FREDERICTON HAS A FLAG INCIDENT

U. S. Flags Torn From Queen Hotel—Some Are Thrown Into Street.

(Special to The Times-Star.) FREDERICTON, Aug. 17.—At some time on Saturday morning a person or persons removed from the verandah of the Queen Hotel all the United States flags which had been placed there for purposes of decoration. T. V. Monahan, proprietor of the hotel, has reported the matter to the police. The U. S. colors were displayed as a compliment to American tourists.

The small flags tacked to the verandah had been up for some weeks. A large American flag was shown on a flagpole at the end of the verandah and the British colors were shown with the small U. S. flags and also on the main flag staff of the hotel.

A short time ago Mr. Monahan received a telephone message from a lady to the effect that the U. S. colors were higher than the British and Canadian colors. He replied that the flag was flying at the highest point from the verandah staff and a small Irish flag was carried away. The small U. S. flags were thrown into the street but were later replaced.

Newfoundland Gets Part Liquor Cargo

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 16—The Dominion of Newfoundland receives 1,000 cases of fine quality whiskey and 300 cases of dry champagne, as the result of a settlement adjusted last night, between the finance minister and the steamer Herbert Green sized last month as a rum runner.

MINERS BARRED FROM BRITISH PROBE BOARD

Will Be Allowed to Cross-Examine Witnesses Through Own Counsel

British United Press. LONDON, Aug. 17—The miners will not be represented on the Royal Commission that is to investigate conditions in the coal industry. [This was the decision which the cabinet reached on Saturday after long discussion. The miners, however, will be allowed to cross-examine witnesses through their counsel and it is likely that Sir Henry Slesser, Solicitor-General in the MacDonald administration, will be briefed to look after their interests. The men's own counsel will have no direct representation on the commission, but will be granted similar privileges to the men.]

AGREES UNDER PROTEST. A. J. Cook, the powerful leader of the men, only agreed to this arrangement under protest, but Premier Baldwin was forced to call a halt to the demands of the miners. Since Conservative antagonism to the encroachments of the men has been steadily rising, Baldwin was given a clear indication that he could not continue to rely on their support in the House if he continued to make concessions, and gave way to their demands, all along the line.

FASCISTI THREATEN. Mr. Cook is again in the limelight, but this time it is the Fascists of Britain, composed largely of the sons of the families of the upper middle class, who are amusing themselves fighting the trail and underfed communists in Hyde Park. These British Fascists are today engaged in defending their headquarters against imaginary attacks with wooden swords.

MR. COOK ZIG-ZAGGING. Mr. Palmer asserted that this car, which is said to belong to John Walsh, Paradise road and which was driven by a brother whose name is not given, was occupied by four men in the Walsh car were given as Frank Ramsey, Andrew Narr and Charles Harrington.

A telegram was sent to Montreal also and Dr. Arnold Johnston to the hospital, where he arrived in St. Stephen on Sunday morning, having motored from McAdam Junction to the hospital.

GO OVER BANK. FREDERICTON, Aug. 16—S. F. Fox with his wife and five children went over a steep bank on the highway road between Fredericton and Woodstock Friday night. The car was leaving well to its own side when it went over. All the party was thrown clear of the car but received no injury save one boy, who was cut about the face. The car was much damaged.

MANY ATTEND AS DEAD HONORED

Local Prentice Boys Carry Out Their Decoration Day Ceremonies

Cedar Hill Scene of Memorial Service—Wreath Placed on Soldier Monument

The 'Prentice Boys in large numbers marched to the services of the annual decoration of the graves of departed members yesterday, and in the brilliant sunshine of a perfect summer afternoon the ceremonies were carried out in a most impressive manner.

A special feature of the decoration day proceedings was introduced yesterday for the first time when Mayor Potts placed a handsome wreath on the civic war memorial in Kings square to honor those members of the order who made the supreme sacrifice and rest in overseas graves.

