BY THE REVEREND W. BRUCE MUN AT THE OLD FORT ANnapolis ROYAL, AUGUST 4th, 1917, ON THE THIRD ANNIVERSARY OF THE GREAT WAR

Your Worship Ladies and Gentlemen: I cannot begin my address today without making some reference to a gentlemen, who, from the beginning of this war, was associated with me upon occasions such as this.

Lay the proud usurper low Tyrants fall on every blow, Liberty is my every blow, Let us do or die.

In the years to come, the people of the British Empire will thank God that they had such an enemy as Germany to face.

It is recognized already by everyone that this is the greatest crisis in the history of the Empire.

Ladies and Gentlemen, there are still some people who consider it inconsistent for a minister of the gospel to preach a fighting sermon.

There are many here who know far more about the present state of the war than I do, but I am in a rambling state of mind, and I know no man who has done more to foster it than the American multi-millionaire, Andrew Carnegie.

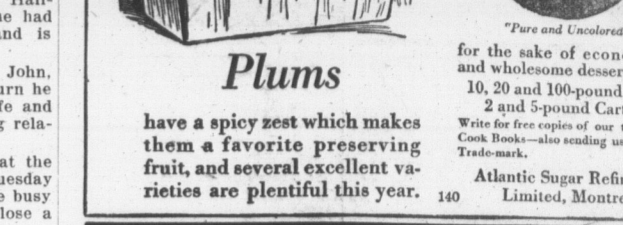

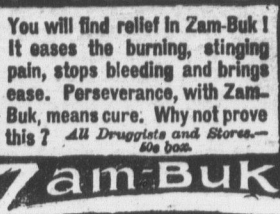

At this port two progressive and enterprising firms, Messrs. Haines & Son, and Crocker Bros., have of late established up-to-date plants for the rapid handling of fish that has some of the most modern fishing industry there. As the boats return with the result of the day's catch, they are taken to the piers where these two firms are located.

The process of cleaning and salting of these plants is more rapid and decidedly more sanitary than that usually seen at many fishing places along the Bay of Fundy shore. The work is all done under cover, the tables upon which the fish are cleaned, and all parts of the buildings are kept scrupulously clean by frequent washing with hose and brush.

Both of the firms mentioned above make a specialty of supplying the fish to the Maritime Fish Corporation Digby, and Haines & Son to Gloucester, Mass.

The catch this week, principally of pollock, was very large, and about taxed the packing capacity of these two large plants.

It was an impressive sight in the early hours of the evening as the fleet of some fifty or more motor boats engaged in "jiggering for squid" for bait. The piers of the plant of Cow Lodge were frequently visited Long Island in the past fifteen years.

This was noticeable from the time we left Digby on the 12-passenger Motor Car in charge of the reliable driver, Mr. Guy E. Morehouse, which makes daily trips from Pettit Pass to Digby on a return.
