maintain a conversation with a person who always grunts by way of reply. Men retort that they have worn their conversational powers to nothing during business hours. Nevertheless, if somebody interesting happens to call, the very man who was silent in his wife's company has plenty to say.
Now there are several reasons why there is so little conversation in the home. The first is because home talk is so often unpleasant. Women, especially, are prone to flavour it with gloom. They like to recite the day's mischances. They spoil the flavour of a dinner by telling how much it cost. They bring on a scene with a child by telling of its naughtiness.
All this gets on the husband's nerves, and he retorts by saying a few pithy things about what a fool a man is to marry and burden himself with a family, and what a poor manager

Doles for the Ugly

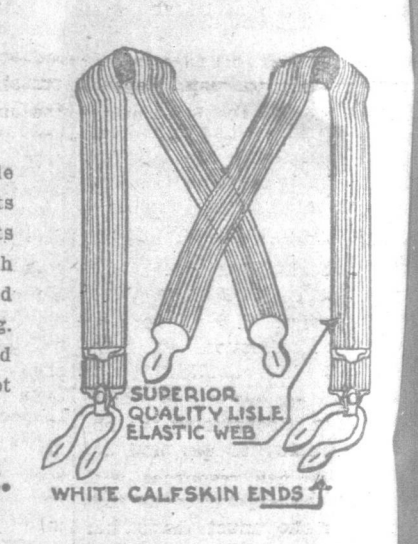

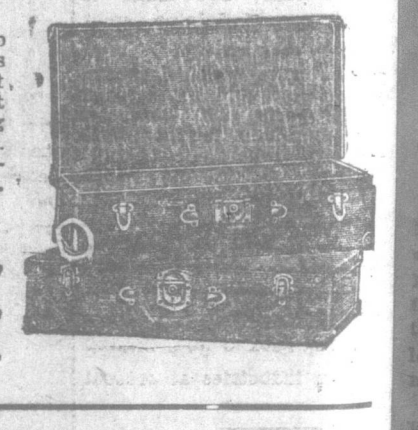

Reparations Expert Committee Recommend Two Years Relief From Payment.

Detained Men Held Responsible for Murder in Montreal Bank Robbery—Hugo Stinnes Seriously Ill—Church Union Bill Withdrawn From Ontario Legislature.

THE DAWES REPORT.

PARIS, April 9. The report of the experts, who have been engaged for the past three months in the task of ascertaining Germany's capacity to pay reparations, was handed to the Reparations Commission to-day. The two committees were under the chairmanship of Brigadier-General Charles G. Dawes and Bernard MacKenna respectively. A business matter heretofore of politics is how the experts describe the task they have just completed. They interpreted the object of their work as tending to the collection of debt, rather than to the application of penalties with a purely economic solution in view. Recognizing the obligation of Germany to pay and declaring that she has resources with which to pay, the experts insist that she does pay she must have her hands clear to exploit her economic resources. They carefully refrain from mentioning the Ruhr, but make it plain that France and Belgium must content themselves with leaving garisons there, if they wish, but take their hands off railroads and industries.

THE DAWES RECOMMENDATIONS.
NEW YORK, April 9. Summarized briefly, the outstanding recommendations in the reports of the Reparations Expert Committee provide for relief for Germany for two years from reparation payments, these to be taken care of by a foreign loan and tax on industries at present non-productive.

KING GEORGE OF GREECE ISSUES PROCLAMATION.
BUCHAREST, Rumania, April 9. King George of Greece, who is residing at Brassø, in Transylvania, has issued a proclamation to the effect:

The second accident occurred on Salisbury Plains, when a machine, handled by Pilot Officer Gold, with a mechanic as passenger, crashed, killing both.

MURDERERS TRAPPED.

MONTREAL, April 9. Giuseppe Serafini and Coro Diego were to-day held criminally responsible for the deaths of Henri Cleroux, bank chauffeur, and Big Paul Stone, drug peddler and bandit, by the Coroner's Jury that investigated their deaths in connection with the \$142,288 robbery of the collection car of the Bank of Hochelaga on April 1st.

