NOVA SCOTIA LEADS in the Fish Catch

VALUABLE FISH LANDED IN THIS PROVINCE FOR SIX MONTHS OVER \$4,000,000 DOLLARS.

Ottawa, July 24.—Canada's sea fish catch for the first six months of this year was valued at \$9,778,040, as compared with \$8,155,438 in the same period in 1924. Of this year's total Nova Scotia contributed \$4,081,417, Prince Edward Island \$670,535, New Brunswick \$1,447,360, Quebec \$820,728, and British Columbia \$2,958,010. According to varieties of fish Lobsters led with \$3,133,166. Cod \$1,472,720, Halibut \$1,467,498, Salmon \$1,183,350, Herring \$999,629, Haddock \$368,586, Mackerel \$351,176, and Smelts \$339,748.

Nova Scotia's lobster catch was valued at \$2,221,120. Cod \$1,067,697, Haddock \$347,350, Mackerel \$208,661, Halibut \$134,227, and Herring \$67,615. Prince Edward Island's Lobster catch was valued at \$542,403, and Herring \$64,576. New Brunswick's Lobster catch was valued at \$466,337, Smelts, \$261,869, Salmon \$189,851, Herring, \$129,407, Cod \$122,153, and Sardines \$93,556. Quebec's Cod catch was valued at \$215,094. Lobsters \$150,246, Mackerel \$94,481, Salmon \$87,968, and Herring \$80,113. British Columbia's Halibut catch was valued at \$1,330,689, Salmon \$338,251, Herring \$267,918, and Cod \$40,677.—Morning Chronicle.

Government Submit Proposals for Settlement in Mines Dispute

Drowned and Immense Damage Done By Floods in Corea--Argentine Cruisers Will Escort the Prince to Home Waters--The Ruhr is Completely Evacuated of French Troops.

LOOK FOR SETTLEMENT HOPEFUL

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 1. The following statement: Government has formulated proposals, designed to effect a settlement of the strike, which have been submitted to the Board of Directors to be considered at the earliest possible date, will probably be on Wednesday, at Montreal, and by the Executive of the U. M. District 26 by a referendum, will probably be held also on Wednesday. In the meantime no de-announcements as to its acceptance or refusal can be made. It is the opinion of the Government that the outlook for settlement is hopeful.

STRIKE PROPOSALS.

HALIFAX, N.S., Aug. 2. A contract remained in the Empire Steel Corporation and the U. M. W. for a period of months pending full enquiry into the coal industry of the Province, contract to contain 1924 working and 1922 wage rates, or six and one-half per cent. below the 1924 contract. A referendum by the Government to determine whether the check-off be continued, and an undertaking by the Government to rebate one-fifth of its royalties for twelve months, are some of the final proposals of the Nova Scotia Government made to the Corporation and the U. M. W. in an endeavor to end the five-month strike of the industry. The proposals were made public to-night.

by Premier Rhodes. The District Board of Miners have agreed to recommend the proposals to their membership for acceptance, it was also announced to-night; and that Directors of the Corporation will consider them at a meeting in Montreal, probably on Wednesday next. Acceptance by the District Board is made on the understanding that their case before the Commission of Enquiry will not be prejudiced by their present agreement to Government proposals. The Board, in making public their acceptance, made it known that when the first conferences instituted by the present Government, opened in Sydney, on July 21, the Corporation asked for twenty-five per cent. wage cut for three months, fifteen per cent. thereafter, and abolition of the Union check-off.

EVACUATION OF RUHR COMPLETE.

PARIS, Aug. 1. Official announcement was made today that the French evacuation of the Ruhr is complete; that not a single French soldier remained in the mining and industrial basin after midnight last night.

ARGENTINE CRUISERS TO ESCORT PRINCE.

BUENOS AIRES, Aug. 2. Four cruisers and two scout cruisers of the Argentine Navy will meet the Prince of Wales about forty miles outside the port of Buenos Aires and accompany the cruiser Curlew, on which he will arrive on August 17th, for a visit to Argentina.

