WASHINGTON, April 18.—Democratic leaders are prepared for an attempt by some of the Republicans who oppose the Canadian reciprocity bill to embarrass the Democratic majority in the passage of the bill, by proposing as an amendment to it a section embodying all the free list that the Democratic ways and means committee has prepared as the first of the party's tariff measures.

Proposed An Armistice

MEXICO CITY, April 18.—A proposition for an armistice, pending negotiations for a settlement of Mexico's internal troubles, was received by the department of foreign relations today from Washington, presumably from Dr. Vasquez Gomez.

A reply was returned, in which it was indicated that the government looked with favor upon the suggestion.

Municipal Topics

First of all, York Township authorities and their road workmen (if they have any) are leaving the sun and traffic to fix up the roads, and the rain and traffic to make them bad again. A couple of teams and a dozen men sent on a quick trip up the Vaughan road, on Yonge street, up the Don road and other similar thoroughfares, would, at an expense of \$50 on each road, let out a lot of water, fill up a number of holes, remove ridges, and throw off loose stones, and do a score of other things that would make the roads more passable for five miles in each direction. But the Township of York and its municipal chiefs are still firm believers in the road fixing itself, aided by traffic and the sun.

The busiest corner in Toronto for most hours of the day is getting to be the corner of Richmond and Yonge streets.

Every time you think about civic affairs in your head. That the greatest need Toronto has today is a tube under Yonge street, from Union Station up Yonge street to St. Clair avenue, where it could take the St. Clair street cars, to be built by the city, and the street cars, to be run by the city.

VALUATORS INSPECT LONDON ELECTRIC

A Direct Offer of Purchase to Be Made Short—London a Radial Centre.

LONDON, Ont., April 18.—Valuators have been in London inspecting the plant of the London Street Railway, the London Electric and the London and Lake Erie Transportation Company, with a view of estimating what these are worth to the financiers who are contemplating a merger.

The statement is made by M. J. Kent that "a direct offer will be made in a few days now. The purchase will be outright. I understand there is no thought of attempting to buy a majority of the stock. That was tried once before and did not prove a success. On the report of the valuator the men behind this merger will likely make a direct offer."

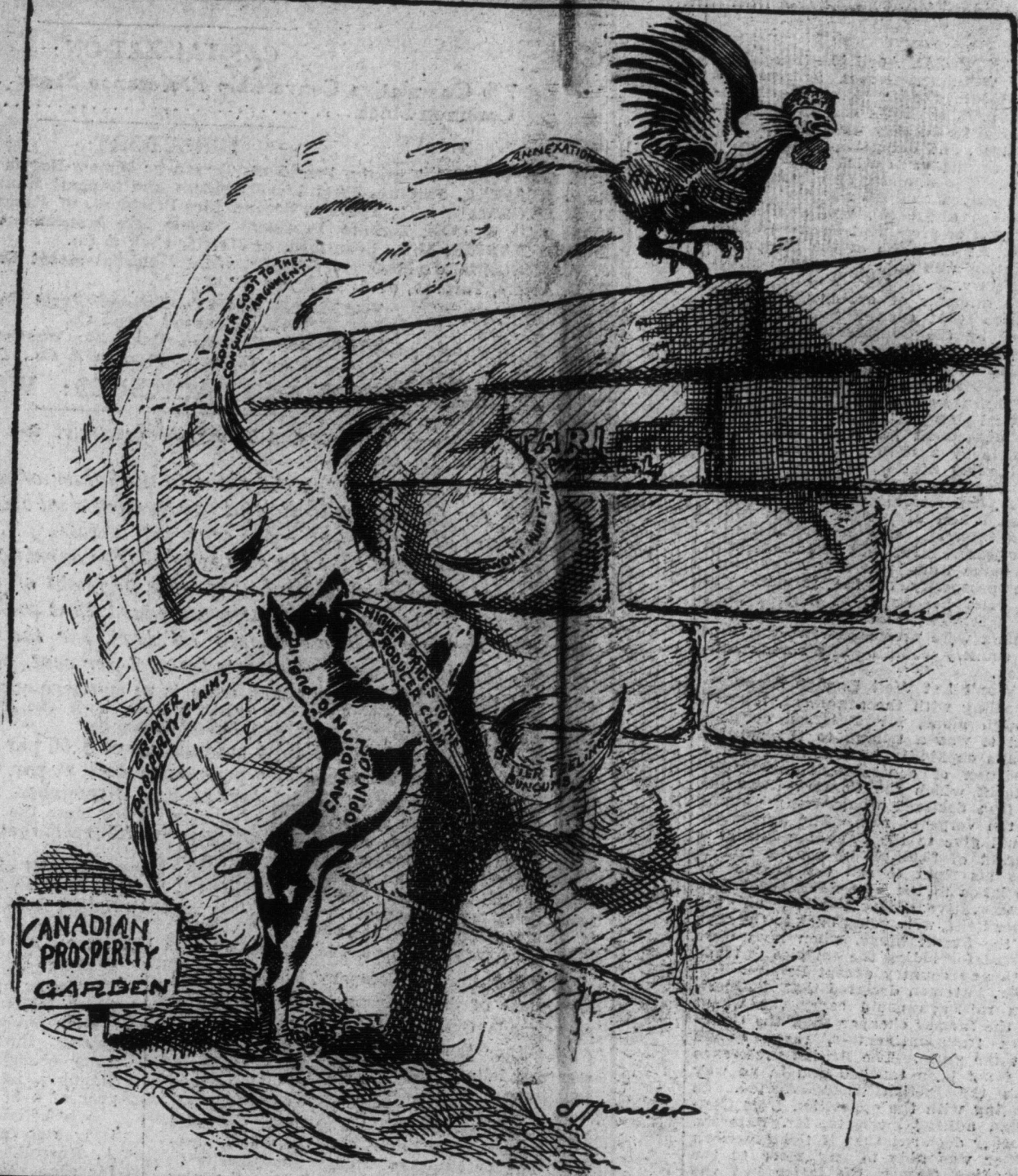
"We are in a somewhat peculiar position here," Mr. Kent further stated. "We in London represent the minority board of the three concerns involved. The majority board of the street railway is in Cleveland, the majority board of the London Electric and the London and Lake Erie Transportation Company in Toronto. These boards mutually will know of the consummation of the deal before we here in this city."