UNION BILL WITHDRAWN.

TORONTO, April 9. The Church Union Bill was withdrawn from the Private Bills Committee of the Legislature this morning, on motion of C. B. McKeown, sponsor for the Bill. This meant that no Church Union Legislation would go through the Ontario Assembly at the present session.

BALLOT WILL DECIDE LOCK-OUT.

LONDON, April 9. Lock-out notices will close all the shipping and ship repairing yards in Great Britain, unless the Southampton strikers resume work before tomorrow. A ballot was taken at Southampton yesterday and the result will decide whether or not there will be a lock-out.

POSTAL OFFICIALS COMPLAINT.

LONDON, April 9. Proposal for the affiliation of the workers and controllers of the postal service was decisively rejected at a meeting of representatives of the former here last night. Postal workers, however, made strong remarks with regard to poor wages paid in the postal service.

IRVINE JOINS BESCO.

MONTREAL, April 9. The appointment of Arthur M. Irvine to be General Manager of the coal sales of the British Empire Steel Corporation and its constituent and subsidiary companies has been announced by the President. During the war period Irvine had charge of the Hudson's Bay Company's business in connection with the purchase and shipment of supplies for the French Government.

The Amazing
Boy-Weaver

A CABINET MINISTER WHO EDUCATED HIMSELF AT THE LOOMS.

In the year 1884, a boy of twelve years could be seen hurrying in the early hours of the morning through the streets of Colne to the cotton-weaving sheds in which he was employed. His schooling had been neither better nor worse than that of his workmates, but, little as it was, it had been broken like that of most of the children he knew, in order to exchange the schoolroom for the workroom, mine, or weaving shed.

Money was scarce in his family, and the few shillings he earned through his boyish toil were a welcome addition to the family income.

Study Amidst Machinery's Roar.

Until his youth this manner of living was no different from that of those about him, but the day came when, amidst the clatter and clang of the looms, a stirring began for a life fuller than that which he knew. A hunger grew for books and for knowledge, and soon the weaver became the weaver-student, snatching odd moments when he could to draw some new knowledge from his books. But a stranger thing happened; a desire grew to read and to write in foreign languages, and to learn the literature of other tongues.

Slowly, and at first painfully, in an environment which only the grimmest determination could withstand, with means pitifully small, this young man set to work. To-day he is a member of the British Cabinet, and the weaver-student has become the Rt. Hon. Thomas Shaw, P.C., M.P., C.B.E., and the Minister for Labor.

He has travelled Europe from end to end; he knows the life of every Continental country. How did he gain this invaluable knowledge? The story should inspire all who read it. Walking to the mill at first with French grammar book in his pocket, studying in the meal times while the machinery was stopped and in the evenings by candle light in his bedroom.

A boy-weaver studying French grammar!

But even greater concentration was shown when Tom Shaw wrote out foreign grammatical rules, phrases, and idioms, pinning them to a square board which he afterwards hung in the centre of each time he was tending, so that at any spare moment, even at work, he could learn his self-imposed lessons.

An appointment later as secretary of a weavers' association gave him better conditions to study, but this did not come until, at the loom, he had learned French and had mastered German and gained also a knowledge of Italian. He had never had money to travel, but his reputation as a linguist spread; in the trade union movement, and at conferences abroad, Tom Shaw began to be known.

During the past few years he has acted as secretary of the International Congress of Textile Workers, and at the time of his appointment to the Cabinet he was secretary to the second International, with headquarters at Amsterdam.

Tom Shaw, can now read, write, and speak in the language of nearly every European country, and it is understood that he has also a fair mastery of two Eastern tongues.

A little, thick-set, quiet man, with steady eyes behind round glasses, the story of his success ranks high among the conquests of environment. Tom Shaw did not wait for his opportunities—he made them.

of the Sea

DRAMAS OF THE LIGHTSHIPMAN'S LIFE.