C. P. R. STEAMER ASHORE.

VICTORIA, Aug. 1. The Canadian Pacific Railway steamer, Princess Beatrice, went ashore at 1.30 a.m., south of Skidgate,

Queen Charlotte Island. All the passengers are ashore.

CONSTRUCTION TRAGEDY.

ST. CATHERINE'S, Ont., Aug. 1. Edward Lynch and youngest son are dead, Thomas Alder, Superintendent of construction, is reported dying in hospital, and eight men are suffering from injuries, as the result of the crash of a heavy blow from section three of the Welland ship Canal here to-day. The structure, which is used for pouring cement for the gigantic canal walls, entombed Lynch and his son and the bodies have not been recovered. All the injured men were at work on the form when the shackle gave way below and the huge steel mass, crumpled like a piece of tin.

FIGHT TO GAIN CATHEDRAL.

NEW YORK, Aug. 1. With Archbishop Phillipovsky in jail, after being forcibly ousted, Archbishop Platon Rodzevsky was in possession of the Cathedral of St. Nicholas. For five weeks the Archbishop's followers, armed with court orders, had besieged the Cathedral in an attempt to remove Bishop Adam and his faction but they refused to vacate. The Cathedral is the seat of the Russian Orthodox Church in the United States, properties of which are worth forty million dollars.

PEACE RIVER WHEAT CROP.

EDMONTON, Aug. 1. The cutting of wheat started in Peace River District yesterday. Harvest is early over the whole north and cutting will be fairly general the first of next week.

FLOODS HEAVY TOLL.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2. Four hundred persons drowned and 225,000 rendered homeless and property damages estimated at about thirty-three million dollars was the toll of vast floods which inundated the River Districts of Corea, according to a cablegram to the Methodist-Episcopal Board of Foreign Missions.

DIED AT ROME.

ROME, Aug. 2. Rev. Alberta Lepid, Master of Apostolic Palace, has died at the Vatican.

COOK'S ADVICE TO MINERS.

LONDON, Aug. 2. At a Labor meeting, at Kenilshaw, near Chesterfield, A. J. Cook, Secretary of the Miners' Federation, declared the crisis was over for the present but that the fight was only just beginning. He advised the miners to concentrate on the whole coal industry because he said, it was going to be theirs. The miners, he added, need not be afraid of the fortnight's suspension, it was a fight now between the Government and the owners.

FRENCH WARSHIP COMING.

HALIFAX, Aug. 1. The French naval Sloop Ville D'ya, Captain Perrier, arrived here this morning from Montreal. After a stay of unannounced length in this port, she will proceed to Sydney, Newfoundland, and later to Boston. The Ville D'ya belongs to the French Fisheries Protection Service operating off the Grand Banks of Newfoundland.

Commercial Failures in Canada

Statistics of commercial failures in the Dominion of Canada for the second quarter of this year, as reported by R. G. Dun & Co., show a slight increase, both as to number and liabilities, over the corresponding period of 1924. There were 549 mercantile defaults in the second quarter of this year with \$12,142,313 of indebtedness, these figures contrasting with 527 insolvencies a year ago for \$11,653,847 of liabilities. The increase in number is wholly in trading lines, 392 trading failures in the second quarter this year comparing with 355 a year ago, trading defaults in the Province of Quebec being considerably more numerous this year, also in Alberta and Saskatchewan. The indebtedness due to trading failures this year is, however, somewhat smaller than a year ago. Manufacturing defaults show a decrease in number this year, but liabilities are larger owing to the failure of a large manufacturing concern in Montreal. There were more manufacturing defaults likewise in the Province of Quebec this year than last. As to the other Provinces, a decrease is shown both in number and liabilities. For Ontario fewer defaults and a smaller indebtedness is shown this year in both the manufacturing and trading divisions.

