A TARIFF BOARD. In Parliament on Monday night Hon. Charles Stewart, Minister of the Interior, made the announcement that the proposed federal tariff advisory board will be appointed in a few days, and at the some time he said that the Government does not propose to increase duties on coal at the present time, which latter statement will not be pleasing to some interests in Nova Scotia which are pressing for increased tariff protection against American coal, on the theory that reasonable success for the Nova Scotia coal industry de-pends upon an enlargement of its market in the St. Lawrence area. Nor does this avid appetite for plty satisfy itself on the sympathetic handout we give to those women who have really made unfortunate mar-riages and have got cruel husbands. It causes the women who have nothing to complain of to also make a bid for our tears.

Women who are married to generous, kind men who are good providers; women who live in new houses and ride around in limousines and wear imported frocks and who live on the fat of the land are forever bemoaning their destines and appealing to us to pity them because their husbands are business men instead of poets or because they have magenta longings that their husbands do not share os the aura of their husbands' souls doesn't match theirs or because of some other tomfoolishness.

THE extent to which women will go in their made desire to be pitted finds its fullest illustration in the fact that they will even sacrifice their children to it.

It is the commonest thing in the world to hear mothers com-plaining of their children and telling how ungrateful they are and how much they sacrificed for them and how little their sons and daughters do to repay it. Worse still, a mother will sit up and tra-duce her children just for the pleasure of having some one "poor Mrs. Jones" or "poor Mrs. Smith" her.

**E** VERY day I hear some mother tell how extravagant and selfish Mamie is, and how she can never have any new clothes because Mamle runs up such ferrible bills at the stores that it is all papa can do to pay them. And how Sally lies in bed of a morning and she has to take her breakfast to her, though goodness knows she is worked nearly to death with all she has to do, but she doesn't dare say a word because Sally is so high tempered and makes such scenes if you cross her. Or she tells how Jennie runs with a wild crowd and is out automobiling until all hours of the night. Or she tells how worried she is because John won't work and Tom will drink and shoot craps, and ob, dear, what a ter-rible thing it is to be a mother!

And the poor, foolish mother doesn't realize that she is paying for the sympathy she is begging by blasting Mamie's chances of marriage and blackening Sallie's character and ruining her boys' opportunities of getting in with worth-while business men.

BUT the worst phase of all of women's mania for being pitied is that if no one else will pity them they can get absolutely maudiin drunk on self-pity. A woman can sit down and get actually dopey thinking how sad it is that she has to put up with a husband who is just a human being in-stead of a movie hero, and how terrible it is htat she has to take care of her children and keep house instead of always standing on the stage in the spotlight or being the Queen of Sheba.

She can reduce herself to a sodden pulp, if she isn't married, by dwelling on her lack of husband and home and children. And she can dissolve herself into a perfect hydrant of tears by contem-plating the miseries of either being a domestic woman or a bushness woman. And either way she has a perfectly grand time being miser-able and feeling herself an object of sympathy who doesn't get her just appreciation in this cruel world.
