

Col Cutler, a manufacturing jeweler, was prominent in that trade and in the business and politics of Rhade Island. He was born in Russia 45 years ago.

That former Emperor Nicholas of Russia and his family were assassinated in the basement of their prison house at Ekaterinburg, on the night of July 16, 1918, seem to be dispelled by the accounts of two independent investigators which are published here. One is printed by the London Times and was written by its former Petrograd correspondent, Robert Wilton. The other appears in the magazinc, Nineteenth Century and After, and is from the pen of Capt. Francis McCullsgh, of the army, who, before the war, was a widely known newspaper correspondent. IN SASKATCHEWAN
North Battleford, Sask., Aug. 30—
Forty-two years ago this month the first newspaper was published in Saskatchewan. After a journey of 650 miles over boundless prairies and unbridged streams, the late P. G. Laurie, following the brigade of Red River carts which carried his plant, reached Battleford, the capital of the Northwest Territories, and printed the first edition of the Saskatchewan Herald on August 25, 1878. It was a four paged sheet 14 inches by 10, and contained as well as the news of the vast territories, telegraphic communications from various parts of the world. The Herald continued to publish weekly from that time to the present with the exception of during the Northwest Rebellion in 1885, when publication was suspended for six weeks while the late editor did garrison duty in the fort.



JAPANESE VERSION OF HALLOWE'EN

Festival of Welcome for the Returned Dead Still Celebrated in Rural Districts With Sacrifices and Lan-

Tokio, July 15-This is the day of the Bon Matsuri. The festival always takes n honor of the dead, who on this re believed to return to the places ir former habitation, and must be

vidual welcome to the returning spirit and guide it on its way.

Passing through a remote country district once, on the day of the Bon, I saw a tiny column of smoke rising above the long grass some distance from the road. For the moment I was unable to imagine what it could be; but on going over through the thicket there I found an old woman standing before an ancient fallen gravestone beside which she had placed a stick of lighted insence to welcome back that solitary ghost that all others had forgotten. In the same district, however, many of the gravestones had been taken by carpenters to make doorsteps for the villas of foreigners; and I wondered how the former occupants of these desecrated graves would feel to return, not only to find no one had remembered them, but that even their tombstones had been spirited away. If the dead leave no descendants to welcome them lit is unspeakably sad, from a Japanese point of view; for what anguish can be greater than to return ungreeted on the night of the Bon!

The Bon Matsuri of the Bon!

The Bon Matsuri of the old days, as it still is in some of the remoter rural villages, was a hilarious festival with much drinking of sake and promiscuous dances among the sexes, youths and maidens growing more familiar than Japanese society is accustomed to tolerate. The weird torch lights, the wild music, and the franzy of the Bacchanalian scenes of ancient Greece. These orgics me few and far between in the Bon of today, for the Bon Odori, or dancer, as it was called, is now seldom seen.

For city folk, the Bon is carefully ob-



For city folk, the Bon is carefully observed in their own way, very quietly, neighbors exchanging gifts and good wishes; each family making its house very clean and keeping the lamps bright for the coming of the spirits. Offerings of food, mostly in the way of fruit and vegetables, are laid before the family altars, the trays being piled up profusely with a generous heart. All gifts must be as new and as fresh as possible.

In the old days these offerings were afterward sent out to sea if one lived near the coast. If one did not care to go to the trouble, there was always some one willing to undertake the task for a consideration. These needy ones came to the family door and cried out: "O mukai! O mukai!" which means, I have come to meet you! They received the offerings from the family altars, which they were supposed to take to the water; but there was a tacit understanding that the person taking them away could have the use of them if he wished.

The Bon is a time when apprentices are given a holiday, and a time for paying all outstanding debts. It is, therefore, an occasion which gives satisfaction to many besides the dead.