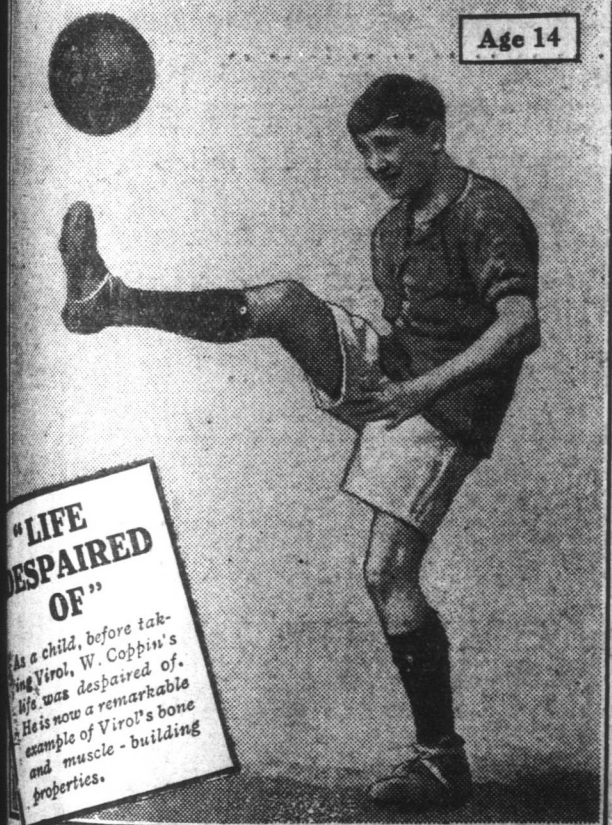

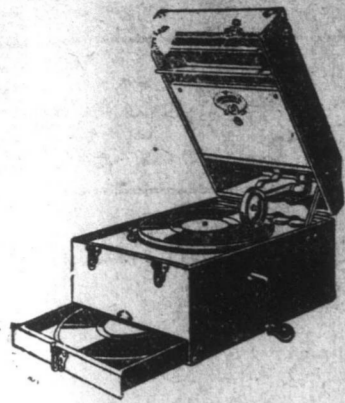

PASSING ENGLAND FOR GERMANY.

(Daily Telegraph, July 7.)

A dinner was given by the Newfoundland Club at the Hyde Park Hotel last evening to meet the Colonial Secretary of Newfoundland, the Hon. John R. Bennett, at present on an official visit to Great Britain. Captain Victor Gordon, High Commissioner for Newfoundland, presided over a distinguished company representative of the social and commercial interests of the oldest Colony.

Lord Morris, proposing the toast of "Our Principal Guest" (the Hon. John R. Bennett, Colonial Secretary), said that they were there to appreciate the great part their guest had played—and the part he was playing to-day—in the public life of Newfoundland. (Cheers.) No man could have been more loyal and more honourable in his public career. (Hear, hear.) Alluding to the administration of the Colony, Lord Morris said it was pleasant for them to know that to-day they had a strong and stable Government. (Cheers.) It was pleasant for them to know that very considerable developments were taking place in the Colony. The time was when they had carried all their eggs in one basket, and had depended upon their fisheries. That was no longer the case. (Hear, hear.) Referring to the pulp and paper trade, he said he looked forward with confidence to substantial developments and a great expansion of that industry. (Cheers.) Few people appreciated the fact that Newfoundland came second to Great Britain in the production of iron ore. Every year a million and a half tons of iron ore passed by British shores and went to Germany for manufacture in that country ("Shame!") It was a deplorable state of affairs, but they had to leave it to politicians to say why such a thing existed when so many factories and men were idle in Britain. (Hear, hear.)

Responding, Mr. Bennett paid a warm tribute to the work Lord Morris had done for the oldest Colony. He expressed a sense of deep appreciation upon the appointment of Captain Victor Gordon as High Commissioner. No man was better qualified for that high office. (Cheers.)