From what Mr. Kent has heard he believes the intention of the men behind this merger is to make London a radial centre. Once securing franchises in this city, they will go after them in neighboring places. They want to complete the chain of radial railways to Niagara Falls and also west.

OPPOSITION TO BIG PLOW WORKS LIB. SPEAKERS CALLED OFF?

Approaches to New Canal Declared Unsafe—Why Kill Towns Built Up by Waterway?

WELLAND, April 18.—(Special.)—Some fifty delegates from points along the canal met at Welland this afternoon to decide what action should be taken toward securing the deepening of the present canal with a slight change in route, rather than a building of an entirely new canal. The result was the election of a committee composed of D. McGillivray, Dr. Colborne, Dr. Merritt, of St. Catharines, Mr. Clark of Port Dalhousie, Jas. Beale of Thorold, J. H. LeFevre of Welland, John H. Thompson of Thorold, A. E. Thompson of Merriton, Jesse Steel of Humberstone and E. Norris of Fonthill. It was decided that a deputation be sent to Ottawa on May 11 to interview the minister of railways and canals.

One of the important announcements made in the meeting was that made by Mr. M. Gorman, M.P., when he stated that so far as Welland and Port Colborne were concerned, the matter was not of such great interest as to the municipalities farther south, for he had the best of assurances from those in authority that the present Welland Canal in case an entirely new canal was built would be enlarged to twenty-two feet from Port Colborne to Welland, with lockages to the Welland River to join the Welland Canal.

The Georgian Bay Canal scheme was being pushed, but he could not see how any sensible man could ever agree to such a proposition as the building of a twenty-two or twenty-five foot canal from Georgian Bay to Montreal at a cost of \$200,000,000.

Time to Get Busy.

Mr. Gorman thought this was the opportune time for the representatives of the municipalities to get to work. "I know," he said, "what Weller thinks. I have no better friend than he. He has no better friend than I am. I know what he wants to do. He wants to build a canal from Montreal to Toronto and I don't want him to do it. I want the people to get up on their hind legs and get down to Ottawa and get there quick, for the Grenville route is the legitimate route for the Welland Canal. It will make St. Catharines a deep waterway harbor and give the people of this city and other towns and cities along the line all the benefits of deep water navigation. Now is the time to get busy. I would suggest that each town, village or city appoint two or three men to go to Ottawa and interview Mr. Gorman. Tell him that towns and cities have been built up along the Welland Canal and the reason of the canal being what it is."

