The only ventilation obtained in that way were draughts, which gave persons confined by their duties to these wretched rooms—inhaling a foul, tepid and loathsome atmosphere—colds and illness which were sometimes very serions in their nature. No man liked to be worked to death, but under the circumstances and surroundings he could see no help for it. He had done four weeks' work in three, and in the foul room he had been sitting felt none the better of it. He had been very unwell, but had to go on. He did not complain of this on his own account alone, but there were the jurors, the officers of the Court, and the public, who were much inconvenienced, and suffered from such a place. It was a most contemptible thing that people, who are called upon to do the business and attend to the administration of justice, should have to suffer as they did, when the improvements needed could be added for a small outlay. He knew one Judge who died from illness caused from sitting in the foul air of a particular Court House. While this was bad for the public as well as others, it threw a very great impediment in the way of the transaction of business. The learned Judge's remarks were received with evident favor by those in the room. He concluded by observing that he did not complain of the work, for there were none others who would bear more in the discharge of their duties, but a clear and cool atmosphere should be provided for all who were so confined, as it could be done at a very light expense."

Many persons would be glad to know how to kill an animal without suffering, horses, we use a large sponge, say six inches in diameter, thoroughly saturated with chloroform, which is dropped into a bag large enough to be drawn over the horse's nose. It is not desirable to have the bag "air-tight;" for, if so, suffocation is likely to ensue. In two or three minutes the horse is unconscious, and in eight or ten minutes dead without suffering. For dogs and cats a similar process, using a small sponge and bag; or these canimals, with the saturated sponge, may be put in a box admitting some air, when they soon "go to sleep." Seventy-live cents' worth of chloroform will kill a horse, and twenty-five a dog or cat. If cone saturation of the sponge does not complete the work, repeat it.—Our Dumb Animals.

Immediately after Lieut. Governor Howland's return from New Brunswick, Mr. Blake waited upon him and tendered his own resignation and that of Mr. Mackenzie, Provincial Treasurer. His Excellency accepted these resignations, and asked Mr. Blake's counsel as to the course he should take. Mr. Blake consulted his colleagues, and conveyed to His Excellency the recommendation of the Cabinet that the Hon. Oliver Mowat sho be sent for. Mr. Mowat has resigned his office of Vice-Chancellor, and accepted

with unmingled satisfaction. Previous to his elevation to the Bench Mr. Mowat occupied a prominent position as a politician in the old United Canada Legislature, where his conduct was marked by much practical sagacity in the course of Legislation, and an efficient and prudent discharge of his deparmental duties as a Cabinet Minister; and, when elevated to a judicial position on the Chanrespect, and an almost equally univer-sal acknowledgment of his admirable aptitude and qualifications for the office, on which he has largely contributed to shed additional lustre, and lend an enhanced weight to the emi-nent worth and justice of the decisions of the particular Court with which he has been connected during the past seven years.

The maturer judgment and more ripened experience acquired since his elevation to the Bench, together with his high personal character, and unitedly point to Mr. Mowat as a worthy successor to the very distinguished statesman who preceded him in the office of Premier, and we feel fully persuaded that Reformers will rally with enthusiasm to the hearty support of the New Government unsupport of the New Government under his leadership, and that the country generally may readily anticipate the mitiation and maintenance of a policy that will faithfully realize the wishes and desires of the great mas, not only of Reformers, but of the people of the Province generally.

Mr. Mowat is now busy with the reconstruction of his Cabinet—Messrs. Crooks, Scott, McKellar and Gowhaving all placed their offices at the new Premier's disposal—and we shall probably learn in a day or so what is the personnel of the New Reform Ontario Government.

Mr. Mowat will, of course, require to seek the suffrages of some constituency, and in this respect, doubtless, there will be little difficulty in obtaining what the exigencies of the case demand.

An Example for Canadian Snobs.

In remarking upon Lord Dufferin's affability, condescension, and desire to please, the Quebec Chronicle reads certain folks in "this Canada of ours," a little lecture which we deem worth reproducing for the benefit of all concerned. Our contemporary says of the Governor-General's social qualities: "His example in this respect might be followed with good results in Quebec and other cities where you often meet persons not one whit above you in social position, and far inferior to you in the qualifications which tender a man agreeable and entertaining, unwilling to be even ordinarily polite on social and other occasions. This constant affectation of superiority in a new, democratic, self-made community, is the most ridiculous outcome of egotism and stupid pride conceivable. The people who ape this superiority unconsciously betray both their inward knowledge of the fact that there is nothing really superior about them. It is not the genuine metal that needs polish and gilding, but the worthless pinchback. We have heard the remark more than once made, of late, that the development of habits of silly display and snobbery in our Canadian cities is something both surprising and ridiculous; and such fashions' may be expected to live on as long as sensible people who don't like or can't afford them, don't sumb their votaries on all proper occasions—and as long as obliging tailors and milliners don't refuse to give long credit.
