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Execution of Whelan. Full Account of the Last Scenes!

His Dying Speech. NO CONFESSION! From the Toronto Telegraph. WHELAN'S LAST NIGHT.

Whelan spent his last night on earth with four priests. At 7 o'clock he took supper, consisting of fish, potatoes, bread and tea.

He bade good morning to his turnkeys, said that he was quite resigned, never felt better, and as usual with all murderers, said he would walk right into heaven.

At 10:45 the lanterns glared in at the door leading from the corridor, but quickly stepped back.

Whelan, as he stood upon the scaffold, said in a loud and distinct voice: "Friends and fellow-countrymen, I address a few words to you upon the solemn occasion.

Whelan never flinched, and at 11:09 the Sheriff gave the signal, the bolt was sprung, and the murderer of Drs. D'Arcy and McFee, was suspended in mid air.

Whelan was the same to and as he was at the trial, and the badge, and dress, as nearly as ever.

Before coming out of the corridor, Whelan shook hands with the Sheriff, and said "forgive me," to which the Sheriff replied, with all my heart.

On medical authority we are informed that Whelan was thoroughly broken down. Shortly before his execution, he went into the water-closet, and went fairly down on his knees, completely unnerfed.

At three o'clock this afternoon a post-mortem was held on the body, but it is not known whether it will be given up or not.

After Whelan had been taken down, his body was examined. On the inside of the left breast, of his shirt, was found pinned a small crumpled badge, called Duddy's badge, and worn at D's funeral in Montreal.

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
