Hamilton carried on business in his own name with the nid of the capital advanced by his father, and, it is alleged, obtained credit for goods from $a$ firm in this city by representing that the capital was his own. It is further stated that, in reply to a letter of enquiry, he denied that bis father had any interest or claim in the

## PHOSPLATE OF LINE.

Phosphate of lime in Canada, after many years of patriotic complacency as to its abundance, high grade and superiority as a fertilizer, is still an object of mere speculative importance. As an article of export, it remains stationary; and though volumes of the geological survey have clearly defined the great belt of ground it occupies in the Province of Quebec as well as in the Province of Ontario, a practical utilization of the enormous deposits and their economical working have not been found. Its value is as yet prospective, speculation in undeveloped property the only show of activity; or, when mining has been undertaken, the work, because conducted on unscientific principles, has become too costly, and has been too often spoiled by ignorant and clumsy attempts at developing what under different treatment should be a profitable enterprise. The extracting and crushing of one ton of the hardest quarts does not cost over two dollars in California, while phosphate is brought to the surface in Canada at a cost of not less than five dollars a ton, unbroken and unassorted; transportation from the mine to a shipping point and delivery alongside the ship at Montreal raise the price to $\$ 12$ to $\$ 13$ a ton. At the present moment, 250 tons of 1 hosphate, guaranteed 80 per cent, ready for shipment, are held at $\$ 15$ per ton alongside vessel, and with a probable freight as ballast of fifteen shillings : a tou of phosphate delivered in Liverpool or London, on these terms, will cost about $\$ 19.50$, while phosphate of lime is worth in England one shilling and a halfpenny per unit, say about. $\$ 90.50$
yer ton of same grade. An article, which, owing to its small value, can be shipped but as ballast is evidently not a regular article of export, especially when shipped from such a port as Montreal, where few vessels require any ballast; on the other hand, phosphate in its crude state is restricted to ports having establishments for its conversion into soluble phosphate, and where it meets the competition of other phosphates (animal and earthy) more easily pulvecized and assim. ilated.

Phosphate of lime, for instance, from North Carolina, a phosphate due to saurian coprolites and other detritus of easy grinding and containing 62 per cent., sells on board ship at Baltimore for silo to $\$ 11$ per ton. Owing to its softness the sixty two per cent. of phosphate which it contains is all converted into superphos phate, while the 80 per cent. of the Canadian mineral phosphate, in conseguence of the hardness of the roek, does not yield, when treated even with an excess of sulphuric acid, any larger return, wenty per cent. remaining insoluble. Until some more economical way of preparing it has been discovered, Canadian phosphate, whatever may be its high percent. age, camot bring in Europe more than the similar foreiga article yielding an equal amount of phosphoric richness. An entire change in the working of our phosphate deposits must take place before a really pasing industry springs up from their development. Jand speculation and desultory work have for many years been a hindrance to the wealth which the phosphate lands hold in reserve for the country.

Numerous articles have been devoted in the columns of the Jounsal. of Commerce to the subject of Canadian Phosphates. The results attained by our neighbors in its exportation within the last ten years have been compared with the paltry exports from this country; the superiority of Canadian phosphate, the manner of turning it to alvantage, and many other suggestions on the subject, due to persons of experience and wellinformed on the subject, have been published, while the want felt by European agriculture of its fertilizing proportion has been pointed out. A new proof of the necessity of imparting to the land greater quantitios of phosphatic elements has been lately demonstrated by the general complaint in Europe as to the smaller amount of saccharine matter in the juice extracted from beet roois. Formerly the proportion of sugar in the juice was on an average 10 to 11 per cent. in weight. The last crops gave only 8.75 ; and agricultural
chemists have ascertained that the predominancy given to potassic manures, if it has increased the yield in juice, has not added to the saccharine matter, which phosphatic manure alone can influence. The conseruence has been a seurch for phosphate everywhere in Eturope, and larger.deposits heretofore discauled have been worked. Mineral phosphate of lime has been discovered in Norway, and is now shipped to England and Germany. In the Spanish Province of Estremadura an extensive belt of mineral phosphate has been found, and a railway is under construction to bring its very rich crystals to the A tlantic coast, and distribute it to western parts of Europe. In France the deposits of earthy phosphate in the South. ern and Fastern parts of the country are largely worked, and so great the economy employed in the operation, that the price delivered in bags at the seabourd is onehalf of what it was two years ago, although the production has doubled meantime.

The conclusion to be derived from the foregoing facts, chiefly gathered in a conversation with one of the largest manufacturers of fertilizers in Europe, is obvions. With the unlimited quantities of available phosplate of lime in the world, of which chemistry may now utilize the smallest particle, whatever may be the ultimate demand, prices must recede, as a continuous large demand for a manufactured article always brings lower prices where labor-saving maohinery lessens the cost of production. To persevere in the expensive and clumsy mauner in which our phosphate developments have been heretofore conducted, is to neutralize one of our most important sources of prosperity.

