TOWN COUNCIL MET ON TUESDAY

Complete Board of Town Offi-
cials Appointed—Other Im-
portant Matters.

The first regular meeting of the
new town council was held last even-
ing in the Fireman's Hall, His Wor-
ship Mayor McKay in the Chair, with
Councillors Belle-Ile, Gilker, St.
Onge, Matthews and Moors present.

The minutes of the previous meet-
ing were read and confirmed.

A communication from Earnest
Giddens claiming \$35.00 damages by
reason of his boat being damaged by
recently flooded water was refer-
red to the Water and Sewerage
Committee.

Applications were received from
Claude Farrer, R. H. Roy and Joseph
Lecasse, for positions as time keepers,
etc., when struck and sidewalk work
was being carried on next summer.
Placed on file for future reference.

An application from James Parker
for the position of engineer on the
steam roller and grader was ordered
placed on file for future reference.

Applications for the position of
policemen were received from Albert
Albert and Robt. Burns. Laid on
table to be taken up when the appoint-
ment of town officials was being
made.

Applications were received for
reduction in the assessment from
Havlock Sanson, James Sargent and
Geo. Hashey. Referred to Assess-
ment and Appeals Committee.

Applications for the appointment of
assessors were received from John L.
LeBlanc, August Belanger, Benj.
Stevens and D. W. Kean. Laid on
table until appointments were being
made.

Thos. Asprey applied for the posi-
tion of road commissioner and David
Gay for meat and milk inspector.

Laid on table to be taken up when
the appointments were being made.

The Town Clerk presented a letter
from Mrs. Wm. Sayde complaining that
Policeman Andrew Smith had at-
tempted to unlawfully seize a pair
of scales on her property, and refused
to leave when ordered to do so, and
in other ways had annoyed her. Re-
ferred to Police and License Com-
mittee.

The usual departmental accounts
were then gone into and ordered paid.
Councillor Gilker from the Police
and License Committee reported re-
commending that a reduction of \$1,000
in salary and \$2,000 in personal prop-
erty be made in the assessment of Mr.
Dube, and that a refund covering
such reduction be made Mr. Dube.
Report received and adopted.

Councillor Belle-Ile from the Elec-
tric Light Committee submitted his
monthly report of that department for
the month of January, showing the
total cost of operation at the plant to
be \$2,096. Report received and order-
ed placed on file.

The letter of Mr. C. O. Foss relative
to the town taking electric current
from the Hydro Electric Commission
was referred to the Electric Light
Committee.

Campbellton Wins Last League Game

Last Night's Game gives League to Camp-
bellton with One Goal to Spare

The sensational clash between Camp-
bellton and Chatham on the latter
last night resulted—if the princi-
ples of sportsmanship are to be ad-
hered to—in Campbellton winning the
Northern Section of the N. B.
and P. E. I. league by a victory of
3 to 1.

The excitement of all those interest-
ed in the game was aroused yesterday
afternoon when word was received
that Wikie the referee appointed to
handle the contest had missed his
train in Halifax. Manager Alexander
of the Campbellton team immediately
got into communication with A. Ster-
ling, president of the league but this
nearly gave birth to a "double re-
feree" controversy—a disgusting re-
jection of that infamous wrangle
which was a prelude to the deciding
game between Campbellton and Cha-
tham last year. Campbellton refused
to play and the game was called off.

Finally, about 6.45, a telegram was
received from Sterling appointing
Kirk Murray and Thos. Gilbert official
referees of the game. Campbellton
finally agreed to play under protest.

At 8.45 the unorthodox clamoring of
the 1800 fans present temporarily
substituted into tense expectancy when
the teams appeared and the belated
game was begun. The first period
which was anything but slow ended
with the score 1 to 1.

In the second period Laviolette
scored a second goal for Campbellton
on a pass from Sharpe. In this per-
iod Chatham shot a goal from inside
the circle—which, according to hockey
regulations could not count as score.
Despite this fact the referees per-
sisted in calling it a goal. But if
hockey rules are to be used in govern-
ing a game of hockey, this shot was
obviously illegal and the score was
rightfully 2-1 in Campbellton's favor
at the close of this period.

The third period was one of the most
sensational episodes in provincial ath-

letic history. The speed of the Camp-
bellton players was incalculable and
the Chatham team played like madmen.
Again and again the visiting players
were slammed up against the boards by
their opponents with bone-breaking
brutality and when penalties were in-
flicted Campbellton invariably "got it
in the neck and the real odds on the
Chatham team went unpalatable.

Lavoie played a stellar game in
goal, defending the Campbellton net
with superhuman alertness and skill,
beating back the vicious onslaughts
of his fedish opponents and standing
the strain in an admirable manner. In
this period Matthews made a sweep-
ing end to end rush and scored. The
goal-judge announced a goal. Then,
fully a minute after Murray
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sensational episodes in provincial ath-

key. An excited crowd of specta-
tors climbed over the railing eager
to engage in the combat. This in-
cluded a bunch of Chatham "hood-
lums" who do little else but fight.
According to the referees, who had
apparently abandoned all reason through
fear of the frenzied Chatham
supporters—the score of 2-2 so far
minutes of overtime was allotted.

Chatham's goal, which was
allotted ten had
elapsed. Matthews and Sharpe were
ordered to the box for the offence of
Chatham player and the Campbellton
boys thoroughly and justly disgusted
with the injustice of the referees,
skated off the ice. In the eyes of
Chatham the score stood 3-2 in their
favor but if hockey rules and ordinary
fair play still obtain in this province,
the result was a distinct victory for
Campbellton of 3-1.

Space does not permit printing the
method employed by their opponents.
Campbellton can take a fair licking.
She has done it before. But to submit
uncomplainingly to such treatment
as they received last night is not de-
manded by the principles of clean
sportsmanship.

Hockey at its truest is not child
play. It is essentially a rough game,
but when it comes down to raw un-
adulterated DIRT, the Campbellton
boys will not swallow it.

The line-up was the same as in the
previous Campbellton and Chatham
game.

San Francisco, Feb. 6.—The court today set March 13 as the date of stating the third trial of Roscoe C. (Fatty) Arbuckle, motion picture star on a charge of manslaughter, in connection with the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, motion picture actress.

Both previous trials ended in disagreement.

FEWER ARRESTS AT THE NORTH SHORE

Fredericton, Feb. 6.—Chief Inspector Hawthorne, who returned Saturday from a trip to the North Shore, said that at Campbellton, Newcastle and other places he found no complaints to justify statements made alleging non-enforcement of the prohibition act.

At Newcastle there had been but seven arrests for drunkenness since last August while at Newcastle reports for December showed much less liquor imported than in the same month of the previous year, when he said, his predecessor was in office.

QUEBEC MEMBER IS UNDER ARREST

Montreal, Feb. 5.—Armand Boissieu, notary and M. P. P. for St. Hyacinthe, was arrested Saturday night, on a charge of embezzling a sum of \$8,000 in connection with work undertaken as secretary-treasurer of the municipality of St. Hyacinthe Le Confession. He was taken before Magistrate Emile Marin and remanded until Feb. 18, on \$25,000 bail.

Following the arrest a long line of claimants filed into his office and were paid out. It is said that as much as \$20,000 was so paid.

COAL SCHOONER FOR ST. JOHN ASHORE

Quogue, N. Y., Feb. 6.—The four masted schooner Beale A. White, which sailed from Newport News, Va., January 15 for St. John, N. B., laden with coal, went ashore one mile west of Smith's point in a dense fog early today. The crew came ashore in small boats. One of the boats was overturned and James Rynburg, a seaman, was injured.

The schooner was resting on the outer bar this forenoon with three feet of water in her hold. A southerly wind was blowing but it was believed here she was in no immediate danger.

MARITIME RELIGIOUS EDUCATION COUNCIL

At a recent meeting of the Executive of the Maritime Religious Education Council which is the Maritime Sunday School Association reorganized, an ambitious program was planned for the coming year. Under the auspices of the Council and in accordance with its plan of denominational co-operation the Denominational Secretaries, Frank M. Milligan, Presbyterian, H. E. B. Broadhead, Methodist and Waldo C. Machum, Baptist, will unite their efforts with the Secretaries of the Council, A. M. Gregg, Boys' Work, Miss Mary R. Allison, Girls' Work and Miss Alice M. Harrison, Children's Division, to hold some 225 district conventions during the year, covering the entire Maritime territory.