Captain Irwin, one of the best known navigators on the great lakes, pointed out that a harbor could never be built at Morgan's Point with such safety to vessels as at Port Colborne, for the reason that prevailing gales were from the southwest which would bring vessels into the harbor in the trough of the sea. A similar reason held good at Port Dalhousie, where the prevailing

The announcement was made yesterday of the assignment of the Wilkinson Plow Works to E. R. C. Clarkson. The failure of this firm, one of the largest and oldest of its kind in Canada, means that, outside of the mere loss of work for some 175 hands working in the factories in West Toronto, there are now left in Canada only two firms manufacturing agricultural implements on a large scale. The Wilkinson Plow Works is a joint stock company with \$100,000 in subscribed capital; the assets run between \$400,000 and \$500,000, and the liabilities some \$200,000. A writ had been issued by creditors for the winding up of the firm, and capital to overcome the difficulties could not be obtained from the chief of the lowering implement duties soon promised, it is stated.

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Under the Practical Methods of Mr. Wilkinson

Under the practical methods of Mr. Wilkinson the company appeared to prosper at this period, and continued to do so until his departure from the firm nine years ago. Personal friends of Wilkinson declare that he was dissatisfied with the treatment he received from other members of the firm at that time, and that he was practically forced from his office. He went from the firm he had started to the Verity Plow Works of Brantford, and is now located with the Cockshutt Works.

A readjustment of the firm was made some two or three years ago, when the Wilkinson Works either amalgamated with or bought out the West Lorne Wagon Works of West Lorne, Ontario, owned by McKillop Brothers, wealthy lumbermen of that place. It is declared that the McKillops bought a large block of stock of the plow works at this time. It is probable that a few of those closely interested in the concern, the stock is divided into small holdings, as on the present site, and in harmony with the building being erected by the Imperial Life.

Crushed by Competition.

Several opinions have been given by those connected with the business of manufacturing agricultural implements that seem to throw light on the failure of the West Toronto firm. One gentleman spoken to by The World last night declared the chief reason for the Wilkinson failure was on account of the keen competition of the Canadian trade.

"This company," he said, "only sold their goods on the Canadian market, which is being largely absorbed by the American companies. The more important of the Canadian firms rely on the export trade for their chief business."

WANT COMMISSION GOVERNMENT

ST. JOHN, N.E. April 18.—The plebiscite here today on the question of a commission form of government, consisting of five commissioners, instead of seven aldermen, resulted in a victory for a commission government by about 2200 majority.

EDUCATIONISTS REVIEW FIFTY YEARS OF PROGRESS

Now all the others departed also, save only Richard McKicker, who is mate of the good ship, and George Armstrong, who is the watchman upon the docks, who watched.

About 6.30 of the clock, the mate was in the cabin and he was hungry for as yet there was no cook, and the watchman was in the watch house watching. The mate heard a splash and he called "the watchman who was still watching," and he said:

"What ho?" says he, "what ho?" "No ho at all," says the watchman, who was still watching, "but the cook" says he.

Then did the mate rush onto the dock and saw that it was even so, for the new cook, had seen many sights while uptown and wasn't thrifting for any more. In waltzing up the gang plank of the good ship he had missed a step and had fallen into the drink.

Now, losing a cook is no small matter, even on a stonehewer, and the mate had the heart of a lion, but it was of his stomach that he thought, and the watchman was watching so most resolutely. And the cook grasped the line and the mate pulled and the watchman who had been watching stopped watching and came and pulled also and after a time, the cook was lifted from the water, he and his coat and trousers.

P. W. ELLIS APPOINTED CHOICE WAS UNANIMOUS

C. P. R. to Suggest Plan For Rounding Yonge-street Corner at Less Expense.

Those who attended the sitting of the city council yesterday had to pinch themselves to make certain that they were awake when they found all the business of the day finished at exactly 42 minutes after six o'clock. The order paper was fairly light and the absence of contentious questions made it fairly certain that the session would be short, but none would speak of the possibility except in whispers, until the mayor had officially declared the shortest regular session of the present council closed.

The first matter to come up which looked likely to irritate a discussion was the bylaw for the expropriation of the southeast corner of King and Yonge-streets, for the rounding of the corner.

