## TOWN COUNCIL MET ON TUESDAY

Complete Board of Town Officials Appointed—Other Important Matters.

The first regular meeting of the new town council was held last evening in the Firemen's Hall. His Worship Mayor McKay in the Chair, with Councillors Belle Isle, Gilker, St. Onge, Matthews and Moore present. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication from Earnest Giddens claiming \$35.00 damages by reason of his boat having been recently flooded with water was referred to the Water and Sewerage Committee.

Applications were received from Claude Parry, R. H. Roy and Joseph Levesque, for positions as time keepers, when struck and sidewalk work was being carried on next summer. Placed on file for future reference.

An application from James Parker for the position of engineer on the steam roller and crusher was ordered placed on file for future reference. Applications for the position of policemen were received from Albert Albert and Robt. Burns. Laid on table to be taken up when the appointment of town officials were being made.

Applications were received for reduction in their assessment from Havlock Sanson, James Sargent and Geo. Hashey. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

Applications for the appointment of assessors were received from John L. LeBlanc, August Belanger, Benj. Steeves and D. A. Kean. Laid on table until appointments were being made.

Thos. Asprey applied for the position of road commissioner and David Gay for meat and milk inspector. Laid on table to be taken up when the appointments were being made. The Town Clerk issued a letter from Mrs. Wm. Boyle complaining that Policeman Andrew Smith had attempted to unlawfully seize a pair of scales on her property, and refused to leave when ordered to do so, and in other ways had annoyed her. Referred to Police and License Committee.

The usual departmental accounts were then gone into and ordered paid. Councillor Gilker from the Police and License Committee reported recommending that a reduction of \$1,000 in salary and \$2,000 in personal property be made in the assessment of Mr. Dale, and that a refund covering reduction be made Mr. Dube. Report received and adopted.

Councillor Belle Isle from the Electric Light Committee submitted his monthly report of that department for the month of January, showing the total cost of operation at the plant to be \$2,096. Report received and ordered placed on file.

The letter of Mr. C. O. Foss relative to the town taking electric current from the Hydro Electric Commission was referred to the Electric Light Committee.

## Campbellton Wins Last League Game

Last Night's Game gives League to Campbellton with One Goal to Spare

The sensational clash between Campbellton and Chatham on the latter's last night resulted—if the principles of sportsmanship are to be adhered to—in Campbellton winning the Northern Section of the N. B. and P. E. I. league by a victory of 3 to 1.

The excitement of all those interested in the game was aroused yesterday afternoon when word was received that Willie the referee appointed to handle the contest had missed his train in Halifax. Manager Alexander of the Campbellton team immediately intimated to communication with A. Sterling, president of the league but this merely gave birth to a "double referee" controversy—a disgusting rejection of that infamous wrangle which was a prelude to the deciding game between Campbellton and Chatham last year. Campbellton refused to play and the game was called off.

Finally, about 6.45, a telegram was received from Sterling appointing Kirk Murray and Thos. Gilbert official referees of the game. Campbellton finally agreed to play under protest.

At 8.45 the uproarious clanging of the 1800 fans present temporarily subsided into tense expectancy when the teams appeared and the belated game was begun. The first period which was anything but slow ended with the score 1 to 1.

In the second period Laviolette scored a second goal for Campbellton on a pass from Sharpe. In this period Chatham shot a goal from inside the circle—which, according to hockey regulations could not count as score. Despite this fact the referees persisted in calling it a goal. But if hockey rules are to be used in governing a game of hockey, this shot was obviously illegal and the score was rightfully 2-1 in Campbellton's favor at the close of this period.

The third period was one of the most sensational episodes in provincial athletic history. The speed of the Campbellton players was incalculable and the Chatham team played like madmen. Again and again the visiting players were slammed up against the boards by their opponents with bone-breaking brutality and when penalties were inflicted Campbellton invariably "got it in the neck and the real offense on the Chatham team went unparalled.

