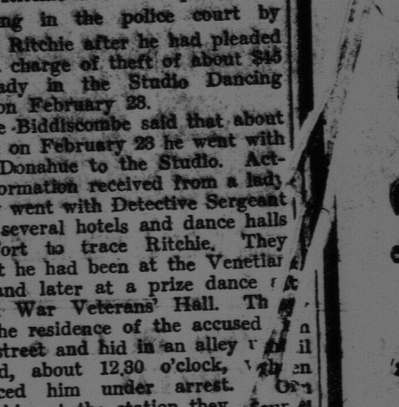

(New York Times.) Iodine still holds first place as a skin disinfectant in surgical technique, particularly in the industrial medical field.

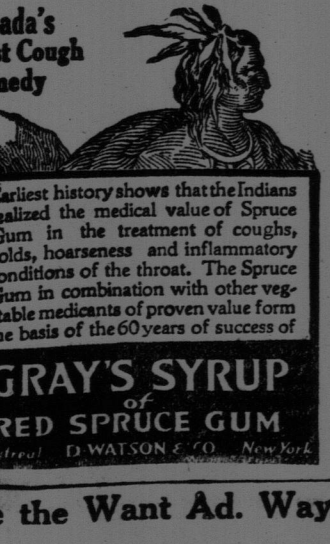

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TO AID TRAVEL
OF WOMEN
IMMIGRANTS

Government Arranges for
the Wearing of Badges to
Show Destinations.

A scheme that is intended to prevent mistakes and facilitate the forwarding of unaccompanied women and girls from their Canadian port of embarkation to their Canadian destinations has been arranged by the department of immigration and colonization, and will henceforth be adopted for all such passengers arriving on Canadian Pacific ships at Montreal, Quebec or St. John. In order to prevent confusion when all passengers are hastening to leave the ship, and to prevent inconvenience to women and girls, it has been arranged that the matron aboard the ship shall supply each unaccompanied woman with a small ribbon for use as a special means of identification. This ribbon will be worn at the time of landing.

A red ribbon will identify those proceeding west of Ontario and a blue one those destined for that province. Passengers proceeding to any other points will wear white ribbons. When there are special government parties a yellow ribbon in addition to the red one will designate a party for Saskatchewan; a sky blue in addition to red for Manitoba, and brown in addition to red for Alberta. Any woman requiring hotel or hostel accommodation will wear, in addition to the color showing her destination, a green ribbon. Upon their arrival at a Canadian port the ribbons will aid the Canadian conductress taking charge of the party to divide immediately those for various destinations, so that there will be little delay.

In addition to a staff of stewardesses on all Canadian Pacific ships there is also a matron whose special duty is to attend to the welfare of women and children traveling alone. The Women's Division of the Department of Immigration and Colonization co-operates in providing conductresses for unaccompanied women, who are given special attention when immigrants are leaving their ship on arrival at a Canadian port. They entrain at once for Winnipeg or the Pacific Coast while those for Ontario go to Toronto, and are sent on to their destination from there. Special cars are allotted to these women, and they receive sympathetic care from the trained conductresses who accompany them.

GIVE HAITI ITS
OWN GOVERNMENT

Termination of U. S. Occupation
is Proposed in Congress.

Washington, March 11.—Termination of American occupation of Haiti and re-establishment of a native government was proposed in a resolution introduced yesterday by Senator King, Democrat, and referred to the foreign relations committee.

The resolution requests the president to abrogate American occupation and the Haitian treaty of 1918. It also asks the president to direct a popular election of a Haitian assembly by July 1, to elect a native president within thirty days and withdraw U. S. forces within six months after election of the native president and adoption of a new native constitution.

SIR DAVID WATSON'S WILL

Two Bequests of \$10,000 Each to Hospitals.
Quebec, March 11.—Two bequests of \$10,000 each, for the Jeffrey Hale Hospital, Quebec, and the Western Hospital, Montreal, and a bequest of \$25,000 to his son-in-law, Mr. James P. Craig, of Montreal, "in memory of our joint loss," are amongst the provisions contained in the will of the late Major-General Sir David Watson, which has been probated in the Superior Court here.

