## ADDRESS

Of the Eighteenth Annual Conference of the Canadian Wes. leyan Methodist New Connexion Church, to the Methodisd New Connexion Conference, in England.
Dear Brethren.-Through the mercy of the great head of the Church, we have again been permitted to meet in our Annual Conference. Our proceedings have been characterized by Caution, Firmness, and Order. The Returns from the different Circuits, do not present so fayourable an ac count of our prosperity as we could wish ; the past has beer a year of peculiar trial and difficulty. In the first place, ma ny of our Ministers have met with severe afflictions in their families; in the second place, some have been unable (foo want of health) to travel; and in the third place, we have suffered materially owing to the ungenerous and unprinciplef conduct of men who have no longer a name amongst us ; ne vertheless, from a multiplicity of circumstances, we have strong grounds to believe, that the great work of saving souls is pro gressing, and although our Minutes will shew a decrease i numbers ; our Connexion, notwithstanding, is increasing in po pularity, influence, and strength.
For the generous support you have rendered us both in ma and means, we would present you our heartfelt thanks. W feel honored in being united with a body of men so liberal an scriptural in their principles as the Methodist New Connexion This Union has been productive of the most happy consequem ces in this country,-it is owned by the great head of th Church. By the pouring out of his spirit upon many of on Missions a vast amount of good has been effected, many sou sunk in ignorance and sin,' debased by vice and the slaves a bigoted superstition, have been enlightened, saved from si and blessed with a sanctified nature and a happy life.

Our truly laborious and much esteemed Superintendent, ha been a great benefit to the Connexion in this country-his wo was of the most laborious and difficult character yet, with holy zeal and a Christ-like benevolence, he has gone forwa

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nd travelled over a territory of nearly eight hundred miles in extent, visiting and confirming the Churches.
And though mucn has been done for which we have reason to thank God and take courage, yet much remains to be done ere Canada will be blessed with the knowledge of the truth as it is ${ }^{n}$ Jesus. Upon our North Western territory there are thirty housand Indians who have never yet heard the sound of the fospel. The Government in this Country is opening up vast racts of land in the wilderness, and giving great encouragenent to settlers, hence many new settlements are rising up. nthe midst of the Forest, from whence may be heard the Vlacedonian cry " come over and help us;" but alas! alas ! he labourers now employed are too few to occupy the field, nd in consequence of the extent of several of the Circuits, pany places receive but a small supply of Missionary labours, a number of our Ministers only being able to visit some laces once a month, and others once in two months, and sa natural consequence of the many privations and great rertions of many of our Missionaries, their strength is failgg , their constitutions are being early broken down and some, uring the past year, in consequence of hard labour and many ants, have been brought to the jaws of the grave. But thank, fod, our ranks still remain unbroken by death. One of our dest veterans, in consequence of severe personal and family mictions has been forced, partially, to retire from the Missivary field; but God has thrust out five new labourers into his ineyard, and we look forward with strong faith believing that, the diligent and persevering use of those means which God ${ }^{\text {as }}$ placed at our command, we shall, ere long, see the blood ained banner of Prince Immanuel spreading over the length ad breadth of Canada. Dear Brethren, we solicit an intert in your prayers, that the word of God amongst us may a, have free coursc and be glorified. ## REPORT

Of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Mis, sionary Society Auxiliary to the Methodist New Connexion Missionary Society in England, read at the General Missionary Meeting of the Connexion, held at the Conferenco in the Lake. Chapel, June 12th, 1846.

Nothing on earth is immutable. The state in which ave now dwell is subject to continual change. In the operation of systems it would therefore be irrational to expect equal re sults in equal proportions of time. The process of improve ment is not only uneven but often retrograde, and as in na ture while one part of the landscape is graced with plenty another exhibits the meager aspect of sterility; so in the Mis sionary field, success in one part is usually associated with re verse in the other. Hence when the amount of success ex ceeds the amount of unsuccessful effort, notwithstanding indi vidual exceptions we pronounce the enterprize on the whold successful.

It is on this principle your Committee in presenting th Third Annual Report desires to erect an Ebenezer. Th greater our difficulties, the more extensive the assistance ne cessary, and the greater our debt of gratitude to the Heado the Church. That the Mission in Canada continues to thi day is an historic fact, and that its continuance is attributabl to divine help is undeniable. Through another year God ha helped us, and amidst numerous conflicting powers, we hav found that they who are for us are more than all that can b against us. "If it had not been the Lord who was on ou side when men rose up against us; Then they had swallowe us up quick, when their wrath was kindled against us."

re in a more prosperous state than they were at our last miversary. We should remember that an increase of num. pers, however desirable, is not always a proper test of proserity.
The highest object of our Missionary enterprize is to turn pen from satan to God; and for the accomplishment of this bject, your Committee rejoices to know, that with zeal, dilience and perseverance the seed has been sown. 'The poor, pe destitute and neglected, have heard the word of life : tne inciples of our Discipline have been more fully unfolded and fiorced; and the latent energies and resources of the Conxion more extensively developed. Almost every station is tended beyond the former limits, and while apostacy and inigue have led to the relinquishment of one of our stations, e excellency and scriptural character of our Discipline havè, the hand of providence, been rendered subservient to the pening up of our way into a more encouraging fietd of la. pur, and while treachery and avowed fickleness have charac. rized some who have left us, the trustworthiness, benevo. ace, and stability of others, have been conspiculously attested. The increasing infirmities of some, with whose personal ppiness, the prosperity of our connexion has for years been arly associated, have rendered a partial withdrawment from efield of action necessary, but the Lord of the harvest has rust out several youthful labcurers into the field. With com. iogled feelings of abhorance and regret we mourn over the astate and treacherous: with deepest sympathy we follow retiring veteran; and with Divine sanction we hail the pong Missionary and encourage. the old with the assurance Be thou faithful unto degth, and I will give thee a crown of ".
The removal of one of our Superintendents has been an im. frant item in connexion with the Mission during the last r. By this arrangement, the oversight of an extent of motry amounting to almost eight hundred miles in length, most herculean task, has devolved on our General Superin-