The Carleton Cornet Band, under the leadership of William T. Lanyon, headed the parade of the 'Prentice Boys from their hall in Gullford street to Cedar Hill cemetery where the chief ceremony was carried out under the direction of Grand Master William H. Price, assisted by Past Master C. G. Price, Past Master Mayor F. L. Potts, Past Master William J. Smith, Past Master J. W. Fillmore and Past Master A. L. Belyea.

Graves were also decorated in Fernhill, Greenwood, Cedar Hill extension, Musquash and Lorneville cemeteries. Besides the representatives of local lodges there were the supreme masters members from Devon, Maryville, Fredericton, Woodland, Lorneville, Grand Bay and other local lodges.

Amongst those who placed decorations were the following members of King Edward Lodge, No. 20, Past Master Duffy, Ralph Melvin, Shubal Carvell, Harry Lowe and Edward Clark.

A large crowd of reverent spectators assembled at Cedar Hill to watch the ceremonies. W. J. Fillmore, as standard-bearer, led the procession of members and friends who bore the barouches filled with beautiful flowers. The Carleton Cornet Band marched next and during the ceremony played the specially selected hymns.

When Past Grand Master R. J. Anderson had officiated, Grand Master Potts called for a short interval of silent prayer.

When the committee had completed the decoration of the graves Mayor Potts addressed the gathering. He referred feelingly to the departed mentioning specially those who had passed away in the last year. He spoke in particular of L. E. Rolston and Mr. Carlson.

In extolling the order's work he emphasized the fact that its motto of "Fidelity, Love and Charity" not only united the members but extended to their relatives also. He paid highest tribute to those members who had made the supreme sacrifice. Mr. Anderson spoke words of consolation to the bereaved.

Graves decorated were as follows: William Catherwood, sr., Russell Lingler, William Wheelwright, Ernest Tilden and Thomas Stout in Cedar Hill, Stewart Baird in Lorneville and Alban Stevens in Musquash, and Lt.-Col. W. McRae in Fernhill.

Queen Alexandra Lodge, No. 24, of Lorneville, decorated the graves of Harry Cole at Greenwood cemetery, where the graves of Otis Clark and Jack Carvell were also decorated.

SIR ADAM BECK, ONT. HYDRO CHAIRMAN DEAD

Succumbs to Anaemia After Several Months' Illness—Was 68 Years Old—Was Creator of Great Electric System, Which He Directed to Last

LONDON, Aug. 16.—Sir Adam Beck, creator and architect of Ontario's great hydro-electric power system, Chairman of Ontario's Hydro-Electric Power Commission, noted horseman and probably the best known man in this province, died shortly before midnight last night at "Hedley" his London home, of pernicious anaemia, aged 68 years.

Sir Adam had been suffering for several months and had returned some weeks ago from Baltimore where he underwent special treatment in one of the local hospitals.

Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission, popularly known in this province as the Minister of Power, was a native of Ontario. He was born on June 20, 1857, at Baden, Ont., which was founded by his father. After having passed through the public school at Baden he attended the famous Dr. Tassie's school at Galt, then the Rockwood Academy, and afterwards the Western University, London, Ont., from which he graduated, and which later conferred upon him the degree of LL.D.

Sir Adam, who was then simply Mr. Beck, in 1878 engaged in the iron foundry and milling business, with his father, the late Jacob B. Beck, at Baden. In 1880 he removed to Galt, Ont., where he commenced the manufacture of boxes and the business of veneering this lumber. He continued in this line for four years, then went to London, Ont. Here he built an extensive plant and established branches at Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton.

The beginning of Sir Adam's great interest in the supply of cheap electric power to the people of Ontario began in 1903, when he was appointed as a Commissioner to investigate the development and distribution of electric power from Niagara Falls. In 1906, as Minister of Power, he introduced a power bill in the Legislature, creating the Hydro-Electric Power Commission in June of that year. This position he continued to hold up to the time of his death.

