RESOLUTIONS OF CONFERENCE.

1. That the Ancaster and Nelson Circuit be divided; one to be called the Ancaster Circuit, the other the Nassagaweya Circuit; and that the Preachers change with each other regularly.

2. That the Western Mission embrace all the appointments west of Raleigh and East Tilbury.

3. That the Norwich part of the Waterford Circuit, be joined to Malahide.

4. That no Local Elder can be received as a representative of a Circuit in the Annual Conference, inasmuch as every Local Elder is a Member of the Conference agreeably to the terms of Union.

5. That in future the Statistics of the Members and those under the watchcare of the church be returned in separate columns.

6. That all persons under the watchcare of the Church shall be inserted on the class papers as being on trial.

7. That the Preachers and Lay representatives shall immediately, on returning to their Circuits, use the necessary measures to erect Parsonages.

8. That no Chapel shall be erected in connexion with our body until a deed of the ground has been obtained.

9. That in special cases Parsonages may (with the sanction of the Annual Committee) be erected on land that is not deeded.

10. That the Superintendents of our Circuits shall, as far as possible, attend each others Quarterly Meetings.

11. That the following brethren form the Missionary Committee for the ensuing year, Revds. H. O. Crofts, Chairman, T. T. Howard, Secretary, J. Hughson, Esq. Treasurer, Revds. J. Brennan, E. Vannorman and J. Caswell, with Messrs. T. Lottridge, J. Cummins, J. Crowe, and R. H. Brett, Esqr.

12. That the Superintendent of a Circuit is Chairman of all business Quarterly Meetings *ex-officio*.

13. That this Conference deeply regrets its inability this year to devise any measures for the relief of distressed Chapels, but hopes to be able at some future period, and would earnestly recommend all our Circuits in future to be careful not to involve themselves in debt though building Chapels in

Crofts, Corresponding Member; and for Canada East, Revds. T. T. Howard, L. F. Adams, and F. Hunt, with Messrs. L. F. Leach, and O. Peasley. Revd. T. T. Howard, Corresponding Member.

17. That the Revd. H. O. Crofts, and T. Lottridge, be the Stewards of the Benificent Society for the ensuing year.

18. That the thanks of the Conference be given to the Editor of the Christian Messenger, for his services during the past year, and that he be requested to continue his services the ensuing year.

19. That the price of the Christian Messenger, after the close of the present volume, be 3s. 6d., exclusive of postage.

20. That all our Superintendants be requested to settle all the Accounts with the Subscribers to the Christian Messenger before the expiration of the year, and that they exert themselves to increase the number of Subscribers for the Third Volume, and pay in all the Subscriptions before the next Conference.

21. That the proceeds of the Bazaar be appropriated to the building of Parsonages, under the direction of the Annual Committee.

22. That this Conference deeply regrets that, in consequence of sickness, Brother Jackson is compelled to retire from the active duties of the Ministry, and fervently prays that peace and prosperity may be the portion of his declining days.

23. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to James Hughson, Esqr., for his valuable services as Treasurer

of the Connexion for the past year, and that he be requested to continue his services for the ensuing year.

24. That the next Annual Conference, be held in Mallory-Town, in the Johnston District, on the Second Monday in June, 1847.

ADDRESS.

Of the Eighteenth Annual Conference to the Members of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN.—Travellers with us to the same haven of eternal repose, Grace be unto you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. We have by the kindness of a gracious providence, been permitted to see the close of another Conference year, and have again assembled for the purpose of transacting business relating to the present and future welfare of our Zion, and we are happy to inform you, that the deliberations of the present session have been characterised by a spirit of meekness and christian forbearance and, we hope, that the same spirit will continue to prevail.

The Religious Services of our Conference have generally been well attended; the word preached has been made a blessing, and we earnestly pray that the fruit thereof may be seen after many days. We receive these holy influences with pleasure and delight, and hope the same will extend not only through the Provinces of Canada, but through all the World; then shall the kingdoms of this world become the kingdoms of our God and his Christ. May the great-head of the Church bless our friends in their work of faith and labour of love.

We are happy also to state, that some of our Circuits have been actively engaged in erecting parsonage houses, and we trust that others will catch a spark of the same fire and endeavour to place their Ministers in such circumstances as will enable them to devote their energies, time and talents, to the great work of saving souls.

