The text of the note follows: The Secretary of State, to Ambassador Gerard.

Department of State, Washington, July 21, 1915.

You are instructed to deliver textually the following note to the minister of foreign affairs: The note of the Imperial German Government dated the 8th day of July, 1915, has received the careful consideration of the Government of the United States...

High Seas Free. The Government of the United States notes with satisfaction that the Imperial German Government recognizes without reservation the validity of the principles insisted on in the several communications which this government has addressed to the Imperial German Government with regard to its announcement of a war zone and the use of submarines...

The government of the United States is, however, keenly disappointed to find that the Imperial German Government regards itself as in large degree exempt from the obligation to observe these principles, even where it believes the policy and practice of the government of Great Britain to be in the present war with regard to neutral commerce...

and therefore an abandonment of the principles for which this government contends, which in times of calmer counsel every nation would concede as of course. Content for Same Object. The government of the United States and the Imperial German Government are contending for the same great object, have long stood together in urging the very principles upon which the government of the United States now so solemnly insists. They are both contending for the freedom of the seas. The government of the United States will continue to contend for that freedom, from whatever quarter violated, without compromise and at any cost. It invites the practical cooperation of the Imperial German Government at this time when cooperation may accomplish most and this great common object be most strikingly and effectively achieved. The Imperial German Government expresses the hope that this object may be in some measure accomplished even before the present war ends. It can only be obliged to insist upon it, by the whomsoever violated or ignored, in the protection of its own citizens, but it is also deeply interested in seeing it made practicable between the belligerents themselves and holds itself ready at any time to act as the common friend who may be privileged to suggest a way. Deliberately Unfriendly. In the meantime the very value which this government sets upon the long and unbroken friendship between the people and government of the United States and the people and government of the German nation impels it to press very solemnly upon the Imperial German Government the necessity for a scrupulous observance of neutral rights in this critical matter. Friendship itself prompts it to say to the Imperial German Government that repetition by the commanders of German naval vessels of acts in contravention of those rights must be regarded by the government of the United States, when they affect American citizens, as deliberately unfriendly. BOY SAVED FROM DEATH GOT EARS WELL BOXED. Little Willie Hawkins Snatched From Beneath Train at Lewiston. Special to The Toronto World. NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., July 23.—When three-year-old Willie Hawkins was snatched from beneath the wheels of a New York Central train at Lewiston this morning and delivered safe and sound into the arms of his mother, Mrs. Thomas Hawkins of East Queen street, Toronto, on the steamer Chippewa at Queenston, he had his ears soundly boxed, much to the indignation of his rescuer, William Piper, assistant superintendent of the Great Gorge Route. Willie and his mother were passengers on the Chippewa, which drew in to the wharf at Lewiston at 10 o'clock this morning. In the rush at Lewiston the youngster became separated from his mother, and, unseen by her, gained the dock. He wandered out onto the tracks of the New York Central, and just as the train was about to bear down upon him he was seen by Piper. Willie was complacently sitting on one of the rails, watching the crowds boarding trolleys. In a moment Piper snatched up the youngster and bore him to safety. He hauled a motorboat and tore across the river, signaling Capt. William Marlow of the Chippewa, who held the boat. Willie was tumbled into the lap of his hysterical mother. She straddled him convulsively to her breast, held him away for a minute to satisfy her that he was unharmed, and then soundly boxed his ears. "Just like a woman," grumbled Piper as he clambered over the rail into the waiting motorboat. "She might have made the kid deaf for life." Deserter Fined. An admission that he had deserted the 59th Regiment at Kingston, buried his uniform and ridden the bumpers to Toronto, was made by Fred Austin in the police court yesterday, when he appeared as a G.T.R. trespasser. Austin had a complete set of military badges of the regiment but he would not tell where he obtained civilian clothes. He was fined \$1 and costs and then turned over to the military authorities.

LOSS OF A WARSHIP IS DENIED BY BERLIN. Claim Made That Only Mine-Layer Was Sunk in Baltic. BERLIN (via London), July 23.—Supplementing the denial made last night that a German warship had been sunk in the Baltic by a hostile submarine, the German admiralty today authorized the statement that in the operations in question no battleship of the Deutschland class was attacked by a submarine, and that no German warship of any kind was sunk. The only loss during the operations was the Albatross, a mine-layer, which was stated.

HORTON GETS DECORATION. PETROGRAD, July 23.—The decoration of the Order of St. George was today conferred upon Commander Max Horton, of the British navy, for sinking the German warship Formosa. The German admiralty, in an official statement, denied that the Formosa had been destroyed.

HAS PROLONGED WAR. LONDON, July 23.—If cotton had been declared contraband at the outbreak of the war, the German navy, as an article in The Evening News, says, would have been over by last April. A similar statement is made by Hilaire Belloc in Land and Water.

