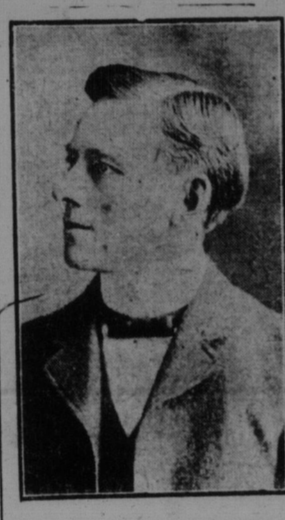

BIRD MAN RACES THROUGH AIR AT SPEED OF AN EXPRESS TRAIN--IN TOLEDO YESTERDAY.

He Has Covered 520 Miles of Aerial Voyage From St. Louis to New York Ahead of Schedule--Father of Aviator Makes Protest Against Meet.

Toledo, Ohio, August 16.—Exactly 520 miles from his starting point, Harry X. Atwood, the Boston aviator, who is attempting to break the world's long distance airplane record by flying from St. Louis to New York, alighted in Toledo this afternoon after completing the third day of his trip with a spectacular flight 2000 feet above the city.

Between some of the stations Atwood beat the schedule time for ordinary trains. In the last lap of the day's run, he whipped up such a speed as hardly to be visible for long, for that a minute or so over the 33 miles from Pettisville to Toledo was run in 50 minutes, including a delay for starting and landing.

Instead of alighting in Toledo, he shot clear over the city and landed near the mouth of the Maumee river in the eastern section.

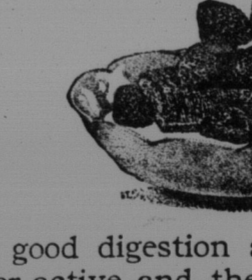

CLOSING STOCK LETTER. By direct private wires to J. C. Mackintosh and Co. New York, Aug. 16.—Today's stock market was subjected to weakness pronounced as had been witnessed during the current downward movement, and in many instances for the year and the first at no time showed any rallying power. The first disturbance was occasioned by the weakness of C.P.R. in London in connection with the failure of three foreign houses. While these failures were said to be unimportant there was circulated rumors of distress in more important quarters. Talk of a large failure in Berlin was confirmed during the day. C.P.R. opened down four points in this market and lost two more. The overshadowing factors of weakness however, were the persistent and mysterious pressures for sale of Canadian Pacific stock. No further light was thrown upon the cause of the prolonged decline in this issue although it was taken as a matter of course that important liquidation was in progress. There were rumors that the largest interests in the property were a heavy seller and that grave discussion had arisen in the directorate over the question of the financial policy of the company. None of the Canadian Pacific shares at this writing prices have fallen somewhat from the low points but the recovery was not convincing and there was evidence of support from the so-called big interests. General news was rather cheerful, especially that relating to the steel industry and the Canadian Pacific in the corn belt. The general list has now reached a level which will attract new buying for speculation and investment but it is uncertain whether liquidation has run its course. LAIDLAW & CO.

CLOSING COTTON LETTER. By direct private wires to J. C. Mackintosh & Co. New York, Aug. 16.—Today's cotton market was highly nervous and extremely irregular of movement reflecting the conflicting tenor of weather reports. These blew hot and cold throughout the session, the main attraction in the afternoon being that some sections of the belt in need of rain and lower temperatures had been partially relieved with the possibility of further relief over night. Bullish reports, however, were numerous and emphatic enough to stimulate considerable scattered buying on the declines and to keep the general short interest on the anxious seat. The impression prevailed that in the event of further adverse weather developments this interest which is admitted by large would run to cover. Many firms and individuals therefore, who entertain bearish views as to the ultimate course of prices are inclined to buy cotton on smart reactions in anticipation of possible late crop damage and a consequent flight of the shorts.