## GOLD IMCORTATION.

The importation of gold from Europe to the United States has lately been one of the most interesting features of the money market, and has excited a good deal of attention abroad, some writers interpreting the situation as oritical, others claiming that a continuation of the present conditions would force a crisis. T'welve years ago, Great Britain and the Continent were able to draw, from the United States gold production, 50 millions a year to supply wants and replenish stocks; and now the United States not only retain all their production but call for more besides. Many are the causes of the change that has taken place in the flow of gold. The United States have resumed specie payment, an unparalleled revival of business and a three years succession of enormous grain crops have changed the position of the country, fog
that of a debtor to foreign countries into that of a very large creditor, and with prosperity and its refining influence, a lurger consumption of precions metals for artistic works and honsehold articles has followerl. The development of home mantifacture in costly articles formerly imported, such as silks and tine woollelts, the substitution of steel for iron as a home industey, the enormous exports of cereals to Europe on an unprecedented scale, have all contributed to bring about i. change which the following figures eloquently show:

The balance of irale in fivor of the United States las become in a few years very large, and by its magnitute justifies; the apprehensions lelt in Europe of a drain of specie. In 1S75, the balance of trade in from of the United States was SIO, 104,000 ; in $187 \%$, it amounts in se65, $55 y, 000$, showing a gain in four years of $5 \because 53,785,000$.
In Burope, on the contrary, owing to baw erogs and rlull trube, the balance is against the lagest commercial countries, us shmon by the following table:

The decrease in the volume of trade in four years, would also exhibit some strikiug facts, but it is sufficient to say that the loss experienced ly the above-named conutries is due alike to a falling ofl in exports of mannfactures and an increase in imports of food prodemes.
The importation of specie is consequently justified as being necessary to settle the balance which the exchange of products has left open. But the question is : How much more gold can Europe spare? It is maintained that any very large exports will produce a panic there. This does not seem sn improbable when we bear in mind how the reserves of gold in Europe hare dwindled of late years.

The Bank of France is the principal European centre where a metallic reserve is held. A comparison of the stock of precious metals held by that Bank on the 3lst December of the last five years with that held in the mildle of July last will show how rapidly the proportion of gold has been decreasing:


Thans within bur years an 1 a half, from December, 187 ti, to.July, 1880 , the proportion of gollt hell bo the Bank of liance has dropped from it per cent. to 38 per cent. 'The supply of goll held in Paris and the unknown ruantity hehl by the Bank of Ciermany may be regatelas the available stock out of which a demand for export conlif be met, and it may be supposed that any stront demand upon a stack so reduced will be resisted by higher mates of interest, or that if the gold is shipped, Eumpe will suffer, and that suftring camot help reacting apon this continent. The absorption of goll through the return to specic payment by the United states and the smatl supply in the money centres will ngain revive the question of bi-metallism, especially now that Italy contemplates the withelawal of her paper money, thas hecoming a new drain upon the gold market.

## POSI OFFICE SAVINGS BANES.

A statement of the business of the Post Ohice Savings Banks from Ist April, 1968, to 30th Jume, 1880, has been recent. ly published, and exhibits most satisfactory results. The number of oflices was SI in ISGS and is now 297. The increase during the last five gears has been from 279 to 297 , and the number was the same in 1850 as in 1850 . Very diftprent has been the result as to the number of depositors. In 1570 there were 35,647 , in 187943,349 , and in 1880, 56,031 . In the five years from June, 1870 to 1875 , the number of depositors increased by 9,202 , while in the five years ending in 1880 the increase was 17,384 , of which 12,682 was in the last year. In the five years between 1870 and 1575 the deposits did not vary materially, the diference between the highest amount, $\$ 2,340,284$, and the lowest, $\$ 1,917,376$, having been $\$ 422,708$. In the last tive years the difference between the highest in $1830, \$ 2,720,216$, and the lowest in 1875, $\$ 1,521,000$, was $\$ 1,199,216$. The aggregate amount outstanding at the credit of depositors, inclusive of interest, has never been so high as on 30th June last. In June, 1872,73 and 74 there was little variation, the amount having been about $\$ 3,200,000$. In the four succeeding years there was a falling off, and the aggregate amounts were unde: $\$ 3,000,000$. In 1579 , they increased to $\$ 3,105,190,50$, and in 1880 to $\$ 3,945,069.11$, the number
of depositors being 31,365 , against 27,445 in 1879. This aftords a gratifying proof of the improvement in the condition of the penple. It is worthy of notice that during the last nine years about $\$ 2,500,000$ has been tansferrel from the Post Office Savings Bank to the Finance Department, amb inscribed as Dominion 5 per cent. stock in the names of the depositors. We have hat occasion move than once io call attention to this Dominion : per cent. stock, when suggestions have been made that the Govermment shonh endeavor to obtain louns at home. It is many years since fueilities have been given for obtaining (iovermment : per cent. stock, and it would appear that it has beentaken to a larger extent than his been generally believed. At the end of 1879, the Dominion if per cent. stock amomited to $8 t, 121,197,5$ per cent. stock to $83,945,739$, Savings Bank, $83,105,190$; Savings Banks in Nova Scotia, S2,495, 201 ; in New Rranswiek, $\$ 1,704,738$; British Col. umbia, $\$ 1,179,402$, giving an aggregato amount of $\$ 16,543,467$, or more than 16 per cent. of the aggregate deltt of the Dominion borrowed from our own people, and chiefly in small sums. The average amount standing in the name of each Savings Bank depositor has decreased of ate years. In 1570, it was as high as $\$ 147.01$, and in 1580 , $i t$ was only $\$ 125.80$. The interest allowed to depositors in I880 was $\$ 136,075.47$. The total expenses of management, including salaries, compensation to Posl Masters, inspection, printing, stationery, de., was in 1880, \$19,134.14, and we learn from a note that the average percentage on the Savings Bank halances for interest and charges of all kinds is rather less than 4 t percent. The report contains a goon deal of interesting information, and is highly creditable to Mr. J. C. Stewart, the superintendent of the Savings Bank branch, an officer who has workerl zealously in the department for upwards of $2 \overline{5}$ years.