"SINK ALL, SPARE NONE" GERMAN'S SEA POLICY. Admiral Kirchoff Says Protests of "Sanctimonious Britons" Are Useless. LONDON, July 23.—The Hague correspondent of The Evening News says: "The Tagliche Rundschau publishes a violent tirade by Admiral Kirchoff denouncing the English official verdict on the Lusitania case and declaring that submarine attacks on unarmed merchant will be continued, regardless of the fate of neutrals. 'Admiral Kirchoff says: 'Members of the German Government and the admiralty and the crews of the submarines will sleep peacefully in the face of such accusations. They will continue just as before to commit such acts, no matter how loudly the proud and sanctimonious Britons may shriek about murder. The watchword for us is 'down with the ships that cross the bows of our valiant U-boats and with those carrying munitions under the protection of humanity. Our note has clearly declared that the presence of American passengers on board will make no difference in this respect.'"

EXTENSION OF CANADIAN TRADE

RAILROAD STOCKS UNDER PRESSURE

Discouraging Cotton Outlook Affected Southern and Southwestern Group.

War Specialties Made Irregular Swings—Bethlehem Steel Strong.

NEW YORK, July 23.—So far as actual results are concerned, today's stock market was largely a repetition of the day immediately preceding.

There was a further downward revision of some of the war specialties, to which Bethlehem Steel common and preferred proved the most notable exception, the former repeating its recent high quotation of 204 and the latter making a new high at 125.

Both the Locomotive and the Baldwin Locomotive also broke into new ground at 77 1/2. A few other industrial and equipments participating more or less actively in profitable war contracts rose and fell within comparatively narrow limits.

Railroad stocks were more prominent, but almost wholly at the expense of quoted values. Shares like St. Paul, Canadian Pacific, Southern Railway preferred, and Texas and Pacific, preferred to lower prices in years. St. Paul's minimum of 78 being the record since 1898.

All the carriers in the southern and southwestern sections of the country were heavier at declines of 1 to 4 points. Actual new low prices were established by Missouri Pacific at 2 3/8, Sea Board Air Line preferred at 30 1/4, Rock Island at 10 1/2 and Norfolk Western at 17.

The chief factor in connection with the heaviness of the southern stocks was the disappointing outlook resulting from the war, together with unfavorable earnings. Cotton options were mostly higher, however, in response to an interest in the market for foreign sources.

Dealings were the lightest of any recent days, the overturn in the specialties being from 1 1/2 to 2 under that of the midweek. Baldwin Locomotive, Westinghouse and American Locomotive, together with U. S. Steel, made up one third of the total of 475,000 shares.

International conditions, particularly the impending reply of the U. S. to Germany, furnished the basis for much of the day's hesitation. There was no development of interest in the markets for foreign exchange. The probable success of the new Canadian note offerings by our bankers threw some light on the investment enquiry. Monetary conditions were unchanged except for a more free acceptance of international collaterals.

Bonds were irregular, with a renewal of foreign selling. Total sales, par value, \$1,655,000.

War Stocks Active on Toronto Market

Canada Car Advances Ten Points and Steel Issues Also Show Firmness.

With the Dominion Government paying 5 per cent. for money, it is quite feasible for semi-speculative stocks with settled dividend prospects to sell considerably below normal levels.

The weakness of this position is shown by sales outside of the Toronto stock market and it is probable that more of this will follow unless some arrangements are made.

C.P.R. was weak yesterday. Five shares sold on this market at 133 1/2 and the New York level was 133. Canadian Steel at 43 1/2 and Steel of Canada back to Wednesday's high of 16 1/2.

In the curb section of the exchange, Smelters returned to 106 and National Car was raised a point to 28 1/2.

The buoyancy in the shares of companies which are benefiting by the war orders on the New York exchange has been contagious and Canada Car was advanced ten points yesterday to 91 1/2.

Steel stocks were also advanced, with Steel Corporation at 21 1/2, U. S. Steel at 43 1/2 and Steel of Canada back to Wednesday's high of 16 1/2.

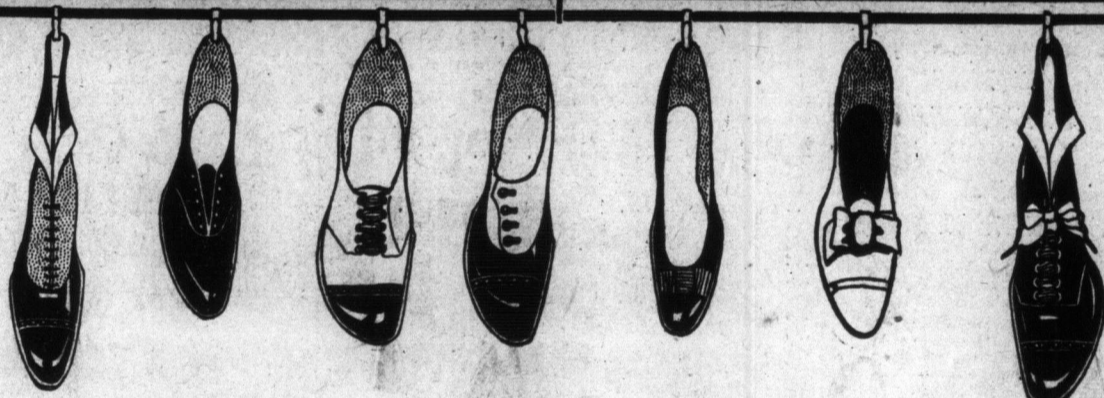
