SUPPOSED POISONING CASE. Mrs. Cameron, Wife of Deceased, Under Arrest and Charged With the Crime.

Attempt at Suicide with a Razor Handed Her by the Jailer.

THE VERDICT OF THE JURY AND OTHER CIRCUMSTANCES CONNECTED WITH THE TRAGIC AFFAIR.

Since our last issue this community and those of the surrounding country have been in a state of intense excitement owing to the mysterious death of A. D. Cameron, Esq.

As soon as the necessary arrangements could be effected for an inquest, Dr. S. P. Farnsworth, M.D., was called upon to hold the same.

Dr. Farnsworth, sworn: Dr. Freeman and I conducted the post mortem examination. We examined the body. We first made a very thorough examination of the stomach.

The deceased Alexander D. Cameron was born at West River, Pictou county, and had attained the age of fifty-one years.

THE JURY'S VERDICT. An investigation taken at Bridgeport, in the County of Annapolis, started on the 21st day of January, A. D. 1933, and adjourned till Wednesday, the 1st day of February, A. D. 1933.

Yesterday morning Sheriff Moore brought Mrs. Cameron from the goal in Annapolis by early train, and took her to the Revere Hotel, in this town, on the 10 o'clock train.

On Friday at 10 o'clock the prisoner was brought before Stipendiary Forsyth upon a charge of willful murder, Mr. Owen appearing for the crown; but she was under no obligation to appear.

In a brief and impartial manner we will endeavor to present to our readers some of the facts, so far as elicited, in connection with the tragic case.

Whittier's Love Story. THE MAIDEN OF HIS HEART DIED AND HE REMAINED TRUE TO HER MEMORY.

The death of the poet Whittier brings to mind a story of his early youth. Whittier never married, and any one who reads the deep, loving nature of the poem who ever looked at the passion shining in his black, intense eyes, and the tenderness that showed itself round the closely shut lips, could not fail to ask himself what better memory made him lead a single life.

The story runs that in his youth the poet loved and suffered, and his painfulness of his experience shut up his heart and made him live unworldly. When a boy and school, as is alleged, Whittier fell in love with a blushing brown-eyed maiden, and used to carry spelling-book and geography book and forth for her from school. As the future poet grew older this feeling deepened, but the young girl, when just on the verge of womanhood, made him decline and died. It is this story of his early youth, that reveals the poet immortalized in the following beautiful verses, that are known to boys far and wide over this broad country, and even across the sea.

Still she sits at the school-house by the road, A rugged haggard sunning, Around it still the same old snow, And blackberry vines are running, Within the master's den is seen, - Deep-seated by rays of light, The warping foot, the brilliant seat, The jack-knive's carved initial.

The charcoal freeness on its wall; His door was shut but his eyes were open, The feet that, creeping like an eel to school, Went storming out in playing.

Dairy Farming. AN EXHIBITIVE PAPER BY MISS M. J. JONES, BROCKVILLE, BEFORE THE FARMERS' CONGRESS IN HIS SESSION OF QUEBEC.

Quebec, Jan. 25. - At this afternoon's sitting of the Congress the question of farmers' clubs in each parish was easily settled. Mr. Jones, who read an excellent paper showing the many advantages they possess in an educational point of view.

One of the most valuable contributions to the meeting was a paper on DAIRYING FOR PROFIT from Mrs. E. M. Jones, of Brockville, proprietor of the well-known and lucrative model dairy of that place. To farmers and all interested in agriculture this paper was by far the most interesting so far read before the Congress.

Referring to her own well-earned success in dairying and rearing some incidents in her girlhood when learning with her little companions, and a splendid berry patch was found, Mr. Jones said: "Now I have found a good spot in dairying, a great spot, and I want you all to come just as fast as you can and share in my good fortune. My whole life has been spent in dairying, and after struggling through untold difficulties and proving each step as I went by dearth brought experience, I have at last attained a good result."

In this way, the average cow of the country makes one hundred and fifty pounds of butter a year, which sells at an average price of about twenty cents. Indeed, I doubt if they do as well. My cow produces from 25 to 30 pounds all the way to 500 pounds of butter a year, and sometimes far more. All my butter sells at 35 cents per pound all the year round right at my place. I have no expense or freight charge to pay, and I do not even have to cart it. What we want to do is get rid of those poor cows that will not respond to feeding. Beef them, bury them, send 'em to the glue factory, for they are giving your farm, and making slaves of your wives and families, and sinking you deeper into debt every year they exist, and will fill the country with their kind, that will respond to good feeding, that will pull you out of debt, and leave you a good balance in the bank.
