Daily Hints For the Cook

BAKED CHOCOLATE PUDDING. Boil two cups stale bread crumbs in one quart of milk thirty minutes. Beat up two eggs, one cup sugar, a pinch of salt, two tablespoons cocoa, or two ounces melted chocolate. Add to milk and bread crumbs, flavor with vanilla and bake one hour.

SPANISH MEAT PIE. One slice of ham and a pound of veal, cut into inch pieces. When it is nearly cooked in just water enough to cover it, pare three medium-sized potatoes, slice them into it, season with pepper, the ham will nearly salt it enough; when it is done thicken with a little flour wet in water; now line a baking dish with a rich crust and pour in the meat and potatoes, have ready two hard-boiled eggs, cut into halves and place on top, then cover with crust; make a hole on top and bake three-quarters of an hour in quite a hot oven. The veal may be left out if desired and still have good results.

### SHERIFF deFOREST HOLDS FIRST COURT

Sheriff deForest presided yesterday at a session of the Sheriff's court for the first time since he has taken office. The case was that of Sims v. Gleason, an action in which the plaintiff claimed \$300 damages to his property in Pond street from the giving way of a retaining wall which supported the property of Mrs. J. P. Gleason, fronting in North street and adjoining Mr. Sims's property on the rear. The defendant said that he had taken the matter up with Mr. Gleason three years ago and he had obtained a satisfaction, he entered suit some time ago. The suit was undefended, and interlocutory judgment was signed. As it was a matter of damages and the court could not fix the amount, a writ of inquiry was issued to the sheriff. He empanelled a jury of seven members and convened his court, which sat on Monday and Tuesday, and yesterday assessed the damages at \$115. H. A. Porter appeared for the plaintiff and McInerney & Trueman for the defendant.

### RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY SHELL FISH COMMISSION

Ottawa, Ont., Jan. 29.—The shell fish commission is recommending the licensing of all star fishermen; that the taking of starfish with eggs may be prohibited; that a size limit may be put on hard-shelled star, a close season established for soft-shelled star, and export of littlenecks prohibited.

The lossing of areas of oyster mud for situation is approved.

### RESCUE IN DARK ON THE KENNEBECASIS

Slating along in the gathering darkness on the Kennebecasis River last evening Merritt Scott of Baywater failed to notice thin ice until it was too late and he was plunged into the chilly waters. His younger brother of about fourteen years was with him. As it would be impossible to effect a rescue alone owing to the shallow ice, he skated with all the speed to the nearest lighted wharf and called for the cottage of Samuel Southern. The latter's son, Wilfrid, went out quickly to where Scott was struggling. Young Southern and the younger Scott boy skated hurriedly to the spot and after some little trouble managed to get the elder youth from his perilous position. He was taken to Mr. Southern's home where he soon was recuperated.

New York, Jan. 29.—The lost link in a chain of evidence on which to base a suit for a \$100,000 tract of land, now occupied by a part of the city of New Orleans, is said to have been found in the discovery of the baptismal record of Joseph Valiere, an early French adventurer.

Persons claiming to be his heirs are scattered throughout the United States, and for years attorneys in their behalf have been seeking to establish title to the Louisiana property, a strip 120 miles long and eighty miles wide, along the banks of the White River.

The baptismal record of Valiere was found in Quebec. By means of this, showing his baptism in May, 1706, it is alleged that his descendants were traced in so direct a line that the heirs believe they can establish their claims.

### LOCAL NEWS

Washington, Jan. 29.—The issue of paper legal tender based on government, state and municipal bonds and backed by a gold reserve of at least twenty per cent, was recommended as a solution of the currency problem by W. H. Barry, former state treasurer of Pennsylvania, on the stand before the currency committee of the house. Mr. Barry told the committee that the evil of the present system was, a insufficient supply of legal tender to serve to support the extended credit demanded by the business interests of the country.

"The banking laws are responsible for the accumulation of money in the reserve cities," he said. "The law allowing the accumulation of millions of money in these reserve cities is responsible. A lack of cash in reserve restricts the banks in the credit they can allow, and this inevitably results in a discrimination as to borrowers. So long as this situation remains there will be a money trust."

A chart produced by Mr. Barry purported to show that panics followed an expansion of credit to a point where it was beyond the support of the available cash reserves.

### THINKS TYPHOID WILL DISAPPEAR

Paris, Jan. 29.—That typhoid fever will gradually disappear during the present century, just as smallpox vanished in the nineteenth, is the assertion of Professor Chantemesse, in a communication to the Academy of Sciences.

Professor Chantemesse cited the testimony of Dr. Frederick F. Russell, of the American Army, that since the employment of bacillus for vaccination typhoid fever had rarely occurred in the army.

The experience of France and other countries, adopting the same treatment, is equally satisfactory. In April last Mr. Delcasse, minister of marine, authorized the treatment of bluejackets and men at naval arsenals with typhoid bacilli, sterilized by heat, and the results of this measure at Cherbourg, Brest and Toulon have just been made known.

The majority of naval men, 67,845, refused to be vaccinated. Among them, from April to the end of December, there were 542 cases of typhoid fever and 118 cases of feverish gastric obstruction.

On the other hand, among the 3,107 men who consented to be vaccinated and have been living in exactly the same conditions as the other men, not a single case of typhoid fever occurred, and only one case of gastric obstruction which was cured.

### GOOD ROADS CONVENTION IS OPENED

The provincial good roads convention is meeting today in the rooms of the St. John Board of Trade with representatives in attendance from many parts of the province in addition to the members of the local association. The purpose is to discuss the condition of the roads and highway legislation, suggest improvements and take steps to have the suggestions put in effect. It is expected that a provincial association will be formed.

New York, Jan. 29.—The lost link in a chain of evidence on which to base a suit for a \$100,000 tract of land, now occupied by a part of the city of New Orleans, is said to have been found in the discovery of the baptismal record of Joseph Valiere, an early French adventurer.

Persons claiming to be his heirs are scattered throughout the United States, and for years attorneys in their behalf have been seeking to establish title to the Louisiana property, a strip 120 miles long and eighty miles wide, along the banks of the White River.

The baptismal record of Valiere was found in Quebec. By means of this, showing his baptism in May, 1706, it is alleged that his descendants were traced in so direct a line that the heirs believe they can establish their claims.

### LOCAL NEWS

Washington, Jan. 29.—The issue of paper legal tender based on government, state and municipal bonds and backed by a gold reserve of at least twenty per cent, was recommended as a solution of the currency problem by W. H. Barry, former state treasurer of Pennsylvania, on the stand before the currency committee of the house. Mr. Barry told the committee that the evil of the present system was, a insufficient supply of legal tender to serve to support the extended credit demanded by the business interests of the country.

"The banking laws are responsible for the accumulation of money in the reserve cities," he said. "The law allowing the accumulation of millions of money in these reserve cities is responsible. A lack of cash in reserve restricts the banks in the credit they can allow, and this inevitably results in a discrimination as to borrowers. So long as this situation remains there will be a money trust."

A chart produced by Mr. Barry purported to show that panics followed an expansion of credit to a point where it was beyond the support of the available cash reserves.

### LOCAL NEWS

Paris, Jan. 29.—That typhoid fever will gradually disappear during the present century, just as smallpox vanished in the nineteenth, is the assertion of Professor Chantemesse, in a communication to the Academy of Sciences.

Professor Chantemesse cited the testimony of Dr. Frederick F. Russell, of the American Army, that since the employment of bacillus for vaccination typhoid fever had rarely occurred in the army.

The experience of France and other countries, adopting the same treatment, is equally satisfactory. In April last Mr. Delcasse, minister of marine, authorized the treatment of bluejackets and men at naval arsenals with typhoid bacilli, sterilized by heat, and the results of this measure at Cherbourg, Brest and Toulon have just been made known.

The majority of naval men, 67,845, refused to be vaccinated. Among them, from April to the end of December, there were 542 cases of typhoid fever and 118 cases of feverish gastric obstruction.

On the other hand, among the 3,107 men who consented to be vaccinated and have been living in exactly the same conditions as the other men, not a single case of typhoid fever occurred, and only one case of gastric obstruction which was cured.

### AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL WILL BE AT SUSSEX

Dominion Official Here Today With Mission to Establish It—The Project

A new school building is to be erected at Sussex near the one at present there. One of the main features is the fact that it will be a practical school of vocations giving attention to agriculture, domestic science, manual training, and other such educational interests. Professor L. B. McCready, of Guelph, Ontario, director of agriculture in the college there arrived in the city at noon, commissioned by Hon. Mr. Barrill and C. C. James to come to the province in connection with the matter. He was accompanied by Superintendent W. S. Carter.

Professor McCready is of the dominion educational department. He said that he thought the scheme would work out satisfactorily. This dominion government had made provision for the granting of \$1,000,000 to the provinces to aid in matters which would be of benefit to agriculture. Such a school as proposed would come under this heading and the province would be aided by the federal government in its establishment and maintenance.