He was re-elected for each succeeding term until the provincial general election of 1919, when he was defeated by H. A. Stevenson, Labor representative. Sir Adam was again elected to the Ontario Legislature as a member for London in the general election of 1923, and was appointed Minister without portfolio in the Government of Hon. G. Howard Ferguson.

Sir Adam had very wide interests and probably was the best known man in his native Province. He was Mayor of London from 1902 to 1904. He was president of the Union of Municipalities in 1904, and held office in various local associations. Known far and wide for his interest in thoroughbred horses, Sir Adam was a promoter of the Canadian Jockey Club and was Master of the London Hunt Club. He was knighted in 1914.

Lady Beck, to whom he was married in 1898, was an expert horsewoman, also an owner of thoroughbreds. With her husband she was prominent at the leading horse shows in London, England, and in the United States and Canada. Lady Beck died on October 17, 1921.

During the war Sir Adam Beck rendered valuable service to the cause of the Allies as Director of Remounts. He personally supervised the purchase of army horses for the Canadian Forces. Sir Adam Beck's first experience in public matters was obtained as a hospital trustee in London, Ont., where he resided for about 30 years. He was prominent in promoting the Byron Sanitarium near London and the handsome residence for the nurses in connection with that institution was the gift of Sir Adam and Lady Beck.

One daughter of Sir Adam Beck, Marjorie, survives. She is the wife of Major Strathairn Hay, of Toronto.

2,200 IN SHANGHAI POST OFFICE STRIKE

Men Attack Post Office and One is Wounded—Deliveries Suspended.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 17.—Twenty-two hundred of the 40,000 postal employees walked out today, demanding increases in pay and shorter working hours. The strikers attacked a Chinese constable guarding the post office and administered a beating. The constable fled upon the men, wounding one. Deliveries have been suspended.

BACK FROM ARCTIC

Baron Byng Returns to Edmonton After 4,000 Mile Journey.

EDMONTON, Aug. 17.—Concluding a month's trip to the Arctic Circle, in which he covered more than 4,000 miles after leaving Edmonton, July 18, Lord Byng, Governor-General of Canada, arrived in the city Saturday afternoon, looking the picture of health.

Freight Rate Expert Named This Week

HALIFAX, Aug. 17.—The freight rates expert to prepare a brief on behalf of the Maritime Provinces for presentation to the Board of Railway Commissioners will probably be appointed this week, according to D. R. Turnbull, president of the Halifax Board of Trade, one of the committee appointed by the recent Maritime economic conference for that purpose.

CROSSES TO WARN AUTOISTS

Victim of Motor Accident Is On The Road To Recovery; Told of Death of His Wife

CAMPBELLTON, Aug. 16.—Henry A. Mence, of Saint John, patient in the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, has regained consciousness and is expected to recover. In the automobile accident near New Carlisle on Thursday in which his wife was killed, Mr. Mence received fractures of the right hip and three ribs and a fracture over the right eye, but his most serious trouble is that his right chest is filled with blood. He was told of his wife's death Saturday afternoon but has not given any directions regarding the funeral. His mental condition is good and he is making some improvement. The condition of the daughter, Kathleen, is not serious. She is suffering from bad bruises but has no fractures or cuts.

Blames Women For Agriculture Decline

LONDON, Aug. 17.—Blame for agricultural decline in England is placed on the female sex and the lack of rural domestic science by Mrs. Margaret Winttingham, former Liberal member of parliament. "The farmers wife is not as interested in doing the adjuncts of farm work as she used to be, and that is one of the reasons why agriculture is declining," Mrs. Winttingham declared in a recent address.

Granby Man Falls From Wagon; Is Killed

MONTREAL, Aug. 17.—Clement Teitelbaum, 35, was instantly killed when he lost his balance and fell from the seat of a wagon he was driving at Granby, Que., Saturday afternoon. He rolled under the wheels and his head was crushed.





SAYS TRADE BETTER DURING LAST YEAR

British Commissioner Declares Prospects For Gradual Betterment.

