Niagara Falls, N.Y., Jan. 30.-At 6.30 o'clock to-night the temporary repairs at the Niagara Falls and Conduit Company's plant were completed, and the electrical famine along the Niagara frontier, due to the early morning fire started by a flash of lightning, was practically at an end.

Power was sent out from the plant an hour before that time, but it was not permanent, owing to a short cfrcuit, which occurred in the power house shortly thereafter, and which seriously burned five men, one of whom may die. The short circuit and the injury of the three men came as a climax to disconcerting accidents which had marked the day, despite the fact that the repairing of the damage in so short a time is considered remark-

Caused Great Inconvenience, Never before since the establishment Never before since the establishment of Niagara Falls power has there been a delay of such magnitude. It was felt directly by thousands of people in Buffalo, Niagara and Lockport, and the Tonawanda and intermediate points. CARS OF COAL STALLED

Long String of Them in Yards Near Exhibition Grounds-What's the Matter?

Out in the southwestern part of the city the citizens are humming a plaintive little ditty entitled, "Coal, coal everywhere and not a pound to burn." It is not a particularly tuneful air, but it describes the situation accurately, for the sidetracks in that section for miles are crowded with cars of black diamonds, while their fuel dealers continue to insist that they have no hard coal for sale and little of any other

A World reporter and the artist trudged over a mile of tracks from Dufferin-street east to the stock yards yesterday afternoon, investigating stories of the people of that part of the city that nearly all the winter the miles of side tracks have held from 50 to 100 cars of coal. Taey wanted to know why fuel sufficient to supply the whole city for a month was kept stored here regardless of the tamine prevailing in Toronto.

The yards in that section would make rich picking for the poor of the neighborhood if they were permitted to remove the pickes from the ground. Great chinks of soft coal are to be seen in abundance on the ground and tons could be secured for the empty bags and buckets of the poor there. Two big policemen in uniform, with their great coats buttoned high up under their chin, keep a kem eye over the network of tracks to see that this waste is not removed and any trespasser is quickly hustled off to the station.





Mr. Hill said that there was no use having a clause in the act giving the county power to compel the Metropolitan Railway to clear away snow unless there was a penalty. York Township had intended to appoint P. S. Gibson, engineer, to look after such matters in that township, but they were advised that if they did not pass the bylaw taking over the roads that the duty of dealing with the railway company devolved upon the county. He thought it was an undecided question whether the county or the township was responsible for keeping the road spassable where a bylaw had not been passed taking over the roads. The Solicitor thought that the law was plain, and that the township were obliged to maintain the roads in a passable condition, whether the bylaw was passed or not.