Angus MacMureh, K.C., appeared on behalf of the C. P. R., the owners of the property from which the frontage is to be taken, and requested that the council delay action until such time as a plan which would give the city the desired relief without rendering the property at this point unfit for the company's use. This, he asserted, would be the result of the proposal of the bylaw if carried out, and he emphasized the fact that property at this corner was worth anything from \$70,000 per foot up. In fact he did not think the value could be really estimated to any one who needed the property. No compensation could make up for the loss to the company, nor the loss to the city if the five-story building it was proposed to erect could not be erected at this point.

It is understood Mr. McNicoll will meet the council any time that they indicate a readiness to confer with him. This will likely be in a few days, as there will be a special meeting of that body to discuss the estimates.

Mr. Ellis Unopposed.

The nomination of Mr. Ellis was the second clause of the report of the board of control, and no sooner had it been reached, than Ald. Bidrd averring to his feet and hastened to give the council at the last sitting that his opposition at the last sitting that Ald. McCarthy had advanced on that occasion

What the City Council Did

Unanimously adopted P. W. Ellis as the city's representative on the city hydro-electric commission.

Passed the bill authorizing the expropriation of 400 feet on the southeast corner of King and Yonge-streets its first reading, and delayed action until D. McNicoll, vice-president of the C.P.R., has been afforded an opportunity to suggest a plan for the accomplishing of the desired end at this point with less damage to the property of the railway company.

Passed a bylaw authorizing the issue of debentures to the amount of \$518,482 for the purpose of enlarging and reconstructing public schools and the purchase of additional sites.

Passed a bylaw taking the frontage on Yonge-street, north of Summerhill-avenue, out of the residence district.

Passed a bylaw, providing for a report from the city engineer and the assessment commissioner on the cost of extending Victoria street from Gerrard-street to Carlton-street.

Deferred the question of two extra weeks' pay in lieu of two weeks' holidays to the permanent employees of the street department to the board of control, with instructions to bring in a report at the next meeting of the council.

Deferred back the recommendation for treated wood block pavement between Queen and Shuter streets on Victoria-street.

Deferred back the board of consultants' recommendation against the covering of the Canadian Creek sewer from Ossington-avenue to Spadina-street with the recommendation that the work be placed in the estimates.

Decided to place one more hand on the list of the made available for the committee in order that a plan for a canal in Carlton Park could be prepared.

Decided to erect could not be erected at this point.

Walsh and Frank Wallace for money spent in forming a syndicate, appeared before Judge Winchester yesterday morning, counsel for defendant did not appear, but sent his clerk to ask for a remand. The judge refused it and gave the plaintiffs judgment for \$542 and costs.

FUMIGATION OF BOOKS DOESN'T WORRY MICROBES

But as School Board Hasn't the Funds Purchase of New Volumes Must Wait.

To what degree do the school books breed disease thru being transmitted from one pupil's hands to another? Trustee Noble stated positively yesterday at the meeting of the finance committee of the board of education, his opinion that these second-hand school books were an important factor in the spread of disease.

"It is not necessarily the scholars themselves," he said, "but what kind of homes do the books get into? Look at the homes in the ward, for instance. Those books are carried by one pupil into a ward home, and the next term your children or mine receive the same books."

"But they are fumigated," retorted Chairman C. A. E. Brown.

"It is absolutely impossible to fumigate books," was Trustee Noble's reply. "For my part, I favor giving a new set of books to each pupil as their own property."

The clause was sent on to the board without recommendation, because there was no appropriation to cover the immediate cost.

The committee reported against the proposal to give higher salaries to principals' assistants.

Dr. McKay's resolution, asking that a clerk be appointed to scrutinize the assessment rolls and property transfers in the interests of the public schools, was brought before the committee.

"I don't care who does it, but I want it done, and done by a competent person," was Dr. Noble's comment.

In the opinion of the chairman the board did not want any more officials than they could help, and he suggested that Mr. Harris, who is already employed by the board, should look after it.

The motion was left over until the trustee could be present, as was Trustee Hiltz's motion to telephones in the schools.

"CLEAN-UP" NOW UNDER WAY.

