A few years ago Prof. Dalbeare, professor of psychics at Tufts college and myself, had a most marvelous "sitting" performance such wonders in Los Angeles. This seance was held in Prof. Dalbeare's own library. No one but ourselves, Mrs. Dalbeare and the psychic were present. Conditions were absolutely of our own making except that the room was dark.

The psychic, confined to her chair by the silk threads the ends of which were held by Dalbeare and myself—fell into a death-like trance and while in this condition and while absolutely motionless and silent, a large tin cone, which stood upon the table, was knocked about. Books were thrown from the shelves behind the psychic!

Large hands appeared between me and the light! And then at last, a voice came from a trumpet which floated around the table!

For two solid hours this voice, which claimed that it had belonged to a Confederate soldier, a native of Missouri, kept us laughing by the quaint and ready humor of his replies.

Prof. Dalbeare was profoundly puzzled as well as amused by the events. Pillows were patting and tossed around, books hurled through the air; my chair was tapped at a distance of six feet from the psychic and the cone moved with unerring precision to whatever point in the room we indicated!

The table was shaken as if by a strong man—And yet the silk threads remained undisturbed and no slightest sound indicated a movement on the part of the psychic!

the Dalbeares recognized, one came to me, but I paid little attention to that part of the performance.

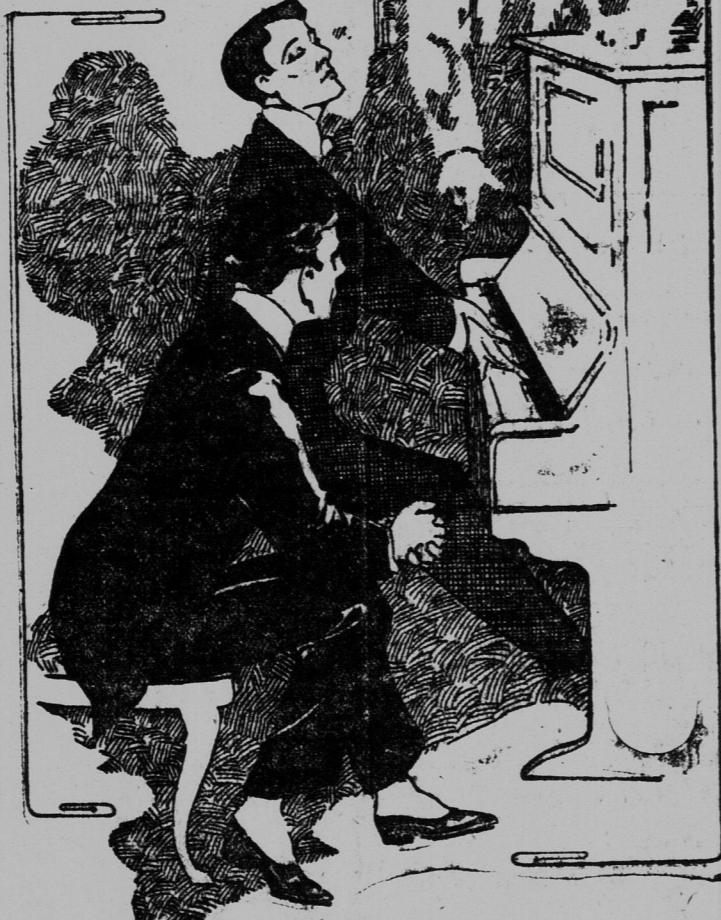

Viola Whalen of Haverhill Accuses Her Father of Murderous Act

Haverhill, Mass., Oct. 2.—For the second time in a few days Viola Whalen was found bound and gagged in the sitting room at her home in Winter street. The room was filled with gas, which was escaping from an open jet.

The discovery was made by employees of a store on the street floor who were summoned by one of the inmates of the apartments adjoining those occupied by Miss Whalen and her mother, Mrs. Mary Whalen. Miss Whalen was partially unconscious.

The story told to the police was that she was seated at a table reading, when her father stepped behind her and fastened a woman's stocking over her mouth, after which he tied her hands behind her back and throwing her on the floor turned on the gas jets in the room and left.

Daily Hints For the Cook

Brown Bread
Three shredded wheat biscuits, 1 cup Indian meal, ½ cup bread flour, ½ cup molasses, 1 ½ cups sweet milk, ½ teaspoon salt. Put above together and let stand ½ hour. Dissolve 1 teaspoon (level) of soda in ¼ cup of sour milk and add to the above. Steam 8 hours steady in greased mould. (Three cups of maple flakes will take the place of shredded wheat biscuit).

Currant Rolls
Two cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, ½ teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, sift twice, work in 2 tablespoons butter, add 2-3 cup milk. Roll ¼ inch thick, brush with melted butter and sprinkle with currants, sugar and cinnamon. Roll like jelly roll and cut off ¼ inch pieces. Bake in hot oven about 20 minutes.

To begin with, I want to say that I don't consider myself the best little dopster that ever spotted a cinch bet.

Two years ago I picked the Cardinals, under Roger Bresnahan, to win the National league pennant, but when the finish came I found out, to my cost, that some one else had a better system of looking ahead than I had.

With me it's a hunch more than the dope, and my hunch for the next world's series is the Athletics. I know what they've done before, and I know how they've done it—and that's enough.

When I'm not busy at being a fan—and I'll admit I'm the most rabid bug that ever bit at an umpire—I fool round the theatre. But baseball is where I live, and I've kept pretty close tab on the situation.

I like the Athletics in this fight for a number of reasons. First, because they can everlastingly smear that pill.

Second, because they have a couple of guys out there who can keep the other fellows from smearing it. I mean Bender and Plank.

