BRITISH ASSOCIATION

Adjourns After a Season of Unwonted Activity.

London, Aug. 28.—The British Association has adjourned after a season of unwonted activity. There were two important discussions. One of these debates was in the zoological section, where Professor Karl Pearson made a fierce onslaught upon Mendel's "Laws of Heredity," and Professor Bateman vigorously reaffirmed the current views in regard to natural selection. The other was the discussion regarding the radio-activity of matter, in which there was a substantial agreement between outside sources. The most practical subject debated was that of the cotton growing resources of the empire. The next year's meetings at Cape Town, with George Darwin as a president, will open the way for a journey to Australia in the course of a few years.

RAN INTO SWITCH ENGINE.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 27.—The Lake Shore fast mail, No. 155, going east, ran into a switch engine two miles west of Sturgis.

Mail Clerk Silvio of Toledo was fatally injured, and three other persons were seriously injured. It is claimed that the accident was due to the failure of the operator at Sturgis to flag the passenger train.

Rome, Aug. 27.—Bishop Le Nordet, the bishop of Dijon, is still kept in retreat here while waiting for a decision in his trial before the holy office, having asked that all documents be submitted to him for personal examination. It is asserted that the bishop has sufficient evidence to prove that the accusation that he abstracted money from the fund destined to erect a monument to St. Robert and Joan of Arc is false.