Lavoie played a stellar game in goal, defending the Campbellton net with superhuman alertness and skill, beating back the vicious onslaughts of his fabled opponents and standing the strain in an admirable manner. In this period Matthews made a sweeping end to end rush and scored. The goal-judge announced a goal. Then, fully a minute after Murray offered a ridiculous, inconsistent objection and ruled off the score. The Chatham players now apparently lost all reason and Keaghan and Duncan abandoned their sticks and reverted to fists instead. While Keaghan held Thomas Duncan began using his face for a punching bag and when some of the Campbellton boys objected, Murray sent Thomas to the box. This is surely a new way of playing hockey.

An excited crowd of spectators climbed over the railing, eager to engage in the combat. This included a bunch of Chatham "hoodlums" who do little else but fight. According to the referees, who had apparently abandoned all reason through fear of the frenzied Chatham supporters—the score 2-2 so far minutes of overtime as allotted.

Chatham's last goal, when the referee allotted ten minutes of overtime, was scored by Matthews and Sharpe were ordered to the box for the offence of a Chatham player and the Campbellton boys thoroughly and justly disgusted with the injustice of the referees, skated off the ice. In the eyes of Chatham the score stood 3-2 in their favor but if hockey rules and ordinary fair play still obtain in this province, the result was a distinct victory for Campbellton of 3-1.

Space does not permit printing the appropriate which Chatham so richly deserves. If the Campbellton team and rooters who attended the game are sore it is because of the infamous methods employed by their opponents. Campbellton can take a fair licking. She has done it before. But to submit uncomplainingly to such treatment as they received last night is not demanded by the principles of clean sportsmanship.

Hockey at its tamest is not child's play. It is essentially a rough game, but when it comes down to raw undisciplined DIRT, the Campbellton boys will not swallow it.

The line-up was the same as in the previous Campbellton and Chatham game.

**ENTIRE STAFF OF OFFICERS KILLED**  
London, Feb. 8.—A mob of two thousand Indian Nationalist volunteers and villagers attacked the police officers at Chauri-Chaura on Feb. 4 and killed the entire staff of officers, the whole mob was then set free, says a telegram received by the India Office today from the British Commissioner at Gwalior, in the northwest section of the United Provinces.

The police officers were hanged and the bodies of those killed were stripped and burned, says the telegram. Two of the volunteers were killed and several wounded.

## HOW PIANO CARRIED HIM

Paid Expenses of Trip from New Mexico to Washington.

Riding on a piano from New Mexico to Washington is quite a stunt.

A young doctor accomplished the feat, however. Of course, he did not actually ride on the top of the piano. But he made the instrument pay his way.

He is an ex-serviceman, who was doing work in a hospital in New Mexico, at the same time he was there for his own health. Feeling that he deserved a doctor's job, he decided to come to the National Capital to see about the matter.

Being a good piano player and having no ready funds, the doctor hit up on a novel scheme to work his way to the continent. He would ring a front door bell and when it was answered, ask: "Would you like a little music?"

Explanation being forthcoming, he would tell the people that he was a good pianist, and that he was travelling to Washington, and that if they had a piano he would go in and play for them.

Many people invited him to play on their pianos. Once seated, he would ask them what sort of music they preferred. He could play almost anything, it seemed, and after finding out what his audience preferred would begin to ask them to name individual selections.

In return for the music he would receive whatever the family thought an adequate return. In most cases it was a dollar or more. From one town alone he took \$21. He would go as far as his money would carry him then he would put on another course of home concerts.

## DISAGREEMENT IN ARBUCKLE'S TRIAL 10 FOR CONVICTION

San Francisco, Feb. 3.—The jury in the second trial of a manslaughter charge against Roscoe C. Arbuckle decided at the conclusion of a forty-four hour session that it could not agree and was discharged today with the final ballot standing ten for conviction and two for acquittal.

Arbuckle was accused of having caused the death of Miss Virginia Rappaport of Los Angeles, a motion picture actress, who was taken ill at a drinking party in Arbuckle's suite here at the Hotel St. Francis on Labor Day, 1921, and died a few days later as the result of an internal injury.

The case was placed on the calendar for next Monday to be set for its third trial. Both prosecution and defence announced that they would favor such trial. So sure was the defence of its position in the second trial that it submitted its case without final argument.

This had an effect opposite from the one intended, according to Nat Friedman, one of the jurors, in a formal statement.