Dr. Hastings, M.H.O., yesterday afternoon started out about half a force of twenty-five inspectors who are to supervise the house-cleaning of the ward. 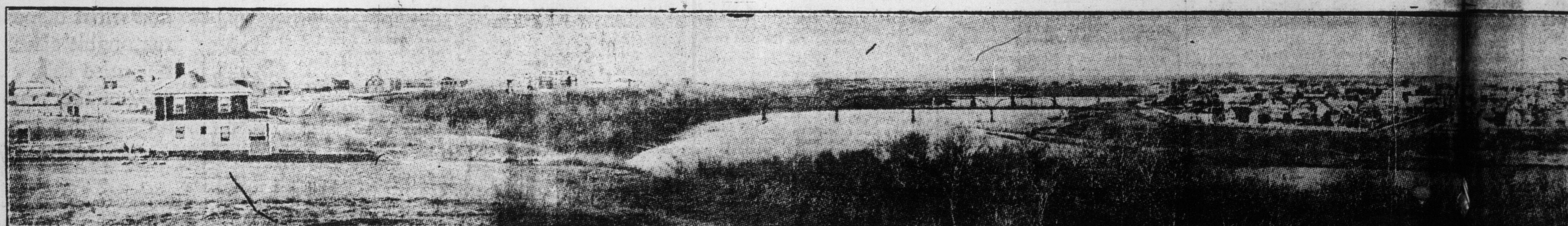