## HARBOUR <br> COMMISSIONERS PORI:

The monthly meeting of the Harbour Commissioners was held of the 9 oh inst. There hal been no report from the Chief Engineer at the previous meeting in August, so that the one presented at the last meeting covered the operations of two monthis. The usual quantity of work had been done in the deepening and improring of the channel. A good deat of work had also been done at the Allanand Dominion and Temperley wharves. At the former the work completed comprised timber wharfing in. 25 feet depth of water, 230 lineal feet; dredging, 18,000 cubic yards;
filling cribs and space in rear, 58,000 cubic yards. At the Dominion and Temperley lines the endargement adds to the wharf an average breadth of $43 \frac{1}{2}$ feet by a lengel of $4 \geq 5$ feet, giving a great cleal more space on the wharf where it was much wanted. and considerably increasing its effective capreity for berthing large vessels. The electric light has been since the 28 th July in constant use, and with very satis. factory results. The wharf frontage, inchnding piers is nearly 13 miles, over which the light of the sixteen lamps may be distributed as desired. It is stated that the system is the lirst known of lighting an extensive line of wharves by electricity. 'The Harbor Master's reports shows an increased tonnage daring the month, being for 1579 8:3,543 tons, and 122,587 in 1580, or an increase of nearly 47 per cent. The total numberof vessels in 1879 was 359 , and in 1880459 , increase 100. Of these 459 vessels 178 were ocean steamers, giving an arrival of over 10 ocean steamers every week since the navigation opened on the 2nd May. The revenue from inward and ontward whart age and tonnage dues on ships has increased $\$ 17 ; 500$ for the month, while the total trafic shows $a$ slight decrease. The total increase from the opening of the navigation to the 31 st August was $\$ 47,072$, or about 33 per cent., the income for 1879 having been $\$ 130,850$ and for 1880 $\$ 186,922$. Attention has been directed to a new Act which came into force on the ist September, intituled, "an Act to make better provision respecting the navigation of Canadian waters," and which is said to be a very important one. It appears that sixteen countries, including Great Britain and the United States, have agreed to adopt it, and masters and pilots are warned of the necessity of becoming acquainted with its provisions. We have endeavored to give a brief summary of the most important parts of the Harbor Commissioners' report.

## THE LAND BANT SCHENE.

Mr. Galbraith has sent us another letter in support of his views, but we are of opinion that lie has already had abundant opportunity of ventilating then, and that the merits of the question are sufficiently understood. We may give very briefly a specimen of $M_{r}$. Galbraith's line of argument. He says: "A bank with 10 mil"lion dollars capital (mortgages) might "discount 30 million dollars worth of " mortgages. The assets would be 40 mil"lions and debts 30 millions, and the "accounts opened with such a bank "would never require to be foreclosed "for lack of capiial." As no other mode
is pointed out of lonning 30 millions, we presume that the fand bank is to issue its notes for 30 millions, and that wuch motes would be given in payment to the mortgagors. What would then become of them? A man who mortgages his property for, let us say, live thousand dollars, has some use for $\$ 5,000$. Ito will not mortgige his property for notes which he intends to lock up. He either wants to pay a debt, or to use the money in some way. He will part at once with the land bank's uotes, which will inevitably come back for redemption, and Mr. Gabmaith will searcely pretend that the mortgages which he relies on as available assets would really be avaiable to meet demand liabilities. Mr. Galbmath puts the case in another form! bat substantially similar. He says: "For example, " che "Trust and Lain Co. borrows " 8100,000 "in london, sells the exchange to a Cath"dian bank, and loans the bank notes on "mortgare. Why not lend its own issue "for $\$ 100,000$ on mortgage in Catmala, "then it would ouly reguire to bormew in "London say the tenth part of that sum "to keep its circulation at par?" The delusion under which Mr. Gabbath labors is that bunk notes remain in circulation for a considerable time, whereas the reverse is the case. Notes issued by a bank are firequently returned before the close of the day on which they are issued, while none stay out for any considerable time. Bank circulation is maintained by constant re-issues, which are eflecterl by short loans falling due from day to day, and paid in the equivalent of gold. It is simply absurd to contend that mortgages would be aviluble assets for redeeming notes convertible into gold on demand. Mr. Galbraith would be more consistent if he were to join the fiat money school of economists, whose headquarters are, we believe, at St. Catharines, and who do not pretend to advocate a convertible currency.

## THE GREAT EXHIBITION:

The Dominion Exhibition opened on Tuesday last according to announcement, and thus far appears to have quite equalled the expectations of the public. Our people have shown by their zeal in endeavoring to outdo all former exhibitions of the kind held in the Jom:nion that local differences are being obliterated, and that the time is at hand when all will co-operate for the general advancement of the city's and country's welfare. There is yet, however, too great a disproportion between the amounts sub. scribed; but the liberal contributors may thank Nature that bleat them with the
character of enterprise which begets the ability to give freely in such cases. But the dividing line is gradually becoming more indistinct.
The huildings and the surroundings are all that could be desired. The Crystal Palace with its extensions is a handsome structure, and the same may be said of the onser seven lange structures, espedially the Manitoba Jixhibit building where one may learn nearly as much of the chancter of the country and We pinneer spirit of our Western friends as could be acquired by a week's visit to the Praire Province itself. The Ereat variety of goods, chiefly of Canadian manufachure, to which we must refer in detail next week, attest the pro. gress of the people at large, and those who visit the Jexhibition camnot fail to learn fomething useful and instructive at every turn within the spacious buidings and grounds. Thousands are flocking to the city from every direction. Ample movision, however, has been made to fur. nish every requisite for comfort when, as is usual at this season, our leading hotels are overfowing with visitors from every quater of the globe.