The component parts of the Empire should, he said, stand together in the domain of economic affairs. (Hear, hear.) They had to come together. (Hear, hear.) Sir Edgar Bowring, proposing "Prosperity to Newfoundland," traced the progress of the Colony and predicted a wider sphere of usefulness for its great potentialities in the domain of Empire development. Sir Glynn H. West and General the Hon. Sir Newton Moore, M.P. (a former Premier of Western Australia), responded.

The health of "The Chairman" was honoured at the instance of Sir William Goode, and Captain Victor Gordon acknowledged the compliment. Other guests included Sir Fredk. Local Bird Protection

WINNIPEG, July 30.—(Can. Press)—The Free Press says:—One of the most striking instances of local bird protection is provided by the sanctuary of Mr. and Mrs. J. K. McDougall, in East Kildonan, Man., on the Red River. Here birds for many years have been encouraged through feeding devices, nesting boxes, provision of shrubs suitable for nesting, planting of berry-bearing trees and eradication of bird enemies and the birds have increased surprisingly as a result. This season, however, a new record was made. Thirty-two pairs of birds nested in the garden and bush immediately surrounding the house, an area of about two acres, and the list shows 13 different species.

Making Ears for the Country

BRANDON, Man.—Indians like many others practice "get rich quick" schemes. A case in point was brought to light here at the Indian reserve at Griswold, Man. Collecting bounty returns on wolf ears, manufactured from skins of young cubs, was the ingenious method employed. The ears were turned in to secure the wolf bounty from the municipality. The Redskins figured it was much easier to make ears than to catch wolves. So well did they make the artificial ears, that municipal officers were fooled for some time. Finally the authorities discovered the ruse and provincial police started an investigation. Three men and a squaw were apprehended. They pleaded guilty to the charge and were warned with a year's suspended sentence.

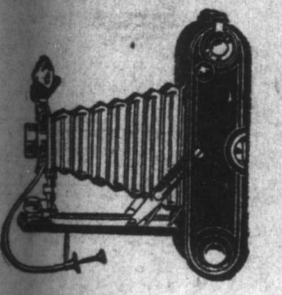
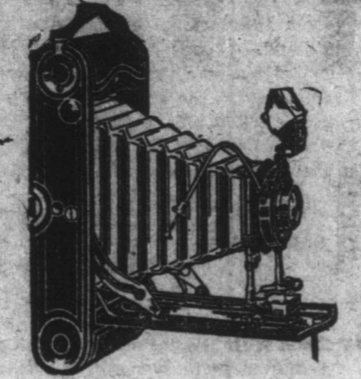

THE SITUATION.

The Boston News Bureau says: The developments in the country's most important industry, steel and iron, are lately quite encouraging. Pig iron is strengthening, with leading interests refusing business at current quotations and with scrap steel up \$1 a ton. Strength in these directions often precedes a substantial buying movement. Meantime pig iron operations for two months now have ceased to recede. The recovery from the low point is rather slight, but enough to suggest that the worst has been seen. It is logical, therefore, to expect distinct quickening in the autumn when general trade is normally stimulated. Industrial earning power is indicative of widespread national prosperity. Very few lines are subnormal. Steel companies in particular have in the past quarter shown an earning power far greater than figured, as the Bethlehem Steel statement emphasized and as the Steel Corporation figures a week hence, it is hoped will show.

Railroad net earnings particularly have been making a gratifying showing. June results for such roads as have reported have been almost uniformly good. Car loadings continue at a high rate and, with the indications pointing to a seasonal uplift in business in the fall, it would not be surprising if new peaks in car loadings were attained. The railroads, during the first six months of this year, have bought very sparingly of equipment. The principal reason has been that their needs were largely anticipated, but they are expected to come into the market more freely in the next six or eight months both for equipment and materials and supplies.

GENERAL MOTORS.
 Earned \$8.19 a Share 6 1/2 Common First Half Year Against \$4.57 a Share in 1924.

