Whereas, before, it was an offence if a player taking the throw-in did not stand on the touch-line when delivering the ball, it shall now be reckoned as noncompliance with the laws of the game if the throw-in is taken when the touch-line is encroached upon by the player throwing in the ball. He shall now stand outside the line when throwing the ball over his head, when as before, both hands must be used On consideration, it will be understood that it should now be easier for a linesman, and also the spectators, to observe when the throw-in is properly taken. When a player taking th throw-in raised his heels the move ment was invariably accompanied b claims for a "foul-shy" award. 