For the country merchant the Exhibition possesses a double interest. The great variety of goods shown by manufacturers from all quarters, and the unusually well assorted stocks in our warehouses mong which a day or two might be pro fitably spent, cannot fail to be instructive. Those whom curiosity may lead to exam. ine the styles of two handred years ago in architecture, as well as in tools and implements, can see in out-of-the-way corners of the city much to flatter our modern pogress. Montreal can show the finest buildings, pablic and private, of any city on the continent, but we have always beside us historical reminiscences of a difterent order of things,
His Excellency the Marquis of Torne will visit the Exhibition next Tuesday.

## THE BYSTANDER AND JHE CURJENCY.

In his September number the Bystunder has undertaken to controvert the opinions expressed in this jonmal on the subject of the currency. It is not a little amusing to notice a complaint in the Toronto Mruil, a prominent organ of the Conservative party, that personal attacks are made on the learned gentleman who is the avowed author of the Bystander, and who is himself as reckless as any journalist in the Dominion in his personal allusions. When it is borne in mind that the editor of the Bystander is an avowed Annexationist, the manner in which the Conservative journals toady him on all
occasions can only excite disgust in the minds of a majority of their supporters. No reader of the Bystander can be unaware of its unwaranted personal allusions, which we have been reluctantly compelled to notice on this occasion because it has thought proper to atcribute articles in the Jouncul to a writer who is known to be a contributor, but who is not the editor, and who is frequently supposed to be the author of articles which he has never seen. We defy the Bystander to point out a passage in our articles on the currency indicative of want of temper, but the learned editor is notorionsly intolerant of opposition to his own views. The Bystander charges us with considering it an act of presumption on his part to have an opinion on the Bank Charter Act, on no other ground than that we ventured to quastion the soundness of his views from which we continue to dissent. We deny that the issue of bank notes is the legitimate trude of a banker. Strictly, the business of a banker is to be the custodian of money deposited with him, and which it is his business to employ in such a manner as will enable him to meet his liabilities. If' we. were propounding some new theory on the subject, there might be some excuse for the Bystander's criticism, but our views on the subject happen to be in strict accordance with those of the most eminent English authorities, such as Sir Robert Peel, Mr. Gladstone, Lord Overstone and Mr. Lowe, now Lord Sherbrooke.

A few years ago Mri. Lowe, when Chancellor of the Ixxchequer, used the following language in declaring his adhesion to the principle of Sir Robert Peel's Act of 1844: "It is generally recognized that the issue " of bank notes is the creation of money, " and that the creation of money is the " business of the State, not of any trad-
"ing association; hence it follows that "the issue of such notes by private banks "is rather an anomaly which we may " tolerate than a right which we ought to " extend. A mixed currency, composed " partly of the precious metals and partly " of paper, cannot be in a sound condition " unless it complies with the three follow" ing conditions : first, the paper must be "convertible into gold on demand; second, " sufficient security must be held by the "issuers to secure the payment of the " notes; third, mixed currency must be "at all times exactly of the same amount, "and consequently of the same value, as "a purely metallic currency would be." We do not claim the recognition of the foregoing opinions as sound merely because they were expressed by Mr . Lowe, although they would be entitled to great
weight as his personal opinion, but because they are in accordance with those of the most eminent authorities on the subject, and, as MIr. Lowe observed, "generally recognized." And yet for advocating those views we are pronounced by the Bystander "a greenbacker or a beaver" backer in posse." 'The Bystander takes exception to the legal tender chanacter of the notes, asking "why should anybody's paper be legal tender"? We ven. ture to think that there is somediflerence between the Govemment of the country and " any body," and there is a very simple answer to the statement: "If the paper is good, nobody will refuse it; if it is doubtrul, why is any body to be compelled to take it." The paper being legal tender is available to Corporations and individuals throughout the Dominion who have to keep legal tenders on hand to meet demands, and who would have to keep gold, if gold alone were a legal tender. The chief olject of the issue of Dominion notes is to economize the use of gold. The supposition of the Bystander of "a " creditor so eccentric as to refuse Bank " of Encland notes, and prefer to encumber " himself with a half a hundred weight of "gold," is simply absurd, inasmuch as Bank of England notes are a legal tender precisely as Dominion notes are, and no creditor, whether eccentric or not, could refuse them. As to taking the notes to the Bank of England, it must be borne in mind that "the eccentric creditor" may happen to live in Liverpool, Manchester, Leeds, Birmingham, or Bristol, where he would be just as unable to obtain his "half a hundred weight of gold" as he would in Canada, where he can always ob. tain gold for his Dominion notes in Montreal, Toronto, Halifux or St. John. If the Bystander can, as he asserts, "see no public convenience in legal tender," he simply proclaims his own want of familiar. ity with ordinary business transactions. We maintain that legal tender notes convertible into gold on demand are a great public convenience, and that to designate them as "a forced currency," which is the term applied to inconvertible notes, is simply to mislead.