BOSTON, July 27.—Alfred P. Sloan, Jr., president of General Motors Corp., said:

Our earnings for the first six months were \$48,082,235. This is after taxes and depreciation. After deducting \$3,519,771 for preferred dividends this equals \$8.19 per share on outstanding common stock. Total earnings applicable to dividends for the corresponding period in 1924 were \$27,065,990; after deducting preferred dividends this was equivalent to \$4.57 per share on outstanding common stock.

General Motors equity in earnings of Fisher Body Corp. and General Motors Acceptance Corp. in excess of dividends received for the first six months was \$30,845, equivalent to 33 cents per share on General Motors outstanding common stock.

Cash and government securities as of June 30, 1925, were \$139,376,065, as compared with \$30,552,453 for the same date a year ago. There were no liabilities except current accounts. This is the most satisfactory statement, both with respect to earnings and general position, that General Motors Corp. has ever made. A detailed statement will be promptly issued.

**Breeding Cattle for
 Agriculture Dept.**

Owing to numerous applications for a better class stock than is at present available, the Agricultural Department has secured from one of the outstanding breeders of Ayrshires in Canada, a bunch of young bulls, which will be distributed around St. John's and in some of the outports. This shipment of bulls arrived during the week by the Canadian Sapper. One animal, the progeny of a cow with 13,000 lbs. of milk, has been sent to the Macpherson Farm, Freshwater Road. The animals under present arrangements remain the property of the Department, which allows about \$75.00 per year to the keeper of each for its support. He is also allowed to retain any fees collected for services. A periodic inspection of the animals will be carried out by one of the present officials of the Department. We understand that the services of Mr. Salter have been dispensed with. This gentleman was some time ago given the job of inspecting the animals and other property of the Department. It is also learned that the Agricultural Specialist, Mr. C. Stær, placed at the disposal of the Department, has been notified that his term of office ceases about the 15th of this month. In reference to the shipment of cattle imported by the Sapper, a recent issue of the Family Herald contains the following account:—

AYRSHIRES FOR NEWFOUNDLAND

"Further business in the dairy cattle trade was manifested at the port of Montreal last week when a shipment of fifteen Ayrshire bulls left on board the Canadian Government Merchant Marine S.S. Sapper, bound for St. John's, Newfoundland. Consigned to the Government of Newfoundland the majority of the shipment were picked up in the Howick-Huntingdon, Que. district by W. F. Stephen, Secretary of the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders' Association, that society having received the order. Assisting the Secretary were Gilbert McMillan and Earl Ness. The latter accompanied the lot on their journey. They are expected to arrive at their destination on Friday next.

"Those in the consignment were from twelve to eighteen months old, all from accredited herds. One individual, that from the herd of Peter Dickson, Ormatown, is the possessor of Advanced Registration Certificate number 18. He is the progeny of a cow with a record of over 13,000 pounds of milk. Balsam Lodge Sir Andrew, formerly owned by G. McMillan and sold at his recent sale is the sire of this youngster. Several others in the shipment were from record cows.

"That the animals in the lot will make their mark upon the stock already on the Island there is no doubt. Bred and raised in the district which might be termed the stronghold of the red and white in Canada they have everything in their favor as regards early attention in life. As it is the intention of the Newfoundland Government to distribute the fifteen head around about St. John's, the advantage that will be gained by their presence is obvious.

"The following breeders contributed to the shipment: S. Stewart (2 head); R. Stewart, R. Roy, P. D. MacArthur and J. J. Peddie, all of Howick; R. T. Brownlee, (2 head); T. Stewart and D. R. Pincoff, of Hemmingford; T. Irwin and M. Robb, of Huntingdon; Peter Dickson, Ormatown. Two of the fifteen head were from the Shawbridge district. W. Clark consigning one and the Boys' Farm the other."