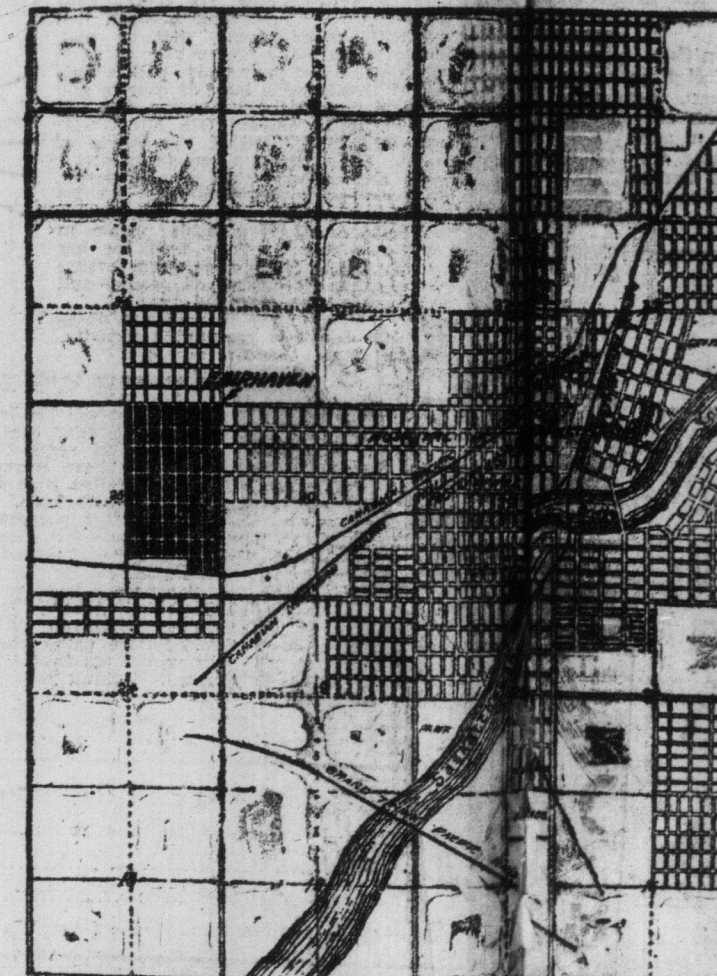

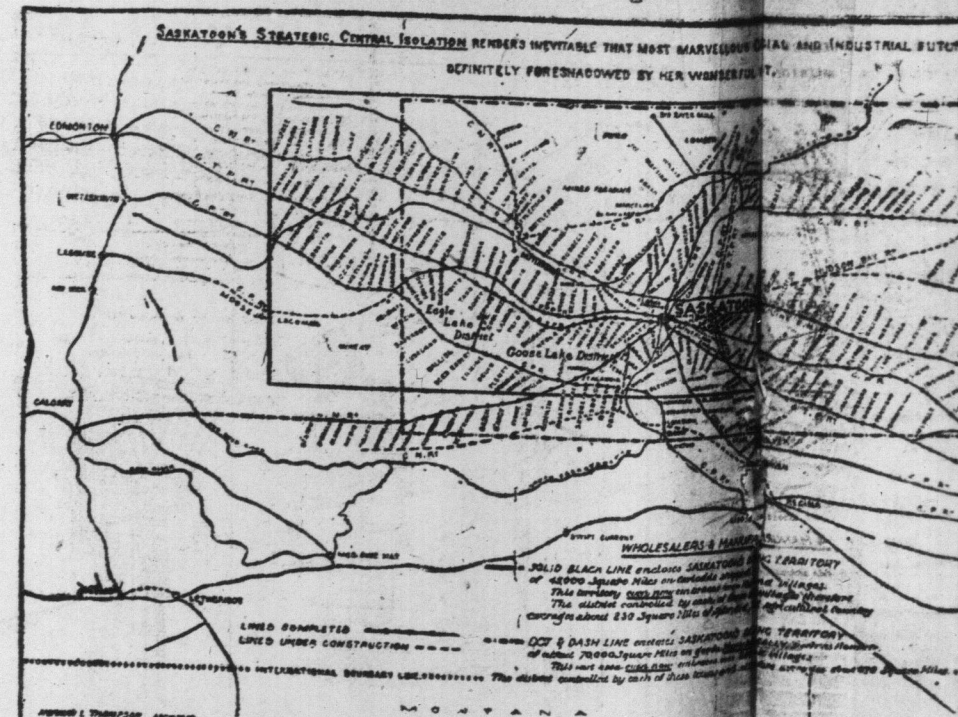

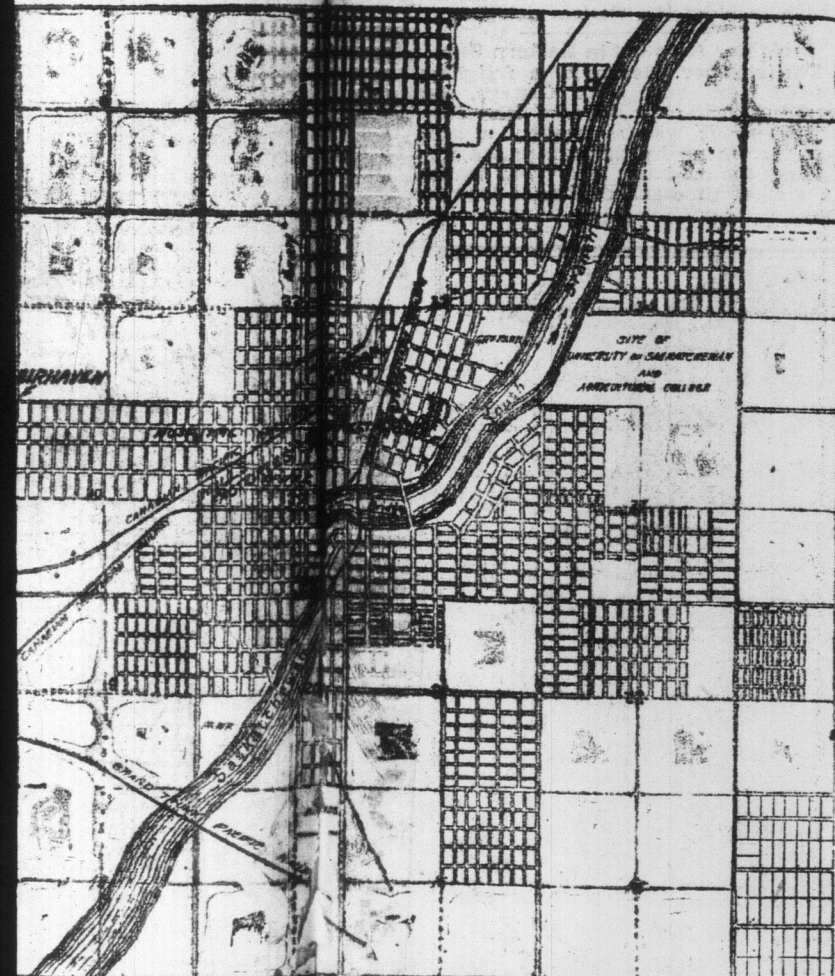


VIEW OF THE CITY SASKATOON TAKEN IN THE FALL OF 1910.

