IS THE COUNTRY BEING TRICKED OUT OF POSSESSION OF THE I.C.R.?

It is stated on the responsibility of a well informed Montreal correspondent that the government has decided to sell the Intercolonial Railway. We have no means of knowing what truth there is in this report, but there is an ominous definiteness about it. That the three big railway systems of Canada are ambitious to own the government road is well known. That the government is inclined to dispose of the road in position is indicated by two circumstances: first, the sale of the Canada Atlantic Railway to the Grand Trunk, and, secondly, the enormous deficits which the Intercolonial Railway has been piling up of late.

If the government had been genuinely concerned in the interests of the I.C.R., it would have jumped at the chance of extending it to Georgian Bay by the acquisition of the Booth line. When it neglected this opportunity it displayed a disregard for the welfare of the government road. The growing deficits, culminating in an adverse balance of \$2,000,000, have intensified that suspicion.

It looks very much as if the government has been purposely running down the road in order to prepare the public for its transfer to a private company. Considering the enormous increase in revenues from the I.C.R., large deficits would appear to be entirely unnecessary. Developments may show that there was method in the apparent madness of the administration of the government system, and that the root of the whole trouble is the ambition of a private company to own the road.

COUNCIL SHOULD ACT

General Manager Fleming is hardly to be taken seriously when he states that the company has temporarily ceased building cars because the present system does not provide for the cars to run. There is many a weary strap holder who could be induced to point out intervals large enough for all the cars the company has built, and all it has under course of construction. The city engineer has a schedule which would also not provide for the cars in his dilemma. Congested the Yonge street route south of Queen-street unquestionably is, but there are other routes where the congestion is less perceptible, and which could stand the addition of some of the cars which Mr. Fleming says are yearning for active service.

A NEW MONROE DOCTRINE

Theodore Roosevelt may not be as wise as he is enthusiastic in the case of preserving peace among the nations. It is significant that while the peace conference which he was the direct means of arranging was in session President Roosevelt was addressing an assembly at Chautauque on the sanctity of the Monroe doctrine. To a certain point the Monroe doctrine can perhaps be justified. But Mr. Roosevelt has given it an interpretation far beyond the intentions of its author. He says in effect that not only will the Monroe doctrine be invoked to protect the weaker nations of the continent against invasion by a European power, but that foreign nations will not be permitted to enforce the legal obligations of the South American republics.

AUDIENCE WITH CZAR

St. Petersburg, Aug. 14.—The emperor will give his usual weekly audience to the ministers of state to-morrow, when the status of the peace negotiations will be discussed. It is possible that the emperor will receive Peterhof an official statement regarding the situation will be issued.

AT ECLIPSED ALRIGHT

But the Moon is Modest and Did it in Private. The eclipse of the moon heralded to happen last night occurred all right behind closed doors. The observatory man in authority for the statement that it was a nice quiet little eclipse, obscuring less than one-third of the moon and as far as he could state there were very few people present. But for the appearance in the early part of the night of some blue clouds that settled in front of the place where the moon could have been seen if they had been there, the interesting phenomena would have been open to the public.

The eclipse was not called off owing to the moon being just about on schedule time. The moon entered the penumbra in first-class shape at 8.05 p.m. and glided into the shadow at 3.25. It was in the middle of the eclipse at 10.41 and after a short sojourn sort of stayed in the shadow at 11.05. It was getting pretty late and the last contact occurred at 11.14 this morning. Magnitude of eclipse was 0.85. It was not seen here.

BREST AND PORTSMOUTH

With the departure of the French fleet from Portsmouth perhaps the most interesting incident in the history of British relations with continental Europe has closed. But being as it was the flower and crown of a long process, sometimes temporarily interrupted, but always persisting, it represents much more than a passing chapter in our history.

The extraordinary interest that France was evincing from the hundred or so of special correspondents who accompanied the visiting squadron, fortunately for once the British authorities exhibited unusual tact in the measures taken to express the national goodwill. Besides the unflattering criticisms of the lord mayor in the famous Guildhall—always of peculiar attraction and importance to the Parisian mind—that was a most happy idea, which suggested a reception in Westminster, the cradle and centre of English parliamentary history, nothing could have been more appropriate or more fitted to excite a warm response in the hearts of Frenchmen.