The Bystander charges Sir Francis Hincks with being the author of the bystem of a Dominion note issue in this country, and proceeds: "From him to "Sir Leonard Tilley is a natural step in the " Financial Rake's progress. He, like a hen, "has sat on the duck's egg and hatched " the unauspicious bird, which he now " with maternal horror sees taking to its "natural element of inflation." the system inaugurated by Sir Francis Fincks was in strict accordance with that of Sir

Robert Peel, viz, to fix an amount which might safely be issued on the security of Govermment debentures authorized by Act of Dithament, and convertible into gold on the shortest notice, and providing that all issues in excess of that amount shonk be issued on the security of gold alone, or certificates of deposit in chartered banks. The avowed object of receiving certificates of dejosit in chartered banks instead of gold was to induce the banks to circulate the (Government small notes, which are at description of currency unknown in England. The permission to hold such certificates of deposit as gold was notian essential feature of the system; it was only permissive, and might have been abandoned at any time. It led to no difficulty, but it is not a little extraordinary that it was denouncel at the time as tending to cause inflation by Writers who have found no reason to complain of the policy of the present Govern. ment, which is certainly calculated to create alarm. The accepted theory on the subject of the issues of Government notes is that they should be automatic and that no eflort should be used to circulate notes beyond the requirements of the jutalic. The original proposal was an issue of $\sin , 200,000$ on the security of dobentures of the Dominion authorized by Act of Parliament, and having the same value as all other debentures, which it is well known are saleable in the London money market at any moment, all further issues to be based on gold or on deposits in chartered banks. According to the new scheme of Sir Leonard Tilley, there is no limit whatever to the issue on debentures until after the aggregate issue shall have reached $S 20,000,000$, an a mount so large that the issues might as well have been made unlimited. There is not the least analogy between the two systems.

We protest against the assertion of the Bystander, that the present system is founded on the old. The one to which Sir Francis Fincks procured the assent of Parliament was based on Sir Robert Peel's Act of 1844 , viz, to fix an amount on which it was safe to issue on the security of debentures, and to require gold or its equivalent to be held for all issues in excess of that amount. The counter project of Sir Leonard Clilley is to issue notes and to hold a certain tixed percentage of available means to meet them, which is particularly dangerous with a currency about three-fourths of which is held as reserves by the banks, and therefore liable to be brought in for redemption at a moment's notice. We do not propose to criticise on this occasion the recent amendments to the Dominion Note Act, but we must
protest against the Bystander's pretension, that there is the least analogy between the two systems. While we write we have before us two Dominion note statements of 1872 marl $158 \%$. Une of 10 th Aigust, 1872 , gives the total circulation $\$ 9,412,702$ against, which was hell:

It will be observed, 1st, that there was an exact balance between the notes in circulation and tho assets held to meet them; 2nd, that the debentures were the same notwithstanding the increase of circulation, while the increased circulation was represented partly by gold and partly by demand deposits in chartered banks. The statements now pullished aifter materially in form, but we admit that they show a burplus, and we are far from wish. ing to convey an iden that there is any intention whatever on the part of the Government of running tuy risk.

All that we contend for is that the system adopted by the Government when Sir Francis Hincks was Minister of Finance was modelled on that of Sir Robert Peel in 1844 , viz., to fix a safe amonat to be issued on Government security, all issues in excess to be based on gold or its equivalent, whereas that which Sir Leonard Tilley has substituted is an issure at the discretion of the Government, reserves to be held according to a percentage which under the circumstances is wholly unreliable, inasmuch as the bulk of the issues are held as reserves by the banks, and all practical men must be aware that the percentage of gold which would be sufficient for $\$ 6,000,000$ would be wholly inad. equate for $\$ 10,000,000$. We beg to assure the Bystander that we are perfectly aware that the issues of private and joint stock banks are still permitted in Eugland, the only effect boing that about $25,000,000$ nut of E30,000,000 are still in circulation which wonld otherwise be notes of the Bank of England. We have always admitted that it would be a mistake to interfere with the issues of existing banks, oven if what we consider the sound theory on the subject were adopted by Parlia ment. It would be a great mistake to interfere suddenly with the issues of the existing banks, but the true principle is a Dominion note issue convertible on depiand.

## AN ESSAFIN A NUTSHECK.

At the ammal convention of the Fire faderwriters Association of the North West recently in Chicugo, the essiny presented by Mr. Dargan of Trexas was nwarded one of the two prizes otlered for the best essay on subjects of general ituportatued to the protession. The subject treated of was proposed by the President of the Franklin Fire Insurance Co. of Phishbetphia, and was as follows:
: The evils that oppress fire unterweiting at the present time, wincially bostile legishtion in its yarions furms of ndverse stuthtes, entacted by inimical legizhators, ignoment of ofr rights, and not disposed to learn true justice towards corporations. What mast we do in this erisis to protect ourselves? And by what memods can we accomplish retorm?" Sixteen buthusiastic underwriters attempted to answer his soul-stirting cry. 'We reason for Mr. Dargan's suiccess is plain. He took up the evils affecting insumance companies, and treated them in the manner in whieh gencalogical trees are handled, and the judges awarded him the prize beenage he had given them a new gensation. Printurs ink malies a poor substitute for the fincy roling and lettering of $\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{s}}$. Dargan, but beve is his essuy in full:


A few weeks ago Mr. A. Moir chstoms ap,praiser for the grocery depmetnient liere, made a seizure of 5,000 gross of corlis, which had been consigned by the manufncturers in Oporto, Portugat, to Messrs: Brock \& Co., their agents in this city, for under-valuation, the goods having been entered att 8 e per gross, while the
appraiser rated themat 20 c . Some correspond ence look place between the consiguees and the Govermment, and the latter cumeluded, on discovering that the revente hat beren systematicully deframled by the practice for several years, until it had almost becoune usuge, that they would not conliscate, but compel Messris. Brock \& Co. to pay the amount of daly buma the inermsed valuation and a fine of on per cent. on the whole, momuting to $\$ 100$, as provided by law in such cases. This amoint was pid for the manufacturers by their Montreat agents, who stated that they as agents bad no menns of checking cargos, and aceepted the consignment in good fitith. There is still another "large consignment of about 35,000 gross in dispute, which Messrs. Brock \& Co. contend are entered at the full valution, and that therefore the Goverument canot legally exnct further tuty. The corks are alleged to be the same as the previons consigmment, but the appraiser values them at ede. It is stated on direct anthority that other cork deaters it: this city have been compreded to anend their entrics and puy ndatitional duty.

It is claimed unt byia new method, snid to have been discovered by an indian, of londing grain in bulk for transathantic shipment, all diffenties and dangera from shifting are obriated. A partition is placed half-way down the hold from the deck, and a finse siling is conducted in such a way ns to reduce the dimmeter of the ship at the deck aboit oite-thitil. It is said to be impossilhe, with this arrangement, for the cargo to shifi, or the centre fritvity of the ship to be disturbed. Loose grain may be stownd below the partition, and get the bilk retained by the pratition wili be sufficient to secure the rightiug of the ship after a storm.

Accommes to the Civil Gode of Cower Canada, articles 1998 to 2,001 , reterring to unpuid vendors boing unable to recluim goods sold and in the hands of a second party, it will be found that they have not only the right to revendicate, but also a right of preference apon its price if exercised wishin eight days.:This right is subject to the following conditions:1. The side must not liave been mide on creatit. 2 'Lhe goods must still be entire and in the satne condition. 3. The merchandise must not have pissed into the himas of a third party who las paid for it, and firthermore:" if the "hhing be still in the same condition, but the "vendor be no longer within the delay, or have "given credit, be hus a like privilege upon the "proceeds, except as regards the lessor or the pleagee.

Orvis, the inventor of the process, says his deviee supplies the furnace witla a proper gunatity of oxygen of the air and hydrogen of the steati, which uniting with the rolntile hytromatmons mad other products of combustion atisiug trum bituminous coal, forms a mixture of carbureted hydrogen and oletiant gas, which reididy ignites and prodnces a perfect combustion, and at the same time making additiombl fuel. Mis. The local money market presents scarcely any mow feature the commencement of the Fin morement of grain und prodace genemally is stimulating some incrensed enquin's tor ad. vances, but the demand from wercuntile borrowers continnes only moderate, and the current rate of discommes is correspondingly easy. Good commercint paper is readily dis counted at 6 to 'iper cent., as to arme and drate Call and short-dated loans are made at 3 to 4 and time loans at 4 to 5 per cent., ans to the charneter of the collaterals. Sterling Exchange has been rather more active his week, it 8 do pren. for round amounts between bunks and美 10 8t du orer he cutnter. In New Fork the posted rates are $\$ 4.82$ for 60 days, and $S 4.84 d$ or threc-day bills. Produce bills are mude here at $T \neq$ prenn., and drafis on New louk drawn at it jrens. The stock market has relapsed into a decidedly weak condition this week ; owing to the rathet indetinite, terms of the contract, the report of the close of nego tiations with the Pacific Ralway syndicate has failed to inspire confidence in the boom" of the pmst few weeks, and as the market is full of stock, investors nee now endenvoring, nearly all at once, to get relieved and hence the weak and declining tendency of the market. The factories all continue very busy, in few being kept ruming both day rad night, on back urders, all of which will not be filled before the middle of next month. The Fall trade in the country has not yet opened up suticienty to cause much of a break in stocks, nevertheless numerots letter orders for sorting up parcels are being received. This shows that retail dealers have not purchased beyond their requirements, and all agree that, if the weather be at all favorable, a brisls Fall trade will yec be done. Prices rule firn, but no change is expected until spring samples are sent out, in December next. Jemitumees are again reported quite satisfictory.d

Oloves have also much firmness, with Iarge operations in N. York. Fruils.-Valentia Raisins, the to Sc for old; Sc to $2 e$ for new. Cables report high prices at Malaga, representing a cost D.P. of about $\$ 2.50$ for Lavers and S3 for London. Uurtants of prime quality at Patras firm.

