At a Court of Common Council, holden at the City Hall of the City of Saint
John, on Thursday the 23d day of November, A. D. 1845:

A Law to regulate and establish the rates of FERRIDGE to be charged for Per-
centage in the Steam Ferry Boats of this City, and to make provisions concerning
the Floats thereto.

It is ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of
Saint John, in Common Council convened, That the present Ferry over
the Harbour of Saint John, from the Floats at present used on the East side of the
harbour, alongside Johnston's Wharf, so called, to the Floats landing and attached
to Rodney Wharf and to Sand Point, be known and called as the FERRY PENNY.

One Horse, 3d.
Ox, or other large animal, 2d.