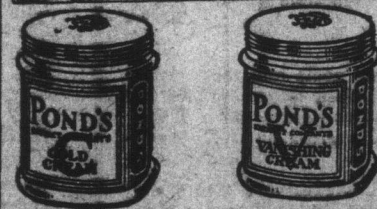



The Circus Opens

The Carnival and Circus Show, on Bannerman Road, was the centre of attraction on Saturday evening and night, for some hundreds of people, young and old. Entrance to the fair grounds is free and much may be seen by a walk through. An admission fee of five cents or fifteen cents is charged for a visit to the tented attractions such as an alligator pool and the Fat Man. The merry-go-round was well patronized during the opening day. It is a very compact affair and spins without noise. The horses and other animals are made to move with a life-like, up-and-down motion, as they move around at a fairly good but safe speed. Music is supplied by the Wurlihtzer Orchestra. For small children the aeroplane ride supplies the same thrill as the merry-go-round and the many youngsters who took a ride on the machine appeared to enjoy thoroughly the experience. The show has many "Try Your Luck" schemes and games of skill. The latter include knocking down a pyramid of milk bottles with baseballs, placing balls in a tub, a speedway, race track, bowling alley. A feature which attracts considerable interest is the making of cotton candy. The apparatus consists of a large pan in the centre of which revolves a disc into which sugar (granulated) is poured, about a cupful of sugar is placed in the receptacle and after it has revolved for a minute or two the candy is ejected in threads which collect on the sides of the pan. This, when rolled off on a stick resembles a ball of cotton wool. The fat man and the alligator farm appear to be the best attended of the tented attractions. The fat man "Baby Jack," is of immense size, weighing, it is said, 650 pounds. His height is 5 ft. 8 inches; ankle, 25 inches; calf, 30 inches; knee, 35 inches; thigh, 43 inches; waist, 78 inches; chest, 56 inches; neck, 25 inches. His age is 22 years. There are eight live alligators in the farm. Seven of them are rather small, but one is about 5 feet long. The smaller ones are very small and go from the pool of water to the land quickly. The large one is tame and opens its mouth when it is desired to do so.

White Man's Diseases Exterminating Natives

EDMONTON, Alta., July 31.—Not many years will elapse before the Eskimo will be exterminated by disease through adopting white men's method of habitation, declared Dr. D. E. Scott, who recently returned to Edmonton after spending one year at Aklavik, in the delta of the McKenzie river. He has been acting as medical officer to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Arctic posts, and working among Indians and Eskimos, in behalf of the department of Indian Affairs.
While this prediction has been made by others in the past, Dr. Scott adds that Eskimos and Indians of the Delta are suffering from intestinal parasite attacks, due to eating raw fish, rabbits and other meats. This, however, he claims, is not a serious problem to contend with, but such diseases as cancer, appendicitis, he states, are becoming too prevalent among the Indians.
In the old days when snow houses were their temporary homes, the Eskimos were healthy, states the doctor, but since they commenced living in cabins and shacks, tuberculosis has broken out among them, and this dread menace threatens to wipe them out. Among the Delta Indians, Dr. Scott found that in all but ten per cent, here were symptoms of tuberculosis. Their methods of living were such that the disease was on the increase.
Speaking of law and order in the North, Dr. Scott declared that the Eskimos and Indians of the Western Arctic regions are the most law-abiding people in the world and he could not recollect one police case during the year he was among them. In the Eastern regions, however, where missionaries have not penetrated, an occasional murder was committed, but this, the doctor says is the Eskimo's own law at work.
Excellent fur catches were reported by trappers in the district, and in the Eastern Arctic, two Swedes have begun shipment of their three-year catch, which is estimated at \$120,000. The Eskimos also fared well, the average catch being around \$2,000.
Dr. Scott plans to return to the North and after a year in government service will leave for London, Eng., to take up post-graduate work.