In addition to the teaching of agriculture Professor McCready thought it likely that a practical agriculturist, a graduate from a school of science would have an office in Sussex and general information could be had there by farmers concerning what was to be done in the best interests of fruit growing, general farming and dairying. This appointment would be somewhat of a propaganda, having general farming information to impart and, besides giving it to the farmers at his office, would also visit their farms and aid them in every way possible. The scheme was now being worked out in Ontario with excellent success. The same man in the winter would conduct special classes in the school for farmers' sons.

One of the means for getting rid of the middlemen, said Professor McCready, would be through this science teacher organizing the farmers into associations such as was done in Ontario, governing the output, etc., of staples from the farm and dairy, providing better markets for them and in every way possible helping them promote the best to be had in farm life. Professor McCready will leave for Sussex tomorrow with Superintendent Carter.



NOTHING DECADENT ABOUT BRITISH TRADE

BOY POLITICIANS

An English Idea For Public Schools STUDIES UP TO DATE

Would Take up Big Matters of Every Day Life in Shaping Boy's Future—Teacher Tells of His Experience.

(London Standard.) The turning of boys into cosmopolitan politicians in order to give living interest to school-work is suggested by the proposal to separate the teaching of the classics from the teaching of the modern languages on the Standard on Saturday.

"Interest in current events ought to be much more fully utilized in education than it is at present," he said. "If the patterns are returned to the customer there is no provision for a drawback on any of duty on that exportation, and if he sent them back to us we are compelled to pay on them each time they are re-imported. If the Canadian customer already had his patterns, which have been made and tested under his direction, he would not be willing to incur the expense and delay due to having them duplicated in this country."

Aluminum The world "trust" in aluminum has again been broken before the committee. A few days ago, A. V. Davis, president of the Aluminum Company of America, admitted in the course of evidence that his company was the only Canadian aluminum company and the Canadian concern has come to an agreement with six or seven foreign companies. The agreement covered the whole world.

A brief submitted by J. H. Beach, tells a remarkable story and gigantic profits of the aluminum "trust" in the Pittsburgh Reduction Company (which was the predecessor of the Aluminum Company of America) was declared a stock dividend of 100 per cent. in November 1908, three months after the Payne-Albright bill became operative, the company declared a dividend of 500 per cent. in stock.

"Mr. Beach is really asking that aluminum be placed on the free list, referring to the company's increased capital as being 'simply capitalized tariff.'"

While the hearings before the committee on ways and means have been in progress, considerable attention has been directed to the attitude of that veteran republican member Seneca K. Payne. Mr. Payne, in republican days, was chairman of the committee and the present tariff bears his name. In the course of conversation he might Mr. Payne informed us of his firm conviction that the Canadian reciprocity act should be amended.

FORESTALLING CASE IS DEALT WITH AND FINE OF \$20 STRUCK

A. H. Hanington Declares Law Antiquated and Beyond City's Powers

That the bye-laws regarding forestalling in the country market are antiquated and ultra vires was the opinion expressed by A. H. Hanington in the police court this morning during the hearing of a case against William Dean, charged with forestalling. The complaint alleged that Mr. Dean purchased ten turkeys from William Mullett, a farmer, in the country market last week before the goods had been exposed for sale three hours. The defence contended that Mr. Dean did not buy the goods for himself, and that he was employed only as a clerk for Thomas Dean in the market. He admitted that he made the arrangements with Mullett for the purchase of the turkeys and had helped him weigh them in the market, that he saw Mullett receiving money for the turkeys. Mr. Hanington contended that Mr. Dean did not act on his own initiative, and that therefore he could not be found guilty. "The laws regarding forestalling are antiquated, and in any mind ultra vires, and you will not find them in force in any other place but St. John," said Mr. Hanington. "I also contend," he said, "that the corporation exceeded their power when they made such laws."

TEMPLE FLAG CASE COMES UP AGAIN IN ANOTHER FORM

Now a Law to Compel Pupils to Salute Stars and Stripes in Every Room of Each School

A Canadian Press despatch from Trenton, N. J., says: The dispute in the Cedar Grove High school some months ago, caused by a father taking his son out of school because the principal tried to compel him to salute the Stars and Stripes and pledge allegiance, was again brought to mind yesterday, when Assemblyman Peacock of Burlington, introduced a bill calling for placing American flags in every room of each public school in the state and requiring all the pupils to salute it each day. Pupils who refused to salute the flag, he returned to school and agreed to salute the flag, but refused to pledge allegiance, and was upheld by the state board of education.