Boo-oo-oom! Then a long-sustained, awe-inspiring note—Wee-ee-ee-ee! The sound, coming at intervals across the fog-shrouded North Sea, is that of the siren of the "Sun" lightship, whose mission it is to warn navigators of the dreaded sandbanks and shoals that fringe the Essex coast.

Out there in the waste of waters, full in the fair-way of passing vessels, the lightship rolls and pitches, saving lives almost every hour of the day and night by keeping ships out of the danger zone, yet always liable to be run down and sunk herself.

Out of Control.

The lightshipman's life is as full of risks as if it were spent like that of any ordinary sea-going man. Collision or broken moorings—either of these catastrophes may happen, in which event the lightshipman is caught like a rat in a trap, powerless to ward off disaster.

There are few lightshipmen on duty around our shores who cannot tell tales of narrowly-averted collisions. A few days ago the crew of a lightship off Harwich saw bearing down on them out of the mist the hull of a big tramp steamer. Her skipper had been caught apparently unawares by the strong currents that swept round the lightship, and his vessel was partly out of control.

The tramp bore straight towards the lightship, whose crew, including those of duty, stood looking on in an agony of apprehension. Would the tramp hit the stationary vessel? The question was answered a moment later when the steamer sliced round, missing the lightship by less than half her own length!

Lashed to Their Posts.

Although to collide with a lightship is one of the most serious of all breaches of the navigator's code, the blame sometimes rests on no one. Some years ago the light of one of our northern lightships failed in a particularly bad storm, in the course of which one man was washed overboard. The light was out for less than an hour, but in that time a sailing ship rammed the lightship, from which the crew were rescued only in the nick of time.

More recently a terrible storm drove a lightship from the Godwin Sands into the Channel, where she drifted as helplessly as a raft. The crew of another lightship saw her swept from her moorings and carried out to sea by the heaviest gale known for years. Those on duty in the second lightship were lashed to their posts on deck, while five out of the seven lights in their lamp were extinguished.

The derelict lightship went ashore in the early hours of the next morning, when it was discovered that her captain was the father of the man who, on the other lightship, had been the first to notice that she was in distress. The captain died as a result of his terrible experience.

The Deserter.


The lightshipman's life is restricted not only by the tiny world in which he lives for two months out of three, but by the regulations relating to his job. Like a soldier on sentry-go, he must in no circumstances desert his ship. The light which he keeps burning in the big crystal globe overhead is of more importance than his own life or that of any other member of the crew. He cannot even go to the aid of a vessel sinking near at hand. More than once lightshipmen have effected rescues, but Trinity House, while not blind to humanitarian principles, does not encourage heroism of this kind.

It says much for the discipline and sense of duty of men in the lightship service that only one case of desertion is on record. A lightshipman, having been informed by letter of his wife's death, lowered a boat and rowed ashore, afterwards taking train to London to attend the funeral. He was severely reprimanded, and would

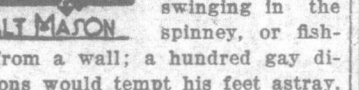

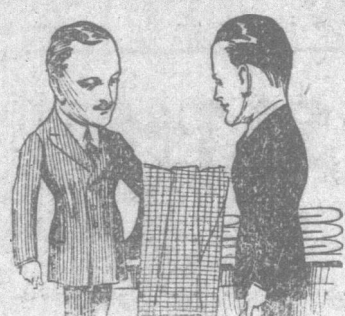

At the annual meeting the proposal to instal an additional machine at the new paper mill in Port Arthur was left to the discretion of the directors.

National Breweries, Ltd.
The annual general meeting of shareholders, held at the head office this week, was confined largely to routine matters. The retiring board of directors were re-elected for the current year without change.

Dominion Cannery, Ltd.
This company has started reconstruction of their factory at St. David's, Ont., which was destroyed by fire last fall, and is also considering erecting a plant at Niagara Falls, Ont., where it has purchased a site.