HALIFAX, Aug. 16—That the undertone of business in Canada was much better than a year ago and that prospects were for a slow and gradual improvement, was the opinion expressed here tonight by F. W. Field, senior British Government Trade Commissioner in Canada, with offices in Montreal.

Mr. Field has just completed a visit to the Western provinces and to Ontario and Quebec and is now making a tour of the Maritime Provinces with a view to making reports on Canadian resources and trade to the British Government department of overseas trade in London. He also visited Newfoundland.

MUCH IMPRESSED.

Mr. Field was much impressed with the leveling process which had appeared in the past few years. Bankers and businessmen agreed that conditions were "a much sounder basis and that the outlook was fairly good."

"One cannot travel from coast to coast without being greatly impressed with the possibilities of development," Mr. Field said.

HERE IS ROMANCE OF NO MAN'S LAND

British and German, Wounded by Same Shell, Now Fraternize.

LONDON, Aug. 17—One of the strangest of war romances is being worked out at St. Anne's, the Lauder castle resort. The principals are a German ex-officer, H. L. Kay, of Blackburn, who, a few years ago, was charging each other in "No Man's Land" and today were walking arm-in-arm on the promenade recalling memories of the war. Dr. and Mrs. Burg are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Kay.

The men first met at Arras early in 1916, during a raid on the enemy lines by a Highland battalion.

In a fierce fight outside the German trenches, Dr. Burg and Mr. Kay found themselves alone facing each other with deadly intent, but that second a shell burst a few yards away. Dr. Burg, wounded, crawled into his own lines, and Mr. Kay was found by his own stretcher-bearers.

Both recovered, and towards the end of 1917 Mr. Kay was captured. Subsequently when he was a prisoner a tall German civilian passed him, turned back, and began to talk.

Mutual recognition followed; they shook hands, and thereafter Mr. Kay had a good friend during his captivity.

POLA NEGRI PAYS FOR SEIZED GEMS

Undeclared Valuables Delivered on Payment of \$57,000.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—Pola Negri, screen actress, through her attorney, William M. Chadbourne, deposited \$57,000 with the Customs authorities in full payment of the fines, penalties and duties imposed on undeclared jewelry which was seized on May 2, when the actress arrived here from Europe on the Cunard liner Berengaria. This finally disposed of the case. The settlement is said to have been the third largest amount paid by an individual to the Customs authorities to recover seized jewelry. The domestic value of the gems was estimated at \$47,000, and the additional \$10,000 represented fines and penalties levied by Phillip Elliot, Collector of the Port of New York. The jewels consisted of four diamond bracelets, a twelve-carat emerald ring, a ninety-six carat uncut emerald, said once to have been the property of a King of Prussia, and a thirty-carat ring. The jewelry was turned over to Mr. Chadbourne after payment of the \$57,000. The actress is in Hollywood.

SEIZE PRICE LIST OF VOODOO DOCTOR

Circulars Offer "Wishing Dust" and Charms to Negroes at \$1 to \$1,000.

ATLANTIC CITY, Aug. 17.—Twelve thousand circulars said to have been sent to this city by a New York voodoo doctor were seized by the police here as they were being distributed to negro homes on the north side by six negro boys.

The circulars bore the address of D. Alexander of Brooklyn, N. Y. All sorts of love powders, wishing dust, lucky charms and incantations are offered for sale on the circulars, with prices ranging from \$1 to \$1,000. "Gaffer Dust, New Moon, No. 1 good, \$50; Happy Dust, \$40; Black Cat's Ankle Dust, \$500; Black Cat's Wishbone, \$1,000; King Solomon's Marrow, \$1,000; Easy Life Powder, \$100; Tying Down Goods, \$50; Chasing Away Goods \$50; Boss Fix Powders, \$15, and Buzzard Nest, \$100," were some of the goods offered.

Inquiry developed that "Bringing Back Powders" were designed to return an errand wife or husband to a grieving spouse. "Tying Down Goods" were said to keep the object of one's affections from departing, while "Chasing Away Goods" had the opposite effect. "Boss Fix Powders" keep one's employer in a friendly mood.


