THREE CHILDREN INJURED IN FIRE IN HULL SCHOOL

Little Ones Were Compelled to Jump
From the Windows

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—The number of
people in the Hull school burned today
was 150 and the loss is \$10,000. That
there were not a number of fatalities
is regarded as miraculous as the en-
tire hundred and fifty pupils were cut
off from the exit and the single fire
escape proved entirely inadequate.
The snow was piled to some depth ar-
ound the building and the children
began jumping from all of the win-
dows.

The injuries sustained were chiefly
from one little girl jumping upon an
other who had preceded her to the
ground. While many were hurt there
were only three seriously injured. One
had both arms fractured, another's
back was hurt and the third had a
leg broken. When it was supposed
that all were out a young man put a
ladder to a window and made a thor-
ough search, finding a little seven
year old girl who had become fright-
ened hidden in a closet. Fifteen min-
utes after she was taken out the room
was a mass of flames.

TERRIFIC SEAS SWEEP SALACIA

Donaldson Liner Arrived Saturday
After Battle With the Waves

ST. JOHN Jan. 10.—The Donaldson
line steamship Salacia in command of
Captain McKelvie arrived in port Sat-
urday afternoon from Glasgow with
three passengers and a general cargo.
The steamer had a rough passage
all the way from Glasgow. On the
21st of December a northwest gale
with heavy sea was encountered. At
6 o'clock that evening the ship was
laid to for six hours. During that
time she shipped a sea which carried
away part of her shelter deck forward
breaking the ship's bell and the reels
on which the steel hawser is coiled,
also flooding the main deck forward.
The gale was so heavy that it blew
the Salacia about fifty miles out of
her course.

The steamer lag on board six Clyde

until he swung under the car when
the lurching of the car loosened his
hold and he fell under the wheels.
The car was going slowly and he was
able to throw his body clear of the
wheels which passed over his foot,
breaking the bones. His leg was also
torn in several places. The unfor-
tunate young lad is under the care
of Dr. Gilvan of Harcourt and is do-
ing nicely.

ITALIAN VILLAGE MOVING AWAY ON LANDSLIDE

PARMA, Italy, Jan. 9.—On the hills

It is two miles in length, half a mile
in width and its depth is estimated at
75 feet. On the top of the slide is
the village of Scopello, recently occu-
pied by a thousand people. It is down
ed to destruction and the inhabitants
have evacuated the village, trans-
ferring their valuables and the fur-
niture and altars of their church to
safer ground.

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FISHER FOLK IN HIGH GLEE

Last of Missing Boats Has Drifted
In

CANNO, Jan. 7.—The last of the
missing Dover fishermen reached the
land this morning when the boat Ha-
zel Maud drifted into her home port
through fog and rain. Her crew
exhausted and frozen and the boat
a wreck. Anxious eyes that had
watched from the beach the day
daybreak caught sight of

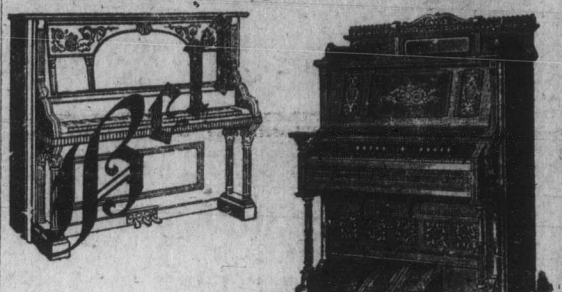

ELECTRIC ENGINE PULLS FOUR STEAMERS

In a tug of war between 1898' and 1899' the new electric engine to be used by the Pennsylvania road in the tunnel under the Hudson river at New York and a giant freight engine, the latter would be dragged along like a tin can on a dog's tail.

Each on another giant steam engine and 1898' would walk off with them both at the rate of 60 miles an hour. Faster on a third steam engine of the heaviest type. The huge electric engine would outpull the trio. It weighs 33000 pounds. It can pull a loaded freight train, two miles long, at the rate of 70 miles an hour. It can snap an ordinary train of 40 cars into the air like a whip lash.

Its driving wheels are five feet eight inches high and it has eight of them. The engine is made up of two sections and may be run in either direction.

Twenty four of these engines which were devised by the Pennsylvania road and the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Co. will haul 1000 trains daily under the river into the heart of New York City.

The operating lever is so small that the engineer with his forefinger can turn on the power of 100 trolley cars. In a collision the engine will withstand an impact equal to 600,000 lbs.