Montreal Tramways & Power Co. Ltd.
The board of directors are obtaining a special report from legal authorities regarding exact position of the company and its associated concerns. There have been a number of developments within the past 10 years as a result of the different deals carried out in connection with financing.

What directors are endeavoring to determine is just where the parent companies stand and whether all deals that have been carried through in connection with subsidiaries with legal requirements, or if there is chance of their being blocked owing to the fact that necessary procedure was not adhered to. According to report, Hon. C. J. Doherty, former Minister of Justice, is at the head of an organization that is reviewing the entire undertakings of the company from its inception to the present day.

Sergeants' Memorial

As I have wended my way to work this winter I have noticed on a number of mornings that the wreath of artificial poppies which was placed at the base of the Sergeants' Memorial on the anniversary of Armistice Day, November 11th, last year, would be blown from the base and lying in the snow some distance away, or else disappeared by being covered in the snow which fell the previous night. Coming home at 1 p.m. I have a large number of times noticed the "wreath" in position at the base of the "memorial." The thought has come to me, "perhaps a mother or father whose son paid the supreme sacrifice has with loving hands, hunted 'amidst the treasures of the snow' for that wreath which is the symbol of sacrifice."

Then, again, I have noticed a number of wreaths, which have adorned the caskeys of some of our dead comrades on their funeral day, placed afterwards at the base of the memorial. Surely a lesson can be learned within the shadow of that cross, for it is the symbol of Nid's cross of sacrifice and it points the path of duty to the 6,000 ex-service men who are scattered throughout the length and breadth of our island home.

Ours is a noble heritage, sealed with the blood of our 2,000 comrades who sleep in Flanders Fields. Our greatest asset is our honour and let us hope that Newfoundland, the smallest link in that great imperial chain of Empire, shall be the test whereby our Empire's strength is measured. Let us who live within the "shadow of that cross" try to measure up to the high ideals of citizenship which is demanded of us, especially at this period.

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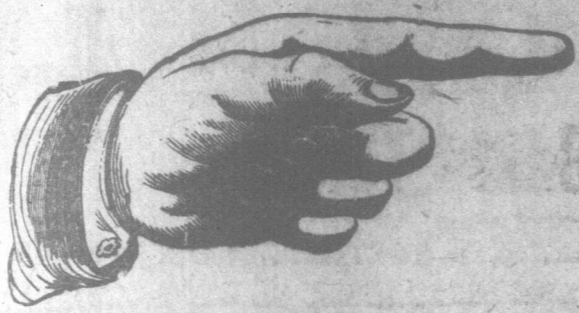
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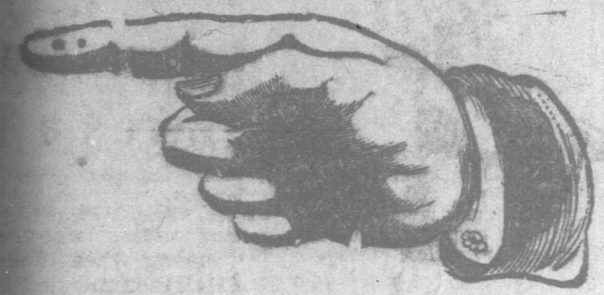

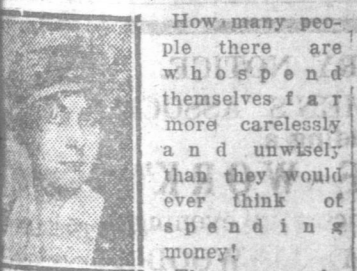

CARELESS SELF-SPENDERS.



How many people there are who spend themselves carelessly and unwisely, than they would ever think of spending money to save money but they never are able to save themselves.

When thinking of a man I know who is a kind of work which is frequent in its hours. Sometimes he will be put in a long day and half night, and the next day he will be time off. Frequently he is so busy that he cannot really enjoy his extra time. If he would only go to bed at a reasonable hour, give his room, give in to his sleep, and rest for an hour or two he would be in good shape again. But he never. He thinks it is fool-

ish for men to sleep in the daytime. But he doesn't think it is foolish for them to sit in their chairs in a cramped position, and yawn and nod and fall asleep for two or three minutes at a time. And so he does that and goes back to his work unrefreshed. He would be horrified to spend money on a way that brought so little return as this way in which he spends himself.