Oarthe, erc.-The market for the week rules steady with a fair demand. Shipping cattle have been held at a slight advance over last week. Monday's market was better stocked than during last week, a better quality being offered; twenty car londs were received for ofter, wearly all of which sold at from 4.feto 5 de. per lb, the balance, comprising butcher's cattle, being sent to the Figer market. Dur Goods.-Trade has been increasingly active; the cheap excursions to the Dominion Exhibition have induced a large number of merchants from all quarters of the Dominion to visil Montreal, many of them for the fira
time for many years, and the large warehouses have been moderitely crowded daring the past two or three days with buyers from Surnin to Quebec, and a fuir representation also of Manitobr from Winniper, and of the Lower Provinces. The majority, however, came prineipally for pleasure, and purchases bave been nearly all small sortiner-up pareels to meet present requirements. So fir, the demand bas been pretty even for all classes of goods. Stocks n the country are as yet aimost entire, and dealers here have well aigh completed all the orting-up orders received from travellers. Next weok the live stock exhibits will be comwete, and other fentures of the great Exhibition will be further adranced, so that the greatest rush of visitors to the city is not expected until then. There is a very creditable display in the inain building of Candian coton and woollen manufactures, to which several local wholesale houses are leading contributors Notes are being paid promptly, and remittances are reasombly good. With reference to the duty imposed on winceys, the trade here are greatly exercised, and at a meeting of the Dry Goods Association held the other day strong opposition was manifested by all present to the new interpretaion of the tarili by the Government, which instructs the customs officers to charge a daty of TAE per lb. on imported plain wincers, in addition to the 20 per et. adealorem heretofore charged. The trade are united in the opinion that the additional duty of ite per lb. is illegrally enforced, that it is not provided for in lise customs tarifi, and that no Order-in-Council has been passed to authorize it. They hive necordingly forwarded samples of the goods to the Department at Othama, asking for faller explanations and a cleaver detinition of the tarift. Jt is certainly an ill-judged time to be adjusting any differences in the metning of the tariflit the middle of the Fall tade season, for, while some few importers may have alrendy been elected, the mijority have not been asked to pay the additional fite per lb., and others, in the face of this, may perhaps find it even more profitable to cancel repeat orders given than to import the goods. To avoid any injustice, therefore, it is to be hoped that the Government will not continue to enforce any radical change until after the present season in the tarifl genetally understood to have been in force, and that ere long the difficulty will be adjusted to the satisfaction of all concerned.
Fhour and Giban.- Since the date of our last report, prices for bread stuffs on both sides of the Atlantic have considerably advanced. Both mivite aud public cable advices report the English wheat markets stronger and higher, quotations for wheats in Liveryool being ld to ad per cental higher today than yesterday. In the Western markets-Chicago and Mil-wanke-whert remains about steady at yesterday's prices. In this market the feeling has reatly improved snce last week, and sales have twanspired at considerably advanced figures. 'Lhe late decline for whent in Europe ed many shippers to attempt to cover the loss they apprehended on their shipments in transit by selling short at Chicaro, but the latter market, instead of sympathising with the feeling in Europe, steadily advanced, owing to farmers small deliveries, so that the over-prudent shippers were caught both ways. As compared with our quotations whent in Europe is 5 c lower, while the Ohicago market has advanced 5c on short sales. The reversion commenced on tlic continent of the high return of the crops is causing a change for the better here, and orders have reached us with higher limits, but scarcely high enough to permit of their being filled. The gap, however, between our prices and their offer is gradually becoming natrower Canadian wheat is begianing to forward freely to this market, and a large export trade is anticipated later in the season. A cargo of very choice white winter was sold yesterday at S1.12, and a cargo of ordinary do at \$1.08. For No. 2 Toledo red winter $\$ 1.08$ has been bid, but there are no sellers at under \$1.10. No. 2 Canadian red wintor is quoted at $\$ 1.08$ to
\$1.09, and other grades of Canadn wheat remain nomiun at previonsly quoted values. Oorn is firm here at 53 c to 53 f c on spot, nud 5ec to 522 c to arrive; a lot of 12,000 bushels sold yesterday at 53 c . In consequence of the inereased demman from Germany and Norway there has been a rather active enguiry here for rye this week at advancing prices, find one lot of 10,000 bushels was sold at 85c. In New York Western rye is quoted at 908 c , which is equal to 90 chere . Onts are quiet at 3ac to 32c, pease stendy at 83c to 84 c , and burley nominal at 60 c to toc. The loeal hour maket rules guiet and steady at considerably timer pricas thun when we last wrote. Superior Extra sold to-day at $\$ 5.20$ to 55.25 , and Sprine Extra solil at 50.25 in handred barrel lots. A lod of 2,000 sacks of Suncrior Extra was soled for shipment to London yesterday on $1 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{t}$, but known to be at an advanee of blo. on previous figures. A considerable quantity of flonr has been shipped to Newfondinnd in bond during the past month, one local fitm alone having forwarded some 20,000 bils. Stocisin Montral on the dates named:

Hops,-The market for the new crop has not yet opened up; it few samples lave been forwarded, but no business upon which to establish quotations has tmaspired. Growers are reported to be holding back their stocks antil later in the season. Reports reepivel from all parts of the colntry give fivorable accounts of this year's crop. Snall sales of ehoice 1879 growh, to meet the wants of brewers, have been made at 25 c to 2 wc .

Damy Prodver.-The local maket for both butter and cheese has remnined remaskably fat all week, no transactions whatever on export account having been reported. In New York the sitution has been steady, and yesterday's Bulletin reports a very strong tone for ehoice and fancy stock, with an unwatd thrn in prices. No movement in butter is expectell here until a change takes place in Great Britain; latest advices from the Euglish markets report butter dull, and give no great encomragement for cheese either. A sale of zo boxes of the latter whs made here yesterday at 123 c . In butter there is really nothing doing here, except the mere supplying of the local retail demand. It would be difficult to obtain over 28 c . for choice Townships.

Drugs and Chemicals.-There has been some improvement in the demand for goods in this line, and prices have been governed more by the supplies in the market than by the figures ruling in England. Soda Ash has given way a little, and in large lots to arrive may be purchased ex ship at about $\$ 1.30$ per 100 . Canstic Soda on the other hand, is fimer, and in 25 or 50 drum lots is stiffat $\$ 2.50$ for good brands. Sal Soda, and Bicarb Soda remain firm at previous quotations. In the british market the demand is still light and unimportant except for Caustic Soda, for which article manufiteturers ne unable to quote at the moment, being oversold. In finer chemicals there is no change of importance to note.

