



For years St. John people have been asking why active business men do not offer their services for public office. In the old aldermanic days leading citizens with much at stake and for the common good of the community sat in the Council at sacrifice of time and without regard for the pittance allowed them by the civic treasury. When Commission Government was introduced, St. John affairs passed into the hands of regularly-salaried men. Ever since these positions have been held largely by the same group. It would seem, therefore, that while Commission Government exists, only those seeking a salaried position are willing to offer and that the public-spirited man of affairs, not in need of a position, must forever hold his peace, unless, of course, he desires to enter the service of his city at personal sacrifice and with a definite desire to promote the interests of his fellow citizens. As managing-director of a large local concern I have no need for seeking a salaried position in the Council, but, filled with the idea that the people of St. John desire some new blood in civic affairs, and that there are other young business citizens who will take similar steps as soon as the ice is broken, I am offering my services to the people as Mayor with the young business citizens who will take similar steps as soon as the ice is broken, I am offering my services to the people as Mayor with the honest promise to serve them faithfully, young heartedly and to the best dictates of my observation and conscience. I am not gifted as a platform speaker as I would like to be, so take this method of chatting with my fellow townsmen on the important subjects in hand. I will, therefore, enumerate below, under a few headings, some of my thoughts on civic matters so vitally important to us all:



OUR WONDERFUL ADVANTAGES

At the very beginning Navigator Champlain was struck with the value of this great natural boon, our harbor. In the old days it was one of the five leading ports in the British Empire. When I was a boy our sturdy civic rulers pressed the claims of this winterport and with our people's tax money built the nucleus to Sand Point. The experiment has been a marvelous success, and we are now established as the real winter Atlantic gateway of Canada, with increasing prominence as a summer-port as well. Our main harbor has been taxed of late winters to accommodate the traffic and the last year or two have demonstrated the value of Courtenay Bay, our second big harbor. As previously stated in these columns by me, it is the bounden duty of the City of St. John to make known the merits of this port far and wide and thus maintain our natural position among the ports of the Atlantic coast, the same as Vancouver is dominant on the Pacific. A passive, defensive attitude will not suffice. We must be aggressive, and that aggressiveness must begin in the Common Council.

HYDRO ELECTRICITY

Water-power electricity is another gift of nature with which St. John has been blessed, same as various other sections of this continent. In the wake of Hydro comes manufacturing stimulus, reduction of household expenses and the enlivening of the community generally. The rural districts are brought to a par with the cities in these matters and the possibilities of cheap power are practically without limit. The citizens of St. John know already what Hydro is meaning to them in dollars and cents—both directly and indirectly—and there is absolutely no argument. As Chairman of the Civic Hydro Commission from its inception and to the present time, I am naturally fully informed in all the details of this grand new reality and challenge any opponent of this public utility to deny its unquestioned advantages. As months have gone by and Hydro will have passed all its experimental and familiarizing stages of production, petty prejudices, mixed with politics, will fade into useful dollars and cents for the people of this city and New Brunswick.

MANUFACTURES

Ask any well-informed business man what conditions are today throughout Canada and New England and he will tell you they are not normally good. This is especially true of the Maritime Provinces. In spite of these temporary conditions the City of St. John is standing the acid test better than any sister city, which is a tribute to the solidity of our business houses, the enterprise of our manufactories and the natural qualities of our port. This is a great argument in favor of St. John as a place for instituting new industries. Why did the big sugar refinery come here? Why the dry dock and shipbuilding plant? Why are all the big banks represented here? Why is St. John to have a new million dollar chain hotel? Why a chain theatre? And so on. Tucked away in the east of Canada this City occupies a pecularly useful position as a shipping centre for manufacturers and should be boosted as such in every section of this continent and overseas—chiefly by the Common Council.