Third, because they have the fiddlers to back up this pitching and protect it. Fourth, because they're a smart team.

And, fifth, because they can play baseball—and play it up, around and through the middle, all fifteen ways and back again, without a break.

But mainly I like 'em because they can hit. I've watched that batting order come up in a tight game, and I've watched the other pitcher. For three or four innings he might pitch his head off and "get by." But the strain would get him, and around the fifth inning I could see him weaken, his curve ball straighten out and his smoke fade.

When he started to ease up, there would be a sound like a barrel of crockery rolling down a cellar stairway.

That's what the Giants have got to go up against. McGraw has some grand pitching, but a bat is bigger than a ball.

Look at that Mathewson or Marquard must tackle. First, there's Eddie Murphy, a 200 hitter; then Rube Oldring, another; if these two are nailed there are Collins, Baker, McInnis and Strunk still waiting.

If he gets by one, the rest is still harder. What's the good in fanning Collins to get at Baker? Any one of these guys is liable to break up any set of a game in two minutes. You think they're beaten and in a flash you can almost see the battle of Gettysburg again, with 90 cannon in action.

In a short series of this sort I like the ball club that can hit the ball hardest—the one that is most dangerous at bat. For in a series of such importance both clubs are keyed up to the cracking point, and the one that hits the ball oftenest and hardest gives the other guys a greater chance to blow.

If you're not hitting, there's nothing for the other club to fumble or safe. If Mack's team isn't hitting 'em safe it's hitting 'em somewhere, and in the end this of itself will tell.

Then they say Mack has only two pit-

chers. Forget it. I've seen this Bob Shawkey, and if he isn't a pitcher never was a guy with a right arm. It wouldn't surprise me to see Coffey stick this kid in to open the series. Connie is a wise fellow and a hard one to dope.

Shawkey has the stuff and he is game. Think what it would mean if he could step in there and grab off that first game (which has better than a even chance to do), with Bender and Plank in reserve.

Recent Bouts in Australia

FROM T. S. ANDREWS

Milwaukee, Sept. 29—The last batch of Australian mail, to hand, tells of Johnny Summers' defeat of Heck Keyes, an Australian light-weight, who was in the states for several years.

The battle took place in a hotel, New Zealand, and went fifteen rounds, Johnny winning on points.

Up to the twelfth round Keyes, despite his age, put up splendid contest, but his stamina began to fail him in the last three rounds.

These facts were brought to the attention of the select standing committee on agriculture and colonization during the last session of parliament by A. Ruddle, dairy and cold storage commissioner, who showed very clearly that the industry is not losing ground, but is making steady progress.

It was brought out that the Canadian people are consuming relatively more milk and milk products than heretofore, and that an increasing quantity of milk is being manufactured into condensed milk, casein and other products.

During the course of Mr. Ruddle's evidence he gave out a great deal of interesting information concerning the tendency of the industry. This has now been printed in a pamphlet of fourteen pages for free distribution to all who apply for it to the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa.

That the plans of the Grand Trunk P. R. Railway for making St. John their Atlantic terminal still lack any definite shape and are only in a very primitive stage of development, was the substance of the report of Mayor Frink to the common council yesterday on his return from Montreal.

Though no definite information regarding the company's plans for St. John could be expected before E. J. Chamberlin, president of the road, had been over the ground himself, said the mayor, a Commissioner Schofield suggested that, in view of this fact, the council should make some arrangement for a conference with the premier of the province in advance stage than at present. He hinted that Halifax was perhaps more in the eye of the company than St. John as an Atlantic terminal, though he had had no direct intimation of this.

"The main issue," the mayor concluded, "depends on the rapidly with which the Valley Railway construction pushed forward as rapidly as possible. The suggestion was adopted."

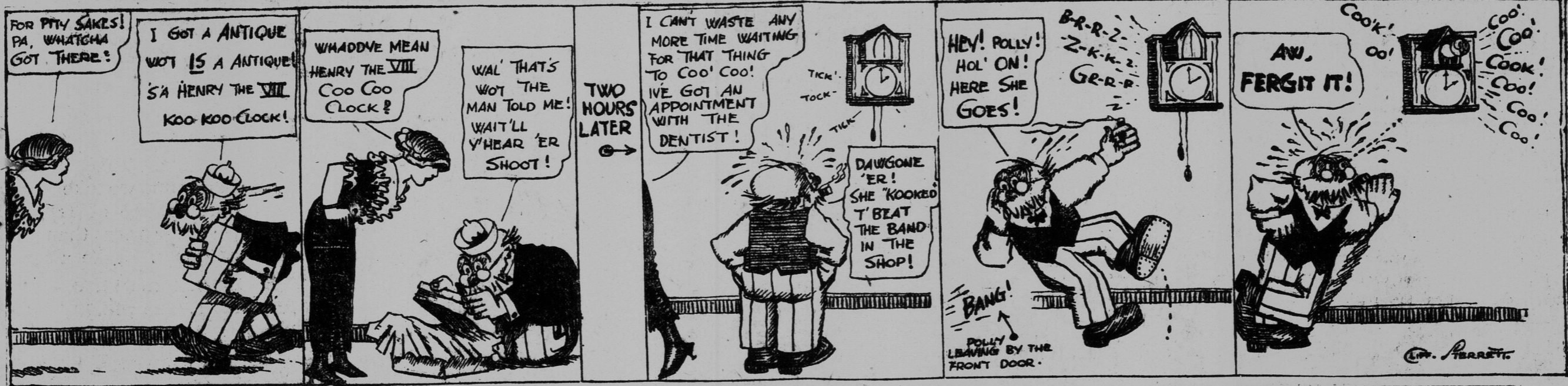