The will, which was dated April 27, 1920, also provides that the Chronicle Printing Company be liquidated as expeditiously as possible and the entire proceeds invested in safe six per cent securities. All stocks, bonds, life insurance and cash in banks are to be securely reinvested under the terms of the will.

The bequest to the Western Hospital is for the "Marjorie Watson Craig Bed," in memory of his daughter, who was a nurse in that hospital. The Jeffrey Hale Hospital bequest is for a bed in the tuberculosis ward.

The use and usufruct of the estate are left to his widow, Lady Mary Browning Watson, and the ownership goes to the two children, Mildred Jean (Billie), and Mary Browning (Bowie) Watson. Ample provision is also made for Sir David's sister, Mary Agnes Watson. As joint executors are named Lady Watson and Mrs. James P. Craig.

GRANT OF \$100,000 FOR BISHOP'S COLLEGE

FUNERAL HALTED
AT THE GRAVESIDE

The Disposal of a Body Once
Thought to be That of a
Moncton Veteran Under
Consideration.

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)
Receiving word that the body about to be buried by the York County Patriotic Association in Prospect Cemetery yesterday morning at that of Frank Wallace McLaren, of Moncton, N. B., was not McLaren, the burial service was discontinued, and the body removed to D. M. Johnston's undertaking parlors. Mr. Johnston said last night that the body would be taken to the morgue today, when the city would probably dispose of it.

The man in question was killed on the G. T. R. tracks between York and Sincere streets a few days ago. From an active service button found on a remnant of the coat worn by the man, which contained a regimental number, it was believed that he was McLaren. But a dispatch from Moncton yesterday afternoon stated that McLaren had returned to his home there. McLaren is a returned man, and lost his service button some time ago. It must have been picked up by the man who was killed.

N. S. FARMER IS FOUND
HANGING IN BARN

North Sydney, N. S., March 11.—Angus McLellan, aged sixty-five, of New Harris Forks, Victoria county, was found dead, hanging in his barn, according to news received here. Suicide while in a state of despondency, is given as the reason for the death.

MURDER TRIAL
IS POSTPONED

Juryman at Owen Sound was
Alone with Another Man a
Few Minutes.

Owen Sound, Ont., March 11.—Because a jurymen had been left unguarded a few minutes and had been spoken to by an outsider during that time, Mr. Justice Logie dismissed the jury in the McMillan murder case and ordered a new trial at the next assizes. James Foster, a jurymen, had registered at the Queen's Hotel, and the sheriff had made arrangements for the jury hearing the case to be put up at the Seldon House. Foster was taken to the Queen's Hotel in charge of a constable and allowed to go to his room alone to pack up. While there Captain Barton followed him up stairs and the two were alone together for a few minutes. Foster said no conversation had taken place.

"I am not suggesting any impropriety," said the judge, "but the law says that in capital cases the jury cannot separate for the very reason they may be, consciously or unconsciously, influenced by their friends. Under these circumstances, I see nothing for it but to discharge the jury and traverse this case to the next assize."

Turning to the jury, Justice Logie said: "Gentlemen, you are discharged. I regret that this country has been put to such expense unnecessarily. Some of you may be county councillors, and, if so, I trust you will see that in the future some provision must be made for jurymen who are locked up over night."

CULTURED EGYPTIAN
CAUSE OF UNREST

Not Common People Who
Make Trouble, Says D. M.
Carruthers.

(Toronto Globe.)
"The real trouble in Egypt arises from the educated Egyptian, and not from the people generally," said David M. Carruthers, who arrived in the city yesterday after a two-month tour of the Mediterranean.

"The government of the country is suffering from what Dickens called 'the obsequiousness of office,'" continued Mr. Carruthers, in an interview with The Globe. "The cultured Egyptians, many of whom have passed through the universities of Britain and America, are subjected to the condescension of the aristocratic Englishman, who looks at him through his eyeglass and regards him as a nigger."

Mr. Carruthers, however, expressed his admiration for the results of British rule, as compared with that of the French.