Religious Sister in Far North

REGINA, Sask., July 23.—By canoe and train for six days—through swift torrents, pumpled along by brawny Indian guides, shooting rapids and skirting cataracts, Sister Carrier of the Grey Nuns' Order recently travelled 500 miles to Regina, primarily to see a dentist.
Sister Carrier comes from that inland mission in the cold hinterland of Northern Saskatchewan, Notre Dame of the Sacred Heart, Beauval mission, five miles west of Lac la Plonge. This is her first peak at civilization in five years.
"I like my mission so much, I would not like to be transferred to another one, unless I am commissioned to go farther north, to work among the Eskimos," Sister Carrier declared. She gave a colorful picture of life in this outpost.
Beauval mission and that lie in a Croese, are generally recognized as the two most difficult missions in the North. In the spring and fall, the Mission often is cut off from all except telegraph communication. No mail comes and none is sent out. If the Mission cook runs out of tea or other supplies, members of the community do without. In the summer time only the minimum of travel is attempted on the rivers, owing to its treacherous rapids. The winter season for travel and the hauling of supplies.
The expense and labor of hauling, Sister Carrier explained, is tremendous, when it is considered that the Mission feeds and clothes an average of 100 persons. Considerable food also is raised in the district. The wheat fields are large and thriving, while all kinds of vegetables are grown.
The mission workers have themselves installed an electric plant and steam heating system. They also built their own telegraph line and completed the connections.
The only neighbors are scattered bands of Indians. "They are friendly, and 'fire water' is unknown to them," said Sister Carrier. The country which is heavily timbered, is dotted with lakes and threaded with rivers. The fur catch, she said, in winter was usually very good, while the fish catch and wild fruit crop materially added to the food supply.
Sister Carrier will return to her post after a short holiday with relatives here.

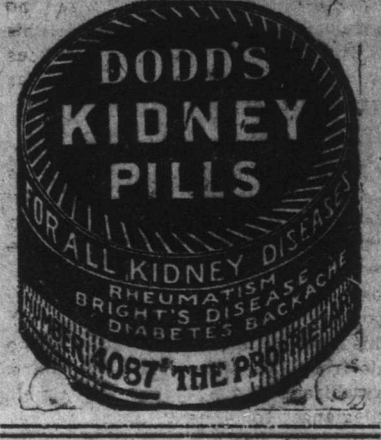

The Late Ambassador, PAGE AND ENGLISH LIFE.
We Are Very Gay But—in the Shadow.
Another selection from the letters of the late Mr. Walter Hulse Page, a former Ambassador in London, to President Wilson appears in the July number of The World To-day.
The editor of the newspapers have given us a most interesting and worth reading selection from an exceedingly frank, and amusing commentary on political and social life as written by the writer at a period when the country was faced with the threat of a revolution following on the passing of the Home Rule Bill in 1914, and the time of the Near East outbreak which grew the world war was a most interesting and worth reading selection from the Daily Telegraph.
The present collection Mr. Page has compiled with personalities rather than polemics, and of them he has much to say that is illuminating and entertaining. Indeed, it is not too much to say that he found much to admire in the qualities displayed by those of our old English families who came in contact. Thus we have a Sunday spent at Panshanger, Hertford, on July 12, 1924, a reference to the danger that the Serbians were against the fact that both Germany and Germany were mobilized.
A long way from these troubles to the quiet, great house at Panshanger, where, with the help of the House and Lord Rayleigh and other lords and ladies were spending Sunday.

