## RUSSIANS NOT SIX GUNS DRIVEN BACK BY THE JAPS

Close Fighting While the Enemy Retreat Slowly Toward Fortified Anshanshan.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 28.—The general staff has received the following telegram from Lieut.-Gen. Sakharov, dated Aug. 27: "Our advance guard on the southern front yesterday retired slowly towards the fortified position at Anshanshan. The Japanese artillery annihilated our positions at different points. Our heavy fire eventually compelled the enemy to move their vast camp from Palmina to Balaisana. At 10 o'clock in the evening there was a lull in the firing. The hottest fighting occurred on the left flank on the south front, where our forces numbered 200. During the night our advance guards retired to the principal position.

## ARMY DISCIPLINE STRICTLY ENFORCED, ENDS LIFE

### Fate Was Cruel to Walter McAllen, Who Was Found Dead at Island Yesterday.

The body of Walter McAllen was found about 1 o'clock on Sunday morning by Night Watchman Mott, one of the benches at Hanlan's Point. McAllen had been in the hospital for some time, and it was believed that he had died there. The body was removed to the morgue, where Coroner Elliott will hold an inquest at 3 o'clock to-day.

## CHIEF DEFENCES GOVE.

London, Aug. 28.—A despatch from Fusan to Lloyd's Weekly says: "After a desperate day and night of fighting the Japanese have captured the principal defence of Port Arthur. ## YANKEE RAILS FOR THE G.T.P.

New York, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—Grand trunk Pacific sponsors have sent out enquiries for supplies of steel rails, 100,000 tons. It is considered likely the entire tonnage will be given to American mills, because it is a manifest impossibility for Canadian rail makers to meet the demand. The new Canadian transcontinental project may need all the rails included in the inquiry before the end of 1905. The company is willing to pay for American rails \$20 per ton, which would make the quantity of rails quoted worth \$2,000,000 to the steel company securing the order.

Winnipeg, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—The weather continues fine and the prospects point to a steady week of harvest. The grain is in excellent condition, and the farmers are well pleased with the result of their labors.

## ALASKAN BOUNDARY BANQUET.

Tacoma, Aug. 28.—(Special.)—In connection with the placing of the initial boundary between Alaska and Canada, the steamer Danube carried commissioners representing the United States and Canada up the Portland Canal. They were Prof. King of Ottawa, head of the Dominion Astronomical Survey, and Superintendent Titman of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey. The former was accompanied by his daughter, the latter by his wife.

Oldfield was driving a Buick automobile, and the other two men were spectators. The accident occurred after a false start, and the race was stopped.

## THE TELEPHONE AMENDMENT.

The amendment was lost—yeas 23, nays 24. The vote was as follows:
