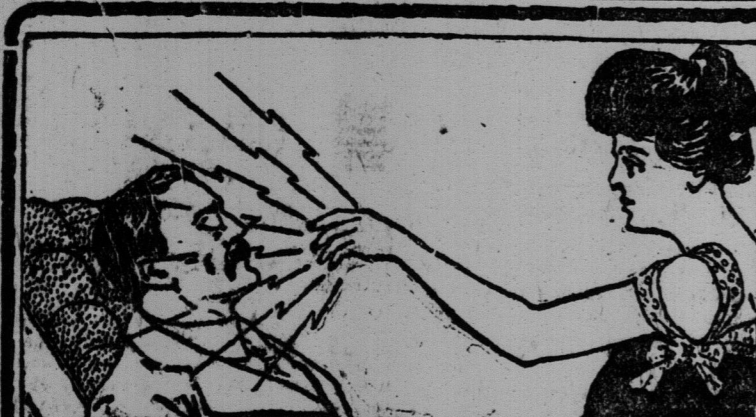

THE DEAR OLD GLOBE

Quite bewildered and mentally disturbed by the new atmosphere of activity and progress which pervades St. John, and which occurs at a time when Hon. Dr. Pugsley is the city's representative at Ottawa, the ancient Globe shows every symptom of distress and alarm.

Then there is the Times-Star, with its daily circulation of two thousand copies. The Globe almost mentioned this paper last night. The name was on the tip of its tongue, but was changed by an effort to the word "satellite." The reference was made in the course of an editorial vagary about one column and a quarter in length, in which Dr. Pugsley, the Telegraph and Times, and other elements of progress were casually mentioned.

The real purpose of the Globe's article, apart from vague trumpeting of alarm, and of dislike for these aggressive agencies of progress, seems to have been a desire to direct public attention to the dredge beaver, owned by Mr. G. S. Mayes. In the polite phraseology of the Standard, the Globe appears to have become a "dredger organ," as well as the evening organ of Mr. Hazen.

One sentence appears to have worked its way into the Globe's article without due consideration for the feelings of the Standard. It relates to the settlement of the Mayes case, and is as follows:—"The action of the minister was very generally approved by the people, for they considered, whether they knew much about the matter or not, that it was a good settlement for the Crown."

It will be remembered that Mr. Mayes sued for over \$82,000 and was glad to settle for less than \$10,000. The Standard was mutually savage and vicious this morning in its attacks upon the minister of public works. Every day that brings new evidence of progress and development at St. John weakens the position of the affidavit makers and makes them more fretful and ill-tempered.

The Standard is the most unscrupulous newspaper published in this province. It was started for the sole purpose of attacking the minister of public works, and bringing about his defeat. The result has been the very opposite of what was expected by the men who were behind the scheme.

TROUBLE MAKERS

Referring to the demonstration in Montreal recently, in which Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the naval policy were attacked, the Montreal Witness declares it was "a demonstration of sentiment and passion, stirring up racial feeling in Canada for political purposes."

MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP

Municipal street railways in England appear to be conducted with great success, in point of earnings, coupled with low passenger rates. The Municipal Transport Association held its annual meeting this year at Bradford, and the general manager of that city's street railway presented some very interesting facts.

Another speaker, Ald. Flint of Leicester, stated that from 1899 to 1909 the number of municipal street railway undertakings in Great Britain had increased from 6 to 82, the track mileage from 53 to 2,422, and the number of passengers carried from 38,422,470 to 1,953,188,236.

Mr. McKelroy, the general manager of the Manchester lines, pointed out that the municipal policy was (1) that the traveling public should receive benefits in the shape of cheaper fares and better transit facilities; (2) that the employees should receive benefits in the shape of better conditions and wages; and (3) that the ratepayers should receive benefits as the owners of the undertaking.

Comparing this with the aims and methods of private companies it will be seen that there is much to be said in favor of municipal ownership.

The Standard quotes from a Hamilton paper a reference to "Bill Pugsley." Does Dog Hazen approve of this kind of courtesy in his personal organ?

The citizens will hope that the investigation of affairs in the market will remove some of the causes of public criticism.

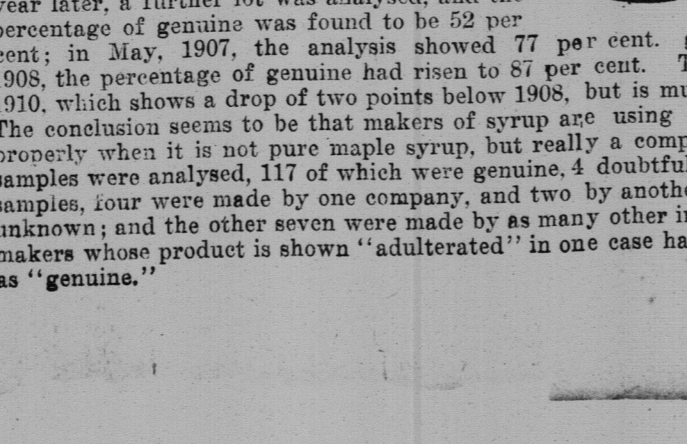

 "I promise Almighty God in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament to abstain from all intoxicating liquors until I am twenty-one years of age. I promise this on my honor as a Catholic and a Christian. Amen."

Such were the words pronounced in a clear and ringing voice by more than 100 boys, ranging in ages from nine to twelve as they raised their right hand as a solemn token of that promise at St. Aloysius Church, Hochelaga, last evening. This was the formation of the Juvenile Total Abstinence Society for the boys of the parish.

After the pastor, Rev. L. Shea, thanked the various total abstinence societies for their attendance and praised their work, Rev. Father Dunstan, O. P. M., of the Franciscan Monastery, preached a telling sermon on the liquor habit. He referred to scenes lately enacted at the Recorder's Court, and the filling of insane asylums with victims of the drink habit. He depicted the disgusting sight of seeing so many drunken men and women in the streets, a disgrace to themselves, a disgrace to the very animals.

"These people say they have rights in society, in the land, in the city," said the preacher. "They have no rights; they cannot govern themselves properly. Just this week past, a body of thieves were committed to jail, the children of

It is our duty to remember the men in their common enterprise, our hearts in one emotion. Around us sleep the brave of either host, their sacred dust till now unremembered. This we seek to do away with. Let this cross stand and endure, an altar to the dead God of Battles, a token of remembrance wet with tears, an offering to the means of the slain, and let it speak to thoughtful minds in days to come, the story of ancient agony long since assuaged, of ancient feuds forever reconciled."