golfing or at tennis, and—in the evening at poker, if you wish; and after intelligent talk about theology.
"His lady wears too many diamonds for the simple taste of a democrat, but she wouldn't hesitate a moment to sell every one of them to help Ulster if she thought Ulster needed such help; and her sons and brothers are in all English-speaking lands, never forgetful of their old home. Great human societies are the most interesting subjects of study in the world—aren't they? We speak about hospitality; we don't know the A.B.C. of this fine art. These great Englishmen practise it on their fellows till it takes rank with painting, architecture and literature."
"Earlier in the same month Mr. Page had written from the American Embassy touching upon current affairs, and his treatment of a question which was at that time exercising the public mind is not without interest.
"Alas! (he wrote) it's a sad day in Parliament for anybody but Ireland and Ulster and the militant Suffragettes. It's a dog-fight from day to day, with only grins to commend it. It was once interesting; it's now only gloomy and tiresome. I dined with the Prime Minister a few nights ago, and I brought away from a long talk with him the feeling that he doesn't know what a week or a month may bring forth. Nor did Mrs. Asquith illumine the situation greatly when she whispered to me, "We have too many damned fools"—a perfectly safe if not a perfectly ladylike generalization. If there's a street brawl in Belfast they'll call it a civil war and the whole world will be shocked—Germany shocked with joy. And, of course, that may happen any day."
The London Season
"Writing on May 21, 1914, Mr. Page gives the President his impressions of the London season in a pen-picture tinged with both cynicism and sadness for the Old World, and, perhaps, a very natural pride in the country of his birth. He writes:—
"At this season, as you know, everybody comes to London; the King gives his levees and Courts and balls, and the rich and the high and the climbing exercise on the social ladder and the traps; the Ambassadors dine one another and other great folk; American ladies come over to be presented; hundreds of people drink Mrs. Page's tea every Thursday afternoon (on July 4 they came 3,000 strong) and we are supposed to have lots of fun; and the funny part of it is, we do!
"I hear more gossip, get more points of view, see more people, get closer to my colleagues than at any other time of year. I dine with everybody, from the King to the newspaper men—this whole Babylon goes on a tear! Yet, in spite of our "seasonable" gaiety, I do assure you (and it never leaves me) that there's a sadness in this Old World life that in certain moods weighs heavily on a man who has been bred to a hopeful outlook on the future and on a sympathetic man whatever his outlook."
"There follows a brief note upon the Ulster crisis and a reference to the Prime Minister, who 'talks like a man who would be glad to be relieved of the whole struggle and to get a little rest before he dies.' And then: "They're all sad—both sides. The Social Machine
"The machine that confers titles, gives social distinctions, confers orders, gives out sinecures, appoints men to livings, and does out many other such aims and uniform, captures the ambitious world and the rich men; and the poor devil who can get none of these things pays the bill. It is known that he is "worked," he can hardly hope for relief in his life-time and he goes sadly on, doing the best he can and drinking the King's health as an expression of pride in the Empire."
"Yet they are all a vigorous race. Else they'd be in real despair permanently. The mills of the gods and of Lloyd George grind slowly. Yet all this sadness is hilarity in comparison with the note of weary resignation that I think I detect in such men as the very cultivated Greek Minister, the Roumanian Minister, the Austrian Ambassador, and especially the foxey but melancholy old Benckendorff of Russia. They, I think, having got some glimpses of the free world, carry with them a real hopelessness. But even this English life would depress me if I had to adjust myself to it permanently."
Sunlight and Shadow
"Which leads him to the conclusion:—
"Heaven forgive me (and I hope you will, too) for so long a letter. But 'tis true, the sunlight falls on our New World. Here we are very gay—but—in the shadow."
The letters appear in more complete form in The World To-day, and will continue for some time.

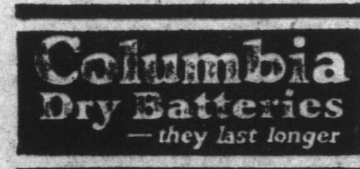

Dear Sir—The arrival of the circus in our city reminds me of what I have read in relation to the first circus ever seen at St. John's, this was in 1847, seventy-eight years ago. It was called the New York Circus Company, Rockwell & Co., Proprietors, B. J. Banks, Manager. It contained twenty-seven performers, the same number so I believe as are in the one now in our midst. It performed in a field near Monkstown Road, the property of Mr. Brown. It was composed of blood horses, trained ponies, a band of musicians, a corps of equestrian and gymnastic performers, pantomimists, negro actors, etc. A pavilion was erected in the field, the price of admittance was five shillings, two and sixpence, and one and three pence.