Hard On Other People.

Another self-extravagance which is particularly exasperating because it bears so heavily on other people (but then, when you come to think of it, all self-extravagances do that) is the extravagance of the man or woman who takes pride in the fact that he will not give in to an illness or call a doctor until he is absolutely prostrated.

Think of the colds that are communicated because someone wouldn't favor himself and get over a cold as quickly as possible. Think of the way a cold will "hang on" depleting one's strength and making one a miserable companion for himself and everyone else, simply because the victim will not take this thing in hand and do the necessary husbanding of strength that is required to throw it off.

Think of the costly illnesses that would so often be avoided if the someone hadn't taken pride in saying: "I'm not one of those silly people who run to a doctor every time they think there is something wrong with them."

Too Much Power.

Another self-extravagance is the use of a thousand foot pounds of mental energy to move an object that ten would have moved. If the manager of a factory should start a machine capable of lifting a thousand pounds to lift ten, we would think him very wasteful. Yet isn't that the way a great many people go about the little problems and difficulties of life?

Unwise or undue self-sacrifice is

self-extravagance. We all know parents who constantly spend themselves in sacrifices for their children. They deprive themselves of normal enjoyment of life and they don't really make their children happier, because it encourages in them a selfishness that is going to be a handicap to true happiness in after life. What could be more extravagant than this.

Getting "Riled Up."

Getting "riled up" (as my New England mother put it) about things we can't alter is another and perhaps the commonest form of self-extravagance.

The thing that is worth what you pay for it is not necessarily extravagant, even if it is expensive. The most expensive things are not necessarily the most extravagant; if they are worth both in money and in true satisfaction what you have paid for them.

It is the little things that are not worth what you paid either in money or in satisfaction that are extravagant.

And his is just as true about self-extravagance as the money kind.

HOLDS MOCK PARLIAMENT.

Tuesday night's meeting of the Wesley Young Men's Literary Class took the form of a Mock Parliament. The assembly was thrown open to the public and a very large number of both sexes were present, which filled the Legislature to the doors. The proceedings were carried out strictly according to Parliamentary rules. At 8 p.m. the Governor (Mr. R. Cross) entered the Legislature and read "The Speech from the Throne" (which was drafted by one of the Class's most esteemed and learned members, Mr. E. Bursay). The Speaker of the House (Rev. J. G. Joyce) then entered, followed by some of the Members of both Opposition and Government. Each member possessed a copy of the "Speech from the Throne", and the night was spent in criticizing same. The following are some of the Bills which will be brought before the House:—To authorize the Municipal Council to raise the Poll Tax imposed on bachelors from \$5.00 to \$10.00. "To introduce and establish a new Poll Tax of \$25.00 on Spinners." "The enfranchisement of women." "The Labrador Boundary Question." "The Standardization of Fish." "To amend the Prohibition Act." "To increase the tariff on Women's Toilets, such as Face Powder and Cream, Perfumes, etc., to 100 per cent." "To increase the Tariff on fancy ribbon boxed chocolates to 70 per cent." "A Bill making it unlawful for males to give up their seats in street cars, Band Stands, Concert Halls, or other public gathering places, etc., to females." The House adjourned at 10.30 p.m. until 7.45 Thursday night, April 10th.

"Hearts of the World" is Romance and History

The combination of wholesome romance with solid historical data are the salient features of D. W. Griffith's "Hearts of the World," to be seen at the Star Movie next week.

Those who have been privileged to see Mr. Griffith's "The Birth of a Nation," can better realize this producer's remarkable art in placing side by side the human things and the epochal. He is a dramatic genius who masterfully stops at nothing to reach his goal of expression, whether it be of comedy or tragedy, of romance or historical significance. Hence the fact that he spent eighteen months in producing "Hearts of the World," carries its own weight and importance.