ADDRESS

Of the Eighteenth Annual Conference of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Church, to the Methodist New Connexion Conference, in England.

DEAR BRETHREN.—Through the mercy of the great head of the Church, we have again been permitted to meet in our Annual Conference. Our proceedings have been characterized by Caution, Firmness, and Order. The Returns from the different Circuits, do not present so favourable an account of our prosperity as we could wish; the past has been a year of peculiar trial and difficulty. In the first place, many of our Ministers have met with severe afflictions in their families; in the second place, some have been unable (for want of health) to travel; and in the third place, we have suffered materially owing to the ungenerous and unprincipled conduct of men who have no longer a name amongst us; nevertheless, from a multiplicity of circumstances, we have strong grounds to believe, that the great work of saving souls is progressing, and although our Minutes will shew a decrease in numbers; our Connexion, notwithstanding, is increasing in popularity, influence, and strength.

For the generous support you have rendered us both in *means* and *means*, we would present you our heartfelt thanks. We feel honored in being united with a body of men so liberal and scriptural in their principles as the Methodist New Connexion. This Union has been productive of the most happy consequences in this country,—it is owned by the great head of the Church. By the pouring out of his spirit upon many of our Missions a vast amount of good has been effected, many souls sunk in ignorance and sin, debased by vice and the slaves of a bigoted superstition, have been enlightened, saved from sin and blessed with a sanctified nature and a happy life.

Our truly laborious and much esteemed Superintendent, has been a great benefit to the Connexion in this country—his work was of the most laborious and difficult character yet, with holy zeal and a Christ-like benevolence, he has gone forward

and travelled over a territory of nearly eight hundred miles in extent, visiting and confirming the Churches.

And though much has been done for which we have reason to thank God and take courage, yet much remains to be done ere Canada will be blessed with the knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus. Upon our North Western territory there are thirty thousand Indians who have never yet heard the sound of the Gospel. The Government in this Country is opening up vast tracts of land in the wilderness, and giving great encouragement to settlers, hence many new settlements are rising up in the midst of the Forest, from whence may be heard the Macedonian cry "come over and help us;" but alas! alas! the labourers now employed are too few to occupy the field, and in consequence of the extent of several of the Circuits, many places receive but a small supply of Missionary labours, a number of our Ministers only being able to visit some places once a month, and others once in two months, and as a natural consequence of the many privations and great exertions of many of our Missionaries, their strength is failing, their constitutions are being early broken down and some, during the past year, in consequence of hard labour and many wants, have been brought to the jaws of the grave. But thank God, our ranks still remain unbroken by death. One of our oldest veterans, in consequence of severe personal and family afflictions has been forced, partially, to retire from the Missionary field; but God has thrust out five new labourers into his vineyard, and we look forward with strong faith believing that, in the diligent and persevering use of those means which God has placed at our command, we shall, ere long, see the blood stained banner of Prince Immanuel spreading over the length and breadth of Canada. Dear Brethren, we solicit an interest in your prayers, that the word of God amongst us may have free course and be glorified. And now brethren, with the warmest attachment, esteem, and affection, we remain your brethren in Jesus Christ. Signed in behalf of the Conference.

REPORT

Of the Canadian Wesleyan Methodist New Connexion Missionary Society Auxiliary to the Methodist New Connexion Missionary Society in England, read at the General Missionary Meeting of the Connexion, held at the Conference in the Lake Chapel, June 12th, 1846.

NOTHING on earth is immutable. The state in which we now dwell is subject to continual change. In the operation of systems it would therefore be irrational to expect equal results in equal proportions of time. The process of improvement is not only uneven but often retrograde, and as in nature while one part of the landscape is graced with plenty another exhibits the meager aspect of sterility; so in the Missionary field, success in one part is usually associated with reverse in the other. Hence when the amount of success exceeds the amount of unsuccessful effort, notwithstanding individual exceptions we pronounce the enterprize on the whole successful.

It is on this principle your Committee in presenting the Third Annual Report desires to erect an Ebenezer. The greater our difficulties, the more extensive the assistance necessary, and the greater our debt of gratitude to the Head of the Church. That the Mission in Canada continues to this day is an historic fact, and that its continuance is attributable to divine help is undeniable. Through another year God has helped us, and amidst numerous conflicting powers, we have found that they who are for us are more than all that can be against us. "If it had not been the Lord who was on our side when men rose up against us; Then they had swallowed us up quick, when their wrath was kindled against us."

