





The Temperance Crusade.

A movement is taking place in Ohio the accounts of which read more like chapters from a romance than real sober nineteenth century than real sober nineteenth century facts. This movement is a determin-ed and successful crusade of women against hquor-selling. Women have long been the chief sufferers from long been the chief sufferers from the evil results of man's intemper-ance. 


