About 15 minutes later he returned to the furnace, and was putting in more coal, when there were two loud explosions. The shells happened to be loaded, and, on being heated, exploded. O'Hanley was knocked down by pleces of the furnace, and had a narrow escape from being killed. He was found lying on the floor by some of his fellow-workmen, and was taken to the Emergency Hospital. There it was found that his face, head and arms were severely burned, and his eyes were filled with cinders and dust.