Altho this notable Griffith work has produced in France under the auspices of the British and French officials, it is not in any sense a war play, but rather a romantic tale of the humble people of France to whom the war came. Mr. Griffith reveals all the beauty of glorious France, the music of her moonlight, the perfume of her blossoms, the charms of her walls and her streets, her streams and pathways—ways that the legions of Caesar found beautiful centuries ago.

Some idea of the magnitude of "Hearts of the World," may be gained from the announcement that one million men and fifty thousand horses appear in the spectacle.

Angling for Birds

St. Kilda, fifty miles west of the Outer Hebrides, is only three miles long and two miles broad, and being very rocky, its inhabitants have to pretty wide awake to make a living. To a great extent they depend upon sea-birds for their food supply, and one fowler has been known to catch 620 birds in a single day.

The fowler sets out with a long deal pole, nine or ten feet long, with a horse hair noose at the end camouflaged by gannet's gulls. Puffins are numerous on the island, and the fowler creeps as near the birds as possible without giving them the alarm, thrusts forth his rod along the ground, works the noose close to an unsuspecting puffin, and very dexterously drops the noose over the bird's head and secures it.

The birds are treated much like herring, except that they need a preliminary plucking. When that is done they are split open, kippered, and hung in long strings across the cottage ceiling. In this way they will keep for an indefinite period, and provide a puffin breakfast at a moment's notice.

Millions Spent For New Hotels

CONSTRUCTION IN 1923 TO BE ECLIPSED THIS YEAR.

Hotel building is to-day classed among the four greatest American industries. All records for such construction were eclipsed last year, when more than a quarter of a billion dollars was spent to build hotels throughout the country.

If all the hotels planned to be built this year are completed, more than half a billion dollars will be expended. This activity is widely scattered. Not only in the big cities, but in comparatively small towns luxurious hotels are now going up.

Last year 64 hotels were built, costing more than \$1,000,000 each. Of these, 14 were in New York city. Five of these hotels have more than 1,000 rooms each. In some cases a single hotel cost nearly \$10,000,000.

Five Miles a Minute!

BY AN EX-PILOT.
In a desperate attempt to regain for Great Britain some of her lost air prestige, a machine is now being built for competition in the big international races this summer, capable of a speed, when going full out, of five miles a minute. This marvellous craft is, the air experts declare, but an indication of what is to come.

What does it feel like to go hurtling through the air at 300 miles an hour in a trail-looking contraption of wood and fabric? The truth is there is no sensation. Air racing is almost without thrills to the competitors. But it is an ordeal that is racking to the nerves. The pilot who can handle a plane at such velocities needs superlative skill, with the ability of a well-trained athlete to endure a strain that is intense, that terribly fatigues.

Flying Through Space

Flying at 200 miles an hour is not nearly so terrifying as lapping Brooklands at half that speed—at least, that is my experience. Velocity, like most things, is a matter of comparisons.

From a motor car or an express train impressions of speed are gained by the rapid passing of trees, hedges, or telegraph poles. But in the vast spaces of the heavens there is only emptiness all around. Looking down perhaps from 10,000 feet up, the stationary objects below—houses, fields, haystacks—seem to disappear so slowly behind a moving plane that the impression is deceptive. The machine seems but a slugard.

Judgment of pace by the eye ceases to be of avail when flying. But there are things, apart from the instruments, that help to indicate his speed to an experienced pilot. Chief of these indications is the noise and roar of the wind tearing past struts and wires, a sound that changes its note with each rise or fall of the velocity.

Do You Waste Water?

It was not realized how gigantic was the quantity of water wasted by defective taps until New York levied a tax of two dollars on the owner of every leaking fitting. In two years forty thousand million gallons of water were saved.

Church on Wheels.

After using a small cottage as their church for 100 years the Wesleyans of Quinton, a village near Northampton, have bought a tiny wooden building on wheels.
