When the Russian forces retired from Fort Etseshan they entered Fort No. 15 to the north of Chaochanke, During the nights of Aug. 18 and 19, while it was raining, the Japanese attempted to storm Fort Antsushan, which is a strong position adjoining Etseshan they were repulsed with heavy losses.

It is considered likely the entire tonnage yill be given to American mills, because it is a manifest impossibility for Canadian rail makers to meet the demands. The new Canadian transcontinental project may need all the rails included in the inquiry before the end of 1905. The company is willing to pay for American rails \$20 per ton, which would make the quantity of rails quoted worth \$2,000,000 to the steel company securing the order.

1. To bring express companies under the jurisdiction of the railway commission, that their regulations regarding carriage of goods and rates may be modified in the public interest when necessary.

2. To deprive the chairman of the railway commission of his right to overrule the opinion of his two colleagues on questions involving points of 3. To give independent telephone companies access to all railway stations on payment of the actual damage sustained in consequence of their entry upon the railway company's premises.

4. To apply the Michigan law of graded passenger rates to Canadian