During the past year the Council has taken over from the Y.M.C.A. the responsibility for the promotion of organized Boys' Work and the Canadian Standard Efficiency Training Program in the Churches and Sunday Schools and now provides the Boys' Work Secretary, Mr. A. M. Gregg. In a similar way the promotion of the Canadian Girls in Training Program has been taken over from the Y. M. C. A. and Miss May R. Allison, the Girls' Work Secretary added to the staff.

For some time there has been a demand for an Elementary Secretary to give special help to workers with children. This has been met by the appointment of Miss Alice M. Harrison who is doing most efficient work.

The officers of the General Board of the Council for the year are: Chairman, L. W. Simms, St. John, N. B.; Vice-Chairman, Geo. D. Wallace, Halifax, N. S.; Secretary, Rev. F. M. Milligan, Halifax, N. S.; Treasurer, Robert Reid, St. John, N. B.

Headquarters have recently been removed from Moncton and are now located at 4 Prince William St., St. John with Miss Kate R. Abrams as the efficient Office Secretary.





BROADWAY BELLE DROPS FROM SIGHT

Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw, Evicted From Tea Room, Vanishes.

New York, Feb. 2.—Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw has vanished as suddenly as she rose to notoriety through the slaying of Stanford White by her one-time husband, Harry K. Thaw.
A month ago she was evicted from her tea room and apartment at 235 West 42nd street, her landlords, had her few shabby effects placed on the sidewalk by a city marshal.
The eviction was but one of a series of tragedies that have entered the life of the former belle of Broadway in the last few months. Some time before she had taken a huge overdose of morphine in an effort to die.
The suicidal attempt came when she was waiting to dispose of her life. The resultant publicity caused her landlords to allow her to stay in her tea room and apartment a little longer.
But a month ago the blow fell. She was evicted. Without funds, and evidently without friends, the woman found herself alone on the sidewalk beside her meagre belongings—a trunk and a small handbag. Next she found a little furnished bed room at Broadway and 52nd street. A week ago, she dropped from sight.
Since then no one has been found who has seen her. Those who know Evelyn are expressing the fear that she may have sought death again and found it.

DISAGREEMENT IN ARBUCKLE'S TRIAL 10 FOR CONVICTION

San Francisco, Feb. 3.—The jury in the second trial of a manslaughter charge against Roscoe C. Arbuckle decided at the conclusion of a forty-four hour session that it covers its agreement and discharged today with the final ballot standing ten for conviction and two for acquittal. Arbuckle was accused of having caused the death of Miss Virginia Rappé of Los Angeles, a motion picture actress, who was taken ill at a drinking party in Arbuckle's suite here at the Hotel St. Francis on Labor Day, 1921, and died a few days later as the result of an internal injury.
The case was placed on the calendar for next Monday to be set for its third trial. Both prosecution and defence announced that they would favor such trial. So sure was the defence of its position in the second trial that it submitted its case without final argument.
This had an effect opposite from the one intended, according to Nat Friedman, one of the jurors, in a formal statement.
"We thought that when the defence declined to argue it had thrown up its hands," he said. "The first ten ballots stood nine to three for conviction, and thereafter until the fourth and final ballot it was ten to two."
Arbuckle appeared to be somewhat downcast by the disagreement. Members of his family were so visibly perturbed that it was some moments before they greeted him or his attorneys after the result was known.
"In spite of my own personal conviction, it was my intention to be guided by the opinion of a majority of the jury," District Attorney Eddy said. "Had the majority opinion been in favor of an acquittal I would have asked for a dismissal. As the jury stood ten for conviction to two for acquittal, it is manifestly my duty to try the case again."

DRIVE PLANNED WIMMIPPE, FEB. 8.—The Canadian famine relief committee for the drought stricken in Soviet Russia has forwarded to Premier Mackenzie King an offer to build a dam on the King's River in co-operation with the Dominion government. Fifty thousand dollars in money, grain and clothing is the result of six months' operation by the committee in the West.