"One has only to visit Algiers and see the rab quater in the city, and then take a trip to Cairo and inspect the Arab section there, to realize the difference between French and British rule. I was delighted with the Arab quarters at Cairo, but was disgusted with those of Algiers, which were with-

**TAXATION IS
HEAVY BURDEN
IN OLD COUNTRY**
London, Feb. 22.—(Associated Press, by Mail)—Wages of the British workman were cut more than 25,000,000 a week in 1921, says the British Board of Trade. The reduction affected more than 7,000,000 workers and was almost equal to the increases in pay which had been granted in 1919 and 1920. The severity of the British income tax may be judged by the fact that installments now payable, including the super-tax, amount to £400,000,000 sterling. This burden is borne by fewer than 2,500,000 persons. The sum now levied in income taxes is almost twice as much as the whole national revenue in 1914. The number of unemployed continued to increase during the last month. A statement issued by the American Chamber of Commerce in London shows the severe declines in British trade last year. It gives British imports in 1921 as only 74.3 per cent of their volume in 1919, while exports were only 49.8 per cent of those of 1919. In the last three months of 1921, however, a steady increase is noted in exports of coal and manufactured goods.

ON APPEALS TO PRIVY COUNCIL

Sir Alan Aylesworth Protests Against Bill to Abolish the System.

(Toronto Telegram.)
Claiming that it was a direct violation of every Canadian's birthright, and that, in his opinion, the province did not have the power to pass such a measure, Sir Alan Aylesworth, K. C., who headed a deputation of benches before the provincial cabinet today, roundly denounced the introduction of Mr. Raney's bill to abolish appeals to the Privy Council.

"This is a matter of grave importance," said Sir Alan, "and you are considering a step that should not be taken. This is not a lawyer's matter in any sense, except that they are familiar with the proceedings of the courts, as it concerns every British subject. Such a move as the introduction of this bill would be hailed as a triumph by such men as J. H. C. Crawford, if it is necessary to make mention of the names of some of them."

Sir Alan pointed out that the introduction of the bill would tend to disturb the affectionate feeling that existed between the Mother Country and the Dominion. He stated that the bill would have the effect of encouraging those disaffected people of whom he had spoken. "I could understand why some of the judges at Osprey Hall would favoring appeals cut off, as they then could be free from restraint, as there could be no appeal from their findings. Furthering this argument, he stated that an instance of this was in the Division Court, where the judge was seen from appeals.

"That," said he, "is the same judge, when the Country Govt. knows there is an appeal from his ruling, and it will act as a unconscious check."

Mr. Drury pointed out that in presenting a case in any court of the province, they were dealing with the representative of the King.

Sir Alan replied that it was merely appeal from one King's delegate to another King's delegate until such time as the case was taken to the foot of the throne, and that the appeal to the King is older than the British government itself. "This bill certainly does seem to smother that appeal," said he, "and I would rather see any other appeal cut out than that to the Privy Council."

In making this comment, Sir Alan strongly emphasized his words that he nearly knocked the telephone of the member's desk.

He claimed that the act would be ultra vires, if passed.

ONE LAW FOR ALL, SAYS BEN SPENCE

A Lively Report on Prohibition in Ontario—The "Master Bootleggers."

(Toronto Telegram.)
"Loyal citizens should respect the laws; not simply those in which they believe or for which they have voted," declared Rev. Ben Spence in his annual report to the Dominion Alliance Provincial Convention in Massey Hall this afternoon. "That man," he said, "who ever open-eyed, deliberately violates the law is not only guilty of a criminal offence, but also disloyalty to his fellow-citizens and treason to the state. No man is fit to govern who is not willing to be governed. We need more of a true British respect for law. If any citizen does not like the law, let him seek to have it changed by constitutional means, but let him be loyal to his fellows and the state."

"In this age of jazz and turbulence let us not be swerved from our steady course."

The Sandy Bill, he stated, had saved the situation in Ontario, due to the effort of the Alliance.

"The failure of legislation to make good is most disappointing and regrettable. Any revision of the O. T. A. should be in accord with the will of the people, and should be a strong law."

"Lowering of liquor stocks is what is causing so much clamor at present. Liquor are more strongly set against the liquor traffic than ever."

He estimated that \$10,000,000 worth of liquor came into Toronto between the vote and the start of the law against importing.