On some of our stations a decrease will appear, from the Minutes; yet even in some of these instances the Circuit

The highest object of our Missionary enterprize is to turn men from satan to God; and for the accomplishment of this object, your Committee rejoices to know, that with zeal, diligence and perseverance the seed has been sown. The poor, the destitute and neglected, have heard the word of life: the principles of our Discipline have been more fully unfolded and enforced; and the latent energies and resources of the Connexion more extensively developed. Almost every station is extended beyond the former limits, and while apostacy and intrigue have led to the relinquishment of one of our stations, the excellency and scriptural character of our Discipline have, by the hand of providence, been rendered subservient to the opening up of our way into a more encouraging field of labour, and while treachery and avowed fickleness have characterized some who have left us, the trustworthiness, benevolence, and stability of others, have been conspicuously attested.

The increasing infirmities of some, with whose personal happiness, the prosperity of our connexion has for years been nearly associated, have rendered a partial withdrawal from the field of action necessary, but the Lord of the harvest has thrust out several youthful labourers into the field. With mingled feelings of abhorance and regret we mourn over the apostate and treacherous: with deepest sympathy we follow the retiring veteran; and with Divine sanction we hail the young Missionary and encourage the old with the assurance "Be thou faithful unto death, and I will give thee a crown of life."

The removal of one of our Superintendents has been an important item in connexion with the Mission during the last year. By this arrangement, the oversight of an extent of country amounting to almost eight hundred miles in length, almost herculean task, has devolved on our General Superin-

tendent, But the God of the Missionary, who suppressed the boisterous wave for the safety of the one while being wafted to his native shore, has vouchsafed to the other strength according to his day. Aided from on high, our general Superintendent has visited the various Circuits—preached—held Missionary Meetings, and aided in the organization of the Circuits.

Your Committee is satisfied that this Auxiliary Society is on the advance. The spirit of christian benevolence and christian emulation are becoming stronger. The past assures us that the friends of this Society will abound in the work of the Lord, and with these efforts of infancy as our premises, we think it not too great an exercise of confidence to state that in its maturity, if not in its youth, our Auxiliary Society will at least, equal the success of some kindred societies of longer standing. During the past year £248 1 4 has been raised in Canada.

The Report of the Parent Society has not yet reached this Country, but intelligence has been received that our friends in England are still supporting a Mission in Ireland, a country dear to the hearts of many of our friends in Canada, and which calls loudly for the aid of British Christians to raise them from the degrading and soul-destroying influence of popery which prevails there to an alarming extent. In Australia our English friends, are supporting a mission. At present the Methodist New Connexion, have in that country One Missionary, Two Chapels, Eight Preaching places, and a School for instructing the Children of the Aborigines of the country. This Mission we doubt not will prove a blessing, and hence we earnestly wish it success.

In presenting this Report, your Committee would deem unpardonable ingratitude to omit the recognition of the benevolence of our beloved Brethren in England. Each succeeding year they have extensively shared the joy and expense of our prosperity, their hands are still stretched out and their hearts are still glowing and expanding. Under the pressure of such kindness, if we held our peace the stones of the street might

immediately cry out, and when the half has not been told, the eloquence of silence can best declare the remainder.

Let the fact that our Brethren in Britain are both able and willing to render us assistance, rather stimulate us to put our shoulder to the wheel, than induce us to cry to Hercules alone.

Your Committee, before retiring, performs a pleasurable duty in presenting their thanks to those Ministers, and —colleagues, and Friends, whose influence and energies, and means, and prayers have, during the past, been enlisted in carrying out the objects of this Auxilary Society. Much has been done and they shall in no case lose their reward.

In conclusion, your Committee while thankful to God and the people for past liberality, would remind the Subscribers and Friends of the Infant Auxilary that, after all that has been done, we are not yet able to attend to every call that entreats assistance. Notwithstanding the increase of our labourers, and the increase of our funds, neither are sufficient to enable us fully to supply the spiritual destitution of those who in plaintive accents exclaim "come over and help us." Let our honour as a connexion, let a desire to co-operate with our transatlantic Brethren, let the symyathetic tones of Christian Benevolence, arouse every latent energy of our minds to proceed in this laudable enterprize.
