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CITY NEWS

Sunday Excursions. The Ontario Loan Day Alliance will hold their sixth annual convention to-morrow in the Guild Hall, McGill-street.

The Executive Board meets this morning and the General Executive will meet in the afternoon of the former, together with the president of each of the local branches throughout the province, will meet in the afternoon.

The program for the convention includes discussion on the subject of Sunday excursions, particularly those from Toronto to the United States, and how to deal with them.

Other topics are: Unnecessary labor, the construction and repair work on steam railways, the more general and thorough enforcement of the home law as affecting the Sunday sale of liquor, unnecessary labor in the mining towns and camps of New Ontario, Saturday night early closing, co-operation with labor men, Sunday ice cream and soda water parties.

Thomas Reynolds Dead. Thomas Reynolds, the well-known liquor merchant, died yesterday morning at his late residence, 857 West Queen-street, after an illness of a month's duration.

Mr. Reynolds' condition had been steadily improving until about a week ago, when he went out for a drive and contracted a cold which developed into pneumonia. He was 69 years of age, and for a long time had been a resident of Toronto. For the past 10 years he had been residing at the corner of Queen and Niagara-streets, coming from Guelph, where he had been in the hotel business for 20 years.

He is survived by a widow, two daughters and one son. The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock to-morrow afternoon at 2300 College to Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Don't Spit on the Streets

Local Board of Health Will Make That Request of the Citizens of Toronto.

Consumption and its contagion was the main question before the Board of Health at its meeting yesterday afternoon. Dr. Sheard, the Medical Health Officer, submitted a communication which had been forwarded to him by Dr. J. B. Harris, asking that a bylaw be submitted next January to provide for the establishment of a sanatorium for consumptives.

This sanatorium is to be for the poor and the sick, and is to be situated in a quiet, airy, and healthy locality. The city would be asked to pay a 40c per day allowance in addition to the government grant for those who could not pay themselves. The sanatorium would not be more than 45 miles distant from Toronto and the land in connection therewith shall not be less than 50 acres in area.

Dr. Sheard endorsed the proposition very heartily and a resolution was passed that the Board of Health should prepare a bill to be presented to Council, and submitted to the Mayor at the next annual election.

Don't Spit on the Streets. The Board of Health will soon be prohibited by the local Board of Health. The order will not be compulsory, but it will be an appeal to public decency.

Three ladies representing the Local Council of Women waited upon the board and urged that some measures be taken to stop spitting upon the streets.