Entire Staff of OFFICERS KILLED



TO THOSE "NOT PRESENT."
 (Held over from last week.)
 The men of the town who are interested in the religious and educational training of teen-age boys were given an opportunity, through a mass meeting on Sunday afternoon, of hearing Mr. Taylor Statton of Toronto, who is a leader in boys work. Mr. Statton is not a universal celebrity but is eminently successful in this kind of social and moral welfare work among boys, which he has chosen as a life work.

Had this been a mass meeting for women, doubtless a good representation of Campbellton's lady-folk would have appeared. As far as Campbellton is concerned the women workers practically built the Memorial Hospital and it seems that the men are waiting for them to present our town with a Y. M. C. A., a public library and probably a club for the men. At any rate, it would appear, judging from the Sunday mass meeting, that the men of Campbellton are not worrying a great deal over the matter of combined educational and religious training for their sons.

Oh yes, we know the place of meeting was changed from the Presbyterian Church, as previously announced to the Methodist Church. But you didn't go to either places. Of course not. You didn't feel well. You had your feet propped up on the kitchen sink, smoking a mild Havana and reading a love story. Or maybe you had a nap. You refused to shake off that strange Sabbath day lethargy to which man has been addicted ever since going to church on a Sunday was first invented. You slumbered peacefully while a few of your fellow townsmen gathered together at the

hope of gaining some available knowledge which could be handed on to your boy to help him in his struggle to become a really worth-while man and an honorable and useful citizen. You are an ungrateful wretch, aren't you? Yes, indeed you certainly are. Now, this vituperation is not being dished out indiscriminately to all hands. It is for those who deserve it. Do just classify yourself as your own conscience directs.

In defence of your miserable slothfulness in the matter you may throw out the following questions as a grenade to halt further just criticism of your shameful attitude. "Why all this talk about training for teen-age boys and endless discussion of high ideals and principles? We didn't know anything about this kind of training when we were young. Why should our sons need it?"

Of course you didn't know anything about this kind of religious and educational training when you were young. You don't need to tell us your "wisdom" and the criticism which you so readily advance make it an obvious fact. The reason you ask such a senseless question is because your tongue is continuously making a hubbub that neither your ears nor your brain have much of a show.

The above question and many others which might be put have been repeatedly discussed and explained at meetings held in the interests of this branch of educational work and all of us who are not in an altogether dormant state are well acquainted with details. The objective of this movement is a worthy one and, though a lofty one, is not beyond realization. What is needed is active support by those who believe in the principles advanced by the movement and most of our town's male citizens do. There are men in this community much better qualified, both morally and intellectually, than the writer for leadership in this work. He has written this to enlist interest and support—not because he is any example. He is no angel, as anyone will tell you if he were he would not have written. Angels don't write—they sing.—Cor.

SAYS THAT JAZZ

CORRUPTS YOUTH

Taunton, Mass., Feb. 1.—Jazz was denounced as an evil by Mrs. Russell T. Hatch, of Melrose, head of the nurses' department of the State Federation of Woman's Clubs, at a meeting of the music department of the Taunton Woman's Clubs which was held at the clubhouse this afternoon. Her topic was "The Popular Song of To-day and Its Effect Upon the Community."

"Unless the trend of popular music in the country to-day is checked, in a few years there will be but few clean-minded children in our high schools." This was one of the statements made by the speaker, in quoting an authority on music. The girls of to-day she claimed, like jazz music because it is the prevailing fashion and they want to be in style and up to date. She said that the difference between jazz music and clean, popular music was the difference between decency and indecency.

Jazz music, she asserted, was not confined to the dime music halls but could also be heard at the exclusive country clubs. In referring to many of the songs of to-day, she said, it gave the young people a wrong impression of life and that by allowing these songs, it tended to lower moral standards.

She spoke of a new jazz song which was about to be placed on sale in the Boston music stores, the title of which she claimed, was not clean, and this song, she said, would be placed on sale unless the women's clubs stopped it. She suggested that these songs be stopped by popular opinion rather than by legislation.