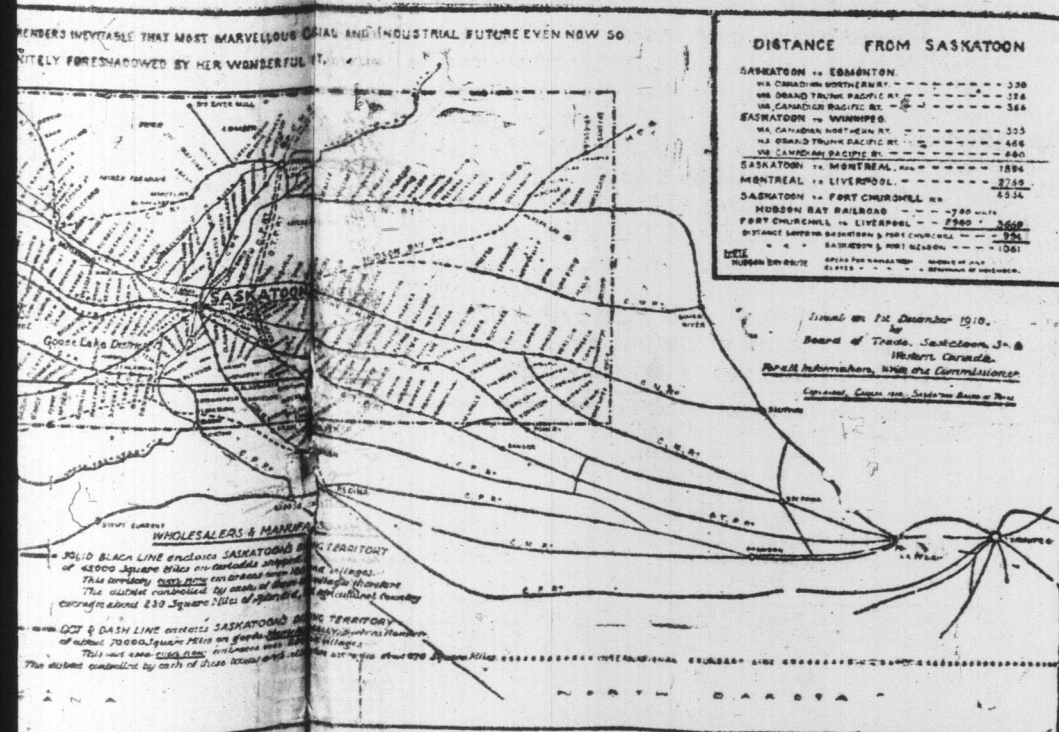

The Globe said yesterday that there is every prospect of the passage of the reciprocity proposal by congress at Washington. The World has no faith in such expectation. The senate will kill reciprocity and the proposed tariff reductions; they did it in the last congress and they will do it in this one.

And speaking of government by commission, would it not be a good idea to put the new mining Town of Porcupine under a paid commission, say of one man, or if the government preferred it, three men? If government does not keep up with the growth of the population there, some kind of disorder or epidemic will come this summer.

How THEY CONTINENTALIZE. Can anyone for a moment doubt that President Taft has some big policy behind his reciprocity deal with Canada (to the north) and his warlike demonstration on the Mexican border (to the south)?

Roosevelt in a burst of something not long ago said: "I got Panama." Taft may yet say: "I got Mexico and started Canada on the slide." "US got Mex."

READING CAMP ASSOCIATION. Excellent work is being done by the Reading Camp Association of which Mr. Alfred Fitzpatrick is superintendent, all over the frontier lands of Canada. The tenth annual report is a most interesting little booklet, full of pictures which arrest the attention and give a fair idea of what the pioneer work looks like.

ANGLICAN ADVANCE. At the recent census of the churches the Anglicans showed great and, perhaps, unexpected strength. The vestry meetings just held confirm the impression of vigorous vitality given by the statement of mere numbers.

R. over the rounded corner, but it is to be hoped that the conference between the mayor and the company's representative will have a practical issue. The improvement is badly needed. However much the city may benefit the C. P. R. will also benefit. A fine broad front on a wide corner will afford better accommodation to its patrons than the present stony allowance.

hydro-electric commission, and it was nearly thwarted by unfair influences against public improvements. Three good men well paid could make a model city out of any city in Canada, while twenty aldermen, changed every year, subject to all kinds of influences and without continuity of policy, can bring any town into discredit, and, what is worse, endanger the lives of its people.

Now is the time for Sir James Whitney to appoint a commission to investigate this question of improved government for cities, that is, if he needs any further light on the subject. We should think he has men in his cabinet and in the house at this moment who are capable of drafting the necessary amendments for an addition to the municipal law which would allow government by commission.