Hardware and Iron.-There hns been a fair jobbing trade done in shelf and alk kinds of hardware since our last reference, and the prospects are still good for an unusually brisk fall trade; owing, however, to the number of exhibitions now open throughout the country, it may be later than in some previous years. Travel-
lers now ont are unable to do mucia business with Western merchants, who we generally busy at the fall shows. Bur fron contimes firm, both here and it Duglaus, sud a good demand from consumers is being experienced, a mir jobbing business laving been done during the week, but no latge siles bewwen houses, whith by-the-by are now pretty well stucked, have been reported. In the fig fron marke there is no elange in the situation, as compared with the date of onr hast repoct; a good many country merehants, atemding the Dominion Fxhibition, have been making enguiries this week as to quotations, but they seem indisposed to do business while on a risit for pleasure, and sules counpise only small jots, at mobongred prices. Latest cuble advices report the British marliets firm mad unchanged. Owind to the sailiug ressels having all left on their last trip, importers are now dependent ujon stenmers, and freights for the remainder of the seasonare therefore expected to be mneh higher. The bulk of the season's hasiness will likely be done in Oetober. Remithances goot.

Hows and Shoss.-The market fur green Nitus remains firm, and prices now paid to butehers are steady and settled at $\$ 10,50$ and Sifor Nos. 1, 2 and 3, respectively, at Ienst we camot learn of higher figures being paid, alhough it has been stated that 810.50 was mid for No. 1 n few days ago by a locat tanner. Dealers self to tamers at an advance of $\$ t$ on these prices. Receipts are tree, bat stocks held here we extremely light. Sheep-skins.-The oflerings during the week have been very fint, nud the demand tative, ut firm prices, wow maging from soc to st, aceording to size and guantity of wool. Colliatimes me nominally quoted ut 120 , but there we very few oflering, the sason being over.

Fruars.-Fall apples eontinne dabl, the market being overstocked, and the quality of the ollerings is genernlly poor. Sales slow, at Si to $\$ 1.50$ for romad lots of Oandian ; a few choice qualities, well-packed rendy for shipment, being Sl.75. American apples are scarce in this market, imports having been checked by the large guantitics of Cmadian fruit arriving. (of Penchesthe murket is well supplied, especinly of Clean Stones' from Upper Camadn. A bout 600 baskers arrived from the west lu-day, and sold at 70 c to $\mathbf{5 i}$ per basket in round lots; J:ate Crawfords bronght \$1.25 to the 50 Pears are modeately active, selling at 50 to soper brl. for Fiemish beanties and Duchess; a few lots of extra Bartletis have sold at \$12 to \$15 per brl. Grupes continue very plentifin, and are worth 4 e to 5 c per lb. for Concords, and 7 to 8 c for Delawares; the demmad is only fitir. J'lums are in fair request, at Sj.5n io S2 per crate for blec and green. hemons, good stock is very scarce, and prices fir:a. Ordinary gnalities selling at 85 to 86 per box or 88 per ense. The green fruit exhibit by the Montrial Horbicultural Society in Victoria Rink this week is pronounced a very credituble display, and the strow, on the whole, is regarded by all odds as the mosi successiul yet attempted by the Society.

Fabaguts.-Continue very dull, especinlly for grain, of which there are rery few shippers open for tomage just now; several of them have made contracts in advance for what tonmage they require. A small ressel was taken during the week at as. for gratin, Cork for orders; the highest bid for a medium-sized ressel. One steamer intending to lond with grain has been charured, it is reporied, for denls at $6 \overline{5}$. The Liddlesdale steamship left here several days ago for Savannah, nud is now loadiug cution, the owners not being willing to aceppt rates of freight ollered here. Some local brokers express confidence in the stability of present rates, and quote $45.6 \mathrm{~d} . \mathrm{j}$ os. to 5 s . 6 d . to direct U. K. ports or on the continent for steamers. Sailing vessels are quoted at 5s. to 5s. Gd. for spot. Timber and deal shippers lav-
ing engaged vessels intending to entry grain supports the opinion that we need not look for lower freights. Deals fiom this portare quoted at 65s. to 72 s . Gd. ; from Quebec or other St. Lanwrence port, 6 es. 6d. to bos. ; and lumber to hawrence prort, 55. to sit per it.

Funs.-The wholesale tride are still very busy with orders, the demand this season being fully equal to the ability of manufiactuters to supply. The ctass of grods sold, though, has been chiefly the common grades, and a proportionately lage amont of labor is required in mannfretwing them. With jucreased prosperity it the comntry, however, the tendency of the demand will be for a beter class of goods, and on the whole prospects promise a larger deman than dealers will be able to supply. Prices will ikely adrance, owjug to the increase in the value of Coney and otber low-priced goods. A new industry, claimed to be the piuneer enterprise of the kitur in the Dominion, that of manufacturing far hats, was commenced in this city this year, and is working satisfictorily thus tist. It will no doubt prove as favomble in its results as the Ganadian manufucure of wool mints, which has been largely increased during the past twelve montis. A ready sale at satisfactory prices has been fonat for all offering, and the fatwries are now increasing the products, in maticipation of a greater demand for the coming senson. The goods are filly equal to the American, and are furnished nt abouit the sume prices.