A HOMING CITY

St. John is a homing city. Although the lure of the busy centres of the United States and Canada has been very strong the last 18 months, St. John seems to have "stood the gaff" better than most places down this way. Happily many of these runa-

ways are coming home again, disillusioned. The city is growing outwards in spite of these shuffles of homes. Take, for instance, the development of new streets, avenues, etc. in West St. John, far into the fields of Lancaster. Have you noticed the substantial town that has sprung up in East St. John, soon to be affiliated with the main city? There is the marked development of a residential character round-about the Shamrock Grounds area in North End, and a general betterment of homing conditions on all sides. These enlargements have taken place in the face of a vast amount of permanent residential exodus to the suburbs—business men's homes on the lines of railway. We want a vigorous Council to foster this situation.

Its owners were prepared to take a loss for a spell until the dock's advantages became known. Here is a tremendously valuable asset to our city and if the rank and file of St. John citizens only knew the wide range of possibility existing amongst the shareholders of the dry dock alone, they would feel very comfortable indeed over the future of this enterprise and its labor giving benefits to the community, to say nothing of shipbuilding probabilities and sister industries bound to be instituted nearby. Our Council should support this enterprise enthusiastically.

A TOURIST CENTRE

With the completion of traffic highways of the highest type joining at the boundary in Charlotte County with the excellent state or Government of Maine. St. John City and the Maritimes are assured henceforth of a steady flow of motor tourist traffic from all parts of the United States. Last year's statistics indicate the giant strides this form of income will take from now on. All the world seems to be a-wheel these times and with so many exmaritime-Provincialists living across the border and in Upper Canada, St. John will surely be a central distributing point for this homeward motor traffic dating from the present. This is why the United Hotels' Company of America is betting on St. John by placing on the old Dufferin site their handsome Admiral Beatty hotel of nearly 200 rooms. Let our Common Council get busy on this, too!—make known our central tourist position.

These facts are that Skelton's mark was the first real, international, world record ever made by an American in the breast stroke, and that his performance was due to the development of a discovery made by his coach, William Bachrach, who has been appointed head coach of the American swimming team for the Olympic games.

Coach Bachrach's invention, by which Skelton was able to beat the German record of 2m. 542-5s., is an improvement on the leg stroke commonly called the "frog kick." Bachrach reveals the secret of the new leg action for the first time in his forthcoming book, "The Outline of Swim-

ming."

In a special chapter on breast-stroke swimming Coach Bachrach explains that the Germans have always been invincible in world's record breaking and in the Olympic games before the war in breast-stroke swimming, because it was the national style of swimming and was compulsory in the army. He states that all previous world's records claimed by Americans were for the 60-yard pool. The international swimming federation, however, considers only the records made in 75-foot pools and the Germans and Austrians held all of these.

"Most of the burden of propelling in the breast stroke,' Bachrach says "is upon the legs. The old style of leg action requires tremendous power in these members. The Germans seemed able to develop the power needed. I had never been able to find an American youth endowed with legs strong enough for this stroke."

Bachrach explains that the so-called "frog kick" calls for a three-count action of the legs. His new stroke, done in two counts, diminishes the resistence created in preparation for the driving action, it requires less legpower and delivers much greated efficiency for the energy expended.

"The old style of leg stroke," writes Bachrach, 'brings the legs forward underneath the body, knees bent and feet held together in preparation for the drive. The feet are then separated and thrust to the rear to form a V figure. Then comes the drive in which the feet are slammed together with all the force the swimmer commands.

"Bringing the legs up underneath the body offers so much resistance to the water as almost to stop progress entirely, causing a very broken pace. By the leg action I tave taught Skelton, the legs are not doubled up under the body. The knees bend, not downward, but outward to effect a direct separation of the legs. The legs assume the V figure as the knees straighten and the drive back together again starts instantly.

"In this stroke it is not necessary to drive the feet together until the shins bang against each other. The only real drive comes at the beginning of the closing movement. Then the legs are used as though they were a pair of fish tails, and the driving action is like snapping the lash of a whip."

J. I. Fariey, who attracted considerable attention as a breast stroke swimmer at University of Minnesota, began to break American "world's records" after joining Coach Bachrach's squad. He says his increased speed is due to Bachrach's instruction in the new style of leg action.




