COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Before being admitted to this Institution, pupils must pass a satisfactory examination in the subjects of Arithmetic, Reading, Writing, Spelling, Geography and English Grammar.

This Institution is designed to give a sound practical English education, to fit young men for Agricultural and Mercantile pursuits, and also to prepare students for Matriculation in Arts, Law and Medicine. As St. Francis is affiliated to McGill University, Montreal, students of the College are enabled to enter for their second or third year at that University.

There are five courses, extending over three years, viz.-

I. English Course, embracing Arithmetic, English Grammar and Literature, Algebra, Geometry, Natural Philosophy, Peading, Writing, Spelling, History, (Canadian and English), Geography, Composition, Physiology, French, Drawing, and Feelamation.

II. Commercial Course, Peok-keeping in all its branches, Banking and Exchange, in addition to the English Course.

III. Agricultural Course, Chemistry, Potany, Theoretical and Practical Agriculture, Mensuration, Levelling, Veterinary Surgery, and Rural and Municipal Law, in addition to English Course. IV. Professional Course, including in addition to the ordinary studies of the English Course, all those required for admission to the study of Law and Medicine.

V. Arts Course, being that required for admission to the University of McGill College, and also the subjects of the first two years, students being allowed to pass their intermediate examination in St. Francis College.

Students not taking any full Course will receive instruction in those special branches they may select.

The Agricultural Course is intended for the regular Agricultural Students attending the Agricultural department, and who perform their practical work on the College Model Farm, but farmers' sons attending the College are admitted to such Lectures in the Agricultural Course, as may be decided by them.

Board is Three Dollars a week, including washing, fire, and lights, and use of bath-room. Students furnish their own bedlinen and towels.