"We thought that when the defence declined to argue it had thrown up its hands," he said. "The first ten ballot stood nine to three for conviction, and thereafter until the fourth and final ballot it was ten to two."

Arbuckle appeared to be somewhat downcast by the disagreement. Members of his family were so visibly perturbed that it was some moments before they greeted him or his attorneys after the result was known.

"In spite of my own personal conviction, it was my intention to be guided by the opinion of a majority of the jury," District Attorney Brady said.

Had the majority in the first trial been in favor of an acquittal I would have asked for a dismissal. As the jury stood ten for conviction to two for acquittal, it is manifestly my duty to try the case again."

Fifty thousand dollars in money, grain and clothing is the result of six months' operation by the committee in the Dominion.

## BROADWAY BELLE DROPS FROM SIGHT

Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw, Evicted From Tea Room, Vanishes.

New York, Feb. 2.—Evelyn Nesbitt Thaw has vanished as suddenly as she rose to notoriety through the slaying of Stanford White by her one-time husband, Harry K. Thaw.

A month ago she was evicted from her tea room and apartment at 235 West 11th Street, New York, by her landlords, had her few shabby effects placed on the sidewalk by a city marshal.

The eviction was but one of a series of tragedies that have entered the life of the former belle of Broadway in the last few months. Some time before she had taken a huge overdose of morphine in an effort to die.

The suicidal attempt came when eviction threatened. The city marshal was waiting to dispose of her. The resultant publicity caused her landlords to allow her to stay in her tea room and apartment a little longer.

But a month ago the blow fell. She was evicted. Without funds, and evidently without friends, the woman found herself alone on the sidewalk beside her meagre belongings—a trunk and a small handbag. Next she found a little furnished bed room at Broadway and 52nd street. A week ago, she dropped from sight. Since then no one has been found who has seen her.

Those who know Evelyn are expressing the fear that she may have sought death again and found it.

Newcastle, N. B., Feb. 6.—Death claimed one of Northumberland's leading citizens yesterday in the person of Councillor Murdoch Sutherland, of Red Bank, after an illness of two weeks from pneumonia following influenza. Deceased was about sixty-five years of age and was for years postmaster at Red Bank, where he conducted a general store. For some years he held the office of Overseer of Fisheries for the Northwest Miramichi river, which post he resigned about two years ago. In years of service he was one of the oldest members in the county, having represented North Esk for upwards of twenty years. He was survived by sons, Jeremiah, of Nelson, Mark of Blackville, Melbourne, of Red Bank, Jack, Miller and Norman at home; also four daughters, Francis (Mrs. Lawrence Mather), Newcastle, Martha (Mrs. Melbourne Carter), Miller, Misses Annie and Irene at home. The funeral took place from his late home today.

## SAYS THAT JAZZ

## CORRUPTS YOUTH

Taunton, Mass., Feb. 1.—Jazz was  
denounced as an evil by Mrs. Russell  
T. Hatch, of Melrose, head of the  
nurses' department of the State Fed-  
eration of Woman's Clubs, at a meet-  
ing of the music department of the  
Taunton Woman's Clubs which was  
held at the clubhouse this afternoon.  
Her topic was "The Popular Song of  
To-day and Its Effect Upon the Com-  
munity.""Unless the trend of popular music  
in the country to-day is checked, in a  
few years there will be but few clean-  
minded children in our high schools."  
This was one of the statements made  
by the speaker, in quoting an author-  
ity on music. The girls of to-day  
she claimed, like jazz music because it  
is the prevailing fashion and they  
want to be in style and up to date.  
She said that the difference between  
jazz music and clean, popular music  
was the difference between decency  
and indecency.Jazz music, she asserted, was not  
confined to the dime music halls but  
could also be heard at the exclusive  
country clubs. In referring to many  
of the songs of to-day, she said, it  
gave the young people a wrong im-  
pression of life and that by allowing  
these songs, it tended to lower moral  
standards.She spoke of a new jazz song which  
was about to be placed on sale in the  
Boston music stores, the title of which  
she claimed, was not clean, and this  
song, she said, would be placed on sale  
unless the women's clubs stopped it.  
She suggested that these songs be  
stopped by popular opinion rather  
than by legislation.