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With all this activity and expansion Bishop Sweeney has a right to expect substantial assistance and co-operation in the completion of St. Alban's Cathedral. The task is comparatively small one for such a large and wealthy body as the Episcopalians of Toronto, and there should be no reluctance or hesitation about furnishing the wherewithal to supply a diocesan centre worthy of the dignity and importance of Toronto.

Early Buoyancy in Mining Stocks Gives Way to Reaction

Porcupine Stocks Do Not Hold Early Display of Buoyancy

Values of Gold Mining Issues Sag When Liquidation is Resumed by Tired Holders—Cobalts Comparatively Unchanged.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, April 18.

Porcupine stocks showed good advances at the opening of business today, the advance being to a great extent a reflection of the movement on the New York curb yesterday. Responsible buyers were in evidence for all the gold mining issues, but the floating supply of securities was overburdened, and as the day wore on, the list gradually declined.

The net result of to-day's operations was a number of losses throughout the list, these ranging from a point in some of the cheaper issues, to 23 points in Hollinger. It is worthy of note, however, that the early advance was carried to a degree which left quotations on the late reaction to be changed from those current at the end of last week.

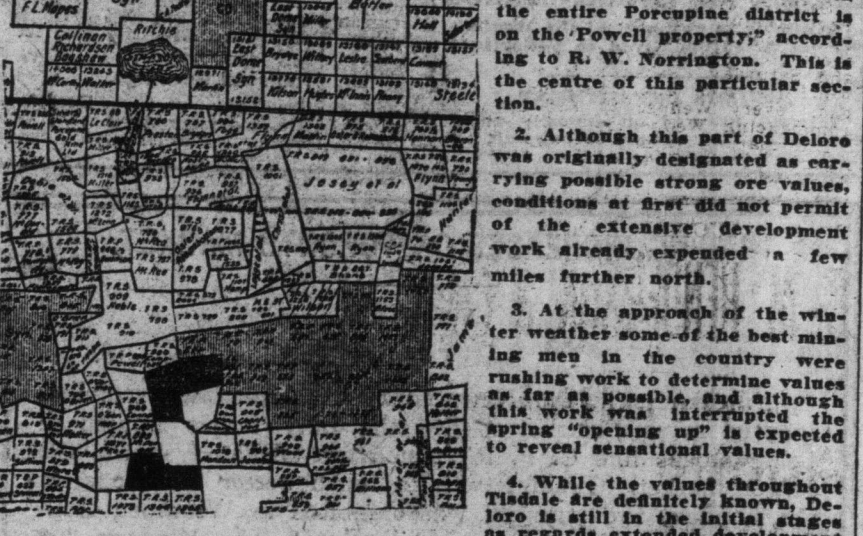
The selling to-day came from tired holders, who had seen values of their securities decline in the recent movement, and who took advantage of the first buoyancy to liquidate their holdings. Selling of this nature was sufficient to offset the early buoyancy, and the decline followed as a natural outcome.

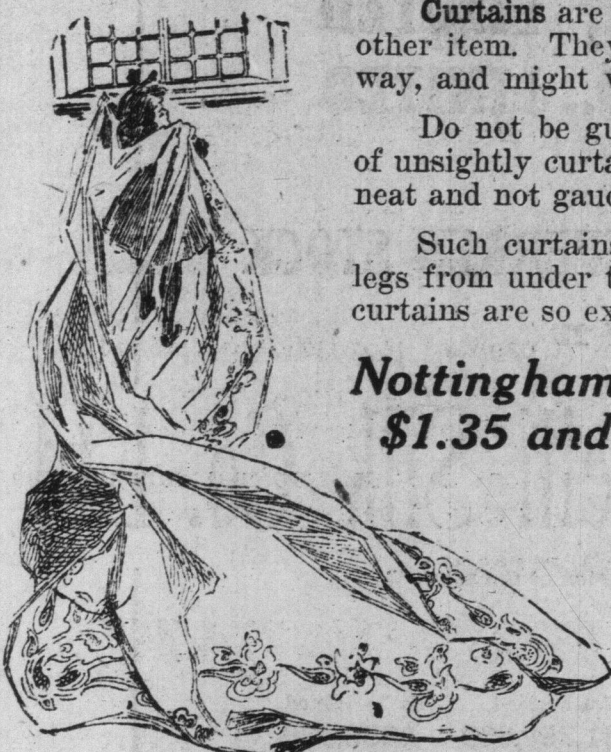