"The O. T. A., there is no doubt," he said, "allows privilege to the rich and not available to the poor. What the poor man cannot have the rich man should not be allowed to keep. Some method must be found for dealing with the piled-up hoards in the cellars of the well-to-do. More determined efforts should be made to get the man who has up. The master bootleggers in Toronto too often escape."

"The policy of the provincial government to enforce the O. T. A. through the provincial police has been wholly good. Attorney-General Raney has had more than one magistrate and Crown Attorney charged, and more than one has been found guilty of their duty. In the province of Ontario last year the government made a profit of over \$800,000 upon the sale of liquor which admittedly was used for beverage purposes and thus fraudulently obtained upon prescriptions furnished by doctors who knew they were not for medicinal purposes. Law-abiding physicians should see that the few members of their profession who disgrace it, and who will not voluntarily obey the law, be compelled to do so by having the law in this, as in other regards, as nearly rogue-proof as possible."

Regarding Dominion prohibition, he stated that: "We are trying to mop up the border when we should turn off the spigot."

"Canadian soil is today being used as a vantage ground for offensive operations against the administration of the United States. Canadian distillers supply liquor to rum-runners while government officials facilitate their activities by the issuance of charters to export companies and customs officers grant clearance papers to shipments of liquor, knowing it is to be used in defiance of U. S. law and debauching citizens."

Speaking of the exemption of native wine he said: "The legal trade in this and of booze was approximately \$2,000,000 last year. Native wine runs from 16 per cent to 28 per cent, proof spirits, and most of it is stronger than imported wine and champagne and beer. That Ontario grape-growers have nothing to fear from prohibition of native wines is shown in the case of California, where the 1921 crop reached the value of \$79,000,000, a tremendous expansion."

Speaking of doctors' prescriptions, he said: "During the year the Board of Commissioners issued several thousand prescriptions, and for a time checked the further developments of the evil under power conferred by the Ontario Temperance Act. An epidemic of prescription granting happened around Christmas."

"The export trade from Windsor has reached 1,000 cases a day."

"This situation can only be remedied by legislative action, which should be pressed for immediately."

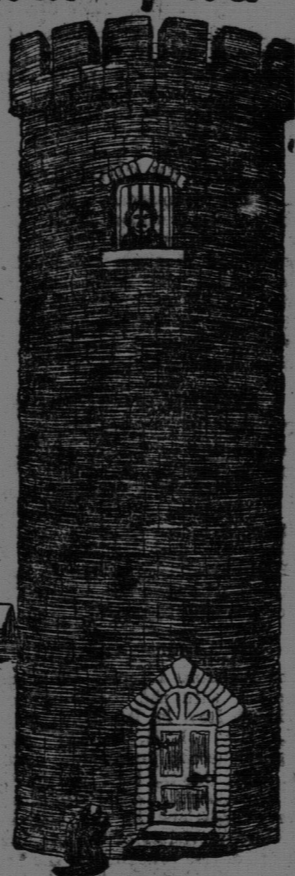

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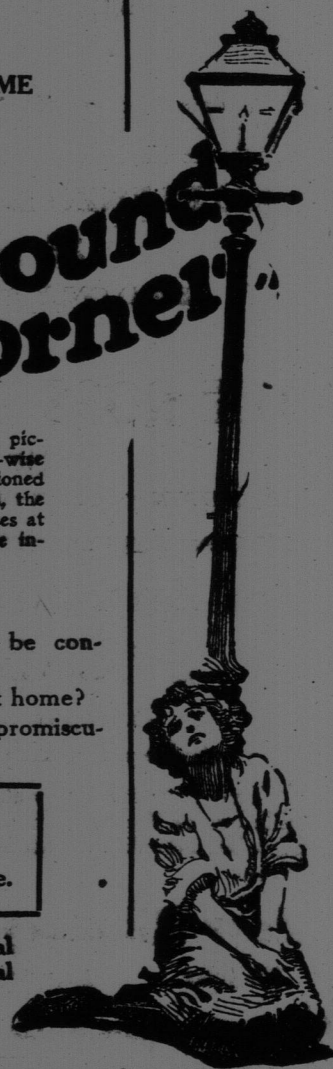
